



Go West Young Man...

...to the National Garden Railroad Convention, that is. The 2023 NGRC will be in the San Francisco Bay area from July 1 through July 8. The Bay Area Garden Railroad Society has hosted the event several times and do a great job.

One major draw is the guided trip PRIOR to the convention. This was available last time the group hosted the convention and we even had GGRS members on the trip. The trip is called The Great Western Rail Adventure and features 11 train rides and several museums in a seven-day period. More info can be found at www.TRAINTRIPS.BIZ on this June 24-30 convention add on.

NAPA Valley Wine Train will have a special event for the convention on June 30. The real convention starts July 1 and runs until July 8 with garden railroad tours every morning. The vendor hall opens July 6 through the 8 with the famous BBQ at Roaring Fork and Big Trees RR on Tuesday night, July 5, Ice Cream social on July 6, and the Accucraft sponsored Banquet on Friday, July 7. July 10-11 will have post-convention layout tours in central California. Finally, the National Summer Steam Up for live steamers will be in Lodi, California July 12 through the 14. The 2023 convention car will be a USA Trains wood sided reefer painted especially for the convention. The hotel will be the Hyatt Regency in Santa Clara. More info and registration forms can be found at www.NGRC2023.ORG. This looks like it could be a fabulous three-week trip out west!

Since the NGRC is basically on the west coast and is during a peak holiday travel time, an alternative or addition might be the **2023 Big Train Operator's Convention** June 19 through 24 held in Bird-In-Hand, Pennsylvania.

This is a long day's drive from north Georgia. This group originated from the old LGB Conventions, of which the 2001 event was held in Atlanta and hosted by the GGRS. There will be a Welcome Aboard Party with buffet on Monday evening, June 19. Off site steam train rides are offered on Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday and include Strasburg RR, Northern Central Railroad with a visit to Howard Tunnel (second oldest continually used tunnel in US), and Harrisburg, Lincoln, & Lancaster RR. Wednesday will be a day of trains at the hotel featuring seven operating layouts, a build your own layout contest, model train or structure building contest, an operating track all the way around the hotel fish pond, clinics, and vendor room.

The convention car will be a special lettered PIKO 25-ton diesel locomotive. A wine and cheese party for the women, an ice cream social, and a banquet will be held at the hotel. You must be a member of the BTO Club to attend. Registration, membership, and more info can be found at www.bigtrainoperator.com. <u>Annual dues are \$50 per year.</u>

No matter if you choose the west coast trip, the Pennsylvania trip, or both, you can have fun at a large-scale garden railroad convention this coming summer. They are both packed with train rides, opportunities to socialize, chances to see model trains operating, clinics, and vendor halls to shop. I do hope you will attend one and give a report back to the GGRS membership.

San Diego Zoo Safari Park Monorail

The name is totally NOT tribal, and was a joke name chosen by the designer Chuck Faust.

The San Diego Zoological Society became interested in developing the Wild Animal Park in 1964. The main purposes of this zoo were to be species conservation, breeding of animals for the San Diego Zoo as well as other zoos and providing areas where zoo animals could be conditioned.

On June 30, 2010, the San Diego Zoo board of trustees voted to change the name of the park from the Wild Animal Park to the San Diego Zoo Safari Park to clarify what it offers, since some visitors were unclear as to the difference between the zoo proper and the "animal park". The name "safari" is supposed to emphasize "the park's spacious enclosures of free-ranging animals" (as opposed to "the closer quarters of the zoo"), encouraging visits to both.



The park operated the Wgasa Bush Line monorail, which ran clock-

wise through the Wild Animal Park. The name of the monorail was originally chosen by chief designer Chuck Faust as a profane inside joke, with "WGASA" being an acronym for "who gives a sh*t anyway". Andy Faust, son of zoo designer Chuck Faust, confirms the story. "They were having a brainstorming session to come up with a name for the line and had hit a brick wall. No good ideas at all. Someone, in frustration, said 'WGASA'. No-one knew what he meant. 'Who gives a sh*t anyway?' came the reply."

Chuck Bieler, one of the zoo officials sent it to be approved by the committee. "Wgasa was just a neat African-sounding name. They said, 'That sounds great,' without any knowledge of what it meant. I was one of the few who did. We got a lot of chuckles out of it, and it survived the years." Bieler, who later became the zoo's executive director took to telling people that the name actually stood for "World's Greatest Animal Show Anywhere."

