-2022 REPORT-



It is the pleasure of my office to provide to our community the 2022-year end report.

Members of the Div. of Fire & Emergency Medical services handled a total of 2,131 dispatched emergency 911 calls requiring either a fire, medical, or rescue response. We typically handle the shift, when fully staffed, with five (5) members on duty. Two (2) of those members are out of Firehouse 51 located on Addison Road, and three (3) members stationed at our headquarters, located on St. Rt. 7 NE. The Fire Chief works a day turn schedule of Monday-Friday and manages the department with the assistance of the command staff. Brookfield Div. of Fire & EMS is contracted with the Township of Hartford to provide fire and emergency medical services, making our response district approximately fifty (50) square miles. We provide this service with the following pieces of apparatus:

The department is comprised of six (6) fulltime Career Firefighter/Paramedics, one (1) fulltime Fire Chief, six (6) Volunteer Firefighters, fourteen (14) part-time Firefighter EMT's & Paramedics, & a Chaplain. All members are certified to their level through the State of Ohio Div. of EMS and most have certifications and education well above the baseline requirements. These classes include but are not limited to the following:

EMT- Basic • Paramedic • Fire I & II • Educator/Instructor • Inspector • Confined Space Rescue • Trench Rescue • Structural Collapse Rescue • Pump Operations I & II • Fire Officer I-IV • Hazardous Materials Technician • Advanced Auto Extrication • National Incident Management • Investigator

Two thousand twenty-two proved to be a turning point for the Division of Fire & Emergency Medical Services. We were met with the challenges of a shrinking workforce, just as many other industries have seen. This is in part due to the post-pandemic world in which we live, elevated unemployment rates, a lack of desire for the fire & EMS field, and many other justifications. We have worked very hard as a department to recruit and retain new employees, but unfortunately for us our industry has so many vacancies that our part-time employees are leaving to take fulltime/career jobs with other departments. We have struggled to compete with wages and benefits, but some of the main competitions are bigger cities with far deeper pockets. Regardless, we have taken steps to provide for our employees and have done so this past year by making big strides to overcome some of the previous hurdles identified here in the township, this includes new state of the art equipment, pay increases for the part- & full-time staff, bringing contracts inline with current and future needs, implementing standards, and increasing our fulltime staff. These measures mentioned, and many more behind the scenes, have been an effort by all whom are involved; the township trustees, my office, members of the department, the firefighter's union local, & the volunteer division, as well as other area fire departments and their command staff, all whom have supported our endeavors. We all work very closely to meet the growing needs of our community and region. We do this by identifying shortcomings and areas that need improvement and then work cohesively to identify and accomplish our goals.

We can't win the game if we don't play as a team.



I am very pleased and excited to announce this past year we were the recipients of over a quarter million dollars in grant funding. Starting back in January, we received a grant from Firehouse Subs totaling over \$11k for the purchase of thermal imaging cameras. With this grant we were able to equip every on-duty firefighter with these life-saving devices. These tools are used to identify heat signatures that allow the user to differentiate different temperatures in a fire and non-fire setting which increases our chances of finding trapped persons more quickly. The handheld units also identify hidden fire allowing us to practically ensure extinguishment; thus, saving homeowners hundreds of thousands of dollars from fire that could have possibly gone otherwise undetected. In March, were awarded a grant from the Ohio Department of Natural Resources totaling \$10k, we coupled those monies with capital previously conserved, to purchase a new brush fire unit. This purchase was made to fit the needs of not only our department, but the surrounding communities and terrain. We last had a dedicated brush fire unit that were twin jeeps from the 1970's. These jeeps no longer met the needs of the department and have been out of service for the past four years because of their unreliability and many safety factors that affected the firefighter. We purchased a utility terrain vehicle with a skid unit. This new apparatus was upfitted to allow for the transport of water and a fire pump to areas we were not able to reach before with the equipment we had, in addition this unit has transport capabilities in the event we have a person injured or lost miles from surrounding roads. We also have a portable combination tool used for extrication that is battery operated and can be taken into a wooded area or onto a riding trail if the need arises. In September, the Federal Emergency Management Agency made notice that in a competitive process we were awarded a grant totaling \$241,413.28 with our 5% local match for the purchase of four (4) new cardiac monitors/defibrillators & four (4) mechanical cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) assist devices. These items were definitely a department need, as the ones we currently are using are end of life; meaning parts can no longer be obtained and they cannot be updated. We then received word that we would become the recipients of a \$5k grant from the Ohio/Trumbull County Farm Bureau for a grain bin rescue tube, a necessity for rescuing someone trapped in grain or other agricultural products.

