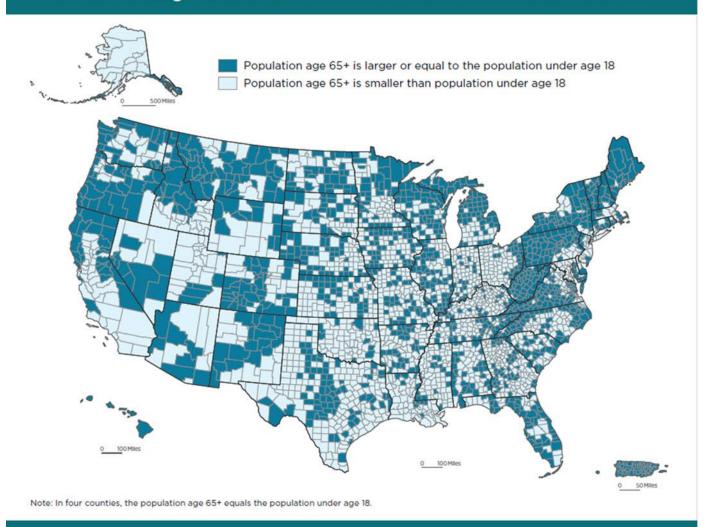

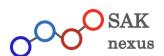






Older Adults Outnumber Children in Nearly Half of U.S. Counties in 2024





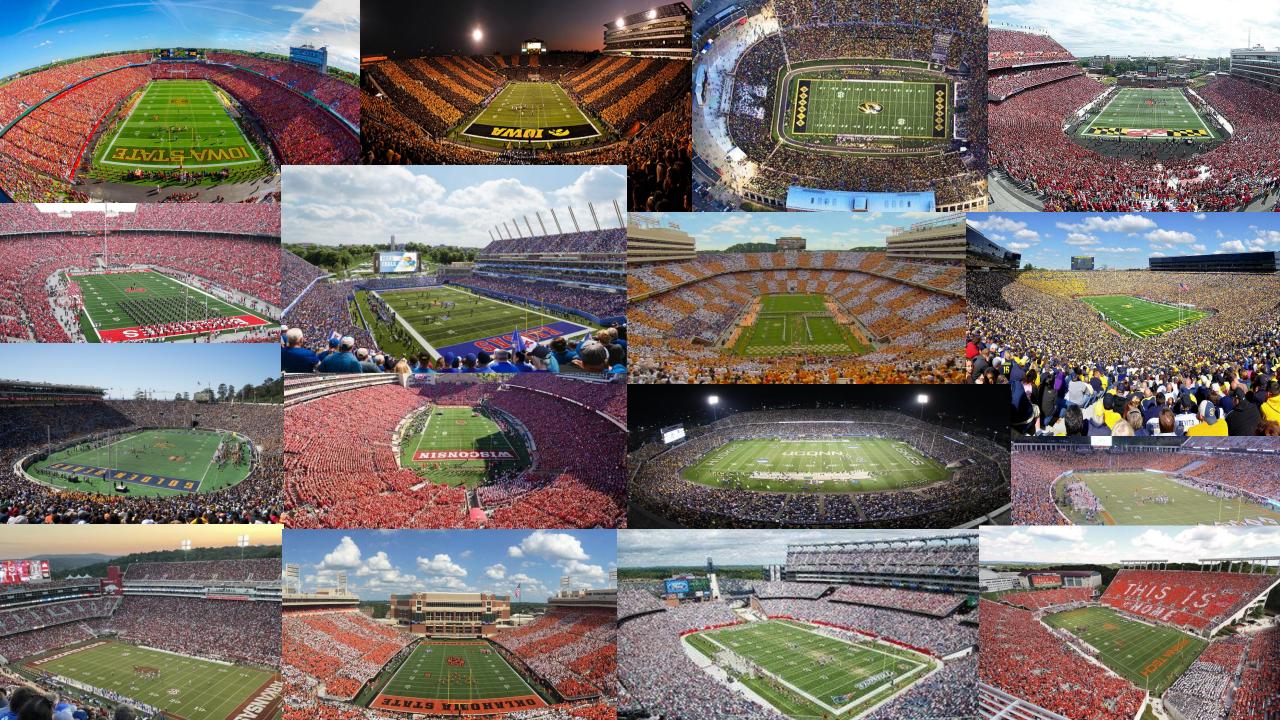


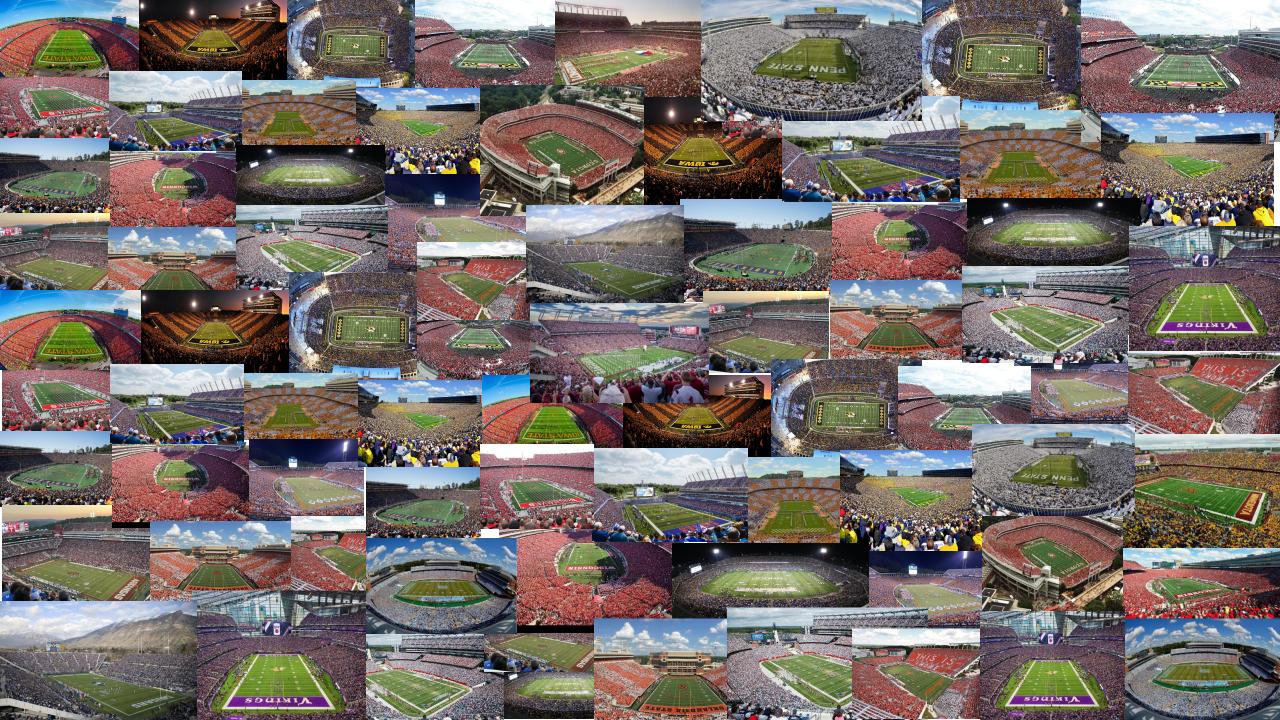










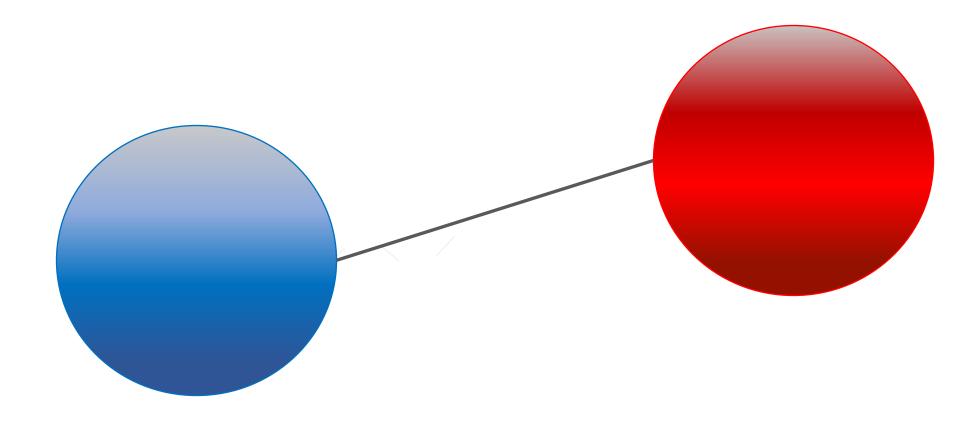


Alzheimer's in Numbers

