

By the time you read this, the holiday season will be well behind you, but I am writing this the week of Thanksgiving after spending a lovely afternoon on Carol Spark's patio enjoying the company, the weather and the whimsy surrounding Carol's home. It seems there is a story everywhere I look, from the tiles her father made that lead to her funky little garden, the hand painted rocks Carol is known

for and the beautiful cupboard on Carol's patio, hand painted of course by Carol and her Great-grandson. As I relaxed and listened to the stories of how Samaritan's Purse has impacted the world around us I had a new understanding of why Carol and her family have been dedicated to this very worthy organization for many years, putting together hundreds of boxes a year and mailing them to some of the most remote places in the world. Carol tells me that it is not unusual that the last leg of the journey for boxes to be via a canoe or wagon and even delivered by camels ridden through the desert with packs of the shoeboxes filled with gifts on their backs.

Our conversation drifted here and there as Carol explained that getting supplies for the boxes is a year-around job. In addition to hand-making darling little octopuses made of yarn and tiny baby dolls, she is always on the lookout for a good sale on items that are small enough to fit into a shoe box but still useful and interesting. One afternoon when her great grandchildren were with her, a package came and Carol set about unpacking a box filled with 50 Hot Wheels cars she had ordered. Her great-grandsons eyes lit up as he watched on. Nothing was more fun for him than digging in

the dirt to make little roadways with dips and turns for his cars and he watched his great-grandmother unwrap each car with anticipation.

But this time, Carol explained, these cars weren't for him. And then she told him about children around the whole world who would be receiving a Samaritan's Purse Christmas Box, explaining that these beautiful shiny new cars were for them. A look of understanding replaced his initial disappointment and he went off to play in the bedroom. Still sorting through items for the boxes, Carol looked up to see her great grandson approaching, his arms full of his own little cars, his gifts to the children around-the-world.

Pecipe of the Month



CHICKEN STEW

6 servings

In this comforting chicken stew recipe, chunks of tender chicken, hearty root vegetables, and seasonings simmer in a flavorful chicken broth. It's filled with goodness for the ultimate comfort food.



Ingredients

- 1½ pounds boneless skinless chicken thighs about 8 thighs, diced 1-inch
- 2 tablespoon olive oil
- 2 carrots diced
- 1 small onion chopped
- 2 ribs celery diced
- 5 tablespoons all-purpose flour divided
- ½ teaspoon dried rosemary
- ½ teaspoon dried thyme leaves
- · ¼ teaspoon ground sage
- salt and black pepper to taste

- 1 ½ cups diced potatoes peeled if using russets or baking potatoes
- 1 ½ cups diced sweet potatoes peeled
- ½ red bell pepper finely diced
- ¼ cup white wine
- 4 cups chicken broth or chicken stock
- 1 cup green beans cut into 1-inch pieces, or frozen peas, thawed
- ½ cup heavy whipping cream

Instructions

In a large pot or Dutch oven, brown chicken in 1 tablespoon olive oil (it doesn't have to be cooked through). Remove from pot and set aside. Cook onion, carrot and celery in remaining olive oil for about 3 minutes or until onion is slightly softened. Stir in 3 tablespoons of flour, seasonings and salt & pepper to taste. Cook over medium heat about 2 minutes. Add potatoes, sweet potatoes, red pepper, white wine, browned chicken and broth. Bring to a boil, reduce heat and simmer covered for 30 minutes. Remove lid and stir in green beans and cream. Thicken if desired (below) and simmer an additional 10 minutes uncovered. To thicken: In a mason jar combine remaining 2 tablespoons flour and 1 cup water or broth. Shake very well (ensure there are no lumps) and add a little at a time to boiling stew to reach desired consistency.

January - best wishes to everyone for a healthy, prosperous and happy 2025. May this year be better than the last.

The weather has gotten so much cooler and the afternoons are a great time for potting up some

plants but choosing the right plant can sometimes require some thought. You might buy a plant because you like the look of it, or because that plant will fill that particular niche or spot. Garden Centers are a reliable source of houseplants with a reasonable plant selection and, with any luck, a few unusual ones. Nurseries have higher prices but offer a larger and better selection. When buying plants it can pay to shop around. You want to get the most for your money. Part of the fun of growing plants is to come across unexpected discoveries, plants you've never seen before. There are also some "classic plants" that have been around for generations that are easy to grow. Here are three "classics":

One of the more popular houseplants of the latter 1800's was the "Parlor Palm", now commonly known as the NEANTHE BELLA PALM. This native of Central and South America is a houseplant here in Phoenix. This palm can attain a height of 3 - 4 feet. The fronds are composed of leather-like, dark green leaflets. A very hardy indoor palm, but a slow grower. Tolerates crowded roots and poor light. Let the soil surface dry between waterings. When repotting, use a general-purpose soil mix. Repot every 2 - 3 years.

Native to Taiwan, the SCHEFFLERA has long stalks with branches containing 6 - 8 glossy green leaflets 4 - 10 inches long, depending on the size of your plant. A houseplant here in Phoenix can grow to 6-foot, with a spread of about 4-foot. Requires moderate or reduced sunlight. This plant likes humidity but can be quite tolerant of drier air. Always let the soil dry out between waterings and then water thoroughly. There are also several varieties of schefflera available with variegated foliage.

If there is one plant that could be considered to be the easiest to grow, that would have to be the SANSEVERIA. Hailing from Western Tropical Africa, this plant is classified as a "rhizome" which is defined as a growing stem which can grow partially or entirely below ground. Its roots grow directly from the underside. The primary growing point is at

one end of the rhizome. Additional growing points form along the sides. Leaves are thick, rigidly upright, patterned and can grow to 4-foot tall. Most leaves are dark green, banded with a gray green. Many variegated varieties are also available. Common names include "bow string hemp" which comes from the use of the tough leaf fibers that were made into bow strings; "snake plant" which comes from the leaf banding, or mottling, which can resemble some snakeskins. The last common name would be "Mother-In-Law's-Tongue" because well, we're not even going there. This plant does well indoors in bright, medium or low light. As a patio plant it requires diffused light or shade. The sansevieria can withstand dry air, fluctuating temperatures, scanty watering, as well as some neglect. Let the soil dry between waterings. A very slow growing plant that seldom needs repotting and responds well to cramped conditions. This is a plant that will hold its own and look stunning in any home.

January is also the time to inspect your property looking for dead branches on your trees and shrubs. Those should be removed before the spring growing season starts. Always look for new weed growth and be sure to remove those pesky things before they have the chance to go to seed. For now, it's time to get out there and enjoy this wonderful weather. Maybe pot up a few plants and spend the afternoon in the garden. That's where we're going. Is there really a better place to be? For now...

TEMPORARY A/C UNITS


