## **Beloved Board Member Passes**



By now you all have heard that a member of our Board of Directors, Jeremy Johnston, passed away on June 15, 2024, after a 2-year plus battle with Diffuse Large B-cell Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma. What a valiant fight he put up undergoing everything from chemo, to radiation, to stem cell replacement therapy! Throughout his treatments, his spirit never waned, and he was sure that he was going to beat this disease. Jeremy first joined our board in 2011, the first year that we had an official board, for a term of three years. He resigned in 2013 at the completion of his term due to a heavy work schedule at the Center of the West where he was the Managing Editor of the "Papers of William F. Cody," and eventually served as Curator of the Buffalo Bill Museum. He was also pursuing a PhD in history at the time. He rejoined the Board in 2021 for another 3-year term.

Jeremy was a wonderful historian who was a mentor to many students and interns, was published in many Western history publications, and who was a member of numerous organizations including the Park County Historical Society/Wyoming Historical Society, both of which he served terms as president. He wrote two books on Powell and one about Park County for Arcadia Publishing. He co-edited *Beckoning Frontiers* with Lynn Houze, a biography of George Beck, and wrote numerous journal articles. Besides being an authority on Buffalo Bill, Jeremy is recognized as a Theodore Roosevelt scholar. His interest in Roosevelt began as a youngster when he learned of his family's connection to Roosevelt. His great, great grandfather, John B. Goff, guided Roosevelt on hunting trips and they were friends. The Goffs moved to Cody about 1900, establishing a hunting guide business and Goff Creek Lodge on the North Fork of the Shoshone River. Although Roosevelt never hunted in the Cody area, Goff guided him on a hunt in Colorado in 1904. Jeremy's PhD thesis on Theodore Roosevelt and William F. "Buffalo Bill" Cody has been peer reviewed and hopefully will be published in the future. Our thoughts are with Jeremy's family.

#### THE BARRUS FAMILY

Gene Albert "Gabby" Barrus was the first of the Barrus family to settle in Cody. In 1934, Gabby was invited by future Wyoming governor and US Senator Milward Simpson to relocate to Wyoming and play second base for the Cody Merchant's baseball team. Gabby was born in Winterset,

Rhode Island's Textile Heyday

Iowa, just southwest of Des Moines, on March 28, 1913. His parents, Charles and Hazel, raised a big family in Winterset with Charles' salary from his house painting business. Further back, Gabby descended from a great-grandfather, William "Barrass" of Rhode Island, who worked in the textile industry during the heyday of the Industrial Revolution in the 1830s. And

before that, the Barrus line had Early American and Scottish roots.

In Cody, Gabby soon met



his wife Marjorie (Marj) and they rented a home at 1208 Alger Avenue. For many years Marj worked at the K and D Dress Shop for her great aunt Charlotte Kant. Gabby worked for Husky Oil and also guided hunting trips for a local outfitter, Max Wilde. (story continued on p.3)

When the owner of the Boston Red Sox, Tom Yawkey, came to Cody for hunting trips, Gabby had an opportunity to talk baseball with him. In one conversation in the 1930s, and during the Great Depression, Gabby mentioned that his home team was wearing old uniforms. Yawkey returned to Boston but soon sent new uniforms, caps, and gloves for the local Cody baseball team. The box was full of Red Sox uniforms, however, so the Cody Merchants became the Cody Red Sox.

In the 1940s, Gabby worked as a bartender for the Log Cabin Bar in Cody, but later he transitioned into sports broadcasting for KODI. His play-by-play sports commentary led to several recognitions at the local and national levels for sports broadcasting excellence.

Gabby also became a renowned wildlife and scenic photographer and writer. His complete set of 35 mm slides having been digitized

were donated to the Buffalo Bill Center of the West. The Cody Heritage Museum (CHM) uses one of his Legend Rock petroglyph photos for their first photo mural at the beginning of their exhibit. Barrus authored more than 200 hunting, fishing, and Western flavored articles that were published in several national publications.

Gabby and Marj raised two sons: George L. "Mick," born October 30, 1938 and James C., born January 22, 1940. The Barrus brothers were well known as fine athletes. Both became teachers and coaches and were named Wyoming Coaches of the year during their careers. Mick taught school for twenty-six years before pursuing a new career with the US Forest Service. His work with recreation safety in grizzly bear country was an important contribution to public recreation in the

Mick was active in the Lions Club and served on the International Lions Club Board of Directors. He traveled extensively with the Lions Club as a motivational speaker, eventually earning the title of Ambassador of Good Will, the highest honor a Lions member can receive. When the CHM was in the throes of fundraising for renovating the DeMaris House and for exhibit development, Mick stepped up to chair our Capital Campaign, raising close to \$100,000 for us. We would not have been able to open in 2018 without his fundraising efforts. Mick passed away unexpectedly on April 2, 2024.
