

Bannockburn Tour Package 2014 submitted by Kenneth McAlpine

There have been several inquiries regarding a potential tour package at the 2014 Stirling Games.

For several days before and after our 2004 AGM in Oban Scotland, 25 of us enjoyed a tour through Scotland, which included visits to many areas of particular relevance to our Clan's history.



Some of the highlights included a visit to see the Stone of Destiny (Stone of Scone) upon which the MacAlpine Kings were coronated, a visit to Dunadd Hillfort our ancient Clan seat, and a visit to the Isle of Iona where King Kenneth MacAlpin is buried.

In 2004 we arranged two Clan MacAlpine 2004 AGM "Cuimhnich Bàs Ailpein" tour packages (7 nights or 9 nights) with Alex Hood of Scottish Highland Trails which featured a "MacAlpine sites" emphasis.

Prices **DID NOT** include airfare. Interested parties made a reservation and nonrefundable deposit (15%) six months prior.

Tour Highlights - August 21 - 27 or 29, 2004

- Three nights in Edinburgh in walking distance of the "Royal Mile" and Edinburgh Castle, the Palace of Holyrood House, the shops of Princes Street, and the new Museum of Scotland;
- Tickets to Edinburgh Castle, home to the "Stone of Scone" on which King Kenneth MacAlpin was coronated, and to the Edinburgh Military Tattoo;
- A visit to Stirling University and the (Sir William) Wallace Monument;
- Three nights (basic tour) or four nights (extended tour) in Oban in walking distance of the town center and all its amenities:
- Visits to the Dunadd Iron Age Fort (King Kenneth MacAlpin's early capital), one or two Standing Stones in Kilmartin, and Dunstaffnage Castle (lies on lands of our original Clan seat):
- Dinner from a traditional Highland Menu with Scottish Entertainment;
- The Society's AGM;
- March in the Parade to the festival grounds;
- The Argyllshire Gathering with games, piping, and other festivities:
- Tickets to the private Clan MacAlpine Dinner with entertainment, including: Pipe Major Peter MacInnes (a top

solo Piper in Scotland), a display of Highland Dancing, Patricia Roberts (a Clarsach Player of the Highest standard), a tribute to the Haggis with the address given by Alex Hood, (past President of the biggest Robert Burns Club in the Edinburgh area);

• A visit to Glencoe and the site of the notorious Massacre of MacDonald of Glencoe in 1692; one night in the vicinity of your departing airport.

Short Tour Only

 Also, drive along the west shore of Loch Lomond and visit the Scottish Wool Centre.

Extended Tour Only

- Also, travel on the Isle of Mull to the Isle of Iona (burial place of King Kenneth MacAlpin) and the Abbey founded by St Columba in 563AD;
- Visit "Dewars World of Whisky" and tour the Aberfeldy Single Malt Whisky Distillery;
- Stay one night in Dunkeld (King Kenneth MacAlpin's ecclesiastical center);
- Visit Scone Palace and the Moot Hill (King Kenneth MacAlpin moved his capital here in 843 AD and was crowned King of Scots and Picts on Moot Hill in a ceremony using the Stone of Scone);
- Visit St. Serf's Church in Dunning, home to the Dupplin Cross (said to have been erected by King Kenneth MacAlpin);
- Visit the Bannockburn Battlefield and Memorial.
- Guests returning to Glasgow will pass Loch Lomond while guests returning to Edinburgh will pass through the South Queensferry/Forth Bridges area.

The 2004 Basic Tour Cost: Adults, double occupancy - £ 985 BPS (approx. \$1,645 US) per person, Single Occupancy - £ 1,170 BPS (approx. \$1,955 US) per person; Children under 12 - 760 BPS (approx. \$1,270 US) per person.

Extended Tour Cost: Adults, double occupancy - £ 1,330 BPS (approx. \$2,220 US) per person, Single Occupancy - £ 1,510 BPS (approx. \$2,520 US) per person; Children under 12 - £ 940 BPS (approx. \$1,570 US) per person.

Prices have certainly increased since then, but if there is sufficient interest, inquiries will be made at several tour operators and a suggested package will be posted in the next newsletter...

Greetings Clan MacAlpine:

On behalf of the COSCA Board of Trustees let me welcome you back to Pleasanton.

The Council of Scottish Clans & Associations (COSCA) and The Standing Council of Scottish Chiefs (SCSC), in association with the 40th anniversary of the Stone Mountain Highland Games are pleased to announce a joint seminar to be held on Friday October 19.

An unprecedented number of Scottish Chiefs, Commanders and heirs will gather at Stone Mountain as Honored Guests of the Games. This presents a unique opportunity for COSCA and SCSC to host a Scottish clan leadership caucus to convene the day before the games official opening.

This collaborative event will bring together American clan leaders, leaders of the American Scottish diaspora, Scottish Chiefs and heirs and invited special Scottish guests to discuss some of the most important issues facing the American Scottish diaspora.

Sir Malcolm MacGregor of MacGregor, Convener of the SCSC remarked, "the Standing Council of Scottish Chiefs fully acknowledges the importance of our American kith and kin within the clan network. So it is more than appropriate to work with COSCA at our first joint seminar at Stone Mountain."
