# The Gentleman Train Robber: The Outlaw With Etiquette

Bandits of the old West have a reputation for being blood thirsty, ruthless, and violent people. There is one train robber, by the name of Bill Miner, who was so polite that he earned the nickname 'The Gentleman Robber'.

Bill started robbing stagecoaches and his victims noticed his manners and overall demeanor. As he graduated to robbing trains, his personality stayed the same. The Gentleman Robber may have proved that people are more prone to accept style over action, regardless of one's chosen profession.

Ezra Allen Miner (1847 – September 2, 1913), more popularly known as Bill Miner, originally from Kentucky in 1847. He never legally changed his first name, but regarded William Allen Miner as his true name throughout most of his life. He moved west while a teenager. Miner's parents must have raised their son to be the kind of person he exhibited to his victims. Kind, considerate, and polite were all attributes associated with Miner.

# Terry Manning, President



The Gentleman Robber had a strict "no-kill policy". In spite of choosing a life of crime, he never killed anyone. The truth is, he told his men to never hurt anyone during a robbery.

He instructed them to fire their guns as a warning signal if there was a threat of capture, but that they were not to shoot at their robbery victims or law enforcement who might be coming for them.

Once, as deputies were closing in on Miner and his gang, one of his men disobeyed Miner's orders. While Miner allowed himself to be captured, with all the grace attributed to Miner, one of his men, Tom "Shorty" Dunn fired at the officers. Dunn was hit in the foot when they returned fire. Because of his cooperation, Miner received a much lighter sentence than was given to Dunn when they reached trial.

Miner served time at San Quintin, as well as in other facilities. His first arrest came at the age of 19. Shortly after he arrived in California in 1866, he was caught robbing and was sent to prison in San Joaquin County. Once released, he returned to politely robbing people, stagecoaches and trains. He was subsequently arrested again.

The Gentleman Robber partnered with the outlaw Bill Leroy and the two planned on robbing a stagecoach. The two men, hiding alongside the road heard the distant sounds of horses and wooden wheels bouncing across the hard-packed, rutted trail. Moments later, they drew guns and stepped into the moonlight, only to find themselves surprised and confused.

Instead of the stagecoach they had been waiting to rob in late September 1880, the pair found themselves standing in front of a mud wagon—a lighter and smaller version of the traditional Concord stagecoach.

The two outlaws had learned the Barlow & Sanderson stagecoach would be transporting a shipment of gold bullion between mining camps in the San Juan Mountains in the southwestern corner of Colorado. They subsequently discovered the stage line had changed its route and decided to send a buckboard to connect with

the stage coach at Buena Vista. But it had no gold bullion aboard. The only treasure on this wagon was the \$50 carried by the driver.


The disappointing robbery marked the first crime 33-year-old Bill Miner committed after spending nearly a decade behind bars in San Quentin State Prison. Unfortunate for Leroy, he was apprehended by law enforcement and subsequently lynched. Miner escaped without a scratch. The long arm of the law caught up with Bill....again and he was given a twenty-five-year sentence for stagecoach robbery. He tried to break out in 1892 and all he got for his trouble was a neck full of buckshot. He was released on June 17th, 1901.

Miner, being the courteous robber that he was, would never take a belonging of a woman. He would take valuables in the possession of his male victims, such as watches, guns, money, or jewelry, but when the ladies offered up their pocketbooks and jewelry, he politely declined to take them.

Minor was so interested in keeping his victims free from harm that he began each robbery by nicely asking the victims to raise their hands so he could make sure no one was about to pull a gun on him. It was Bill Miner, the Gentleman Robber, who created the often-copied phrase, "Hand's up". It became stock and trade in the movies and is still used by modern robbers plying their trade today.

On September 10, 1904, Miner was living in British Columbia under the pseudonym, George Edwards. Minor planned and executed what is considered Canada's first ever train robbery. Silverdale, east of Vancouver was the chosen spot. Miner and his men pulled off a clockwork robbery and easily hot footed it back to the United States.

