Rules & Regulations

- 1) Membership is \$5.00 per person
- 2) All entry forms for exhibits in the Hall must be made to the Secretary on or before five (5) days prior to the Fair.
- 3) No exhibitor may make more than one entry in any class except for Poultry
- 4) The decision of the Judges shall in all cases be final, except when a rule of the Society has been violated.
- 5) Rule interpretation will be up to the discretion of three (3) Directors.
- 6) Membership cards allow the member entry to the fair on Labour Day Only.
- 7) From the sum or sums awarded to any member as a prize or premium, it shall be lawful for, and the duty of the Secretary and/or Treasurer to retain \$5.00 as the membership fee for the ensuing year.
- 8) Any person entering an article or animal contrary to the rules of the Society shall forfeit any prize he/she may be otherwise entitled to.
- 9) This Society will be responsible for payment of prize moneys only to the extent that the revenues of the Society permit.
- 10) A protest must be in writing and be in the hands of the Secretary within 24 hours after the Fair. It must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be accompanied by a deposit of \$5.00. The deposit will be forfeited to the Society if the protest is not sustained.
- 11) Prize money will be presented at Awards Night. If unable to attend and your award is over \$50.00, it will be forwarded by mail. For persons with awards lower than \$50.00, you will be advised of an alternate place for pick up. All awards must be picked up/distributed by December 31 of the current year. Otherwise the money will revert back to the Armour, Ryerson & Burk's Falls Agricultural Society.

NO PERCENTAGE PULL

LIGHT AND HEAVY DIVISIONS

Rules & Regulations

1. Course will be 150'/50m long with sidelines 20'/7m apart
2. To qualify, a draw of at least 20'/7m is to be completed
3. Teams will be allowed three (3) attempts to qualify.
4. While drawing, horses must stay within sidelines of course or be excused.
5. Draws
 - a) All draws are to be taken in order. Pass-ups will be allowed after the first three draws are successfully completed. Only two (2) pass-ups in a row are allowed, the third must be taken.
 - b) The first four (4) draws will be two (2) blocks at a time. After that NO MORE than three (3) blocks at a time will be put on the Stoneboat.
6. Ten minutes will be allowed to repair broken harness or equipment which has occurred during a draw, before calling the next team.
7. Any forward movement of the stoneboat will be considered a "draw".
8. Contestants will draw for their position of order prior to the commencement of competition.
9. Officials and contestants ONLY are allowed within the course area during a draw.
10. Three (3) minutes will be allowed for a teamster to hitch his team. "Time" will commence from the moment the team enters the "draw" area.
11. Draw Area
 - a) The teamster and two assistants only will be allowed in the "draw area".
 - b) Teamster MUST have a person to help hitch.
12. While the team is hitched to the stoneboat:

- a) Neither teamster nor any assistant to be alongside of or ahead of the team. They are not permitted to 'head' their team.
- b) Assistants are not permitted to talk to horses.
- 13. Slapping of horses in the 'draw area' and surrounding area will not be permitted.
- 14. A horse is permitted to participate as a member of ONLY ONE team.
- 15. The judge's decision is FINAL.
- 16. During the competition, attempting to talk to the judge, at the judge's discretion, will result in disqualification.
- 17. Any questions regarding the rules, or operation of the competition, are to be discussed with the committee only, prior to the commencement of the contest.

Light Horse General Rules:

Exhibitors may enter two entries in each class, except in the showmanship and halter classes, where only one entry is allowed.

Light horses are allowed to camp on the grounds. Please clean up after your horses. Designated areas will be set for hay and manure.

Animals must be in good health or, after consultation with a veterinarian, they may be asked to leave the show.

All animals shown at the ARBF Fall Fair must have liability insurance. Bring a copy of the insurance policy when doing registrations/entries so that we have it on file.

All Western Performance and Western Games will be judged as per the current year WHOA (Western Horse Association of Ontario) rules. All English Performances and Hunter/Jumper classes will be judged as per the current year Equine Canada (Section R-G). Extreme Cowboy will be judged by the current year EXCA Rule Book. ARBF Fall Fair rules as to age, size, along with any other amendments will take precedence should the need arise.

The judge's decision is FINAL. If an exhibitor has any questions they are to ask the Ring Steward to approach the judge on their behalf.

Judge's Notes - In the absence of completion in any section or if an entry is of inferior quality the judge may award only such prizes as they deem worthy.

There must be at least two entries in a class for the class to run. If not, classes will be combined at the discretion of the Director.

All entries are asked to be ready at the gate and enter promptly when their numbers are called. The class order of go will be announced at the beginning of the class and/or posted in the warm-up area. Competitors are asked to notify the announcer's booth of their intentions to scratch from a class prior to that class beginning.

