- ✓ The Treasurer works with the bank, balances the bank statements and keeps track of incoming and outgoing disbursements. Present a monthly report to the board and Association at large on how we are doing financially, and which activities generate a profit or loss.
- ✓ The Secretary keeps track of all the Board and Association meeting minutes. Prepares and types the minutes in standard format and presents those minutes to the Board and Association for approval, then logs those minutes in the Association's "Legal Book".

- ✓ The Members-at-Large are primarily tie breakers when the
 officers are deadlocked on a vote. They will provide input on
 upcoming events and activities and take on special projects
 as the need arises.
- ✓ All members of the board, Officers or at-large members are expected to take an active role in all Park activities and events. They should promote goodwill about the Park and Association and do what they can to make each event a success by personally participating in and promoting each activity.

Your vote really matters, so take your time when making your vote. It is up to you to make this Association work for you and be the best for the Park.

I had hoped that construction would be done by now. Maybe it will be, but at this writing it does not appear that this will have happened. What does one resident on Facebook refer to the Park? Patrick has a list of volunteers who can either take items to the dumpster or to a local thrift shop. If you can help or need some help, send Patrick a note and let him know.





ELECTIONS EXPLAINED by Patrick McCombs



Nominations for each position are made by the residents. Per the bylaws, these nominations are made at the Association meeting in October. 

Autumn in Phoenix and the weather could not be better. We are also glad that the intense summer heat is finally gone. Now is the time to enjoy those cooler temperatures by spending more time outdoors in your own

personal seating area. All you need are some lawn chairs, a couple of small tables and a few plants, one can never have too many! It is that easy! You now have a special place to enjoy that morning cup of coffee or that lazy afternoon. Just make that space your own.



Containers, or even small pots, can personalize any seating area and make it look like a garden when your plants are placed in groups. Remember that when you pot up those plants your planting scheme will start to change the moment you create it and will not reach its full glory until many weeks later. Container plants, when

placed in your seating area, offer a creative scope that lets you play with different colors, textures, shapes and forms. Pots can be easily rearranged to suit the changing seasons, or even your own mood. We all need that special spot for our relaxation.

Prices at the garden centers and nurseries have gone sky high and if you are buying your plants from them be sure to check them out carefully. Avoid root bound plants and be sure to check for any discoloration in the foliage. Make sure the plant looks healthy and disease free. Always pick out the strongest looking plant. Whether your plant will live in the ground, or in a pot, as gardeners we understand that Mother Nature is unpredictable. We learn to adapt and work with what we have.

Gardens give us a creative outlet to make the most out of our space and never let anything go to waste. Resourcefulness can present itself in many ways, whether that be using old plastic milk jugs to create little greenhouses for your plants or implementing native flowers and creating a pollinator friendly garden.

Flowers and herbs can grow well together in the same container. Remember that old Simon & Garfunkel song about parsley, sage, rosemary and thyme? They all grow great together in the same pot or planted among your fall flowers. Whether planted separately, or together in containers, you will end up with some beautiful potted plants.

This is also the time to start your fall pruning. Now is a great opportunity to remove any dead limbs or branches from your trees and shrubs. Be sure to rake out dead leaves around the base of the plant since this should help prevent any problems with decay, fungus or disease. We must keep our plants healthy and happy. Regular garden maintenance will reward you with healthier veggies and better blooming flowers.

The rain this past fall has been causing a lot of weeds to sprout. Make sure to get those pulled before they go to seed. This will not only make it easier for you to keep your area weed free but will pay off in the long run.

Want to try something different? A trip to the grocery store might be in order. Pick up some fresh garlic from the produce section and now is the right time of year to plant it. Among the oldest known foods and seasonings garlic stands out front and center. In ancient times it was reputed to augment physical strength. It has been prescribed, at one time or another, to treat nearly every human ill. As the plant matures the bulb will divide itself into a cluster of bulblets, or cloves, covered by a papery skin. The cloves are separated for culinary use and for the propagation of new plants.



Carefully separate the bulbs into cloves and plant them point up about 1 inch deep in rich, well-drained soil. You can plant garlic mixed in with your potted flowers or herbs. One gallon pots also work well. The height of the plant at maturity ranges between 1 - 2 feet with a spread of 9 - 12 inches.

Wait for the leaves to brown out, after the plant blooms, to harvest. 4-6 hours of morning sun should be adequate.

Metrocenter project inches closer to reality

Developer Concord Wilshire Capital and TLG Investment Partners announced Sept. 18 that Phoenix's iconic Metrocenter Mall is on its way to becoming the largest mall redevelopment project in Arizona's history. A press release announced that abatement and demolition of the mall, including the Dillard's and U-Haul Buildings (formerly Macy's), have commenced, and that Diversified Partners, LLC, a Scottsdale-headquartered national real estate firm, will develop and construct the 140,000-square-foot retail component located at the center of the \$850 million mixed-use development.

The developer added that after several months of survey and analysis of the materials inside the building to ensure the protection of the public during demolition, Resource Environmental, Inc., a Los Angeles based company, will first abate and remove the asbestos from the buildings and then proceed with the demolition of all the buildings. They have secured a \$24.5 million construction loan to fund the expenditures for abatement and demolition as well as the civil work necessary to start the interior roadway construction of the project.

According to a spokesperson, exterior demolition of the first building is anticipated to take place mid-November.

The developer will work with real estate firm Hines to redevelop and repurpose the site, and Hines has taken over the oversight of the site.

"The environmental remediation plan of the Metrocenter Mall has been ongoing for some time, and we are excit-ed that Resource Environmental has taken over control of the site, and we plan to have it completed

within 10 to 12 months, in order to get the site ready for construction," said Chris Anderson, senior managing director of Hines.

Nate Sirang, president of Concord Wilshire said that they are excited to bring to life the core of the mixed-use development, which will include an "eclectic retail and food and beverage mix, where every resident and visitor can feel a connection."

He added, "Our vision includes

He added, "Our vision includes integrating state-of-the-art public safe-ty solutions into a comfortable and fun first-class destination for families, while contributing meaningfully to the Cityof Phoenix, the local community, and its economy."

The Village, as the new development is being called, has been designed as a transit oriented, self-contained community encompassing the city's new light rail station, which was completed in January 2024 and represents a \$150 million investment by the city. As the project moves closer to demolition and site-readiness, the residential aspect of the project has shifted from the originally announced 2,600 multifamily rental units to 1,100 for-purchase townhomes, according to Jon Green, senior vice president, Concord Wilshire. He added the caveat that the mix of housing may change over time as the market changes. The townhomes will range from 1,400 to 2,200 square feet and the anticipated price point will begin in the low \$400,000 range.

Green presented a project update to stakeholders at an Aug. 27 Metro District Community Collaboration meeting (www.metrodistrictcollaboration.com). At the meeting, Green also said that residents should see vertical development, beginning with the retail, 14 to 16 months after the start of September's demolition. Construction on the model homes is projected to begin around month 20.
