I then moved on to HO scale trains as a teen and even into young adulthood. It was in the late 1980's after a trip to Colorado that I moved to G scale trains indoors. My first G scale cars were purchased from Scott Griggs, well before Trainz, when he had a set up at an indoor flea market mall on the outskirts of Atlanta. I ran those D&RGW yellow passenger cars with a Bachmann Big Hauler 4-6-0 Rio Grande Southern locomotive. It wasn't long until I figured indoors was not the way to go for G scale trains and moved outdoors. I have been a garden railroader ever since.

The full size tourist railroads fully understand the connection with trains and Christmas. The ones in our area will have special trains for Christmas. The Tennessee Valley Railroad will have the North Pole Limited and Christmas dinner Trains both out of Chattanooga, as well as the Hiwassee Christmas Train departing from Delano, TN on Highway 411. I may be a bit partial to the Tennessee Valley Railroad as I do volunteer there (you might find me working Santa's Private Car on the North Pole Limited). Pullman Yards

After the October meeting, several members went to The Pullman Yards to explore. While the current modern use is for hosting private events, entertainment, dining, and the like, it has a varied "train" history, as the name implies.

Pratt Engineering Company (1904–1926)

Originally the Pratt Engineering Company built up the area in 1904. The site was originally a sugar and fertilizer processing plant. (one would hope they didn't mix the two!)

During World War I, it was used to produce fertilizer bombs. (BOOOOOM!!!)

It was also used to develop and patent liquid carbonated gases. This technology was later purchased by The Coca-Cola Company.

The Pullman Company (1926–1955)

The Pullman Company purchased the site in 1926 and expanded it, giving it the name "Pullman Yards".


It was used as a facility for manufacturing and repairing its luxury passenger railcars. The yard was a major employer for African American men, including the Pullman Porters, who later formed the "Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters and Maids". This was the first African American labor union affiliated with the American Federation of Labor.

Post-Pullman and abandonment (1955-2017)

In 1955, the Pullman Company sold the property to the Second American Iron and Metal Company, and railcar manufacturing and repair continued until the 1980s. The Georgia Building Authority acquired the property in 1990 after the rail line was abandoned. The site was mostly left untouched but was used as a filming location for major movies.

Redevelopment into an entertainment hub (2017–present)

In 2017, Atomic Entertainment purchased the property with a vision to transform it into an arts and entertainment district. The revitalized space now hosts events, live music, immersive exhibits, restaurants, and activities like roller skating and pickleball. The site has received accolades for its successful redevelopment - https://www.pullmanyards.com/

Pineapple Casserole

1 large (20 oz.) can chunk pineapple in juice, drained

1 large can (20 oz.) can crushed pineapple in juice

I c. sugar

5 Thsp. flour 2 c. cheddar cheese, grated 3/4 c. Ritz cracker crumbs 1 stick butter, melted

1. Pour pineapple mixture into a bowl. 2. Mix sugar and flour and pour over pineapple. 3. Sprinkle cheese over this mixture and pour into casserole dish. 4. Top with cracker crumbs and melted butter. 5. Bake for 45 minutes at 350° E.

P<u>ineapple Casserole</u>

2 cans 20 oz. pineapple chunks 1 can 20 oz. crushed pineapple, drained as well as possible

1 c. sugar

1/2 c. all purpose flour
2 c. shredded cheddar cheese
1 stick margarine, melted
1 sleeve Ritz crackers, crushed

Drain pineapple, reserving 3 oz. of juice. Combine flour and sugar, stir in reserved juice. Add pineapple, mixing well. Spoon into greased 13" x 9" casserole dish. Top with cheese. Top with cracker crumbs and melted butter. Bake at 350° F for 20 - 30 minutes or until crumbs are lightly browned.

Trains around Christmas

Ted informs me that Jewel, the Chief Engineer of the Christmas Tree Express in Chatsworth wants to see your Trains. Send in your Holiday Excursions for the New Year's Edition of the GGRS Gazette.

The red trolley on 'Mister Rogers' Neighborhood' traveled 5,000 miles annually.

The beloved children's television program *Mister Rogers' Neighborhood* used signals to tell its audience when to get ready to listen and learn. At the start of every episode, host Fred Rogers entered his TV home and sang "A Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood" as he changed from a sport coat and loafers to his signature sweater and sneakers. Next, he typically introduced a topic — sometimes veering into sensitive subject matter like divorce or depression — before beckoning the Trolley to transport viewers into the Neighborhood of Make-Believe.

In a given year of the show, Trolley's commutes covered 5,000 miles, according to PBS, more than the length of the world's longest river, the 4,123-mile Nile.

Trolley's precise origins are somewhat mysterious, but we do know the one-of-a-kind model was hand-built from wood by a Toronto man named Bill Ferguson in 1967, the year

before *Mister Rogers' Neighborhood* premiered. (Rogers likely met Ferguson when he was living in Toronto and taping Mister Rogers, which aired on CBC-TV from 1961 until 1964.)



The TV host's love for trolleys went all the way back to his own childhood; during one 1984 episode of *Mister Rogers' Neighborhood*, he visited the Pennsylvania Trolley Museum and remembered accompanying his dad on long trolley trips. Young viewers often wrote to Rogers with questions about the show's trolley, such as why there were no people aboard, to which the host responded that the lack of passengers encouraged kids at home to visualize themselves aboard.

Today, Trolley is on permanent display at the Fred Rogers Center at Saint Vincent College in Rogers' hometown of Latrobe, Pennsylvania. Visitors to Latrobe will have no trouble spotting bumper stickers around town that read "My Other Car Is a Trolley."

We never reveal garden railroad addresses but we do give credit to railroad owners and videographers.


