#### **PASTOR'S MESSAGE**

The Easter season is coming to an end. March 5 was Ash Wednesday. For over three months we have been in the season of Lent and then Easter. For over the last three months we have been focused on the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. We prepared to remember the death of Jesus by remembering our own fallenness. We strove to remove sin from our lives as much as could with the help of the grace of God. Then we celebrated the Resurrection. We remember that this life is not our final destination. We are called not to a set of rules, but to a relationship with Jesus Christ, who wants to give us enteral life in heaven if we are willing to enter into a relationship with Him. Even after the Resurrection, the evangelization efforts of the Apostles were nonexistent. However, after Jesus ascends into heaven and then sends down the Holy Spirit, there is no stopping the Apostles and other disciples from proclaiming the good news of Jesus Christ. From the moment of Pentecost, from the faith of the Twelve, comes billions of Christians. Many mark today as the birthday of the Church.

This past Monday, Premier Banks in Owatonna hosted Priest Golf Tournament at the Country Club in Owatonna as they have for years. My team won, as I expected us to!

St Methodius was born in Sicily and was well educated. He decided to abandon the world and became a monk. The Roman emperor denounced Methodius and confined him for seven years to a mausoleum with two thieves. When Methodius was released, he looked like a skeleton, but his spirit was unbroken. He then was made the Patriarch of Constantinople. He fought valiantly for the Catholic faith. He died of dropsy on June 14, 847.

At the first Pentecost over 3000 people were baptized, creating the **first church**. This is why Pentecost is known as the **birthday of the Christian church**.



Jesus' followers were gathered together for Pentecost, and the Holy Spirit "filled the whole house where they were sitting" (Acts 2:2). "All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them" (Acts 2:4). Pentecost was the celebration of the beginning of the early weeks of harvest. In Palestine, there were two harvests each year. The early harvest came during the months of May and June; the final harvest came in the Fall. Pentecost was the celebration of the beginning of the early wheat harvest, which meant that Pentecost always fell sometime during the middle of the month of May or sometimes in early June. There were several festivals that took place before Pentecost. The Feast of Firstfruits was the celebration of the beginning of the barley harvest. According to the Old Testament, you would go to the day of the celebration of Firstfruits, and beginning with that day, you would count off 50 days. The fiftieth day would be the Day of Pentecost. So Firstfruits is the beginning of the barley harvest and Pentecost is the celebration of the beginning of the wheat harvest.
