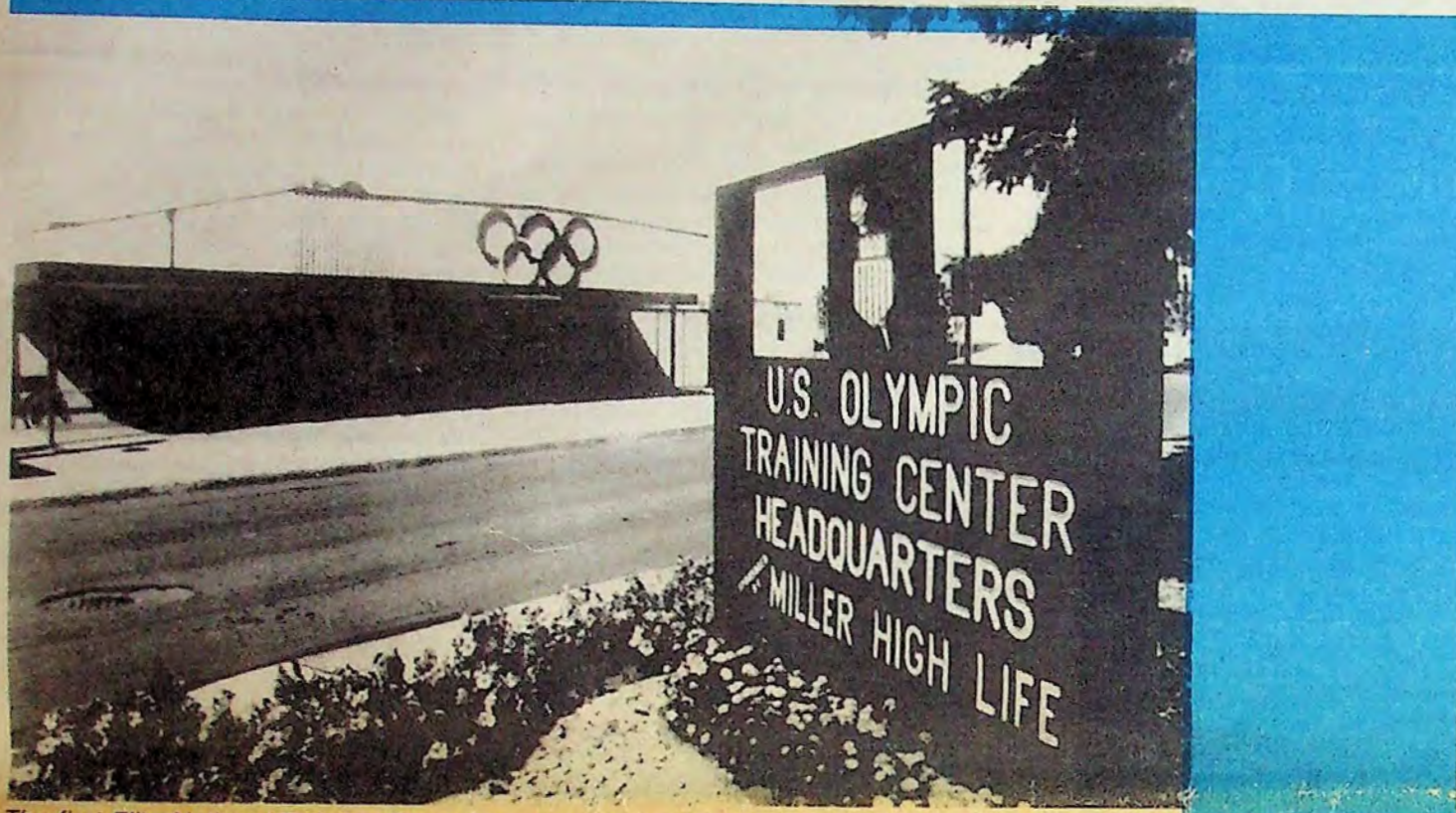

First Elite National Training Camp

Olympic Committee Approves Racquetball Camp



The first Elite National Training Camp for racquetball will be held July 29-August 25 in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

Approval has been given to the A.A.R.A. to hold the first Elite National Training Camp in racquetball history at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, CO.

"What a tremendous step forward for our young sport," stated Paul Henrickson, president of the A.A.R.A. "I cannot think of a more prestigious place in the United States to hold the first National Training Camp."

