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## MY SIDE OF THE COURT

Every newsletter demands an article by my favorite writer--me. This issue I have decided to "tell all" about a wonderful experience that every MRA member should have. It's the experience of being a Michigan Racquetball Association Tournament Director.

First, when I started out in racquetball, as a neophyte player, the little things impressed me. I still remember my first tournament shirt, which I wore for years and still have somewhere in my closet. I also remember being somewhat impressed when I scanned my first tournament application. I remember thinking that the fellow listed under tournament director held some place in racquetball history. I thought that merely having your name on an application made one important. Boy, was I naive.

Well, years went by, along with the tournaments and the shirts. My closets began filling up with racquetball memorabilia. The novelty of the shirts wore off, but the job of tournament director was still mystical to me.

Then came the big step in my life, I joined the MRA Board of Directors. Time went by and the opportunity to run tournaments arose. I was still only an assistant, but I was on my way to glory. Then it happened--I WAS LISTED ON THE TOURNAMENT ENTRY FORM!!!!

This is the part of the story where the real fun begins. After basking in the glory of being listed as a tournament director for a few days, I suddenly became aware of what that meant. I soon began getting phone calls from all parts of the state. These calls came at all hours of the day. I simply figured that some parts of the state must be in another time zone.

The phone calls were of major importance to those who called. The calls were from people who wanted a special starting time, wanted to know who was in their division and finally the ultimate question, "What ball are we using?" These were minor irritations and I was still a MRA tournament director. A SEMI-BIG SHOT.

The next step involved the making of the draw sheets. I was expected to travel to Lansing to do the draws. For some unknown reason, this job has to be done in our capital city. Driving seventy-five miles in the dead of winter, in order to spend four hours to sort, label and list all members' names, computer numbers, etc. The job was slowly losing it's charm.

The next step was one of my favorites. As a tournament director, I was

responsible for the delivery of the materials to the tournament site. Balls, trophies, shirts, score cards, and other miscellaneous items had to be at the site by Friday noon. At times this really became an irritation to me. But it was part of the job and it went with the territory. Second thoughts began to enter my mind.

At this point in the story, I was literally at the tournament site. I was behind the desk, passing out score cards, pencils, and balls. Here I was giving directions to players, explaining rules and answering numerous questions on all aspects of the tournament. I was in my glory!! I also had the ultimate power to direct players and even forfeit a match. This job wasn't so bad after all.

As we all know when things go well, all is right with the world. Then it happened, my first ruling as a director. I was called down to a court in order to clarify a problem that arose. I was briefly told the situation on the court by the referee and proceeded to ask the players what happened. Just like true witnesses in all court rooms, each player had a different version of the situation. So with all the wisdom of Solomon, I declared, "Play it over." I've gotten much more adept at this since those early days, but I still sweated over that decision for hours afterward. This

job was getting to be more involved minute by minute.

Then, the player complaints would come in. Comments like, "This player is in the wrong division." "So and so cheated." And the ever present, "The referee called a lousy game!" These and other comments made life behind the desk interesting. I was starting to sweat bullets. Help, I needed help!!

But time heals all wounds, I survived that first experience and lived to do it again. As time went by, I adjusted and became quite capable of running tournaments. I no longer envied the guy listed on any tournament application. I knew the work involved and the hassles that went with the job.

Finally, I want to tell all the tournament players who read this article. Give the guy sitting behind the desk a break. Try to arrive on time for your match, learn how to read the draw sheets and be ready to referee if you lose. Also, remember that the directors are human too. We can't move the matches ahead if too many tie-breakers are on the courts. We can't control a court, if it sweats. We do the best we can under each situation and always try to make the tournament a pleasurable experience for all. So, try to help us as much as we try to help you.

## FROM THE VICE PRESIDENT

I was inspired to write this article on eyeguards for two reasons. First because of the "Great" article by Chuck Leve in "National Racquetball" and second because of a couple of incidents that happened to me.

I was playing recently with a friend of mine and in the middle of the rally I hit a shot and on the follow through hit myself in the left eye with the racquet. Later on the same day I was playing squash and on my opponents follow through I again got hit in the left eye with his racquet.

