The Florida Keys

The Florida Keys nickname is the Conch Republic. It is a chain of over 1,700 islands extending 220 miles southwest along the southern tip of Florida. The word "Key" comes from the Spanish word cayo or "small island."

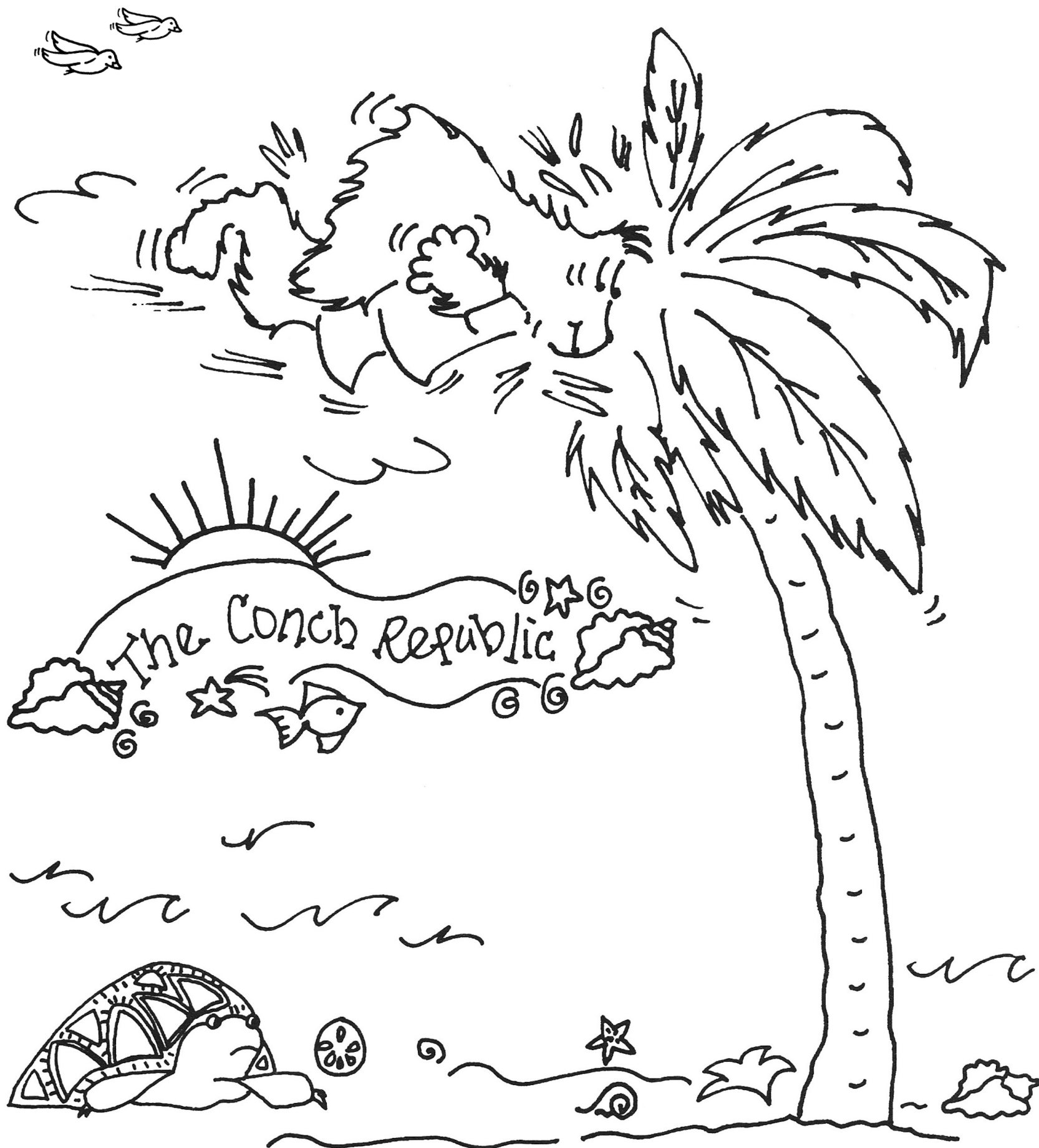
The Upper Keys include Key Largo and Islamorada. Marathon Key is in the Middle Keys. Big Pine Key is in the Lower Keys and is home to the endangered Key Deer. The Lower Keys include Sugar Loaf Key and Key West. Key West is the southernmost city in the continental United States.

