Kitchen Recipe Stand







I had a few scraps of the wood coaster when I made the living room chair so I decided to create a recipe stand with them.

Materials Needed:

4 inch Square Welled Pinewood Coasters scrapes (about 1" wide x 1 ¾" tall)

34 inch wood block

Steps

- 1. Cut the wood block in half on the diagonal to create two triangles.
- 2. Use a scrape piece of the welled coaster or cut a welled coaster in half, then cut

into thirds. One coaster will make 6 pieces about 1" wide x 1 ¾" tall.

3. Glue the triangle (longest side) to the back of the small coaster pieces.

Kitchen Recipes Cards

I made recipe cards quickly by decoupaging some free clip art onto 1-inch square pieces of craft wood. I use power point but you could also use canva aor Goole Slides! Use the program guides to draw out a one inch square and then size the clip art to fit within the square. I also added Make and Bake to promote reading practice, rhyming words and word familie.





Materials Needed:

1" Wood Squares

Decoupage prints

Decoupage supplies: Decoupage medium, brush

Steps

- 1. Apply a thin layer of decoupage medium to the wood square.
- 2. Place your print on the wood square where you want it to be.
- 3. Apply a thin layer of decoupage medium to the top of the print. And gently smooth it is place.

Let the decoupage dry.

Materials Needed:

Mayberry Street Miniatures Miniature Wood Cabinet with Drawers

Book Bin Steps

- 1. Remove drawers from Miniature Wood Cabinet
- 2. Apply paint to cabinet. Add multiple coats if needed. Let dry fully.
- 3. Apply clear coat.

Tip: Save the drawers, I used them for other projects in my other books' themes. Be sure to check them out! I totally believe in upcycling.
