A Letter from the Pastor



I must confess, I spent my Maundy Thursday in a somewhat unconventional way. The first week of April marked a very special occasion for adherents of the three Abrahamic faith traditions, as our major annual observances overlapped, something that is very rare. While we were celebrating Holy Week, those of the Jewish faith were celebrating the Passover on April 5th, and Muslims were at the midway point of their month-long observance of Ramadan. I was invited to be a special guest at an Iftar Dinner that was being held by the Dayton Mercy Society. For those of you who are not familiar with the tradition, an Iftar dinner is the daily fast-breaking meal eaten by Muslims immediately after

sunset during this Islamic holy month. It was a great honor to receive this invitation. And rather humorously, I was seated right next to none other than Jeffrey J. Mims, Jr.!

But what really made the event stand out was their guest speaker, an Imam, professor, and Chaplain from Duke University. He gave a rousing speech about finding common ground in our great faith traditions and how we should all be learning from one another. When he talked about Christianity specifically, he said Muslims could learn a great deal from Christians about works of mercy; how Christians are at the forefront of taking care of the poor and the marginalized, providing disaster relief, and so many other amazing things. It made me think immediately of all the great work that is being done at Fairview.

When it came time for question and answers, one guest happened to ask a very difficult question. He basically asked, 'what do we do in response to leaders who are part of the problem rather than the solution?'

What about the religious leaders who advocate for the second amendment while people are dying in our schools and on our streets? What about the religious leaders who advocate for division rather than unity? What about the religious leaders who call for wars and violence?

It was a question that even the distinguished professor struggled with, so he invited other faith leaders to speak out. I took the challenge. I said that speaking as a Christian minister, I recognize that even our sacred scriptures are fundamentally ambiguous. When taken out of context, a religious leader can make them say anything they want them to. Thus, our scriptures can be used to wound or to heal. But I stated that from a Christian perspective, our Lord Jesus gave us two fundamental commandments, to love God, and to love our neighbors as ourselves. I then emphasized that this is a *universal* truth, that its essence can be found in all of our great traditions, and that this must be the measuring stick with which all other scriptures and the words of all religious leaders must be measured against.

The problem is that there is a spirit of antichrist deep within Western culture that seeks to divide us rather than unite us. We see it every time we scroll through our feeds or turn on our televisions. These voices often drown out those of love and harmony, therefore we must be the counter-narrative. I stated that having this Iftar dinner, with so many people of different faith traditions present is a great example of being that counternarrative. I said that as people of faith, we must stand together in condemning what falls short of that measuring stick, and we must work together in *changing* that narrative. My impromptu sermonizing surprisingly brought a standing ovation.

More importantly, however, I think of these things further as we inch closer to the time of Pentecost, that day when we commemorate the outpouring of the Holy Spirit and the birth of the church. Those early Christians went out boldly proclaiming a message of love and reconciliation, a message that our own culture so desperately needs to hear still today.

It is my prayer then that the Holy Spirit will descend on all of us and on Fairview United Methodist Church, and to continue to lead us in this important work of spreading the love of God and bringing hope to all whom we meet. Come, Holy Spirit, Come!! Fall afresh on us.....



BOOK REVIEW: Ida Keeling (Author), wrote the book Can't Nothing Bring Me Down

Ida Keeling grew up in the Great Depression born to Caribbean immigrants. She raised 4 children by herself under the worst circumstances. Her husband died from a heart attack. Her 2 sons were killed by gun violence. She was an activist in the Civil Rights movement. The loss of her husband and sons was so overwhelming, that Ida was having problems working through it. Sometime later,

when Ida was 67 years old, her daughter suggested running as a way to heal. Miss Ida, as she was known in her Harlem community, always trusted in God to carry her through. She did go running with her daughter and has broken many running records in any age group she ran in and was still running at over 100 years old. She died September 10, 2021, at 106+ years old. This book is well worth the read. She shows that with God in our lives, we can overcome.

As a civil servant since 2009 working with nonprofits, it's my honor to now be serving Fairview UMC and the Dayton community. With the pantry expansion, we can efficiently serve more families in need and process more clients at a time. We're also excited to announce that we'll

be opening the pantry for walk-ins on Wednesday evenings beginning May 3 from 6-8pm. This will allow families who aren't able to come during appointment times Mondays and Fridays to utilize this amazing opportunity that is available to them. To make this expansion a success, we need YOU and your support to make it happen!

So how can you help our new expanded pantry ministries?

PRAYERS – we feel this is a spirit led ministry to a community that is hungry and in need. Pray for our clients and our volunteers as they work together each week.

PRESENCE – stop by and see what we do. You are always welcome when we are open. You can also ask to see the pantry on Sunday morning. There are several people who would love to give you a tour.

GIFTS—we need the financial support of the Fairview congregation to help us pay for the food they we must buy in stores to supplement our stock. Can you afford \$25 a month or more to help this ministry? We can charge that automatically to you or you can place it in the offering. We are also applying for grant money from area agencies to help as well.

SERVICE-- We need YOU! There are lots of opportunities. We need **Assistants** for each pantry client to help them shop. We need **Greeters** to monitor the door as clients come and go. We need **Stockers** to help keep our shelves stocked from the new storage area. We need **Intakers** to enter client information in Pantry Trak, the system connected to the Food Bank. We need **Shoppers** to turn our dollars into food by shopping for the items that we don't get from the Food Bank. We need **Unloaders** to help when we get a truck from the Food Bank.
