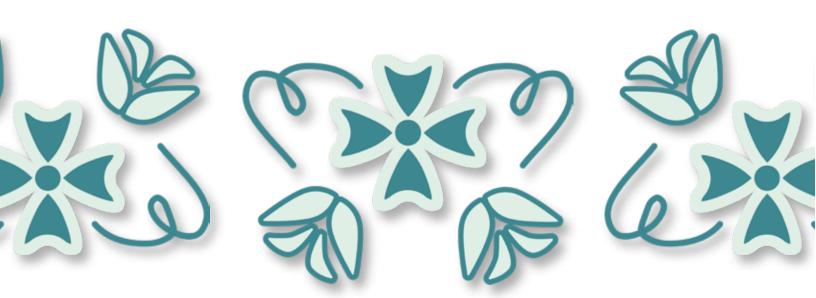


Introduction to SEXUAL ASSAULT AWARENESS MONTH Outreach toolkit

Grooming signs:

Victim Selection - Abusers often observe possible victims & select them based on ease of access to them.

Isolating the victim- Abusers will attempt to physically or emotionally separate a victim from those protecting them.

Trust development & keeping secrets- Abusers attempt to gain trust through gifts, attention, sharing secrets to make them feel that they have a caring relationship to the victim.

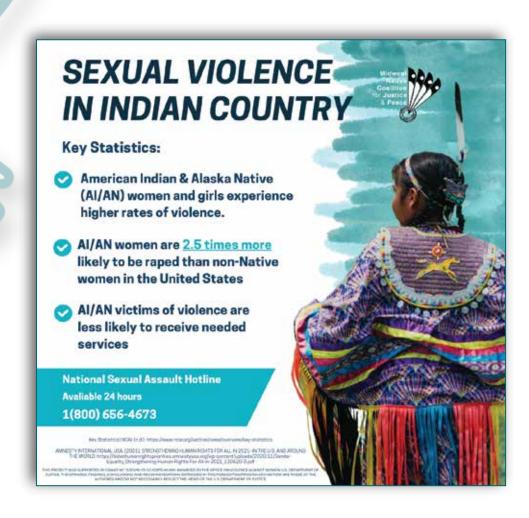
Desensitization to touch- Abusers will often start to touch a victim in ways that appear harmless, such as hugging, tickling, and later escalate to sexual contact, such as massages or showers together.

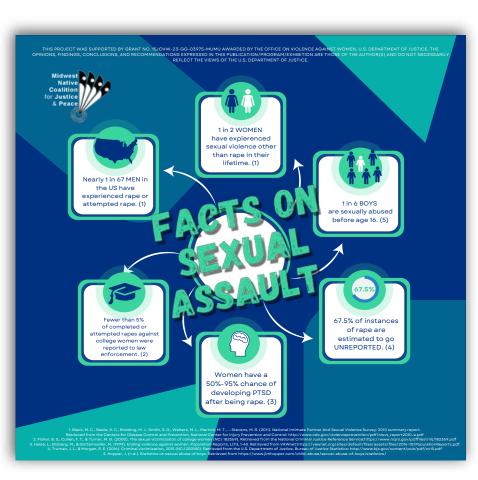

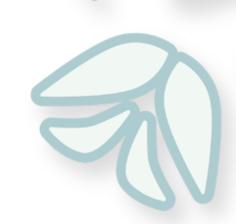








Event Planning



Community Art Mural Plan

Step 1: Planning & Advertising (Before April)

Timeline: Allow a couple of weeks before April for planning and advertising.

1. Design the Concept:

- Decide on the theme of the mural. It could be something broad, like "Unity and Positivity" or "Celebrating Our Community."
- Consider including spaces for handprints, positive messages, or simple artwork that reflects the community's values and spirit.

