

About the Native Alliance Against Violence (NAAV)



- Total population: 2,937,150
- 3.3% American Indian and Alaska
 Native alone or in combination with
 another race

Oklahoma

- Total population: 4,095,393
- 9.5% American Indian and Alaska Native alone
- Other sources say that 13.3% of Oklahomans are Native—the difference of 156,000 people!

Advocacy and Public Policy

Public Policy:

- Broad
- Actions and decisions made by lawmakers and the government to address societal issues
- Set the rules of the game

Advocacy:

- Narrow, focused on specific areas or causes
- Process of influencing the decisions and policies to achieve a specific outcome
- Tries to influence or change the rules of the gam



Structure of Kansas Legislature

- Bicameral legislature
- House 125 members
- Senate 40 members
- Begins January 12, 2026
- Usually adjourns late April/early May



Structure of Oklahoma Legislature

- Bicameral legislature
- House 101 members
- Senate 48 members
- Begins the first Monday in February
- Must adjourn by the last Friday in May

What You Need to Know 2025

- SB 135: provides precedence of child-related orders issued under the Protection from Abuse (PFA) Act
- HB 2182: prohibits a sheriff from charging a fee for service of process for proceedings under the Protection from Abuse (PFA) Act, and Protection from Stalking, Sexual Assault, or Human Trafficking (PFSSAHT) Act and similar proceedings based on the laws of other jurisdictions
- SB 204: requires the sealing of certain records related to case information, warrants, and subpoenas in certain criminal and juvenile offender cases



Notable Recent Kansas Bills and Laws

 2021 HB 2008 - Training for law enforcement agencies on MMIP (Passed)

• 2024 HB 2735 – Est. a task force on missing women black, indigenous and people of color (didn't σ



2025 Trends in Oklahoma

- "child pornography" --> child sexual abuse material
- 85% of sentence served for people with convictions for serious crimes before parole is an option
- School safety: clarifications to rape definitions for students ages 16-20, whistleblower protections extended to school support employees, etc

Notable Stitt Vetoes and Legislature Overrides 2025

HB 1273 – batterers intervention pilot program

 HB 1137 – establishes an Office of Liaison for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Person without requirement of federal funding

These are both state law after overrides





What You Need to Know 2025

- HB 1360: Address Confidentiality Program, program manager can request county assessors take all info offline and only store securely at office
- HB 2705: SA victims can request evidence updates on forensic testing from law enforcement agencies
- HB 1575: Streamlined Services Act, OKDHS will establish one application for all benefits programs such as SNAP, TANF, and Medicaid
- HB 1566: Oklahoma Elder Exploitation and Abuse Act
- HB 1003: Age of consent is now 18 in Oklahoma
- SB 599: Amends law so death penalty and life without parole are on the table for first conviction of molestation of child under 14 instead of second conviction



Scary 2025 bills that thankfully failed

- SB 829: would take away no fault divorce
- SB 228: establishes the Covenant Marriage Act

Expect these same bills or similar to be proposed again next year!




Oklahoma 2025 bill tracking document

What is the Victims of Crime Act?

The Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) uses non-taxpayer money from the Crime Victims Fund (CVF) to support 6+ million victims of crime annually, through domestic violence shelters, rape crisis centers, child abuse treatment programs, and more. Sustained VOCA funds are needed to ensure that victims can reach out for help when they are in danger.
