PASTOR'S MESSAGE

As far as I know, the teachers and students survived the first week of school. Overall, the enrollment is up slightly. We are very blessed to be able to provide the option of a Catholic education here in southeast Minnesota. Thank you to all of you who make sacrifices (time, talent, and treasure) so that our school can exist.

Today's Gospel is an interesting one. Someone asks Jesus, "Lord, will only a few be saved?" Jesus responds, "Strive to enter through the narrow gate, for many, I tell you, will attempt to enter but will not be strong enough." I know I've talked about this before, but as Catholics we do not believe in universal salvation. We don't believe that everyone gets to heaven. Now we can hope that everyone be saved, but it is not reality. Jesus, here and other places, makes it sound like getting into heaven is hard. I run up against this at funerals. So very often, people speak as if the deceased person is already in heaven. I am told all the time at funerals that the deceased is "in a better place." Maybe that is true, but they might also be in Purgatory or hell. So many families are choosing not to have a funeral Mass said for their mom or dad. This is absolutely tragic! They just want a little "celebration of life" ceremony at the funeral home. We have to remember that the funeral Mass is not just for the family members that are still alive. It is for the eternal soul of the deceased. The deceased is most likely not in heaven. Jesus said the gate is narrow; not wide. Jesus said many will attempt to enter but will not be strong enough. This is why Purgatory is one of the hidden gems of our faith. If we are not ready to pass through the narrow gate into heaven at the time of our death, all is not lost. We don't have to go to hell. If we love Jesus imperfectly, we may start our life after death in Purgatory. However, the souls in Purgatory cannot pray for themselves. They rely on God's refining grace, through the prayers of others, to be purified. Eventually a soul in Purgatory is purified enough to be "perfect as your Heavenly Father is perfect." (Matthew 5:48) Then that person transitions from Purgatory to heaven. You cannot go from Purgatory to hell. This is what the funeral Mass is for. It is not to celebrate the person's life, but to pray for the repose of their souls. During the funeral Mass we ask that the graces of the Mass be used

to purify the soul of the deceased so that they may pass from Purgatory to heaven. If we just celebrate their lives and not pray for the repose of their souls, if we just have a "small service at the funeral home," then our loved one is denied the prayers and graces they need to move out of Purgatory and into eternal life in heaven. We are doing them a disservice and lengthening the time they have to spend in Purgatory. It is obviously okay to do both; both celebrate our loved one's life, but then also to pray for them in case they are in Purgatory.

This is also true when we have a Mass intention set for our deceased loved one. This is not just to remember them (although it is or can be that), but more importantly, again to pray for the repose of their souls. If they are already in heaven, great, these graces will be applied to some other soul in Purgatory who needs them. But if the person for whom the Mass intention is for is still in Purgatory, then the graces of the Mass helps purify their souls and lessens the time until they perfectly purified of all sin and attachment to sin and brought home to God in heaven. This behooves us to pray for the souls in Purgatory even outside the Mass. If you are ever in need of something to pray for, pray for the purification of the souls in Purgatory. Unlike us, they cannot pray for themselves. This is why praying for the dead is one of the Spiritual Works of Mercy.
