The second inspirational event was the USRA National Singles which were held in Houston, Texas over Memorial Day weekend. Cheryl Gudinas is once again the reigning Women's Open National Champion. Congratulations, Cheryl! In addition to Cheryl, 12 other Illinois players came home with medals. Some of those include Watmora Casey (2nd in Men's 40+ A/B), Cheryl Kirk (2nd in Women's 45+ A/B), Leo Klimaitis (2nd in Men's 50+ A/B) and John O'Donnell, Jr. (3rd in Men's 70+). I'm sure those who attended Nationals came back inspired by the play they saw there. The rest of us now need to get inspired and practice up over the summer so we don't get left in the dust when the next racquetball season starts!

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The Kid Has Game

Brandon Ritschard played all kinds of sports - soccer, football, baseball and basketball - but he was always bored.

The 13-year-old Glen Ellyn youth found his niche after he received a racquetball set and membership to the B.R. Ryall YMCA in Glen Ellyn as a Christmas gift in 1999. Now, about 16 months after his first lesson, Ritschard is beating players who have been playing the sport longer than he's been alive.

"It's his passion," says Brandon's mother, Julie. "He would rather do this and do (weekend) tournaments and hit the road. He just loves it, so we let him go with it. As long as it doesn't interfere with school, he's good to go."

For Ritschard, a seventh-grader at Hadley Junior High School in Glen Ellyn, the thought of taking on an opponent one-on-one makes his competitive juices flow. "I love to win. I don't like to lose, and it's a lot of fun, too," he responds when asked what he likes most about the game.

And the worst part? The 5-foot-11-inch, 100-pound Ritschard, who has collided with many larger foes - both figuratively and literally - is quick to respond. "Losing," says the honor roll student. "I don't like to lose, especially when I can beat the person and I play badly. That just kills me."

After several months of lessons at the YMCA, the coach called Ritschard's father, Fred, to tell him about his son's progress and budding talent. More hard work followed, with Ritschard practicing up to two hours a day, five days a week for 10 total hours. His hard work paid off, as he landed a sponsorship from Head, a maker of racquets and other equipment.

He competed in tournaments in and around Illinois, eventually accumulating enough points to rank 13th in his age group for the U.S. Racquetball Association.

This summer, he's looking forward to tournaments as far away as Denver, Colo., where he will likely improve his ranking. Aside from attending college and becoming a veterinarian, Ritschard hopes to compete in the Olympic Games.

Some people believe racquetball will be-

come an Olympic-sanctioned event by 2008.

Ritschard's supporters also hope he will be an inspiration to younger kids interested in the sport. Tom Griffith, one of Ritschard's coaches, points to several factors that make him successful. "He's got a large amount of determination, tenacity, whatever you want to call it. He also has a skill level that's really polished," Griffith says. "He's a sportsman out there. Plus, he's a great kid."

Ritschard's hard work and dedication is evident in a recent practice session with Griffith. Ritschard, a lefty, is skillfully darting shots so they bounce on his right side, away from Griffith. Next, he's looping returns off the ceiling to negate a good serve by Griffith. Or he's strategically using the corners so the quick caroms make for an easy "kill."

Ritschard, who also is in the gifted program in Glen Ellyn Elementary District 41, says understanding math and the court's angles helps him play the game. Along with the two pre-match habits: get there early and. "I always like to drink water, or hydrate, as my mom says." So much for that Gatorade endorsement.

Dave Negrete, owner of The Athletic Club of Bloomingdale who also coaches Ritschard, said another reason he excels is because the sport isn't forced on him. Negrete should know: He's a former top-ranked professional racquetball player himself.

Has Matt Brown, a 40-year-old regular at The Bloomingdale Athletic Club, one of the two sites where Ritschard practices, ever beaten him in a match? Brown shrugs and smiles. "He's pretty good," Brown says in a classic understatement. "He's got a great sense of the game. He hits great shots. He's a cool head."