Now I have been teaching racquetball for 10 years, giving rules and referee clinics for 5 years and been playing in the open division of tournaments for 7 years. Under the assumption that I know the correct way to swing the racquet and the correct place to stand on the court, if I can get hit

in the eye with a racquet, let alone a ball, I know YOU can get hit in the eye. The point is obvious. If you play racquetball, wear eyeguards. The more you play, the more you need eyeguards.

Your eyeguards should either have a lens or be a full cover goggle or any other type that completely covers the eye. I am totally convinced that if I would have had on "open" eyeguards that day I got hit with the racquet, I would have had a very serious eye injury instead of just shaky knees.

In Chuck Leve's article he congratulated the AARA for making eyeguards mandatory for juniors. I agree with Mr. Leve, but the AARA should make eyeguards mandatory for all divisions, not just junior divisions.

## CHANGES AT STATE DOUBLES/JUNIORS

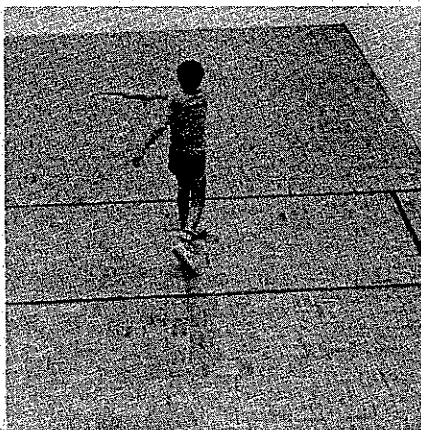
Some changes will take place at this year's State Doubles/State Juniors Championship to be held March 30, 31 and April 1 at Oakland Racquet Club in Birmingham. The first change is that you must be a resident of Michigan to participate. This is true for both players in the doubles and for junior players. Seeding in the 1984 State Doubles Championship will be based on the results of the 1983 State Doubles Championship and on the results from MRA Doubles #1 and MRA Doubles #2.

The second change will be in the offering of "A" and "B" divisions in each of the age groups for the junior player. Under this format any junior with a rating of 1800 or above must play in the "A" part of his age group. This includes all junior players who normally play A and Open. Any junior who normally plays B, C, or D may play in the "B" bracket of his age group.

Lee Steinbach (Grand Rapids) gears up for the State Doubles/State Juniors Championship by playing at MRA #3 in Grand Rapids.

The State Doubles/State Juniors Championship will again count as one of your three tournaments to qualify for the State Singles Championship to be held on April 13-15 at Franklin Racquet Club. A special note to Juniors is that you may play in the Juniors State Championship no matter how many MRA tournaments you have played in. But, if you also wish to play in the State Singles Championship to be held at Franklin Racquet Club, you must have played in three MRA tournaments.

So, Mom and Dad find a doubles partner and bring your son and/or daughter to the MRA State Juniors Championship. Make it a family weekend outing.

Total that up and it comes to \$5.14 in exchange for your \$5 MRA membership dues. These benefits come directly back to you, the player and don't go to any special age or ability grouping.

Also, all MRA members receive benefits from their membership which are not paid for from their membership dues. One such benefit is inclusion in the MRA Ranking System. This state-wide system allows you to see where you stand against other MRA opponents and it helps us keep the competition in each division fairly uniform. You are seeded according to this system at all MRA events and you are eligible to receive any special mailings from groups who use our membership or rating listing. One such special event was last year's Player's Cup Invitational Tournament held at Davison. This membership also enables you to receive pictures of yourself taken in action by the MRA's photographer at each MRA event this year.

All of these above listed services and benefits are yours for your \$5 MRA membership fee. You can see with the total cost of the benefits totalling more than \$5 and some benefits not even being paid for, that the idea of paying members of the Board of Directors from these fees is ridiculous.

Now you say--well the MRA pays somebody. Yes, the MRA pays for jobs in relationship with the MRA State Championship Series of tournaments. For example, a total of \$350 pays the tournament directors for each event. With four tournament directors this breaks down to \$87.50 for each director (before taxes) for working anywhere between 13-17 hours or \$3.25 to \$3.70 an hour after taxes. This person in return is responsible for the smooth running of the MRA event. He/she must handle all the complaints about balls, shirts, courts, opponents and referees. He must also find referees for matches when players refuse to referee or when the players come and request a new referee. Add this to making sure that all the balls, scorecards, drawsheets, banners and shirts get to the tournament site and handle any calls from players during the week and you probably have another four hours of work. I don't believe these directors are overpaid!! Do you? If so, volunteer and try it sometime.