"This development is another indication of the United States Olympic Committee's faith in the A.A.R.A. and the sport of racquetball," remarked Luke St. Onge, executive director of the A.A.R.A. "Here is a great opportunity for our athletes to come and train along with Olympic hopefuls from all sports. This will have tremendous impact on our sport and the development of international racquetball competition."

The camp will be in session for one-week intervals beginning July 29 and continuing through August 25, 1984. Forty athletes will be invited for each session with selection based upon finishing positions in the Regionals and National Singles, as well as the National Rankings.

Both adult and junior training classes will be held during the Junior Week involving 16 and 18 year-old divisions. One week will include Open players and the two remaining weeks will involve the upper age groups.

Players will receive invitations to attend the National Training Camp. The total cost (including room and board) is estimated to be around \$150.00 a week. Criteria for invitations is now being formulated and will be available at the Regionals and Nationals. Invitations will go out to qualified athletes in May and June, and acceptance will be made based upon first-come, first-serve basis until all sessions are filled. If the weeks do not fill up by the deadline the selection will be made by National Headquarters.

The low cost of \$150.00 will go toward rental of facility, camp personnel, camp shirts, etc., and is certainly within the range of all athletes. The athletes will be picked up at the Colorado Springs Airport by Olympic Training Center vans.

The athletes will be housed and receive meals at Training Center and be bussed daily to the Point Athletic Club where the training will take place. Daily sessions will begin at 8:00 a.m. and run until 4:30 p.m. at the Point Athletic Club followed by an evening evaluation period to be held at the Olympic Training Center.

Regional Directors Seminar Held

On January 13-15 all 15 Regional Directors met at the United States Olympic Training Center for the first Regional Directors Seminar. It was sponsored by Lite Beer, DP Leach, and Penn Athletic Products companies.

Continuity and standardization of the 1984 Lite/A.A.R.A. Regionals were the main topics on Friday, January 13. The session opened with Baaron Pittinger, Assistant Executive Director of the United States Olympic Committee delivering a keynote address to the directors.

All three major sponsors made marketing presentations with Lynn Schlaeger representing Lite Beer from Miller's Young Adult Marketing, Kathi Trepper with Robert Landau Associates, and Steve Forsyth, Lite Beer Public Relations Department.

Only a short three years ago the A.A.R.A. was almost non-existent in the state of New Jersey with an association which attempted to profiteer through scheduling as many tournaments as the calendar would permit; their theme was always "quantity."

Being an avid player and staunch supporter of the A.A.R.A. I was asked to consider accepting the position of State Director. Upon acceptance I carefully selected a committee to assist me in this venture. Our common theme as a non-profit group was to promote racquetball through quality and excellence.

Today we have over 1,400 members and schedule over 20 Open tournaments a year. We publish a bi-monthly state newsletter which includes state ranking systems patterned after the National ranking system. We have enlisted

players and club owners/managers through our State Club Affiliate Member Program. We solicited the sport of racquetball through a statewide Burger King/Club promotion.

We have developed an on-going relationship with the second largest newspaper in the state, which not only prints our tournament results, but headlines our events. ABC T-V has announced our tournaments and interviewed some of our top players. Our Governor has proclaimed the week of May 10th as "Racquetball Week" for three consecutive years.

The State of New Jersey is now 100% A.A.R.A. and there no longer exists that "other players" association.

There are many goals yet to reach; the light at the end of the tunnel is far from being in sight. I want to contribute my experience, ideas and energies to help get just a little bit closer to that "light."

My name is Van Dubolsky. I am employed as an instructor of the Physical Sciences at Santa Fe Community College in Gainesville, Florida. Although I love my teaching job which pays the bills, in "real" life, I have been devoted to racquetball for the past 17 years.

I joined the A.A.R.A. in 1973, and since that time I have been involved with the sport at all levels. Our cover story deals with a major breakthrough for our sport. The Elite National Racquetball Training Camp has been approved by the United States Olympic Committee and will be held at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs. The relatively low cost makes it available to all those who qualify. With this opportunity comes the real incentive to compete and do well in the National Rankings, Lite/A.A.R.A. Regionals, Junior Regionals, and the Nationals. We find this to be an exciting time for the sport of racquetball.

For the first time, all current members of the A.A.R.A. have the added opportunity to vote for the candidate of their choice for the four open positions on the Board of Directors. Exercise your right to choose your leaders by voting today.

This past January the Regional Directors of the A.A.R.A. met in Colorado Springs for a Regional Directors' Seminar which was the first ever held.

