PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Merry Christmas!

Well, actually not yet. Today we celebrate the Fourth Sunday of Advent. We see Joseph trying to **love** Mary the best he can in the middle of a sticky situation. Again, as I have said many times, Saint Thomas Aquinas defined love as willing the good of the other. Joseph wills Mary's good. He knows that Mary is an amazing person. However, there was evidence to the contrary right in front of him. He doesn't quite know how to square up all of the facts. So, he decides to divorce her quietly. He's not mad at her. He is not vindictive. He still loves her. He still cares for her. He does not want others to shame her or think less of her. However, once an angel explains everything, he does exactly what the angel commanded him to do. In the confessional, sometimes I ask kids in regard to the Fourth Commandment, "Did you do what your parents asked you to do right away every time?" We can ask this question of ourselves in regard to God. Did we, like Joseph, do what God asked of us right away?" As I have said before, often it's not that we don't know what God wants us to do. Often, it's that we hesitate or like Joseph at first, we let fear get the best of us. Jesus says many times throughout the Gospels, "Do not be afraid." Do not be afraid to love greatly, to will someone else's good greatly, to sacrifice greatly for the good of spouse, children, friends, and maybe even strangers.

As I indicated in the greeting, Merry Christmas. Just a reminder, on Christmas Eve Mass is 4 PM at St. Mary's, 5 PM at St. Olaf, 6 PM at St. Patrick's, and 9 PM back at St. Mary's. Then on Christmas Day, we will have Mass at 9:30 AM at St. Mary's. Jesus Christ has taken on our humanity so that we can take on His divinity. Jesus has elevated our humanity into the Godhead. What was mortal and fallen has become eternal and divinized. Through Jesus Christ, we are adopted into the family of God. We are beloved sons and daughters of God the Father. Due to our Baptism, this is our foundational identity. In a fallen world that says we can define ourselves, it is good to remember that we have an objective unchanging identity as believed daughters and sons of God. The incarnation of God, of the Second Person of the Trinity, of God the Son, is the beginning of the end of the victory of God over Satan. This is worthy of being the second most important day in the Liturgical

Fourth Sunday of Advent

Advent candles shine brightly in the midst of darkness, symbolizing and reminding us that Jesus came as Light into our dark world. The candles are often set in a circular Advent wreath.



The **fourth candle** represents **peace** and is called the "Angel's Candle." The angels announced that Jesus came to bring peace--He came to bring people close to God and to each other again. The **fifth candle** represents **light and purity** and is called "Christ's candle." It is placed in the middle and is lit on Christmas Day.