Legend has it that the loot from the Silverdale robbery was hidden in the nearby mountains and that Miner intended to return for it, but never did. The treasure may still be buried somewhere near the town.

Due to his easy interactions with the law enforcement officials he ran into, Miner was imprisoned numerous

times. Interestingly, most of the time he was able to escape from jail. When he was sentenced to hard labor on a prison camp in Milledgeville, Georgia, (yes, he was here in Georgia), he plotted his escape. He was able to flee the prison, but only for a brief time. He was not used to the humid, hot heat of Georgia. He drank salt water before being recaptured and returned to the prison camp, where the brackish water gave him acute gastritis.

The Gentleman Robber died on September 2, 1913, at the age of 66.



Because of Miner's easy, polite demeanor, he enjoyed a certain degree of celebrity and a tremendous amount of support from the public, even though he was a criminal outlaw. After his death, Miner's legacy was the subject of a song called "The Ballad of Bill Miner", performed by Phillip Mills and the Blackout Cowboys.

There are several bars and restaurants in British Columbia offering drinks or menu items named for Bill.

A biography of his life, *The Grey Fox: The True Story of Bill Miner, Last of the Old Time Bandits*, was written by Mark Dugan and John Boessenecker and published in 1992, should you wish to know more about "The Gentleman Robber."

Richard William Farnsworth (September 1, 1920 – October 6, 2000) was an American actor and stuntman. He was twice nominated for an Academy Award. Farnsworth received a Golden Globe Award nomination for Best Actor in a Motion Picture - Drama for his performances in The Grey Fox (1982).

On the night of October 6, 2000, suffering from terminal cancer that left him partially paralyzed and in great pain, Farnsworth died from a self-inflicted gunshot wound at his ranch in Lincoln, New Mexico.



# Railroad Rendezvous Report

The annual "Railroad Rendezvous" held by The Southern Museum on July 20th was a dream opportunity for setting up an indoor G-scale layout. We were invited to attend and given one-half of their large Theatre Room to set up our display. The GGRS Executive Board chose well in selecting to set up a circus theme for the event as it was well attended by families with small children who loved watching the large trains circle the circus show. The kids loved spotting the elephants in the parade, viewing tigers through their display carriages, catching a look at the lion tamer in action, seeing the many clowns, and experiencing the sights and sounds of the carnival with its merry-go-round, tilt-a-whirl, Ferris wheel, and other fun rides. Three circus trains were operating on large track layouts, as well as a patriotic Eggliner carrying clowns on a small 3-foot circle around the Big Top, and a Paw Patrol set-up for the kids to touch and feel their way through a G-scale experience.

Many thanks go to the GGRS members hosting this layout at the museum. On that Friday, James and Sally Bando and Russ Bundy set up the largest track layout we've used in several years using our collection of GGRS-owned track. Terry Manning brought his circus trains and circus acts. Terry and Dan Steidle provided the carnival rides.

Set-up took about 2 ½ hours.

On Saturday, our volunteers kept the trains running, entertained the visiting families, set up the Paw Patrol play area, and kept the little ones from being run over by trains. Our volunteers during assigned slots included James & Sally Bando, Russ & Leslie Bundy, Terry & Ginny Manning, Dan & Carol Steidle, Lori & Peter Thomas, Roy & Pam Williamson, and Ted Yarbrough. Lori, Dan, and the Mannings toughed it out as "all day" participants.



Breakdown only took 45 minutes with almost everyone there to pitch in.

Each of them can tell you cute stories of the interaction of the smallest visitors with our trains. One little girl's dad hitched a ride on one of our engines for their stuffed flamingo! Dozens of our visitors did the same with Paw Patrol characters under Lori's patient hands. Lori probably set a record for the number of cars of rolling stock in G-scale repositioned in a single day!