The Florida Keys were once part of a submerged coral reef. Six miles off the Florida Keys shore is the third largest barrier coral reef system in the world. It is the only living barrier reef in continental North America.

A trail of historic shipwrecks is scattered along the coral reefs off the Florida Keys. The shipwrecks buried in the sand tell us about how the ships were built, the passengers and the hard times sailors had navigating the waters. Shipwreck Trail is part of the Florida Keys National Marine Sanctuary, home to many reefs and marine life.

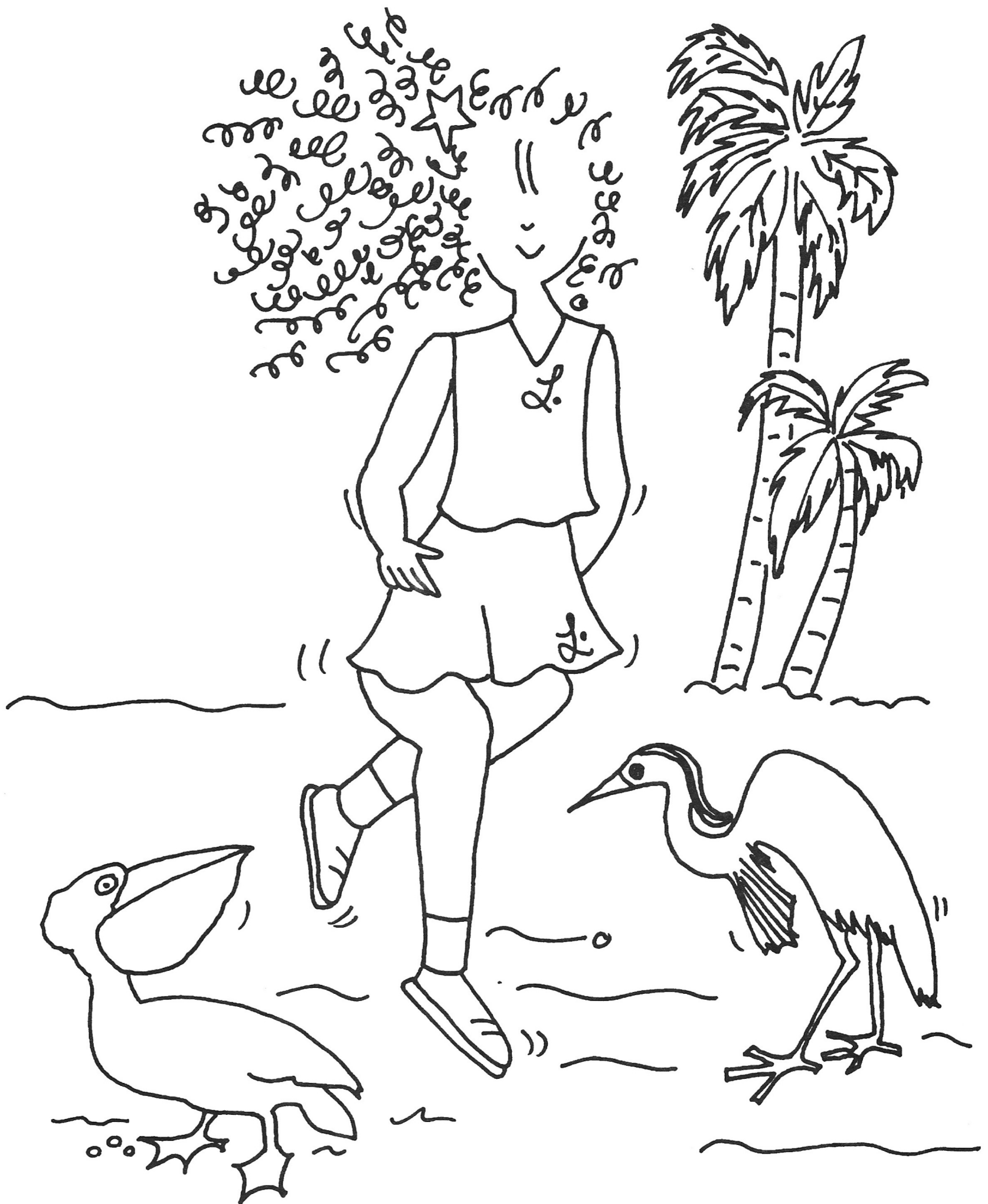

Elliot is having fun in the Conch Republic. The Florida Keys were discovered May 15, 1513 by the adventurer Ponce De Leon and Spanish writer Antonio de Herrera. For many years the Florida Keys were ruled by pirates. In 1822 the U.S. Navy pirate fleet was created to chase away pirates.

