#### **DID YOU KNOW?**



The Pennsylvania Avenue East Main Street is one of 26 main streets located within the District of Columbia. On July 23, 2020, the D.C. Council held the Second Vote of the Fiscal Year 2021 Local Budget Act of 2020 (Bill 23-761). The Bill passed 13-0. Included in that Bill were two initiatives championed by Ward 7 Councilmember Vincent Gray, \$200,000 for a Pennsylvania Avenue East Main Street Program and \$250,000 to update the Small Area Plan for Pennsylvania Avenue East.

### **ABOUT THE PENNSYLVANIA AVENUE EAST CORRIDOR**

Located in Ward 7, PAEMS delivers commercial revitalization services for businesses located along the Pennsylvania Avenue, S.E. corridor from the John P. Sousa Bridge to Southern Avenue. S.E. Businesses offer a mix of services including retail, personal services, health and wellness and automotive/gas. Focusing on this area of Ward 7 is essential as it is one of the last large corridors of Ward 7 in need of economic attention.

The mission of the Pennsylvania Avenue East Main Street (PAEMS) program is to revitalize retail, retain and attract a diverse customer base, empower surrounding communities, and develop businesses along the Pennsylvania Avenue East corridor. In its first six (6) months of operations (October 2020-March 2021), PAEMS has provided approximately 101 hours of small business technical assistance to 24 businesses on a range of topics including marketing and promotional services, microloan assistance, grant writing and fund development, and business planning.

In its first year of operations, PAEMS strategy focused on:

- Identifying and engaging with partner organizations which are involved in the Main Streets efforts
- Establishing presence in the Pennsylvania Ave corridor while building relationships with businesses on the corridor
- Establishing an Advisory Board that is directly involved in leading and implementing the DC Main Street program

The rest of this year and next, PAEMS will maintain a focus on recovery efforts for the commercial corridor. During the pandemic, many small businesses have either swiftly pivoted to survive or struggled to stay afloat. Programs like PAEMS are on the front lines supporting our small businesses and commercial corridors that are the heartbeat of many communities. Collectively, DC Main Street programs are working daily to keep small businesses open and helping them to survive the devastating impact of COVID-19.

#### Tiffany L. Brown

Tiffany L. Brown is a 4<sup>th</sup> generation Washingtonian and a Hillcrest resident for nearly 24 years. After a successful career in the federal government, Mrs. Brown switched careers to fulfill one of her dreams of becoming a teacher. She has been teaching in

the DC Public Schools for the last 22 years as a special education teacher. Education and advocacy have always been the hallmark of her work. Now serving in her 4<sup>th</sup> term as the Advisory Neighborhood Commissioner for 7B02, which encompasses the neighborhoods of Hillcrest, Park Naylor, and Randle Highlands. In this work, Commissioner Brown works day in and day out to improve the quality of life for her constituents. She currently serves as the Chairperson of ANC 7B. Mrs. Brown also serves on the following Boards, Skyland Taskforce – Co-Chair, Pennsylvania Avenue East Main Street Advisory Board, and the William O. Lockridge Community Foundation.



## Dr. Marc Berg

Dr. Marc Berg was born and raised in the Netherlands, Europe, and received his MD Degree as well as a MA in Health Sciences. He was a full time Professor of Health Policy and Management at the Erasmus University in Rotterdam, the Netherlands,

before embarking on a consulting career with KPMG and McKinsey. He has more than 25 years worldwide experience helping healthcare organizations and governments to improve the value of care: higher quality with lower costs. He is a passionate, innovative leader in value-based contracting, outcomes measurement, healthcare analytics and payment reform.

In 2020, he co-founded Bluerock Care to bring this experience to practice. Bluerock is delivering re-imagined, technology-supported primary care to midand lower-income adults on Medicare, combining office-based with virtual and home care. Our aim is to create a highly connective, proactive VIP experience for Medicare beneficiaries, with better outcomes for both community and individuals, and lower costs for beneficiaries and payers. In 2021, Bluerock Care opened its first facility East of the River, in the Shops of Penn Branch Office Building.



# Reverend Dr. Kendrick E. Curry

Reverend Dr. Kendrick E. Curry has been the pastor of The Pennsylvania Avenue Baptist Church (PABC) for 17 years, and he has sought to be a

visible example of the Christian faith in Ward 7 and the District of Columbia.

Rev. Curry has a passion for the elderly, especially those aging in place, and as such, he serves as State President of AARP DC, is on the board of directors of Stoddard Baptist Nursing Home and is part of the interfaith working group of the Coalition to Transform Advanced Care (C-TAC). Because of Rev. Curry's passion for community health, he has also worked with the George Washington University (GWU) via the Rodham Institute and the Ron and Joy Paul Kidney Institute to create informative and interactive webinars around COVID-19 and Community Health. Additionally, Rev. Curry has been a partner with GWU Medical Faculty Associates to develop an innovative e-health community-focused platform and to conduct a telehealth pilot at PABC. He has worked with Howard University to operate the first COVID-19 testing center at a church in the District of Columbia, and he serves on Howard University's Community Advisory Board for Opioid Addiction. Rev. Curry has also served on a number of other boards and commissions aimed at helping people to live transformed and productive lives.



#### Oscar Macció

Born, raised and educated in Argentina, Oscar moved to the DC area as a young man in 1996. He immediately launched a career characterized by hard work, consistently high performance and a steady rise from roofer to project manager to

senior executive two decades later. Oscar quickly progressed from the field to project manager with a real estate development consulting firm. There, he was involved in a wide range of projects, expanding the company's footprint across the Mid-Atlantic region. In addition to three golf courses, Oscar led the execution of 723 units funded through the LIHTC affordable housing program. Recruited to Hamel in 2007, Oscar was promoted within a year to Project Manager. Within four years, he led the completion of 1,427 units worth nearly \$100 million. In 2012 he was again promoted, to Director of Business Development. Before rising to his current executive role, Oscar served as Director of Preconstruction Services for several years.

Oscar's passion for empowering communities through delivering affordable, sustainable housing is demonstrated by his civic engagement and leadership roles. He is a member of the board for the Coalition for Non-Profit Housing and Economic Development (CNHED). Additionally, Oscar serves as the Board Vice Chair for Vida Senior Centers, the oldest Latino/Hispanic nonprofit in the District. Oscar is also a member of the Program Committee for the Housing Association of Nonprofit Developers (HAND).



#### Rameez Munawar

Rameez Munawar is a Vice President of Asset Management at Jamestown. In his role he oversees the Washington D.C. portfolio including mixed-use commercial, retail, and multifamily assets. Prior to Jamestown, Rameez worked for