So, now when someone says to you, "Your MRA dues pay members of the Board of Director" you know the scoop. Any payment as explained above for tournament related duties is all a part of the tournament budget and are all involved in running the MRA CHAMPIONSHIP TOURNAMENT SERIES.

## TRUTH, RUMOR OR FICTION

Over the past couple of years, many rumors have surfaced regarding the MRA, its operation, functions and goals. Based on the mistruths and misrepresentation of facts, such rumors, although creating a false picture, have not been worth responding to. However, time has come to address one such rumor.

Implied in print and often by word of mouth is the idea that your \$5 MRA membership sanction dues are used to pay members of the MRA Board of Directors. This idea is completely false!!!! Your MRA dues are used totally to support racquetball in

Michigan. No portion of your dues are sent out of the state for use in any other part of the country. The benefits of your MRA dues are returned directly to you, the player

- 1) mailing of tournament entry forms to your house
- 2) mailing of special event flyers to your house
- 3) printing of and the mailing of "The Service Line" to your house
- 4) MRA membership card
- 5) MRA Rule Booklets
- 6) inclusion in the MRA State-wide computer ranking system

How does this work you ask? Take the MRA member who joined last August in 1983. That member will receive for his \$5 MRA membership dues the following:

- 1) 9 - 1983-84 entry forms mailed to his house -- cost \$.99
- 2) 2 - 1984-85 entry forms mailed to his house -- cost \$.22
- 3) 1 - special event flyer mailed to his house -- cost \$.11
- 4) 4 - 1983-84 "Service Line" editions mailed to his house -- cost \$.44
- 5) 1 - 1984-85 "Service Line" edition mailed to his house -- cost \$.11
- 6) 4 - 1983-84 "Service Line" editions printed -- cost \$2.67
- 7) 1983-84 MRA membership card cost \$.60

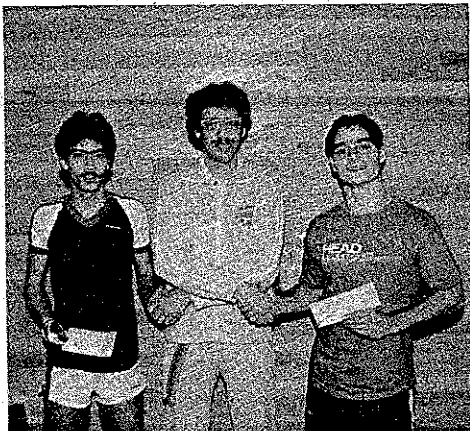

## 3 TOURNAMENT RULE

Again this year, to be eligible for the MRA STATE SINGLES CHAMPIONSHIP to be held at Franklin Racquet Club in April 1984, a player must have PLAYED in 3 MRA tournaments. The State Doubles/State Juniors Championship will count as one of the three tournaments. This means that there are still 2 tournaments left to qualify in: MRA #7 at Racquet King Courts in Trenton and the State Doubles/State Juniors.

IF YOU FORFEIT IN THE FIRST ROUND OF A MRA TOURNAMENT, THAT TOURNAMENT WILL NOT COUNT AS ONE OF YOUR THREE TOURNAMENTS. Also, MRA Doubles #1 and MRA Doubles #2 will not count as tournament stops towards qualifying for the State Singles Championship.

Any requests for special consideration or requests to have this rule waived should be addressed in writing to the MRA Board of Directors at the following address: MRA, PO Box 23035, Lansing, MI 48909. All such requests must be received by March 31, 1984 and will be discussed for approval or denial at the April 3, 1984 MRA Board of Directors meeting.

### NEW MEETING SITE

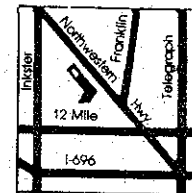

# RULES -- THE SCREEN SERVE

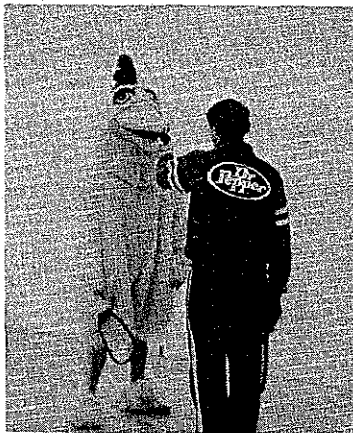
The screen serve has caused problems for players and referees alike. I was about to write an article which would explain the screen serve, as I see it. However, as I was going through various rule books, I realized that there is no definitive rule for the screen serve. Each book had a slightly different variation on the subject.

