# A MESSAGE FROM THE DESERTSCAPE'S ASSOCIATION PRESIDENT Patrick McCombs





#### **GRANJAN'S BANANA BREAD**

#### **Ingredients**

- ½ stick of butter, room temperature
- 1 c sugar
- · 2 eggs, beaten
- 1 Tbsp sour milk
- 1 tsp. fresh lemon juice
- ½ tsp. baking soda
- 1 ½ tsp. baking powder
- 14 tsp. salt
- 4 large very ripe bananas
- 2 cups flour
- 1 ½ cups pecans or walnuts

Preheat oven to 350. Grease and flour two loaf pans.

Cream butter sugar and eggs in bowl using electric mixer. Add remaining ingredients and beat on low until blended. Turn into pans and bake for about one hour.



# THE GARDEN GUYS, brought to you by your neighbors. Michael and Dan at C-111





December - the holiday season has finally arrived and the weather could not be better. Family, friends and neighbors all gathering together sharing that special holiday spirit. A wonderful time of

year. So many beautiful plants are available right now.

The POINSETTIA was first brought to the United States about 1836 By Joel Roberts Poinsett, a botanist and also the U.S. minister to Mexico, from where the plant is native. Your holiday poinsettia will do best in a sunny window but avoid sudden temperature changes. Keep the soil moist but don't let any water stand in the pots saucer. Any foil wrapping that might have come with the plant should be removed. This plant needs to be able to drain. When leaves drop in late winter or early spring cut stems back to 2 buds per stem and reduce watering. Your poinsettia can now be transplanted into a larger pot and moved to your patio area. It will do best outdoors with indirect or diffused light.

One longtime favorite is the CHRISTMAS CACTUS also sold under the names "Zygocactus" and "Schlumbgera". This houseplant has arching, drooping, bright green branches of flattened, scalloped edged, smooth, spineless 1 and one half inch joints. Exotic looking flowers with two tiers of reflexed petals and forward thrusting stems. Blooms can grow to 3 inches long and are borne on the tips of the shoots. Bloom color can vary from bright violet, purplish red, orange, lilac and white. This plant should be kept moderately moist and misted regularly. Feed with a liquid fertilizer. Moderate light.

If there were only one flower that could be described as the "Queen" of holiday blossoms it would have to be the AMARYLLIS. This bulb has strapped shaped leaves and large lily like flowers. The bulbs can be found at garden centers, supermarkets and big box stores. Amaryllis leaves can get long, heavy and be prone to tipping. We use a 6-inch terra cotta pot. Make sure your pot has drainage holes. Use a good commercial potting soil mix. Plant the bulb,

pointed end up, keeping the top third of the bulb above the soil surface. Allow a 2-inch space between the bulb and the edge of the pot. Firm the soil around the bulb and keep soil barely moist until plant growth begins. Certain to bloom the first year, it grows well both indoors and out. Bloom colors range from white, pink, rose, red and many other variegated colors and varieties. This is one real stunner of a blossom.

HOLLY, with its dark evergreen leaves, has been a seasonal favorite for centuries. Sometimes used in wreaths, along with laurel and pine boughs, this plant has a history that dates back to well before ancient Greece and Rome. The Holly family is quite large and includes many different evergreen and deciduous trees and shrubs.

Let's deal with two varieties: A houseplant, here in Phoenix, ENGLISH HOLLY (ILEX aquifolium) is the most familiar in song and legend. A slow growing plant that does best in diffused light. Most Hollies tend to be dense and symmetrical. Prune mainly to remove poorly placed, broken or dead branches. CHINESE HOLLY (ILEX cornuta) is classified as an evergreen tree or shrub. This Holly does best as a patio plant in a shady or semi-shady area. As with all Holly plants the leaves are typically glossy, leathery, nearly rectangular with spines at the four corners and at the tip with large, long lasting bright red berries. This is a plant that can grow to 10-foot or taller. It should be planted in a container and kept trimmed on a regular basis in order for the plant to fit your available space. Varieties that do well here include "Berries Jubilee", "Dazzler", "Carissa", "Dazzler" and "Willowleaf". A northern or eastern exposure is where the plant should do best. All Hollies prefer a rich, slightly acid soil. Good drainage is essential. A good mulch of about one half inch of mushroom compost on your Holly will do wonders.




