PASTOR'S MESSAGE

People of God!!

The gift of newborn's is abundant! This coming Saturday (February 22) we have a double baptism at St. Mary's. Hank Allen Schulte and Kaia Rose Kvam will be baptized after Mass. Hank is the son of Adam and Amanda Schulte and Kaia is the daughter of Beau and Abby Kvam. New eternal souls are an infinite gift from God. At (an infant) baptism, the parents promise to raise the children in the Catholic faith. This is not an easy or light promise to make. Parents should think twice before making this promise. Their salvation may depend on how hard they try to develop a relationship between their children and our loving God.

On the other hand, as I think I've said before. I have talked to parents of adult children who do not practice their faith. I tell them that as long as you raised them to the best of your ability, taking them to Mass and teaching them to pray, then you have nothing to worry about. Children don't come with an owners manual. You (the parent) are a fallen human being. Plus, you are not the only influence in their lives. So, if you did the best you could with the knowledge you had at the time to raise them in the faith, then you can remind them of the truth every once in a while, but don't pester them about Jesus. That will only push them further away from Jesus. Instead pray for your adult children who no longer practice the faith. Ask for Saint Monica's intercession. She prayed for almost two decades that her son would come to Jesus. When her son, Saint Augustine, finally did come to Jesus, he became one of the greatest bishops and writers of early Christianity. We have to remember that God desires their (our adult children) conversion even more than we do.

This week we have the Sermon on the Plane. Here too, just like in the Sermon on the Mount in the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus gives us some of the beatitudes. Blessed are the poor...Blessed are you who are now hungry...Blessed are you when people hate you, exclude you and insult you and denounce your name as evil because of the Son of Man...However, unlike the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus adds the four woes. Woe to you who are rich...woe to you who are filled now...woe to you who laugh now...who to you when all speak well of you... Continued on Page -2-

SAINT OF THE WEEK: St. Wulfric

St. Wulfric was born in England and ordained a priest. At first, he was a very careless priest more in sports than in his vocation. One day, he



experienced a profound sense of God's grace after encountering a beggar. He began living a life of penance. He also copied numerous books and made many things for churches. He was most known for his gift of prophecy. Although his penances were long and severe, most of which seem odd to us today, his service to the Church and it members are noteworthy. St. Wulfric died in 1154. A church now stands over his burial place, the cell in which he lived.