The seminar was sponsored by Lite Beer, DP Leach, and Penn Athletic Products Company who underwrote the expenses of the Directors. Without these sponsors' help no meeting would have taken place. The seminar proved to be a huge success and we feel that for the first time there will be continuity and standardization within the Region. The Lite/A.A.R.A. Maintaining Amateur Status

"How do I retain my amateur status?"

This continually asked question becomes more important as added emphasis is placed on such racquetball involvement as the Central American Games, and the U.S. National Team.

A player may maintain his or her amateur status by refraining from accepting money in a pro-sanctioned

event. Pro-sanctioned events are those events currently sanctioned by P.R.O. for men and W.P.R.A. for the women. Information concerning which tournaments are sanctioned by either group can be obtained by calling Drew Stoddard at 702-329-4511.

If a player places in a pro-sanctioned tournament he or she may cover their expenses by using the winnings in the following manner:

The player must sign his or her winnings over to a 501-C-3 charity organization and then, if possible, bill against the charity his/her expenses. The A.A.R.A. has consented to process those winnings in this manner and serve as the individual's 501-C-3 charity. Expenses that can be billed against winnings are training, equipment, travel, lodging, entry fee, coaching, and anything that has directly to do with the athlete's training and performance in racquetball. By using the A.A.R.A. the athlete will have a permanent record on hand to validate his or her amateur status.

A current pro may regain amateur status by refraining from accepting money in a pro-sanctioned tournament for a period of 12 months. The procedure explained above may accomplish this objective. Once a "pro" has regained amateur status he or she is able to compete in all A.A.R.A. sanctioned amateur events, both National and International.

When racquetball becomes a Pan Am Sport or is included in events under the auspices of the United States Olympic Committee — such as the National Sports Festival — prior pros who have regained their amateur status may not compete.

Pros who have availed themselves of the above procedure to regain amateur status are: Linsey Myers, Karen Walton Trent, Davey Bledsoe, David Fleetwood, Sarah Green, Mark Morrow.

NO. 5 JIM HISER MICHIGAN

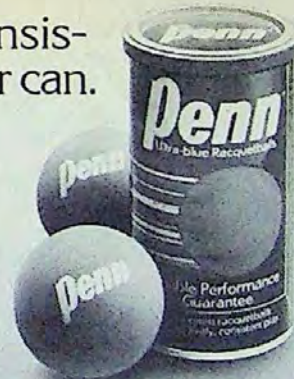

Terms, Organizations

To Become An Olympic Sport

Racquetball is not yet an Olympic sport and will not be contested during the 1984 Olympics. Major obstacles must be overcome before the dream of the Olympics becomes reality.

To understand the procedure for racquetball to become an Olympic sport, one must first understand the different organizations, terms, and phrases that all have parts to play in becoming an Olympic sport.

The **I.O.C.** (International Olympic Committee) is the supreme governing body of the Olympic games.

The **U.S.O.C.** (United States Olympic Committee) is the supreme governing body of amateur sports in the United States. This committee was the result of the Amateur Sports Act of 1975.

The **A.A.R.A.** (American Amateur Racquetball Association) is the national governing body of racquetball in the United States. It is a member of the U.S.O.C. and a charter member of the I.A.R.F.

A **National Governing Body** is the sports association recognized as the sole representative of a sport in the United States for administration and selection of athletes in the Pan Am and Olympic Games. Authority is given to this body by the Amateur Sports Act of 1975.

The **I.A.R.F.** (International Amateur Racquetball Federation) is the supreme governing body of racquetball internationally and a member of the

General Association of International Sports Federations located in Monte Carlo, Monaco. Presently, the I.A.R.F. is comprised of 40 countries as members on five continents.

The **G.A.I.S.F.** (General Association of International Sports Federations) is made up of more than 60 international Sports Federations, with both Olympic and non-Olympic sports.

When people speak of **I.O.C. Recognition**, they are talking of the provision in the I.O.C. Charter that recognizes developing sports with the potential of becoming Olympic sports. Requirements state that the sport must be practiced in at least 25 countries on three continents.

On the Program of the Olympic Games refers to sports that are practiced in at least 42 countries on three continents and have been voted to the Program of the Olympics by the I.O.C.

A **Quadrennial** is each four year period leading up to the Olympic games.

The **Pan-American Games** is the name of the multi-international sports competition contested every four years, restricted to North, South, and Central American Countries.

