Being a godparent requires investment of time and energy. Make sure that you have the time, the willingness and the faith to live out this sacred vocation. These parents are calling you to be something special for their child: to set an example, help teach their child about the Catholic faith, have a lifelong relationship of prayer, faith sharing and love.

Be there on the "big day." Be available for the Baptism ceremony. Besides saying, "We are," when asked if you are ready to assist the parents in raising the child in the practice of the faith, you will have the opportunity to clothe the child in the white baptismal garment, and to light the baptismal candle. Take seriously the profound yet beautiful words: "Parents and godparents, this light has been entrusted to you to be kept burning brightly."