- More than 7 million people over the age of 65 live with Alzheimer's disease in the United States
- More than 200,000 people younger than age 65 also have Alzheimer's
- Nearly 12 million Americans serve as dementia caregivers, valued at \$413 billion

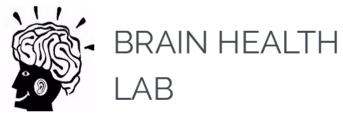

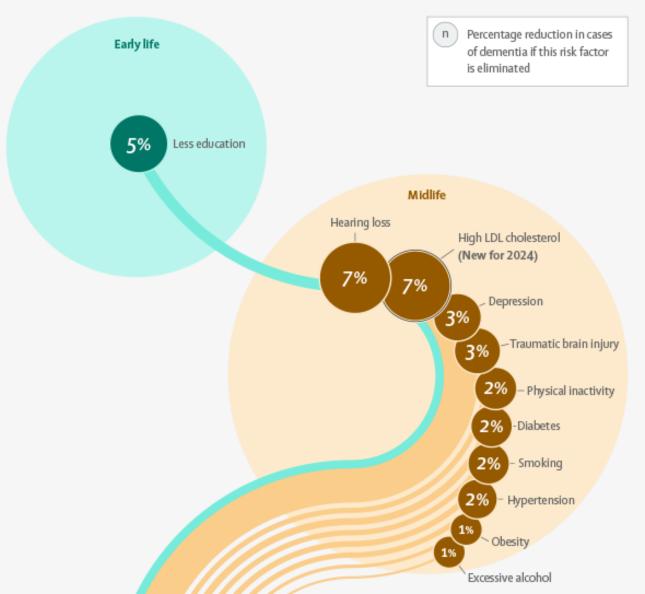

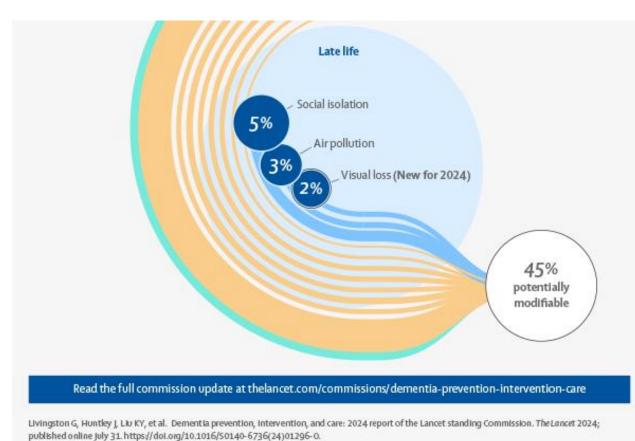

Risk factors for dementia — 2024 update

The 2024 update to the standing Lancet Commission on dementia prevention, intervention, and care adds two new risk factors (high LDL cholesterol and vision loss) and indicates that nearly half of all dementia cases worldwide could be prevented or delayed by addressing 14 modifiable risk factors.