A **Demonstration Sport** is included in both the Pan Am and Olympic Games as sports that can become full participating sports in future Olympic and Pan Am games, but are not officially a contested sport in either contests.

World Games I is a multi-international sports competition for non-Olympic federations. The I.A.R.F. participated in the first World Games I in 1981 in California and will participate in World Games II in 1985, in London, England, along with 23 other sports.

Members of the U.S.O.C. that are on the program of the Pan Am Games or the Olympic Games are called **Group A Members** of the U.S.O.C.

Group C refers to members of the U.S.O.C. that are developing sports and are not on the program of either contest.

Regional games are held every other year by I.A.R.F. members in Europe, North America, Asia, South America, and Central America.

The **I.A.R.F. World Championships** are held every two years by the I.A.R.F. with the 1984 World Championships slated for July 16-21 at Gleneagles Racquetball Club, in Sacramento, CA. In all, 21 countries are expected to compete.

In order to become a Pan American and Olympic Sport certain procedures must be followed. To date most of these have been met.

A bonafide International Federation was formed in 1979.

World Championships were held in 1981 and will be held again in 1984.

The I.A.R.F. became members of the G.A.I.S.F. in 1979.

In 1980 the I.O.C. recognized the I.A.R.F. as the international governing body for racquetball.

The A.A.R.A. became a member of the U.S.O.C. in 1982. Regional Competitions were held in 1982 and 1983 by the I.A.R.F.

Racquetball must become a demonstration sport in the Pan Am games

in 1987. Approval for this is expected this year.

Finally, the I.A.R.F. must receive I.O.C. recognition. This should happen when the I.A.R.F. fulfills all requirements for recognition. This is anticipated to happen in 1984 or 1985.

It is hoped that racquetball will be included as a full-fledged sport in the Pan Am Games in 1991. If all goes as planned, and support continues to be made to the I.A.R.F. as well as the A.A.R.A., this inclusion could be approved within the next several years. The more active the U.S. National Team, the quicker this will become reality.

Once I.O.C. recognition is given to the I.A.R.F., racquetball must expand

the number of countries where it is played to 72 for the 1988 Olympics and to over 90 for the 1992 Olympics. Racquetball must spread behind the Iron Curtain and become popular before it will be voted in by the I.O.C. This possibility is not out of reach since it is felt that the Eastern Block Countries would like nothing better than to embarrass the United States (for example, basketball).

Although the time-table is extremely aggressive, tremendous progress has already been made to seek Olympic status. Much has been accomplished in six short years. It has taken other sports as long as 50 or 60 years to reach Olympic status.

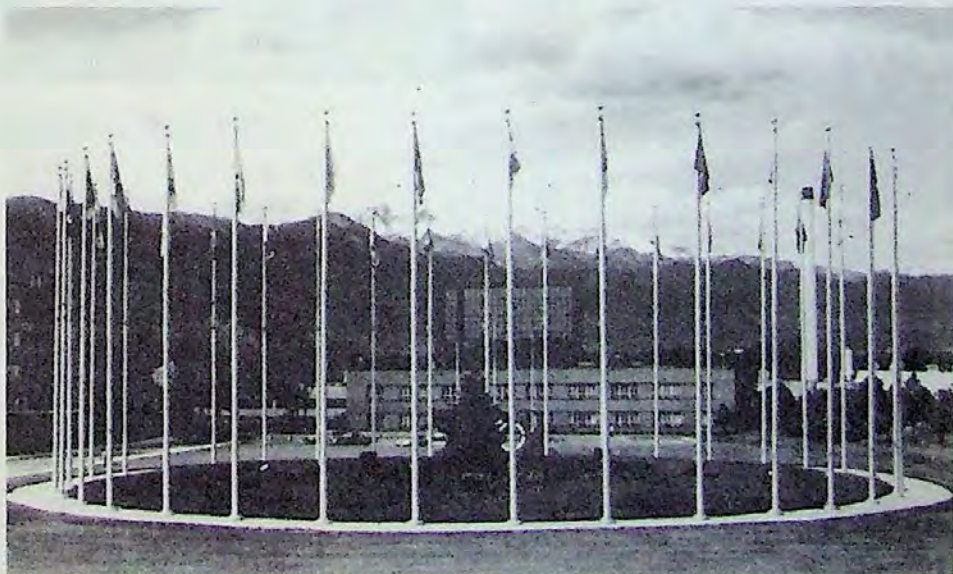