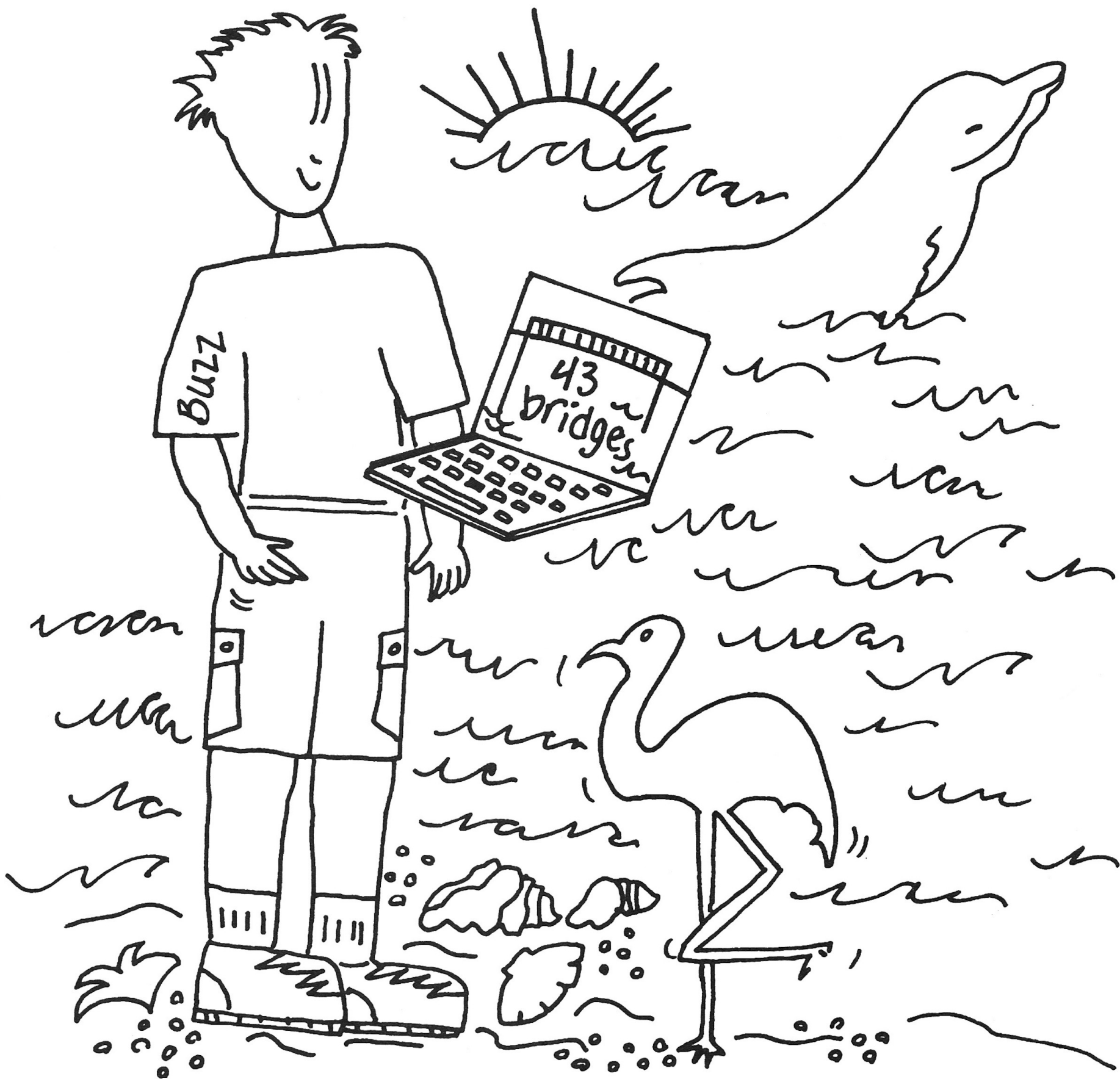

The Coral Reef

The coastal waters of the Keys, including coral reefs, make up Florida Keys National Marine Sanctuary. Coral