THE STEVEN F. UDVAR-HAZY CENTER The new Smithsonian Air Museum......



Six of us, Jim Snyder, Steve Snyder, Tom Smith, Bernie Gerber, John Kocon and Achille Silvestri took a day trip to the Steven F. Udvar-hazy Center. Jim very kindly offered to drive. We had breakfast on the way, fought all the DC traffic and still got there 15 minutes ahead of opening time, 10:00AM. The Center is an extension of the Smithsonian's National Air and Space Museum. They have simply acquired so much materiel they needed more space (space,

t it). They are located near Dulles International

They have a very modens in and some facility, excellently laid out, with a very large number of beautifully restored playes. Have all sorts of civilian and military aircraft. They include pre-WWI planes, a variety of experimental craft, a large number of WWII, many high performance jets of the post WWII era and a number of space craft. Some of their most famous items include the Space Shuttle Enterprise, B-29 Superfortress Enola Gay, Air France Concorde, the Lockheed SR-71 Blackbird (the world's fastest airplane), the Boeing 307 Stratoliner and many, many other items associated with flight.

I've seen larger collections of aircraft, but none as well laid out as the Center's. The thing they do particularly well is that they have many multi-layered ramps so visitors can observe the planes from ground level, intermediate level and a higher level, whereby, you can actually look down on some of the planes. They even have an observation tower where you watch planes approaching and leaving Dulles Airport. Unfortunately, this day the weather was poor and there wasn't too much to see.

Additionally they have an IMAX Theatre and a nice gift shop. We had lunch at a Subway shop on site. They had box lunches and drinks which were served quickly and efficiently with plenty of seating area.

Our day trip to the Steven F. Udvar-Hazy Center was a fine experience and, not to sound too cheesy, would be enjoyed by the whole family.

A BUILDING TIP by Leo Behr....

Along with my annual order of wood from Balsa USA, I also ordered a roll of their Aerospan covering. What the heck, for \$8.99 a roll I'll try anything once. Aerospan is a low heat film covering much like Mono and Ultracote. It can take more heat than you may think. I found it adheres without primer to balsa and even ply, extremely well, without leaving too many blisters or bubbles over solid areas. It also formed around compound curves without leaving wrinkles. The finish is glossy somewhat like Ultracote. For \$8.99 a roll I feel it's worth a try.
