OHEMAA AMA ASARE



The 2012 passage of DACA changed Gilary's life and provided a pathway to an education. Nonetheless Gilary observed, "I would be lying to you if I said that the fear doesn't loom large every time I see DACA in the news."

- A 2014 Kennedy-King scholarship recipient from Contra Costa College (Barclay & Sharon Simpson Scholar).
- Clarence worked to help previously incarcerated individuals reintegrate into the community. Through the Safe Return Project he helped pass legislation to establish fairness-inhiring programs in California, and to support reintegration programs. His team was featured in the *Wall Street Journal*.
- At UC Berkely he became a policy advocate for the Berkeley Underground Scholars, a student-led organization of formerly incarcerated and system-impacted students working to expand the prison to school pipeline.
- Graduated from the University of California in 2016 with a Bachelor's Degree in American Studies.
- Attended the Goldman School of Public Policy at Cal from 2016-18, where he earned his Master's in Public Policy.
- Completed a Graduate Research Assistant program at the California Department of Justice.
- Clarence is a member of the Social Justice and Well-being team with the W. Haywood Burns Institute.
- His aspirational goal is to earn his Juris Doctorate in law.

- A Kennedy-King 2015 Kaiser Permanente Scholar from Los Medanos College.
- Received her Bachelor of Science degree from California State University-Los Angeles in 2017.
- Received her Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Roseman University in Las Vegas, Nevada in 2019.

- A re-entry student. Jules is a 67-year old graduate of UC Berkeley in 2020 with a degree in Sociology—she excelled in the classroom with all A's and one B+.
- Jules became a mentor to many of her classmates at Berkeley. "I felt like a mother and a grandmother in a lot of classes," she recalled. One piece of advice given to a fellow student was "Boyfriends are nice, but good grades can lead you to a better place."
- The moniker of Ms. Jules was coined at Cal when one of her fellow students recalled her stating during attendance, "I want everyone to call me Ms. Jules, in recognition of my role with younger students on campus."
- Ms. Jules is now pursuing a Master's in Social Welfare and will become a mentor to a new generation of young people.


- A 2014 Kennedy-King Gagen McCoy Law Firm Scholar from Los Medanos College.

- Miguel's goal is to establish a private practice and to enter electoral politics in the near future. Keep track of local ballots!