reefs are home to angelfish, lobster, crab, sea urchin, grouper, butterfly fish, octopus, turtles, jellyfish and many other types of underwater plants and animals. Coral reefs are very fragile. Coral needs clear, clean water to grow.

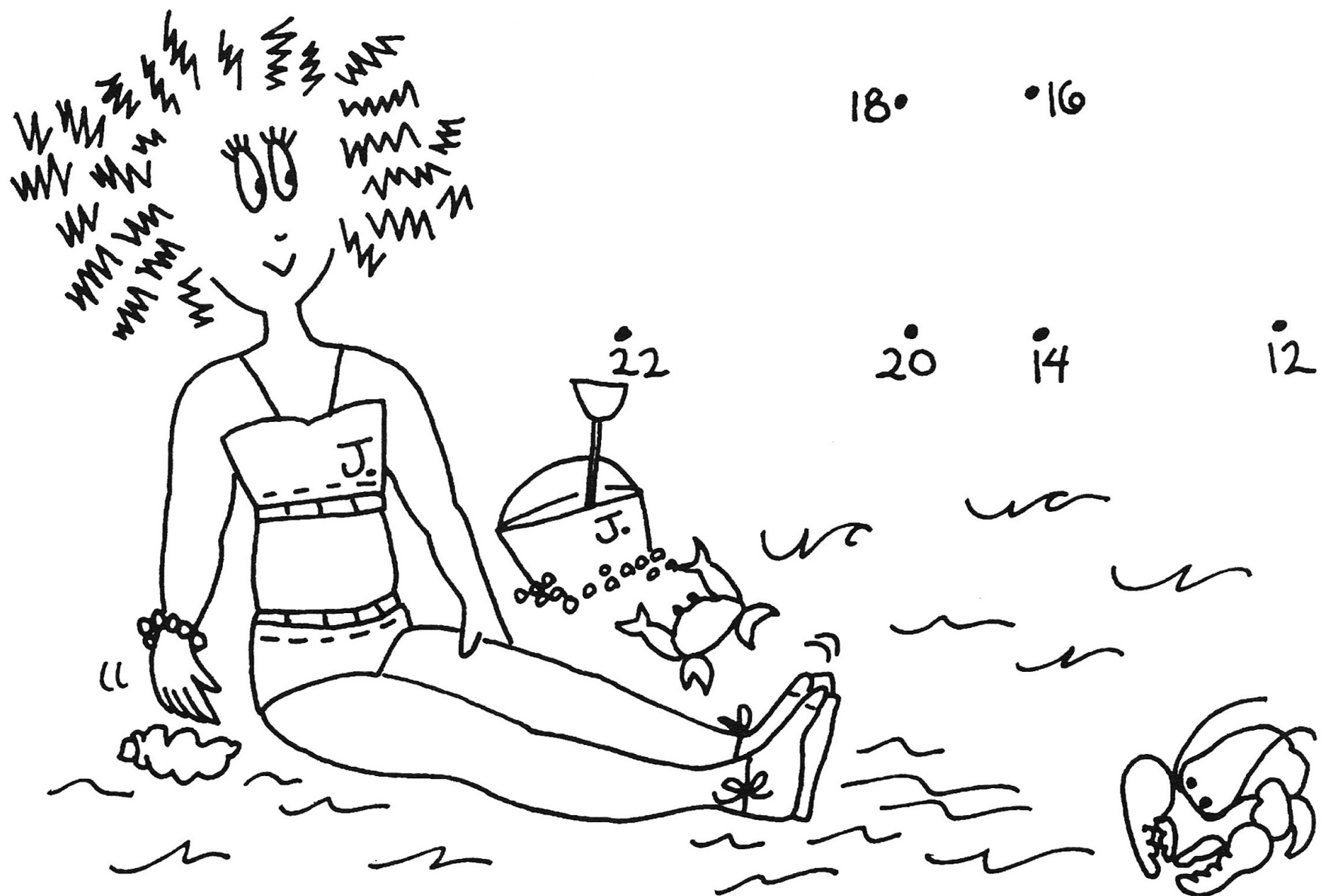
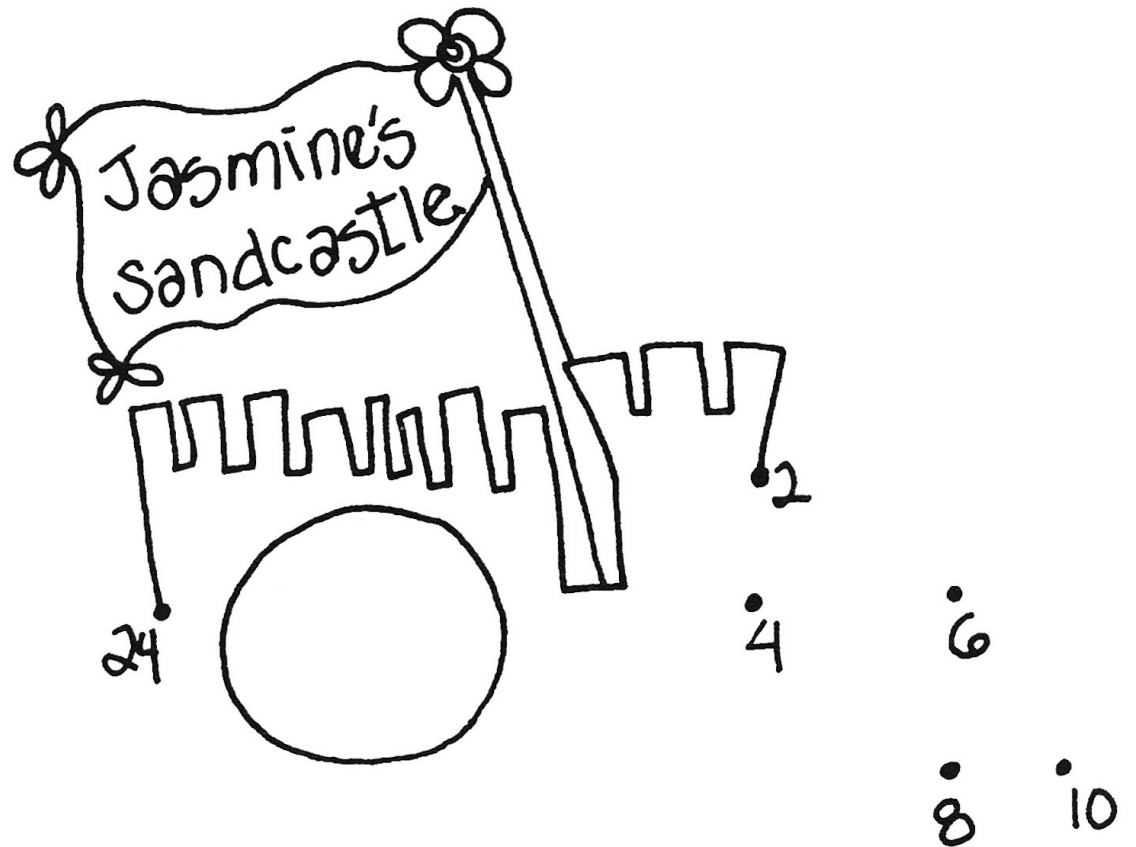

