
North Portland Harbor residents and businesses on Hayden Island are forming an ad hoc committee to address the noxious odors that emanate from the oil rerefining plants on Suttle Road and Force Avenue.

These plants produce a very obnoxious odor that drives people off their decks or sidewalks and forces them indoors during times of discharge. Most affected are those most proximate to these plants, including Suttle Road Moorage, Class Harbor Moorage, West Hayden Island Moorage, and Jantzen Beach Moorage. Also, Heron Lakes Golf Course (a city-owned facility) has filed hundreds of complaints with the city, with no results so far.

Currently the committee is canvassing adjacent residents and businesses in order to determine the affected areas, but it has been reported as far away as Delta Park and the Bridgeton Road area.

CHANNEL DEEPENING AND TMDL's Submitted By Carol Grant

TMDL (Total Maximum Daily Load) is "A calculation of the maximum amount of a pollutant that a waterbody can receive and still meet state water quality standards, and subsequent allocation of portions of that amount to the pollutant sources or sectors". The Department of Environmental Quality is proposing to adopt new rules regarding TMDL's. A public hearing will be held July 15, 2002 at 2:00 pm at DEQ Headquarters, Room 3A, 811 SW 6th Avenue, Portland, Oregon. Why the Rule? The 1972 Federal Water Pollution Control Act, Section 303 (d) mandated TMDL's be determined for waters of the state that do not meet water quality standards. This rule will include administrative procedures to issue TMDL's, processes for public participation in development of a TMDL, procedures to request reconsideration or appeal of TMDL's and policies for implementing wasteload and load allocations determined by the TMDL. The National Marine Fisheries and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service say deepening the Columbia River Channel will not jeopardize threatened and endangered fish and wildlife. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers will now present an environmental impact statement addressing the project's environmental issues. This project will deepen the 103 mile channel between Astoria and Portland from its current 40 foot minimum depth to 43 feet. Channel deepening needs watching by us river dwellers. What is your thought on how this could effect our habitat? The TMDL's are going to impact everyone. How about volunteering to go to this meeting and report back your findings. Get Involved!! OSMB Faces a Projected 1.3 Million Dollar Shortfall for 2003-2005 Biennial Budget By Tom McInnis

Brief History: The Oregon State Marine Board was created in 1959 by the Oregon Legislature in response to the growing popularity of recreational boating and the federal Boating Safety Act of 1958. The governing board consists of five members, appointed by the governor and confirmed by the senate. The Board sets state boating policy and has the authority to enact rules for vessel operation. The agency itself is a small, independent department, consisting of a director and 38 staff who work with the Board to provide boaters with safety, education, marine law enforcement, boating facilities and titling and registration services.

Funding: The Marine Board as an independent agency is selffunded by registration fees and marine fuel taxes paid by boaters. No general fund tax dollars are used to support its programs. Boater-paid fees go back to the boating community in the form of services and facilities such as boat ramps, parking lots and restrooms.

The Budget Shortfall: The Marine Board will be facing a projected 1.3 million dollar shortfall in the biennium budget of 2003-2005. The budget shortfall can be attributed to many issues. Among them are increasing maintenance and operational costs and a lack of fee increases since 1994. This is compounded by a decrease, or at best, a flattening number of boat registrations and fuel tax revenues.

Solutions: The Marine Board has put together a number of policy option packages which range in combination to reductions in maintenance grants, law enforcement and current levels of service, to fee increases to maintain the statuesque or increase current service levels in the future. The Marine Board has held public workshop meetings on these proposed options and is continuing to solicit comments from stakeholders, customers and the public in general.

How Can You Help or Be Heard: You can contact the Marine Board and request a copy of these proposed options and comment on your preference, or you can come to the next Waterfront Organizations of Oregon board meeting where these and other options will be discussed and comment on what you think your organization's position should be.

.GREEN BLANKET HALIBUT

1 Sheet (12 X 18 inch) heavy duty aluminum foil.

1/2 cup mayonnaise or low fat plain yogurt

1/2 cup (4 oz.) canned green chili salsa

1 tbs. Fresh lime juice

1 tbs. Chopped fresh cilantro or chives

3 (4 to 6 oz. Each) Halibut steaks.

Combine mayonnaise, green chili salsa and lime juice. Set aside. Put halibut steaks on foil on medium hot grill. Cook for 5 minutes then turn steaks over. Brush or spoon mayonnaise mixture on cooked side. Sprinkle with cilantro and continue cooking 5 to 10 minutes more until fish flakes when tested with a fork. Don't overcook. Enjoy!