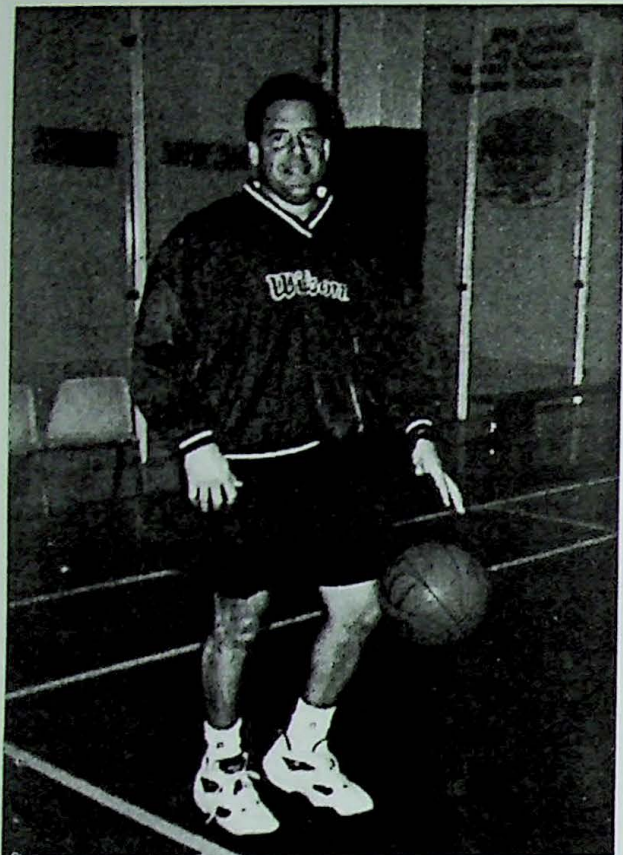

"Illinois has always been one of the biggest supporters of the USRA. We're appreciative of the participation from Illinois players at the USRA tournaments". So said Jim Hiser, USRA Associate Executive Director and National Singles Tournament Director. And participate we did! With 31 players entered, Illinois ranked third behind Texas (147) and California (38) — last year we were fourth. Team Illinois (21 men and 10 women), posted some nice results (see below).

The Downtown Houston YMCA hosted this event for the 19th consecutive year; 650 individuals comprised 1,150 entries in 65 divisions (age, skill, and combined age/skill).

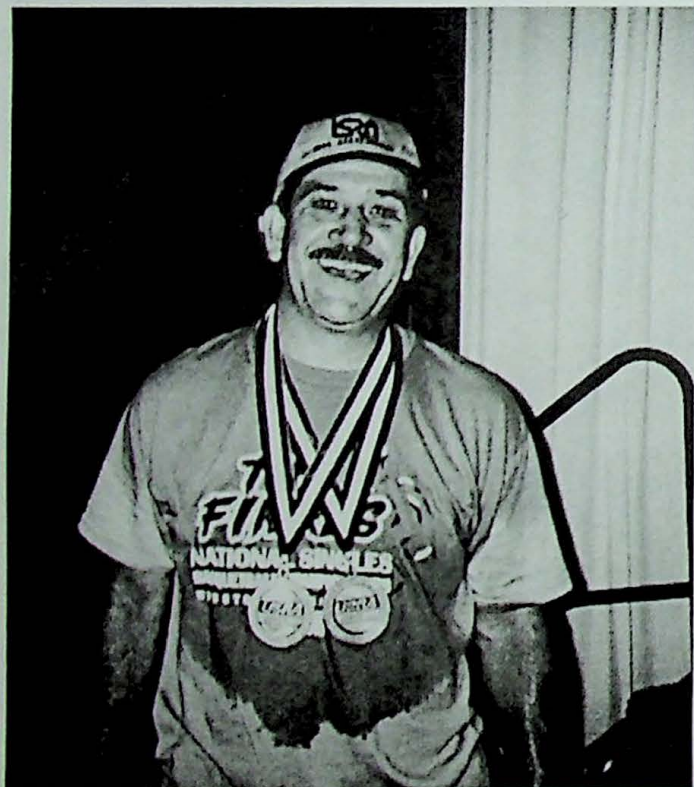
Cheryl Gudinas (IL) earned her third consecutive Women's Open title with a win over Jackie Paraiso (CA); scores were 7-15, 15-9, 11-8. Jack Huczek (MI), 18, became the youngest player in racquetball history to win the Men's Open by defeating Rocky Carson (CA) 15-11, 15-6.

Off-the-court highlights of this tournament included nightly activities at the Hyatt Regency Houston. Survivor Evening (Thursday) netted

Illinois yet another honor: Janet Christie and George Smuckel brought home a win in the Twist Contest; way to go, guys! Casino Night (Friday), the Fiesta Awards Banquet on Saturday, and Sunday's Karaoke Night provided opportunities for camaraderie among tournament players and their guests from across the U.S.

Awards on Saturday night included: Cheryl Gudinas, Female Athlete of the Year; Rocky Carson, Male Athlete of the Year; Agatha Falso, Peggy Steding Award (age division); Tim Hansen, Bud Muehleisen Award (age division); Caryn McKinney, Hall of Fame Inductee; and Chris Coy, John Halverson Fair Play Award.