So, in all my wisdom, I referred to my MRA Guidelines for Referees and I found an answer. Instead of writing my viewpoint, I opted to simply reprint the Guidelines view. This was written by a committee of eight, which included yours truly. I hope the following will clear up the screen serve some for you.

1. There is **NO** 18" rule or other definitive rule. It is strictly a judgement call.
2. The referee should call a screen whenever he believes that the server's body blocked the ball to such an extent that the receiver was not allowed a fair chance to see the ball well enough to make a reasonable return.
3. The call should never work to the advantage of the server, therefore be more inclined to make the call if the resulting shot is likely to be a difficult return for the receiver.
4. Generally, the receiver is entitled to see the ball most of the way back after the ball strikes the front wall.

5. On drive serves hit down the wall, generally it is **NOT** a screen if the ball hits the side wall first, and may be a screen if the ball hits the floor first depending on how close the server was standing to the wall.
6. The call must be made quickly and should be made very loud so that both players hold up. **WHEN IN DOUBT, CALL THE SCREEN.** It is better to have a point unnecessarily replayed than to have a point unfairly awarded.
7. The players' ability must be considered. Pro, Open, and A players should be expected to make returns on much tougher serves than the C, D, and novice players.
8. **CAUTION: DON'T LET THE RECEIVER DECOY YOU INTO A SCREEN SERVE CALL.** Often perfect aces to the forehand side catch the receiver off guard because he anticipates a serve to his backhand and starts to move that way. He may honestly think he was screened, but he is not entitled to a clear view of the ball if he moves out of center court, particularly if he moves the wrong way.

Well, here it is and I hope it clears up any concerns that you may have on the screen serve. If you need copies of this or would like copies of the MRA Guidelines for Referees, write to me at PO Box 23035, Lansing, MI 48909 and we will answer all of your requests.

It blocks your peripheral vision. Sounds good, but what about your NECK!!! When the ball goes left or right, turn your neck and look at the ball and you won't have any trouble with peripheral vision.

I firmly believe that eyeguards should be mandatory at all tournaments. If a player doesn't like the ball, or the scoring format or the mandatory eyeguard rule, that player doesn't have to play in that tournament.

If you, the average racquetball player, feel the same way, please pass the word along to your club manager, and to your club pro or program director. Tell them that you would like to see the rule "eyeguards are mandatory" on the next entry form for a racquetball tournament at the club where you play.

The MRA is a believer in eyeguards. They have had eyeguards mandatory on all their entry forms for the past several years and as a result have had no serious eye injuries and few minor eye injuries. That track record speaks for itself.

If you think that I am hard nose on this rule, you're right I am. Why? Because I am tired of seeing and hearing about someone getting hit with a racquet or a ball and ending up with a very serious injury which could have been very easily prevented by wearing a pair of \$8-\$10 eyeguards. You spend \$20 or \$30 on shoes to protect your feet and ankles, why not \$8 to \$10 to protect your eyes?

So please pass the word along about eyeguards to all involved in racquetball. And please do yourself a favor--wear your eyeguards over your eyes, not over the top of your head while playing and practicing. The eyesight you save most probably will be your own.

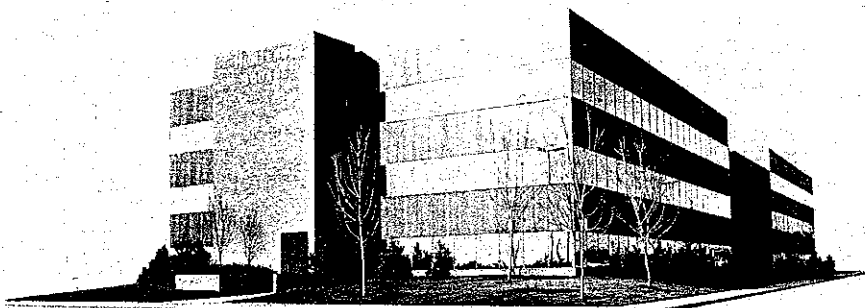


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
