# Top three coordinating conjunctions

# AND

#### Add words to a list:

- Sam and Mike are brothers.
- We bought milk, butter, and sugar\*

#### Add phrases:

- Sam cleans the house <u>and</u> does the laundry
- We add the flour, combine it with the butter, and mix them together\*

# Add two or more sentences together:

 Sam cleans the house, and Mike does the laundry.\*

# Coordinating Conjunctions join words, phrases, and sentences together.

The coordinating conjunctions in English are sometimes called FANBOYS.

For (meaning because), And, Nor (negative of or), But, Or, Yet (meaning but), and So.

The three most common of these are <u>AND</u>, <u>BUT</u>, and <u>OR</u>.

# BUT

#### Contrast phrases:

• We bought milk but not sugar.

#### Contrast sentences:

Sam likes to clean, <u>but</u> Mike hates cleaning.\*

# OR

#### Give a choice between words:

- Do you want to talk to Sam or Mike?
- Should we buy milk, butter, or sugar?\*

#### Give a choice between phrases:

- I will clean the house <u>or</u> do the laundry.
- Do I add the flour, melt the butter, or mix in the salt first?\*

# Give a choice between sentences:

 Should I add more sugar, or should I add more salt?\*



### Don't forget to add commas:

• when three or more items are on a list

(milk, butter, and sugar)

when two complete sentences are put together

(Sam likes to clean, but Mike hates cleaning.)