The Monorail line has been retired, partially due to high maintenance costs. It was dismantled and replaced by truck-pulled trams that run on biofuel.



Those who travel to the National Conventions each year have great things to say about them. Fun, sites, adventures, bargains, etc. Everyone who goes usually enjoys the event and remembers great times for years. Some folks, however, have reluctance set in when the convention is held way over yonder on the other coast. Many look for alternatives, or simply say, "Not this year."

One alternative looks very attractive to us on the East Coast this year, as the Big Train Operators (BTO), formerly the LGB club is holding its Convention June 19-24, 2023 in Bird-in-Hand, Pennsylvania. Yep, that's a place!

There is a \$50 membership into the club, which gets you quarterly slick page magazines, calendar, and the opportunity to attend the convention. You can't attend without being a member. HOWEVER, these folks do things a little different, and being a member for one year and attending the convention might cause you to become a repeat member year after year.

Several differences between the National Conventions and the BTO Conventions may be obvious, while others might be less so. The similarities also may be an, "in the eyes of the beholder" moment. One difference is less personal layouts-on-tour, and more emphasis on 1:1 opportunities. The convention social get togethers may be similar, but there are opportunities listed as: Trivia Contest, an Al Lentz Model or Special Interest Contest, Drag Races - featuring a new format this year, and a Build-Your-Own-Layout Contest at the hotel site. Sounds a little similar and a lot different to me. Maybe you want to join a crew of GGRS members already planning to attend the Big Bird Express in PA this year. Details on membership at this link:



NEW Dwarf Signal (pair) \$68.95

Add color and realism to your G scale layout. 2 per package. Available in Black or Silver. Our new Dwarf signals are easy to use, and built for outdoors. We use a fiberglass reinforced polymer that can withstand over 200 Degrees C. Each light can display Red or Green aspects, depending on how you install it. Use these in fixed-mode (hardwired to the color of your choice) or attach to your own switch or control system.

Each light has potted, moisture-resistant electronics inside a durable 3D printed PETG housing. No wispy wiring for us - we use a robust oversized wire that is easy to solder, or attach to a connector. Our LEDs will operate from approximately 11V DC up to 24V DC. We designed our dwark signals so users would have the option to connect them directly to track power, or to a control system of your choice. Sorry but we do not include any sensors or other control electronics - just a simple, reliable, signal.

Prototype use guideline: North American Railroads installed these on the right-hand side (i.e. Engineer side) of the track. Trackside dwarf signals were used to indicate the turnout position: typically one on the approach side and two on the diverging side.

Wiring is easy. Tested in hot, wet subtropical Georgia weather.


Have you been to your church's layout recently? SAW WHAT??????

During the Kansas City Garden Railway Society tour, Mike Martin met the pastor of the Heartland Community Church in Olathe, Kansas. Dan, and his father, Mike who was from California had his own railroad garden. The display featured two loops of track,

structures, details, and even plants. Dan told me his church had an enclosed area in the lobby called a "light box" that might be a good spot for a railway garden. The enclosed area is open to the outdoor sky, weather, and sunlight.

The "light box" area in Heartland Community Church was a perfect spot for a garden railway display during the holidays. Dan agreed to help them build it. Since the layout would be exposed to outdoor winter weather and was a temporary display for the Christmas season, they chose battery remote control trains instead of track power.

In September, Mike, his wife, a church staff member, and Dan began work on the project. We drew a two dimensional diagram of the space and taped off the dimensions of the proposed layout on a storage room floor. The light box already had a pond and water feature. The panes of glass and steel in the light box enclose a garden area with pine trees, shrubs, a memorial stone bench, mulch, and an 8-by-6-foot pond with three large water pillars and three lower spouts. They stacked large stones from a local nursery to elevate one loop of track and also decided



to have a second unelevated track section. Roadbed was cut for both the ground level and elevated track plans. Flextrack was used and a rail bender formed the curves. Track was placed on the prepared roadbed sections. All 135 feet of track was screwed down and rail clamps were added for good measure. They screwed wood bents underneath roadbed for the elevated portion. The "light box" allows the weather inside—and the snow makes for a beautiful scene. Their group built everything in sections, exactly as it was to be set up. The church theme for the project was "Light Will Shine." In December, they moved the sections into the light box, and it fit like a glove. The trains ran without a hitch. The church continues to display this railway every year around Christmastime, and it's a popular feature. https://www.trains.com/grw/how-to/large-scale-layouts/church-garden-railroad-display/