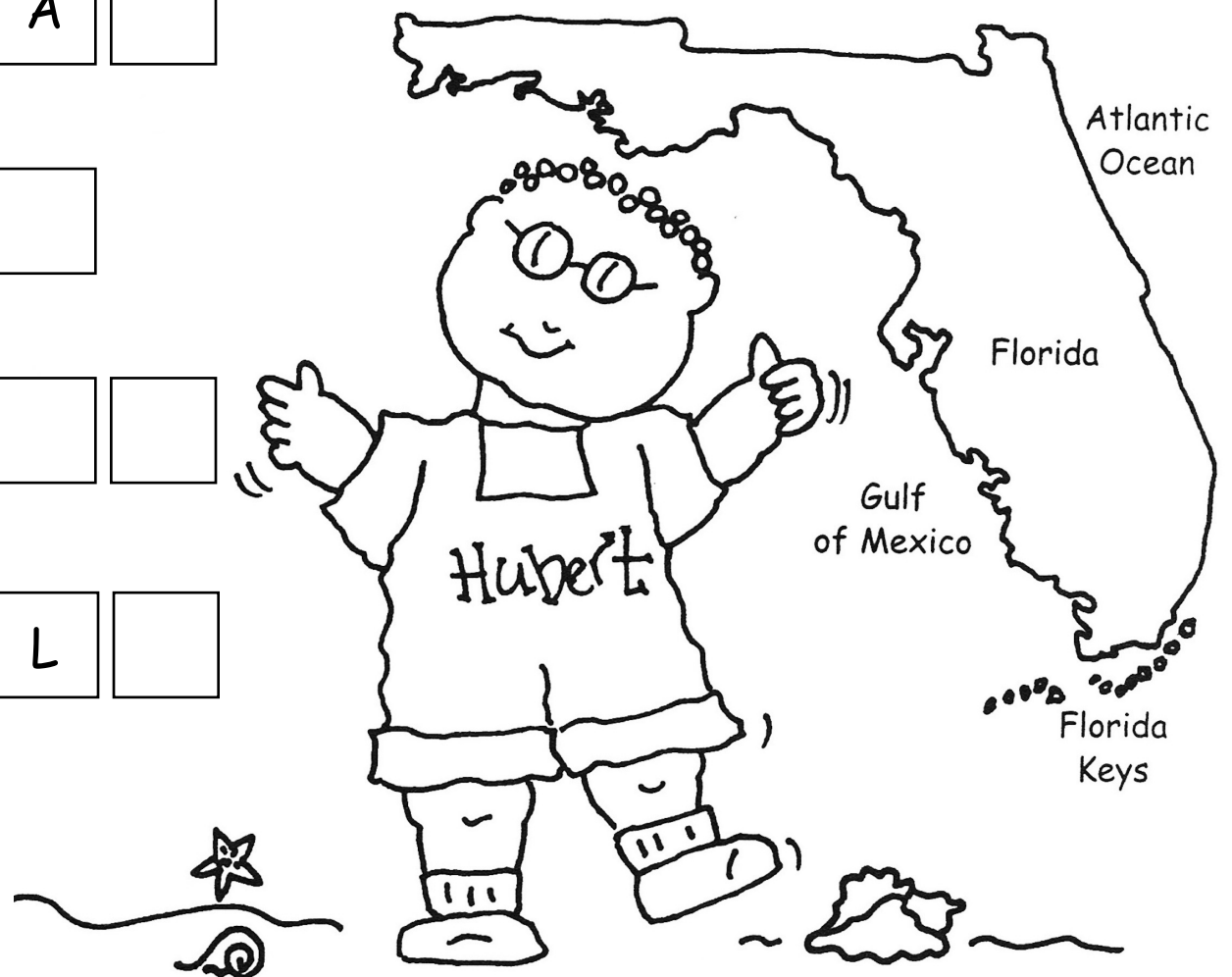

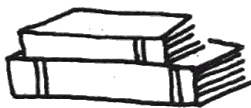

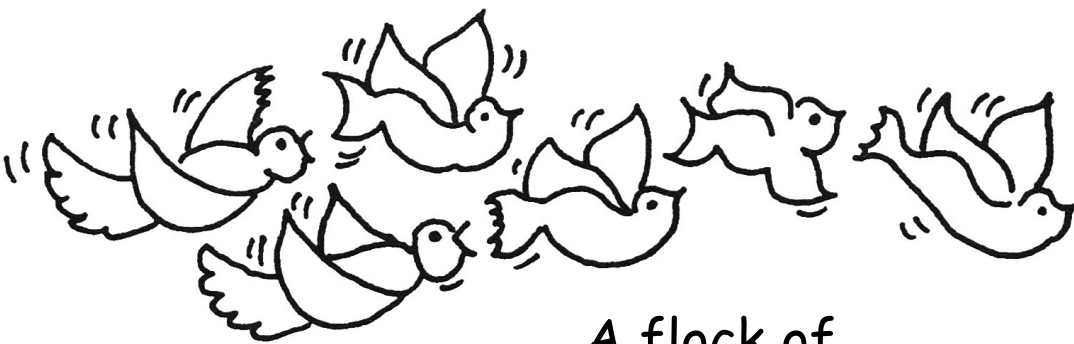

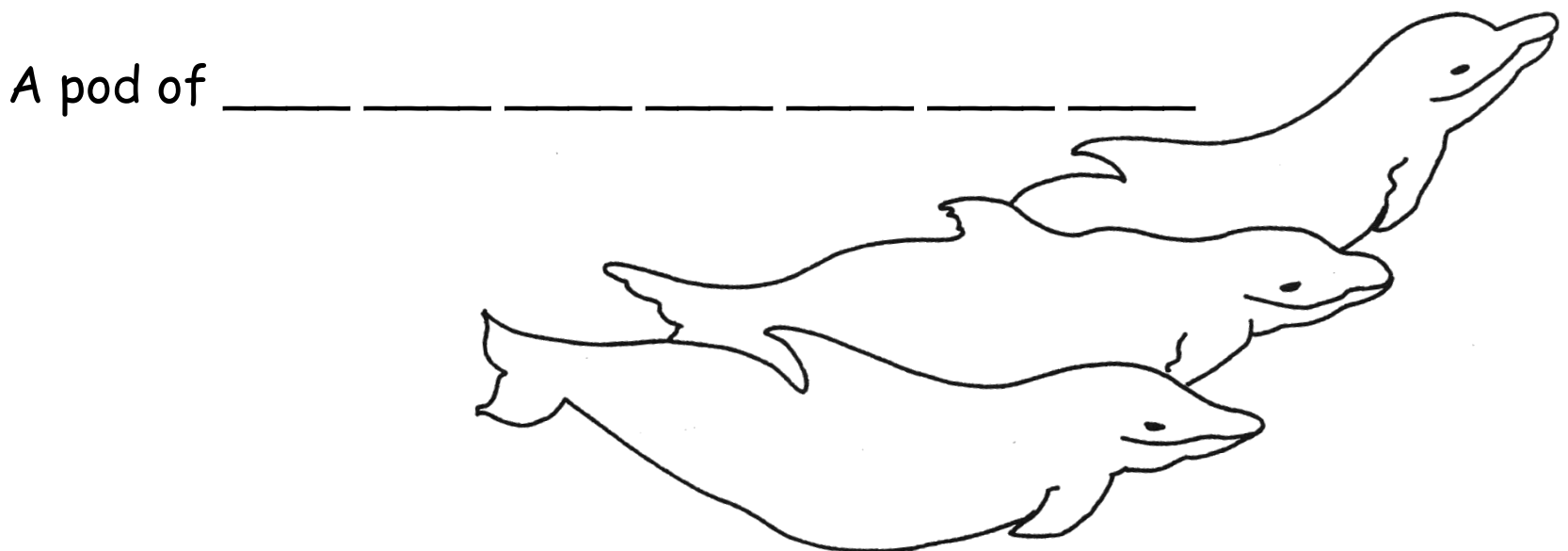

Florida Keys Fun Facts

-  1. Famous American writers Ernest Hemingway, Tennessee Williams and Robert Frost lived in Key West.
-  2. In 1832 artist John James Audubon painted the wildlife of the Florida Keys. Today many artists live and work in Key West.
-  3. The Key West and Great Heron National Wildlife Refuges help protect birds and sea turtle nests.
-  4. There are over 90 different types of coral in the waters off the Florida Keys. Corals are fragile and can be damaged by disease, pollution or by people touching the coral.
-  5. The southernmost point in the United States is 90 miles from Havana, Cuba.
-  6. The nine sites of Shipwreck Trail are the Benwood, Duane, Eagle, Adelaide Baker, Thunderbolt, Amesbury, North America, San Pedro and The City of Washington.
-  7. Sugarloaf Key is named for the sugarloaf pineapples that once grew there.
-  8. John Pennekamp Coral Reef State Park is 178 miles of protected ocean waters.
-  9. President Truman made 11 visits to Key West during his presidency and his home there was called the Winter White House.
-  10. Key Largo is the longest Key. It is 30 miles long.