For those of you who are contemplating a trip to Houston in 2002, here are some pro's and con's (my editorial opinions only!) of the event. Pro's: One site for all competition makes it easier to catch the matches of friends (and competitors in your divisions!); the Hyatt Regency is walking distance from the YMCA and boasts nice rooms at \$78/night, a pool, and a central gathering area (aka the bar); you'll enjoy supporting your fellow Illinoisans and, for those who have attended before, renewing friendships with those you have met in prior years; a great windbreaker jacket replaced the traditional tournament shirt this year. Con's: A lot of construction downtown made for a dusty walk (maybe it'll be done by next year?); courts 18 and 21 (ask anyone who attended for details); the USRA did not provide meals on site this year (except bagels and fruit at

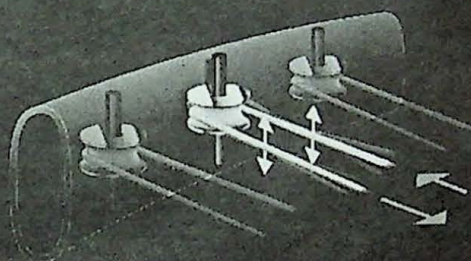
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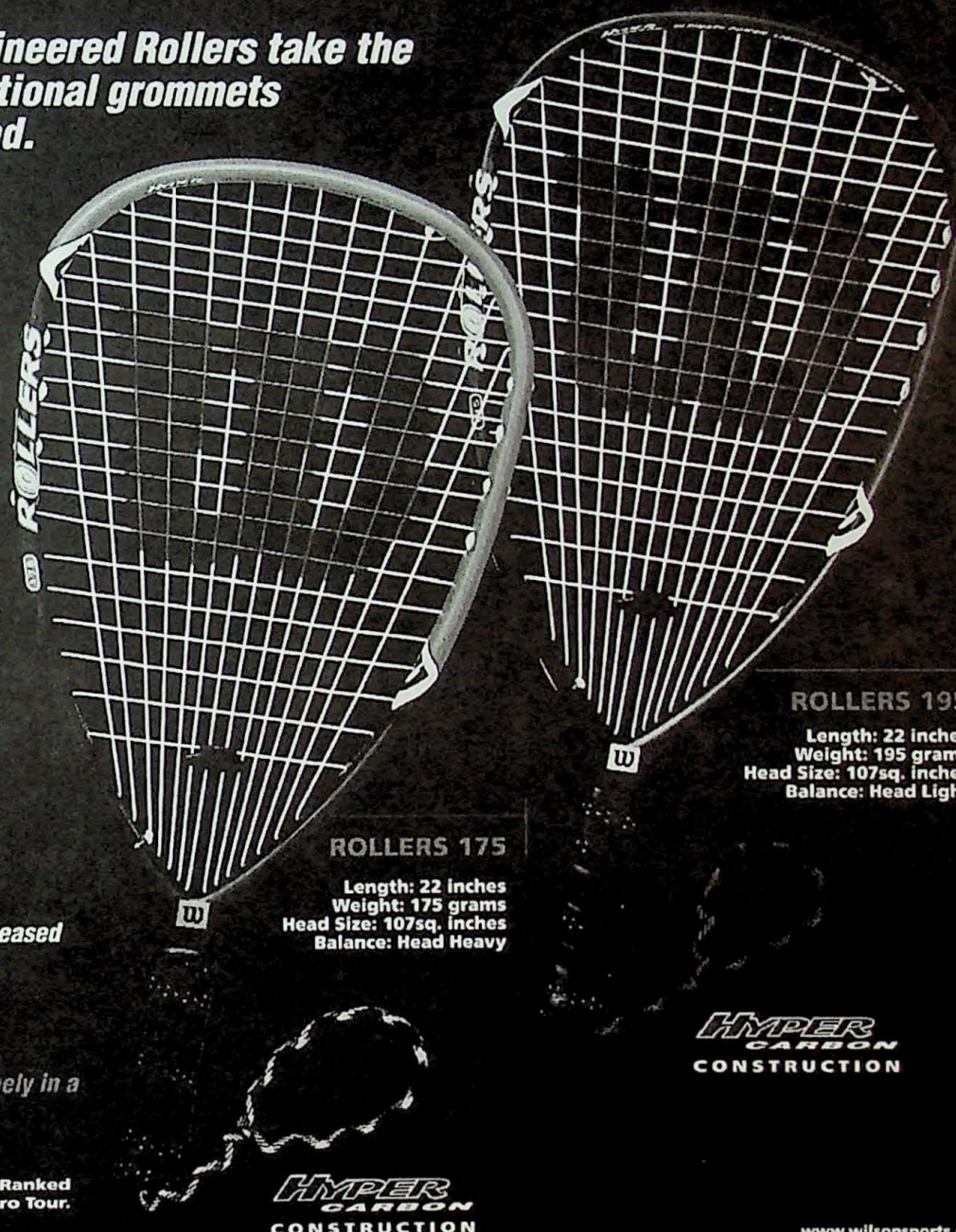