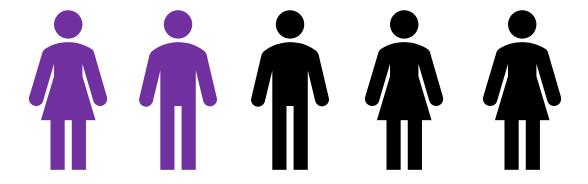

2 out of 5 dementia cases could be prevented or delayed by addressing modifiable risk factors



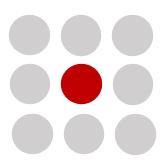


The BOLD Dream

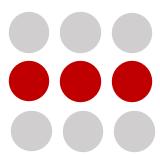
Alzheimer's and related dementias cost us more than \$384 billion per year, including \$246 billion in Medicare and Medicaid. By 2050, costs are expected to exceed \$1 trillion.

BOLD is a modest investment that can change the future of Alzheimer's. The federal government has invested \$117 million so far and next year is on track for around \$40 million.

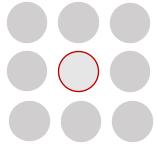

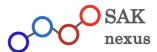

The BOLD Infrastructure for Alzheimer's Act

Public Law 115-406 115th Congress

An Act

Dec. 31, 2018 [S. 2076]

Building Our Largest Dementia Infrastructure for Alzheimer's Act. 42 USC 201 note.

To amend the Public Health Service Act to authorize the expansion of activities related to Alzheimer's disease, cognitive decline, and brain health under the Alzheimer's Disease and Healthy Aging Program, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

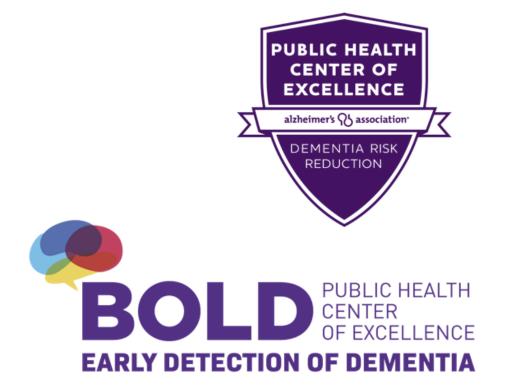
This Act may be cited as the "Building Our Largest Dementia Infrastructure for Alzheimer's Act" or the "BOLD Infrastructure for Alzheimer's Act".

SEC. 2. PROMOTION OF PUBLIC HEALTH KNOWLEDGE AND AWARE-NESS OF ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE, COGNITIVE DECLINE, AND BRAIN HEALTH UNDER THE ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE AND HEALTHY AGING PROGRAM.

Part K of title III of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. 280c et seq.) is amended—

(1) in the part heading, by adding "AND PUBLIC HEALTH PROGRAMS FOR DEMENTIA" at the end; and

