PUT ENOUGH ENGINE ON IT AND YOU CAN FLY ANYTHING...

Oh really! When I put together my "Old Timer", I expected nothing more than a slow easy flyer, even though it was classified as a sport flyer. Luckily for me Tom Smith was with me when I made my test flight. The plane took off and went crazy, it was all over the place, it was like it never heard of the laws of flight, Bernoulli's principle or birds skirting the flying field. Fortunately, Tom took the transmitter, made a few frightening passes and was able to safely land it. After that it was a bunch of studies trying to figure out what went wrong. John Kocon became part of the consulting team. We agreed to adjust the CG and increase the double dihedral to conform more closely

to the plans. But in flight more erratic and unpredictable moves were the menu of the day. Tom tried it and John tried it to no avail. Fortunately, we were able to get it back, once again, in one piece. We were ready to give up...it was an unflyable monster. Then John offered up an extra Cub wing from his stash The Cub wing fitted real well into the frame of the Old Timer. I put it all together and Tom and I took it out for a test. Tom took it off and after some minor trim adjustments, it flew very well. It flies just like a Cub except it has better ground characteristics. Obviously, the trouble was with the wing, perhaps it was twisted or the dihedral was not just right. But the plane flies well with the Cub wing and that's how we'll leave it. The lesson is that, while many airplane designs are very forgiving, you still need to pay close attention to basic features such as the CG and the building of the wing.
