

Dr. Simone's Letter

Dear SCM benefactors,

The following excerpt from the Vatican Insider on November 30, 2013, affirms the way that SCM works on your behalf to help the poor. SCM works with Bishops, priests, sisters and lay missionaries to deliver your gift of love to the poor in the same way that Pope Francis does!

Archbishop Krajewski is the man in charge of the Pope's charity work. He is the man the poor and needy turn to for help. Krajewski held an informal meeting with a group of journalists and explained to them how the Pope wants his charity work to be carried out. He explained that requests that come through need to at least carry the relevant parish priest's signature, as a guarantee that the request is genuine. "Once we have made certain the request is genuine, we send a cheque to the parish priest who cashes it in and takes the money directly to the people who need it, on behalf of the Pope." So money is not sent, it is delivered in person. "The Pope told me this: there shouldn't be any money in the Almonry's bank account; you shouldn't hold onto or invest

any money, you should spend it. "The Pope already does a great deal of good," Krajewski said. "'he goes out' via me, 'he goes out' with his words, 'he goes out' when he stops to spend time with faithful and embrace the sick and suffering during public events like the General Audiences."

Executive Director's Letter



Dear SCM benefactors,

More than 5000 people were killed and four million made homeless by the superstorm in the Philippines on November 8, 2013. Silent Children's Mission has sent monetary assistance to the Poor Clares in Cebu to help them with the many families in desperate need. They are so grateful for your help. Here is an excerpt from their letter:

"Thank you so very much for your generosity. We received the funds yesterday. Tomorrow, Saturday, we will start purchasing the necessary and urgent things most needed by the typhoon victims and the next day start distributing it. We will go to the northern part of Cebu, Medellin first. On the next weekend, we will be going out of town, to Dulag and Tan-auan Leyte for more distribution to the families ...these areas are badly hit by the typhoon. Rest assured your support will go a long way with the Poor Clare Sisters who identify the families badly hit."

What does malnutrition look like?

I found this child suffering from severe malnutrition during a visit to Malawi at Kapiri Mission. Unfortunately she died three days after this picture was taken. There was nothing the Carmelite sisters or I could have done to save her.

Malnutrition does not happen instantly – it takes weeks, months and even years to happen to a body. Symptoms of malnutrition include a condition of uneasy or painful sensations caused by want of food. Symptoms include weight loss, dry skin, damaged hair and nails, slow wound healing, and severe conditions (as seen in this photo) include bilateral pitting edema, severe wasting, pale eyes and palms, acute respiratory infections and diarrhea and vomiting.

The UN estimates that nearly 870 million people in the world or one in eight people suffer from chronic malnutrition. Almost all of these people live in developing countries. Children are the most visible victims of under-nutrition especially in Africa where hunger is rising by 2% per year.

The world produces at least 2720 kcal of food per person per day and despite this, children continue to live with "want of food". Dr. Simone often says, "We don't have too many children – we have too many selfish adults. There's enough food and there's enough space for everyone on this earth. But as long as we fight and we have wars and we keep taking care of our own concerns – that's why the poor suffer."

Please help us to reach more children before it is too late for them. If you cannot help at this time - please pray for the work of Silent Children's Mission.

May God bless you and your families during this Christmas season.