As we made our way throughout the year, my office received word that James Williamson would be resigning from our ranks as a Captain to take a fulltime fire chief's job in Newton Falls. We wished him the very best of luck and we know that with his leadership he will take that department to new levels. The vacancy, created by his departure, was quickly filled with Firefighter/Paramedic Derek Hollander. Derek was promoted to Career Captain and assigned newly hired Firefighter/Paramedic Brian Stanley. Not too long after this changing of the guard, FF/Medic Russ Vereshack left for a job closer to his residence and we hired Brookfield's first fulltime female Firefighter/Paramedic, Ms. Carly Jackson. Carly and Brian served with us in the part time ranks and through their dedication and commitment they were able to promote to career positions.

Our firehouses had some minor renovations to help make them a better and safer place to work. At Firehouse 18, we had a new man door installed with drainage. This will help to alleviate and hopefully negate the ice jam and onslaught of water that would pour into the station when it rained or snowed. We were also able to upgrade the interior lighting on the office side of the building as well as the laundry room area. At Firehouse 51 we had both the interior and exterior lighting upgraded and along with that, members of the department painted the interior walls and doors. Snowblowers were purchased for both stations and a new outdoor grill was procured for Firehouse 51. Also, at the request of employees, landscaping was added to the front of firehouse 51 to give the building better appeal.

Overall, the year 2022 was good to the department, we did lose some members, but we also gained new that are willing and able to step up and meet the needs of the department and the community. Our job is dynamic which means that we will always be changing and adapting to the needs and demands that we face. We, here at Brookfield Division of Fire & Emergency Medical Services are here for you and whatever it is you need, we stand at the ready to give it our best.

Thank you for all of the support each person in our community gives to us and we look forward to a safe and prosperous 2023.







Overall command may be relinquished to a more qualified person based on the incident type so long as that person is competent and a proper transfer of command occurs.










HARTFORD TWP. RESPONSES BY TYPE/MONTH 2022














Overall Mutual Aid 2022



Mutual aid is defined as just that, it is aid from one jurisdiction to another mutually exchanged based on a fire or EMS system being overstrained for one reason or another. This may include incidents, based on their size &complexity, call volume, manpower shortages, vehicle shortages, etc....agreements with our neighbors throughout the area to assist them, and vice versa, in their time of need. It is this department's position that c=boundary lines do not exist and when someone calls for assistance, they need just that...assistance.






***These numbers reflect both Fire/EMS and include automatic aid ***







Each day, the shift is scheduled to have two fulltime and three part time personnel, for a total of five persons on duty.


With regards to this scheduling, these are five (5) twenty-four (24) hour shifts totaling one-hundred and twenty (120) hours to be filled each day.

In respect to part-time availability, benefit time off for vacation, sick, compensatory, and other types of leave, and in addition to the experience and levels of training it is sometime necessary to close Firehouse 51.


There are many factors that go into the decision to close Firehouse 51, these include being centrally located within the entire district, the types of specialized apparatus and equipment housed at Firehouse 18; and the inability to move all this equipment from one firehouse to another. Additionally, most command related functions required to be performed during the tour, can only be accomplished at the headquarters station.

We work very diligently to be certain that we are providing the very best of our service and skills to all resident at all times






MEDICAL CALLS BY MONTH 2022






EMS Runs by District









EMS Calls by Shift 2022