In the event of a complaint, which cannot be settled by the Director, the exhibitor lodging the complaint must do so IN WRITING with a cheque for \$25.00 payable to the ARBF Agricultural Society within two weeks of the completion of the Fair.

A Coggins test will not be required.

All prize money will be paid the day of the competition.

NOVICE RIDERS CAN ONLY ENTER NOTIVE CLASSES, NO CROSS ENTRIES

1. The entry fee for all birds is \$.50 Each
2. All entry fees, plus membership, are to be sent to the Secretary five (5) days prior to fair date.
3. In case of withdrawal, no entry fee or membership will be refunded if the secretary is not notified with 48 hours in advance of judging.
4. All birds must be cooped by 9:30 a.m. Monday.
5. Judging begins at 10:00 a.m. Monday.
6. Birds are not to be removed before 4:30 p.m. on show day.
7. No Exhibitor is permitted to enter and show more than two (2) exhibits in any one section.
8. In classes for any other variety (AOV), the variety must be listed on the entry form.
9. Any bird, in the opinion of the Judge or Director, showing evidence of unhealthy, diseased, extremely dirty, will be removed from the building and not judged.
10. All birds will be judged by a Licensed Judge under the American Standards of Perfection. If there is no one available, the Society will provide an adequate replacement.
11. All exhibit tags are to remain with the secretary and they will be secured to coops designated by the Director.

1. All exhibits to be delivered to the Hall between 8:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. on Saturday. Doors close at 11:00 a.m. **SHARP.**
2. Entries **MUST** be tagged and ready.
3. Only one entry per section
4. Each entry must be the work of the Exhibitor
5. No article may be shown for more than 2 years
6. Exhibitors will not be allowed in the Hall to place their exhibits. Exhibitors will hand in their exhibits at the door with all entry tags properly attached. An attendant appointed by the Directors will have entire charge of place exhibits.
7. Manufactured articles must be the manufacture and property of the exhibitor.
8. Any article or Exhibit in the Hall competing for a special prize is **NOT** to compete for a Society prize.
9. A Director shall have the authority to discard old or soiled work.
10. The Directors will take every reasonable precaution to ensure the safety of articles sent to the exhibition, but the owners

themselves must take the risk of exhibiting them. Should any article be accidentally injured or lost, the Director will give all the assistance in their power towards the recovery of the same. It is distinctly understood that they will make no payment for any articles injured, damaged or lost.

Vegetables are judged per Ontario Judging Standards printed by the Ministry of Agriculture and Food.

Vegetables must be clean and displayed on paper plates unless they are too large.

Tips on Exhibiting Vegetables

Beans: *Do not wash.* Wipe gently with a soft cloth. Should be uniform in colour and size, fresh (snap when bent), free from stringiness, fine grained smooth, fleshy clean, well -filled.

Beets: Tops removed ½” (12mm) from crown. Trim roots to 1”, should be 2 to 2 ½” (5 to 7 mm). Do not scrub. Can be placed in cold water bath before carefully wiping off soil.

Cabbage: Trim stem ½” (12mm). Trim heads down to two layers of sound green outer leaves.

Cauliflower: Heads should be dense, well-formed and free from fuzziness and small leaves. Trim stems to ¼” to ½” (7-12mm). Leave 4 to 6 lower leaves around head and trim squarely across leaving ½” to 1” (12-25mm) projecting above head.

Carrots: Trim stems to 2” (5 cm).

Corn: Remove 1/3 of husk from tip to butt. Do not totally strip husk from ear.

Cucumber: Trim stem to ¼” (7mm) Green is mature. Yellow is ripe.

Onion: Remove roots just below base of bulb. Remove only jagged and dirty outer leaves. Cut tops ½” to 1” (12-25mm) above bulb.”

Parsnips: To clean, soak in water. Do not rub skin. Trim rootlets. Should be 2” to 3” (5 – 7 cm) in diameter at the crown. Remove side roots. Tops trimmed to ½ “ (12mm) above crown. Skin clean, smooth, and white with no discoloration.

Pumpkin: Trim stem. Can be washed to remove dirt.

Tomatoes: Leave 1” (25mm) stem attached to tomato. Free of cracks and scars. Clean and firm. At least 2 ¼” (5.5cm) in diameter.

Turnips: Trim off tops and roots without leaving scars. Swedes/Rutabagas should be 3 ½” to 5” (8-12cm) in diameter. Smooth shapely and clear skin.

Squash: (Winter: Acorn squash, Hubbard Squash) *do not wash.*
Trim stem.

Squash: Summer: Zucchini Trim stem. Can be washed to remove dirt. Do not rub skin.
