Kennedy-King Memorial College Scholarship Fund 2021 Update

Kennedy-King was created 54-years ago as a living memorial to the social justice dreams of Dr. Martin Luther King and Senator Robert F. Kennedy. We are heartbroken and disturbed by the recent instances of violence against people of color, cases that follow a long history of racial injustice in the United States. The Scholarship Fund seeks to find racial, social, and economic justice through education. We believe education enables access to opportunities, more equitable wealth distribution, and promotes social justice.

Our mission is to provide scholarships to underrepresented minority community college students, principally those that identify as socially, economically, or educationally disadvantaged. Underrepresented minorities are determined using data from the California College and University systems. We draw our scholars from the three Contra Costa community colleges so that they can transfer to a four-year institution and complete their education. The exceptional vision of the Founding Members has been recognized by the Contra Costa community through their sustaining and increasing support of Kennedy-King. We also support former scholars pursuing their graduate degree and award grants to current Contra Costa County community college students facing extreme hardships.

In 2021 Kennedy-King awarded an additional 41 undergraduate and graduate scholarships to scholars from Contra Costa College, Diablo Valley College, and Los Medanos College. Our scholarships have been awarded to 921 recipients. Almost \$5.8 million have been awarded to-date. Seven former scholarship recipients have served on the Kennedy-King Board of Directors, four of whom are serving at the present time. We look forward to a future in which the Board is predominantly comprised of former scholarship recipients. **We thank our donors** as these accomplishments would not have been possible without your generosity and continuing support.

Our mission has been to offer scholarship opportunities for outstanding but underrepresented minority students in the Contra Costa College system who are transferring to a four-year college or university. An example of one worthy scholar is Fernanda Lopez, a 2010 Kennedy-King Scholarship recipient from Los Medanos College. She was always driven and did very well in school. She dreamed of attending San Jose State to study Broadcast Journalism. Receiving a scholarship from Kennedy-King made her dreams possible, graduating from San Jose State in 2012. After working in broadcast journalism for a number of years, she is now a Public Relations Manager for an animal nonprofit in San Diego.

Irving Rosales Gonzalez found it difficult to find meaningful employment after his early struggles. Using his entrepreneurial skills, he started his own business—New Glory Painting. This allowed Irving to provide for his family and return to school at Los Medanos College. He has transferred to UC Davis to pursue a biochemical engineering degree. His aspirational goal is a Ph.D. so he could pioneer environmental-friendly biofuel alternatives that address climate change imperatives.

Her success was so complete that she was asked to travel to hospital and treatment centers to speak to others seeking recovery.

- Daniella is a former foster youth who has volunteered in the past with organizations serving foster children. She benefited from her ILSP experience;
- Daniella received her Bachelor of Science in Nursing and Bachelor's in Liberal Arts in a joint degree program at St. Mary's College and Samuel Merritt University in 2008;
- As a Registered Nurse, her career has included:
 - Kaiser Oakland and Kaiser Vallejo Med – Telemetry
 - Aesthetics/Cosmetics nurse
 - 9+ Years with Contra Costa Health Services including:
 - Public Health Nurse with Healthcare for the Homeless;
 - Received the Contra Costa County Health Services, Service Excellence Award "For helping a homeless patient reconnect to insurance and primary care resulting in the patient obtaining housing and receiving dialysis three times per week".
 - Deployed during the pandemic as a Nursing Program Manager of the COVID-19 Mobile Outbreak and Vaccination Teams
