# Letter from our Interim Moderator Rev David I W Locke MA MSc BD

Hello everyone. It's my pleasure to say a few words to you as Interim Moderator at our two churches. I have much enjoyed being part of your church's life and community, and am really impressed with your congregations and all that is going on, as indeed are my family. My son indeed enjoyed and benefited from some of your children and family activities. I am sure that in time a Minister will be keen to come here and help lead you all forward.

Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

**Philippians 4:6-7**



I was privileged to help lead worship at New Machar on the last Sunday of October. The focus was on how we can and should limit our worrying with God's help. Jesus said [in Matthew 6 v33-34], "Seek first His kingdom and righteousness... do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own." This implies we will have worries day by day but we can limit them partly by focusing on His kingdom, his goodness and sharing that with others. And especially by praying, we can pass our fears to a loving God who will help us know His peace.

We were thinking about this as it was the time of clocks changing, the darkness of winter approaching and indeed also Halloween and Guy Fawkes. Amidst the darkness there may be things people fear or worry about, but Jesus offers us His Peace amidst storms, light amidst darkness, and guidance to move forwards; with his goodness and help that can overcome fear and evil. Indeed Halloween is a precursor to all Saints and all Souls days, when we can remember God is stronger than evil. His goodness is at work in Christ's followers, and we can start to look forward to the light of Christmas, and the Hope the Christ child brings us.





I recently restarted as a Street Pastor, and after training, was out on the night of Halloween in Aberdeen's central streets – they were mobbed full of people in all sorts of costumes. Some said they had never seen it so busy.

It was a real eye opener for me. I did not do much but as we went about, it was amazing how many young people thanked us for the good work being done and for how Street Pastors had helped them in the past, even in one or two cases saving their lives. On the whole people were well behaved and some wanted to explore Christianity. It's an example of how we as Christians go forward on the shoulders of the saints who have gone before us, and who pave the way for us. We face the dark, not alone but especially with the spirit of Jesus at work in and through us, as we open up in faith and let his peace be shared so young people can notice.

As I write, Remembrance Sunday is past, and for me part of the remembering is how God was with us, with our fore-bearers through the horrors of world war and helped them know peace. That peace may be very fragile now globally, so it's up to us, to carry on as light bearers, in whatever we can God's light shines even amidst the darkness because God sent his son Jesus Christ to be the light of the world for you and me, whatever trials we may be facing. At a Street Pastor online prayer gathering recently, we were joined by fellow Street Pastors in Jamaica, as they faced their recent torrential storm and massive damage. Our prayers helped them know and share Christ's peace in practice – I was amazed at the calm they maintained, and at their focus not on themselves but on how they and we could help others.

*The angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. [Luke 2 v 10] the light shines in the darkness .. the true light that gives light to every man was coming into the world [John 1 v 5,9].* At Christmas we can hear again the truth that God came from heaven as one like us, Jesus, to share real life with us, its joys and hardships, and share his grace, hope, peace, joy, love, and truth. In the Christmas bible readings, although there is much fear, trouble, doubt, worry – joy is also found and a key message repeatedly comes across; do not be afraid God is with us – that is what Immanuel means. And 'do not be afraid, is a message that


