

Iron Bridge (Algoma)

This society, organized in 1887, was one of the first fairs held along the North Shore. Farmers came from as far away as 17 miles with team and wagon to the fair which, at that time, was held across the highway from the present fairgrounds.

Going back (over 60 years), one of the present members recalls that there were many grain exhibits, including Banner oats and Chancellor peas, Beauty of Hebron and Irish Cobbler potatoes.

Field crop competitions have brought in seed better suited to the district in Rodney, Vanguard and Garry oats.

Though heavy horses were numerous in early days, saddle horses and ponies were also popular.

Livestock were tied to fences along the road and sheep placed in small pens. The "ladies' work" and other exhibits were displayed in the Orange Hall, away from the fairgrounds.

Finally, in 1926, the society purchased about three acres of land from Nelson Warnock and, in the same year, let a contract to Mr. Davidson for \$150 to erect a 30 x 60-foot hall. Lumber and other materials were donated or bought by the society. This hall was enlarged to accommodate the school fair. It was where the laneway beside the Esso gas station is today.

- 1. All entry tags must be filled out correctly (see sample).
- 2. The secretary will retain \$5.00 in prize money from each adult exhibitor's winnings for the following year's membership fee.
- 3. Only one entry per section of each class per person.
- 4. Every article or product entered must be grown and/or made totally by the person exhibiting. Exhibitor may be asked to sign an affidavit.
- 5. No prize will be awarded unless the article is deemed worthy by the judge.
- 6. Should the society's funds be insufficient to pay prizes fully, gift certificates and/or merchandise may be awarded in lieu of prize money, with explanation provided. All cheques must be cashed by October 31 of that year or will be null and void.
- 7. If a sponsor withdraws support in a given year, only the Iron Bridge Agricultural Society (IBAS) prize will be awarded.
- 8. A list of all articles entered must accompany exhibits.
- 9. All articles to be recently made by the exhibitor and not previously shown at the Iron Bridge Fair. Only quilts may be shown two years in a row.
- 10. Exhibitors leave exhibits on the front table only; no one (except authorized personnel) is permitted past this area. No entries are received after 11 a.m. on Friday.
- 11. All special merchant gifts and certificates that have been received and awarded by the IBAS have been obtained in good faith and when awarded become a contract between the merchant and the recipient. The society is not responsible for dissatisfaction with the award.
- 12. We recommend exhibitors follow the O.A.A.S. judging standards.
- 13. The IBAS shall not be held responsible for lost or damaged entries while at the fair.
- 14. Competitors cannot display their item using a purchased design pattern without the permission of the owner of the design pattern. It is the responsibility of the competitor to obtain this permission from the designer.
- 15. All protests must be made to the secretary (in writing) before the exhibits leave the grounds. It must be accompanied by a sum of \$5.00, which is to become the property of the society if the protest is not substantiated.

16. NO ENTRIES ARE TO BE REMOVED UNTIL AFTER 4 P.M. ON FAIR CLOSING DAY.

All canned goods must be presented in jars of 1 pint or less and be sealed with a two piece metal closure designed for home canning – **no wax**. It is required that all preserves be cooked in a boiling water bath for a minimum of 10 minutes/Pressure Canner. Label with name of product and date processed in small, neat, legible writing/printing. Rings to be removed by the exhibitor and fastened with an elastic. Tags to be fastened with an elastic. Pressure gauge may be used to test seal (a small hole will be made in lid).

- Choose vegetables uniform in size and colour.
- Cut off tops 1 cm (1/2 inch) from applicable vegetables and leave on tap roots.
- Wipe or brush clean. Display on a sturdy disposable plate.
- Pumpkins and Squash must have stem on.


