Executive Director's Update

Dear SCM benefactors.

Although 2020 had challenges, we are very grateful for the many donations we received. We were able to provide school fees for hundreds of children, support feeding programs at churches and schools, help provide health care for mothers and children in under-resourced communities, help grow our two self-sufficient farms in Haiti and Malawi, and provide spiritual care, all via our religious and lay missionaries.

In his Apostolic Letter *Patris Corde* (With a Father's Heart), Pope Francis has proclaimed 2021, the Year of St. Joseph. Several months prior to this proclamation, we received a call from a benefactor wanting to know if a donation could be accepted with the provision that it be used for a project in honour of St. Joseph. Her timing was Providential for

everyone involved, especially the children her generous donation will be serving. A letter accompanied donation which included: "When I spoke to you, I asked about the cost of a borehole (well) and you gave me a cost of \$5000.00. That is exactly the amount of money I promised St. Joseph. Prior to my phone call, and as I was praying to St. Joseph and asking him which charity I was to pledge to, your newsletter arrived in our mailbox - the only piece of mail for that day. I read it from cover to cover and felt that St. Joseph was answering my prayer...". We are pleased to share that the well will indeed be named "St. Joseph's Well" and the children will learn about the goodness of this special saint through this inspired project. The well is in the

process of being dug in the VOA camp, a permanent makeshift camp in the suburbs of Monrovia, Liberia in West Africa where Fr. Michael and I visited in 2016. St. Joseph's well will provide safe, clean drinking water for the children attending a school in this underresourced community (see page 5). We are blessed to collaborate with missionaries who are dedicated to building the kingdom of God through loving service to those in need.

Pope Francis describes how St. Joseph teaches us "the value, the dignity, and the joy of what it means to eat bread that is the fruit of one's own labour" (Patris Corde).

There is a need for us to understand the importance of dignified work and how our brothers and sisters in many countries do not have the opportunity to experience this, especially during this time of pandemic. Current demographic trends show that one in five young people in the world will be born in lower developed countries, 2030. As the world recovers from the pandemic, it is these countries that will suffer profound long-term effects as many workers experienced workplace closure, making it increasingly difficult for parents (UN, 2020). Advances that were made in relieving world poverty have been lost due to the pandemic and recovery with be

challenging. That is why assisting children to meet their educational, nutritional, physical, and spiritual needs is so important in helping them to meet their potential, develop selfworth, experience dignity, and have the opportunity to develop their souls.

Thank you to all of our benefactors, who like St. Joseph, are unnoticed and discreet in their giving, but generously make a profound difference in the lives of so many.

Please continue to support this mission with your prayers and financial donations, because without your help we can do nothing.

Spiritual Director Report

The cost of the COVID-19 pandemic on the world's poorest countries



"... He sowed seeds of peace and walked alongside the poor..."

This article is a summary of some of the impact that the present pandemic is having on poor people all over the world. Although it is difficult to know the full impact, we do know that for the first time in 20 years, poverty is likely to increase significantly.

Covid-19 does not strike random—mortality is much higher in elderly people, poorer groups, and ethnic minorities, and its economic effect is also unevenly distributed across the population. Growing child poverty, homelessness, and food poverty will lead to an unprecedented rise in infant mortality, mental health problems, and falling life expectancy,

especially for women in the poorest areas and cities. The economic fallout is likely to be felt for years. Leading UN economists say that the pandemic is likely to cause the worst economic crisis in decades among least developed countries. "The COVID crisis is leading least developed countries to their worst economic crisis in 30 years, with per capita GDP for the group expected to fall by 2.6 per cent this year." (Mukhisa Kituyi, UNCTAD).

The world faces a greater challenge than ever before as the pandemic threatens to undo vears of eradication progress in poverty while exacerbating pre-existing inequalities and exposing fragility of our systems. In 2019, the UN estimated 700 million people lived in extreme poverty with earnings per capita of average \$1,088 compared with the world \$11,371. These average of countries have a weak infrastructure and reduced financial means to withstand economic shocks.

The World Bank now projects 88 million to 115 million *more* people will be forced into extreme poverty by the year's end, with that figure potentially reaching up to 150 million in 2021. For those living in extreme poverty, the biggest concern is not the virus, but hunger. The World Food Programme has warned that

the number of people facing food insecurity would double as a result of the pandemic without adequate measures. "Covid-19 is potentially catastrophic for millions who are already hanging by a thread" (Arif Husain, WFP).

This information can serve as motivation for us to continue to support efforts to alleviate poverty worldwide. YOU can, and are, making a difference. Looking ahead, Pope Francis warned us that our worst response after the crisis would be for us to "plunge even more deeply into feverish consumerism and new forms of egoistic self-preservation." (Fratelli Tutti). His hope is that we will no longer think in terms of "them and those" but only as "us".

As Mother Teresa once said:

"If you can't feed just a hundred people, then just feed one."

Let us be part of the solution, and along with our prayers, let us continue to fight the battle and help our brothers and sisters who need it most.

Displaced people and refugees made their way to hide in these deplorable, dilapidated houses as a permanent home for them until today. The St. Joseph's well will provide safe drinking water which will prevent water borne diseases, as hygiene is a big challenge in the VOA camp. With the completion of the bakery we are hiring a licensed baker to teach the woman an apprenticeship program and when they complete the training they will be given a job baking bread. The bread then will be used for the feeding program and school program along with the peanuts, honey, eggs, and chicken produced on the farm. Our goal is to be a self sustaining community taking care of the needs of those in dire circumstances. There is a Haitian proverb:

We only want help to reach the first branch of the tree, once there, we can climb to the top on our own.


