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



All our hosts received a certificate of appreciation for their FeroEquinology Expertise. Here Norm is presented his.



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
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Tom and Eileen Conrad

We had our meal and meeting here. Bar B Que and fixins. The weather was glorious all day.










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Michael & Suzanna Carney


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Dave Bergmann



Steam?

Covid-19 shuttered many operations during the pandemic. The cost of restoration, like everything else, continues to climb at an unprecidented rate. It is becoming more difficult to find volunteers, and many of the operations using coal, have found supplies dwindle, as the cost to mine, move, and sell excellerate. That being said, the prospects for some activities to return to normal is out there.

A TRAINS magazine survey conducted in fall 2021 showed 153 steam locomotives operated in a public venue at least once. (This includes any locomotive at least in 2 foot gauge or larger, not an amusement park reproduction. That is down from the first survey they conduceted in 2008, when 190 operating units were accounted for. Consider some may have been down for standard repair, or in the process of being sold and not operating, but in an operable state at the time.

Of the 153, 81 were standard gauge, while 72 were narrow gauge. 84 burn coal, vs. 63 which burn oil. Only 6 burn wood. Some of the coal burners are considering changing to oil due to the coal situation. Durango & Silverton ran its 2021 season without a coal-burning steam loco, and has converted 3 of its engines to burn oil. Cumbres and Toltec is converting one of their engines as well. The vast majority of the locos were made in the 1920's, so we may be looking at some "100 years of operations" moments.


Of the 50 states, 10 have no operating steam locomotives. (Georgia has one..... we rode it at the Agra-rama last year). The top 3 states for seeing Steam in action are: California - 19 units, Colorado - 15 units, and Pennsylvania - 13.

As for new steam, there is the following: The last loco that Baldwin built Mallet, the C & O 2-6-6-2 on the Western Maryland Seinic RR is now operational. The Reading and Northern T1, 4-8-4 is almost ready, and hopes are that the Pennsylvania coal-hauler will be ready sometime this year, after a 30 year dormant period. Another T1 continues to progress in repairs in Cleveland, but no data on when she will be ready to run. The Nashville, Chattanooga & St. Louis 4-8-4 we saw in Nashville during the National Convention is approximately 1/2 way completed.

The most anticipated steam outing would be, of course, the Big Boy out to make another cross country run.

Also, U.S. Sugar elected to add more steam to its Sugar Express tourist operation in South Florida.

Bachmann 4-6-0 Front Truck Replacement by Russ Bundy

Background:

In 1988 Bachmann made their first "G" Scale Electric train. A Battery powdered, 1:20.3 narrow gauge 4-6-0 steam train commonly known as The Big Hauler. The next year, 1989, they began making this train set as a track powered, electric and the legend was born.

The Bachmann Big Hauler is the definition of a "starter set." Inexpensive, complete (They come with the engine, a couple cars, track, and a power supply.) Just take it out of the box, set it up and enjoy. Although the track is not really suited for outside use, they're generally reliable, fun, and if it does break just put it back in the box and Bachmann will fix it. Thousands have been sold. If you haven't owned one, you know someone who has.

If there is one flaw with these units, it would be that the front trucks are very light and prone to derailment. The cause is an engineering design error that makes the truck unstable. Basically, a very light truck floats on a very weak coil spring. This design has caused owners a lot of heartache over the years.

Several years ago, Bachmann redesigned the front truck, adding weight and changing the design to a chassis mounted leaf spring type of support.

The "stock" truck is basically a piece of formed plastic and weighs around 87 grams. (Figure 2).



The "new and Improved" truck features two all metal side rails held together with a plastic insulator and, of course, has the leaf spring.

It weighs almost double that of the stock truck. (Figure 3)

See comparison photo. (Figure 4) The results were a much better, more stable engine.





Owners were quick to recognize the benefits and these replacement parts were sold out for a long time. The initial demand seems to have passed, and new trucks are again available through the Bachmann web site. The best news is replacing the original truck with the newer version is a relatively simple procedure.

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Parts:

As of this writing, the replacement trucks are in stock at bachmanntrains.com. I didn't look anywhere else as they were on sale, and I had waited too long not to buy these. Other than the truck you'll need four (4) screws to attach the truck to the frame and standard soldering supplies to connect the two wires. (More on that later.)

Installation:



You first need to remove the stock truck. To accomplish this, you must get to the screw that is holding the spring in place. First, remove the two braces connecting the front of the boiler to the frame. (Figure 5)

Then remove the three screws in the front of the chassis. (Figure 6). Carefully bend the front section down to expose the screw that is attaching the truck, remove said screw. (Figure 7) Then clip the two lead wires.

Now the fun part. You'll need to drill four (4) holes to mount the bracket holding the truck leaf spring to the frame. Just center the




bracket on the truck and mount the unit.



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You also need to drill one (1) hole to run the wires inside the frame. (Figure 8).

NOTE AND WORD OF CAUTION!

I don't know why, but for some reason Bachmann changed from red and black colors for the power leads to yellow and brown/tan. Be sure to match up the correct sides of the truck to the engine wires.

In my replacement this meant yellow to black and tan to red. (As an aside, if you replace any Aristocraft motor blocks with the new ones made by Bachmann, you'll face the same color-coding problem.)

Solder the truck leads to the engine wires, hide the wires in the frame, reconnect the three screws and reattach the boiler braces. That's it.

Final thoughts:

This really is a straightforward installation that will greatly improve your Big Hauler. Good Luck. RSB