2. Create a Marketing Plan:

- Flyers & Posters: Design eye-catching flyers and posters to display around the community and at popular spots. Make sure to include:
- The date and location of the mural painting event
- A brief description of the event and how people can participate
- Instructions on how they can contribute to the mural (e.g., spreading awareness, leaving a positive message, creating a handprint)

3. Social Media Promotion:

- Post teaser content about the mural project, encouraging people to get involved.
- Use images and short descriptions to keep the community engaged.
- Create a hashtag like #OurCommunityMural to spread the word and make it easier for people to share their progress and involvement.

Step 2: Setup for Mural Event (Before the Event)

Timeline: Set up the location and the panels a few days before the event.

1. Choose a High-Traffic Location:

• Ensure that the mural will be placed in a high-traffic area that people frequently pass by, like near a park, community center, or popular outdoor area.

2. Install Aluminum Panels:

Secure the panels to a sturdy surface (like a wall or a fence) so they are visible and accessible for people to contribute to them. Make sure they are safe and stable.

3. Prepare for Painting:

- Set up paint stations with brushes, paint, water containers for cleaning brushes, and protective coverings for the ground.
- Organize the space in a way that's easy for people to come, create their artwork, and leave.

Teal Ribbon Community Engagement Plan

1. Teal Ribbon Distribution:

- Provide community members with teal ribbons at various locations (e.g., community center, local businesses, or events).
- You could also distribute them during a specific event or meeting to ensure everyone has access to one.

2. The Challenge/Announcement:

- Announce that if community members are spotted wearing a teal ribbon throughout the day, they will be entered into a drawing.
- You can make this announcement through flyers, social media posts, or by word of mouth.

3. Drawing:

- At the end of the day, draw a few names from the community members wearing teal ribbons.
- Offer small prizes to the winners (gift cards, tickets to a local event, or donated items).

4. Social Media and Promotion:

- Create a hashtag for the event to increase engagement and make it easy for people to share pictures. For example: #TealRibbonChallenge
- Encourage people to take photos with their ribbons and tag your community's social media account for bonus entries.

5. Create Excitement:

- You could also include a teaser about the drawing, such as,
 "The more teal ribbons you spot, the more chances you have to win!"
- You might want to make a few surprise announcements throughout the day to keep excitement up.

6. Follow-Up:

- Announce the winners publicly on social media or at a community event later on to keep everyone involved.
- This will also increase excitement and build anticipation for the next community activity.

Voices for Change:

A Screening of (title of movie) for Sexual Assault Awareness

1. Plan the Event Details:

- Date & Time: Choose a date that aligns with Sexual Assault Awareness Month (April) or a relevant date of significance.
- Venue: Consider hosting the screening at a community center, local theater, or even virtually for broader access.
- Movie Details: Since (Title of movie) deals with sensitive topics, ensure the audience is informed beforehand about the content, as it depicts a graphic and intense scenes involving sexual assault.

2. Raise Awareness & Set the Tone:

- Informational Materials: Hand out flyers or create a digital presentation that includes information about sexual assault, statistics, resources, and helplines.
 These could be shared with the audience before or after the movie.
- Survivor Resources: Have local sexual assault support organizations or hotlines available to provide resources and support. Partner with organizations to offer post-event counseling or support.

3. Create an Engaging Discussion:

- Facilitate Conversation: Consider having an experienced moderator lead a conversation on sexual assault, its impact, and ways the community can offer support to survivors.
- Trigger Warnings: Be sure to provide trigger warnings about the content of the film and allow attendees the option to step out if they need to during intense scenes.

4. Promote the Event:

- Social Media: Create an event on platforms like Facebook to spread the word.
 Use relevant hashtags like #SAAM, and #SexualAssaultAwarenessMonth.
- Partner with Local Organizations: Collaborate with local nonprofits, schools, or sexual assault support groups to help promote the event and share resources.
- Email Invitations: Reach out to your community through newsletters, school lists, or email blasts to bring more people to the event.

5. Create a Safe and Supportive Environment:

- Safe Space: Ensure the event feels safe for survivors by creating an environment where people feel heard and respected.
- Counseling & Support: Have trained professionals on hand (e.g., counselors or social workers) to offer support during or after the event.