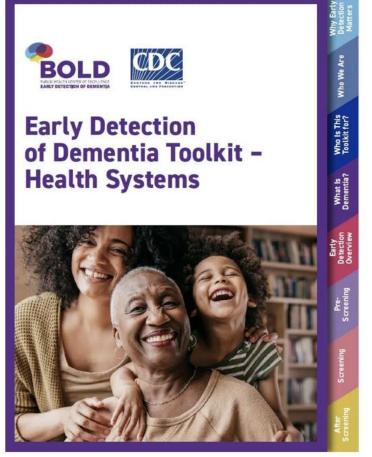

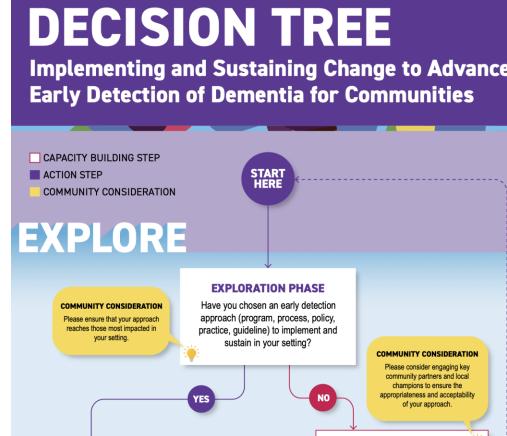

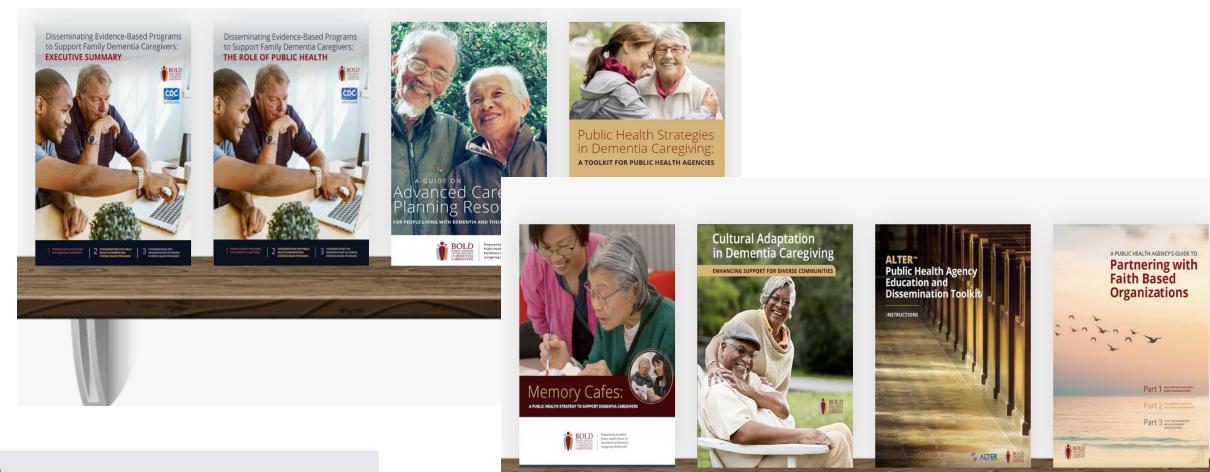

Saving Your Brain Quiz

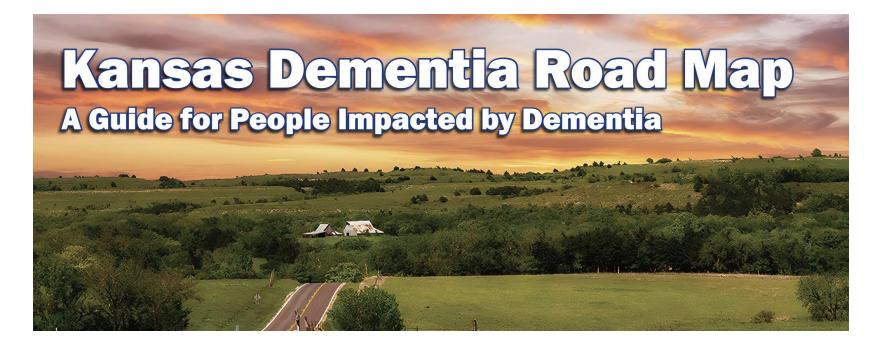
The **Saving Your Brain Quiz** is meant to be a learning tool to assist in making healthy lifestyle choices that will lower your risk of cognitive decline (such as when you have difficulty with memory), dementia, and Alzheimer's disease. Many of these healthy choices are known to also lower your risk of other diseases such as heart disease, type 2 diabetes, stroke, cancer, etc. Once you turn 65, your estimated lifetime risk for cognitive decline is approximately 23%, but even if not over 60, use of this tool can start healthy habits with a lifetime of results.

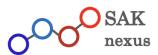

Delaying Alzheimer's disease by 5 years would decrease spending by \$180 billion by 2035

Preventable hospitalizations in people with Alzheimer's and related dementias cost Medicare \$2.58 billion in 2013

If everyone living with Alzheimer's received a diagnosis sooner, cumulative savings would total potentially \$7 trillion



Think about why it is important for public health organizations to share stories from people living with dementia, their caregivers and their families.