Travel League Wrap Up

Another very successful ISRA Travel League wrapped up its season with a party at the Glass Court in Lombard this past April 20th. Over 100 Travel Team participants were treated to doubles competition awards, and prizes galore from our sponsors. Everyone went home tired and loaded with prizes.

For those not familiar with the Travel League, the Illinois State Racquetball Association, its host clubs and such manufacturers as Ektelon, HEAD, E-Force, Penn and Wilson all contribute to provide increased competition for the benefit of ISRA members.

The league simulates tournament play through a variety of methods. First, the level of competition is top notch. Each week your team will face some of the best players from 21 of the top clubs in the Chicagoland area, no matter what your level. Second, each player is part of a 12-member team. Each week, 5 players represent the team in three singles and one doubles match. Racquetball is, for the most part, an individual sport. You play for yourself or your doubles partner. However, in Travel Team play, a poor performance affects the whole team and this tends to bring out the best in both you and your competitor. Lastly, the differential in points between you and your opponent is key to booking a team win. In tournament play, your goal is to win the match. Winning 15-14 is just as good as 15-1. (Although the latter is always preferred.) In Travel Team play, your goal is not only to score as many points as possible but you must also try to limit your opponent to as few points as possible. A 15-14 win is nice, but 15-1 or

15-0 is the goal. This means that each point is significant as it might make the difference in an overall team win, even though your own match might be a losing effort.

This year we had 39 teams with well over 400 ISRA members participating. This is by far the largest league of its kind in the country. League winners were recognized at the Glass Court party, an appropriate setting since the Glass Court teams won several divisions. The winners of the 2000/2001 Travel League are shown below:

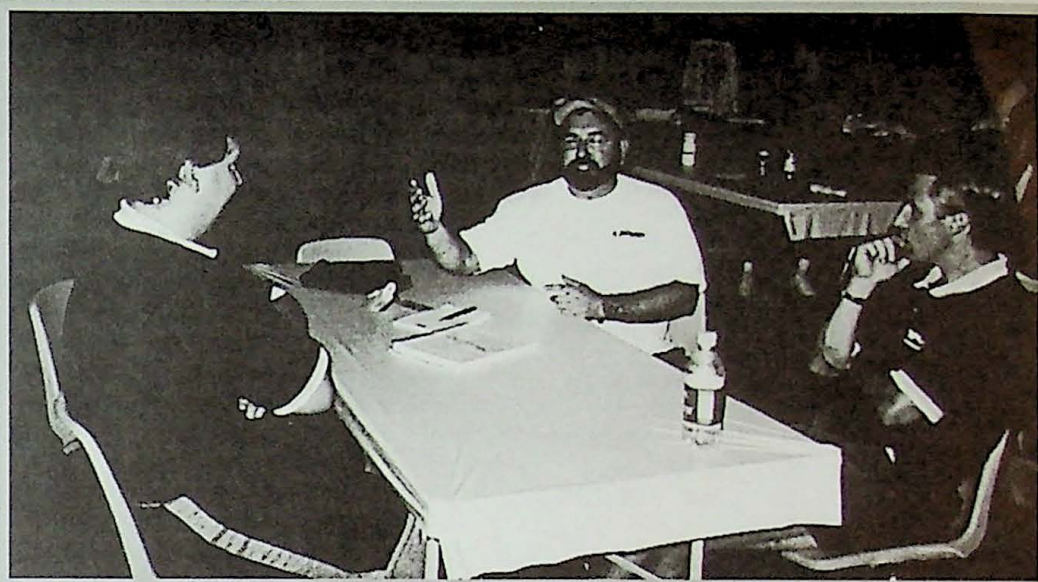


Negrete takes over the IRT!!!

forward to a new format and we're looking to expand by about three to five tournaments next season." Of course, the Halloween Pro Stop will be even bigger and better

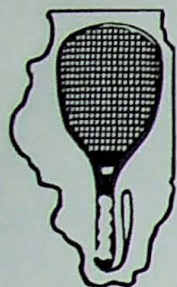
in Illinois and the Negrete Open/WIRT Pro Stop looks to come back to Bloomingdale next year. Stay tuned for further developments as the season nears.
