- 2. The replacement/repair of shed was discussed. Achille Silvestri is willing to donate his shed. Steve Snyder priced materials and found we could build one with a garage door for about \$1000.


New business

May 2011 The Old Days... Bob Walker

We did 1983 a few months ago, but a lot was happening back then in our hobby.

One of the first CA glues was Hot Stuff. Everyone was having fun trying to figure out how to unstuck fingers, etc. 3 ounces was about \$4. Satellite City either made or distributed it. Carl Goldberg had Super Jet CA glue. Both were advertising accelerator for the CA. Pacer also had CA glue, but was advertising their debonder....handy for those stuck together fingers.....

World Engines was the US distributor for OS Engines. June 15 was the advertised arrival date of the new OS FS-120 4 cycle engine. The new design of this engine was to greatly increase the power and was intended to be used by pattern flyers.

The July 1983 issue of Model Aviation Magazine noted that the Radio Control Modelers of Baltimore were going to have a contest on June 11. My father, John Walker had the centerfold of that issue. His construction article for the CO2 SWATT had full sized plans in the center so they could be easily removed. This was a military like pusher plane using a Brown Twin CO2 engine and free flight. Built using....CA glue.

Electric planes were starting to get popular. Astro Flight was a leader in electric motors, chargers, controllers, etc. Unfortunately, NiCadTM batteries were being used. They were large, heavy and took a while to recharge, but the field was picking up in popularity.

Sheldon's Hobby Shop in California was advertising fuel. 5% nitro for \$6.95; 15% was \$9.25, so fuel really has not gone up over the years.

Ace Radio Control was advertising frequency flags....not the ones numbered 11-50, but with colors. In 1983 we still only had about 10 frequencies. And we were on wideband.

Kraft, once the premier manufacturer of radio control systems in the 60's and 70's was advertising their K-Line systems. These were imports and the beginning of the end of RC systems being manufactured in the US.

JR Radios were distributed by Circus Hobbies of Las Vegas. They were priced between \$100 and \$460. The various models were called Apollo, Circus, Century and Unlimited. Futaba had ball bearing, coreless and high speed servos.

Circus Hobbies also had a large selection of Kalt Helicopters, most with collective. These were priced \$200 to \$500. Circus also distributed Webra engines from Germany, which recently went under. Helicopters were popular enough to have a column each month in Model Aviation.

Still not a lot of good ARF's in the early 80's....Lanier may have been the largest. The big kit manufacturers included Andrews, Bridi, Dave Platt, Goldberg, Johnnie Cashburn, M.E.N., Midwest, Pica, Sig, Top-Flite. Engines were Irvine, H-B, OS, Enya, Super Tiger, Fox, and K&B.

SAFETY REPORT....Bob Walker, Safety Officer

If the field dries out, flyers will be flocking to the field. The cold weather is a thing of the past until Fall. Hopefully, this will not be a windy season.

But once you finally get out there, here are a few things to remember:

- Range checking seems to be a lost art. When I started in RC back in the 60's, I always range checked before flying. Half the time, there was no range, so it was back to the bench to find out why. I still range check each day before flying. With the 72 mHz systems it is easy. Collapse the antenna and start walking. With the 2.4 gHz transmitters, the way to range check may not be obvious. Your first time at the field each season, it is especially important to do a range check. Bring out the radio manual and check before flying.
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- The bane of computer radios is that they have multiple programs for multiple planes. A number of planes crash every year because the radio is set to the wrong plane. The people who take off and find they have reversed controls seldom land in one piece. Model Match is a nifty thing on Spektrum radios, but I do not think the others have this. Check the carburetor if you can before starting too. A reversed throttle and engine starting at full rpm can be an unpleasant surprise.

- 4. The pit area is dangerous. Please do not have children wondering around this area. Each year there are several plane crashes in the pit or close by fly overs. If your guests or children are not flying, please keep them behind the fence.
 5. With regard to pets, the second sign coming into the field states that all dogs in the park must be on a leash. Please be courteous to
