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
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
Who's Who on the Illinois Board

Tom Utterback, Wilson-sponsored player, former ISRA Vice President and current ISRA board member, thought that he would take a year or two off from ISRA executive duties beginning in 1999. He thought that he would just kick back and show up for his first match like the rest of tournament draw. Little chance of that happening! Tom is as active today in the state racquetball scene as ever—ISRA Vice President title or no. Tom has been playing racquetball for 14 years and when you have that much racquetball in your blood, it is hard to stop doing what you do best. While many of you see Tom playing deep into the draw during local tournaments, tournament directors see him beginning the Tuesday before the tournament's start, a welcome sight as a helping hand in the hectic days leading up the first scheduled match. Tom has been tournament director or co-director for all of the state's leading tournaments: State Singles, State Doubles, Regionals, and the always demanding Revie Sorey tournament. He also runs a tournament or two at his home club, Palos Olympic Health & Fitness, where Tom has been the Racquetball Director since 1992. At Palos, Tom runs leagues, clinics, junior programs, challenge court nights and teaches racquetball to club members.

Beside all of his off-court racquetball activities, Tom actually finds some time to play racquetball. Currently, he is ranked as the State's top Men's 35+ player in the USRA ranking system and number #17 in the country for this very difficult age division. He won State Singles in Men's 35+ last year and lost in the finals at Regionals last year to Dave Eagle from Ohio in a very competitive match. He got to the quarters in the US Open last year in Memphis. He has been known to play mixed doubles with his wife, Barb, a very good women's A player, but, like most married couples, they find that they play better apart than together. Strange! Competitors note that Tom is known for his excellent on-court behavior and his quick drive service motion, which does a good job of hiding the ball as it comes across his body. Tom credits two players with his development into a top Illinois open player. The first was Tony Boschia the former #1 ranked open player from Colorado where Tom lived for several years. The second is a local player, Brian Castillo, who beat Tom frequently when Tom came back to Illinois. In the real world, Tom is a salesman for a wholesale lumber distributor in Chicago. The ISRA board would like to thank Tom for his continued support of Illinois racquetball and thanks for letting us continue to work him during his sabbatical from his ISRA vice-president duties. -Mike Davern

Gene Gene The Stringing Machine... Living out a Life's Dream

After 30 years as Chicago cop, life has become a dream for former Chicagoan Gene Bartkiewicz. Unfortunately for those of us having to deal with Chicago winters, we have to do it without the familiar face of Gene, Gene, The Stringing Machine, at local clubs and tournaments. As many of Gene's customers and friends are aware, Gene has moved to the sunny South Daytona Florida climate and opened his own "racquetball superstore" fulfilling a life's dream and completing a promise to "kick back and enjoy" that he made to himself while diffusing bombs as a key member for the Chicago bomb squad. Now, instead of hunting for the next "Big Bang" in Chicago (a former HEAD racquet) he is now looking for that proverbial "lost shaker of salt" as he walks out of his condo directly onto the beach in Florida. Not Margaritaville, but it comes close.

With his racquetball superstore, The Racquet Connection, only 10 minutes from home, Gene finds plenty of time for work, friends and the active racquetball scene in Florida. Surprisingly, racquetball is quite strong in a good year-round weather state like Florida. "We actually have more racquetball tournaments here in Florida than you have in Illinois," said Gene. "The biggest difference is that there is no racquetball season here, like you have up north. They play racquetball pretty much all throughout the year." The local racquetball community, plus his nationwide mail order activities, keep him busy and he has seen sales increase in his second year of business. Walkin business is increasing, with a number of steady customers coming from the active racquetball program at near-by Embry-Riddle University. He is even getting a number of visits from his Illinois connections where Gene is very willing to play host to all of the wonderful activities in South Daytona.

While he doesn't miss the Chicago winters, the East Coast of Florida has its share of bad weather. Although Hurricane Floyd got all of the national news in 1999, Hurricane Irene really hit the coast hard. "I was able to get out of town using back roads for Floyd, but for Irene I sat on my balcony and watched as the ocean came right up to my building. The beach was totally gone for awhile." So to get a feel for real winter weather, Gene stays in touch with the Illinois racquetball scene and comes back to town each year for the Revie Sorey tournament. Gausing String Gauses-Enough Knowledge To Make You Dangerous!

In last month's issue we discussed string tension, since that is the question I often get asked about first. However, in my opinion string gauge is just as important as the string's tension. For example, I know the racquet service business that strings Andre Agassi's tennis racquets. They put a micrometer on each set of strings for his racquets since Andre can tell the minutest difference in the string thickness. Now you probably aren't as particular as Agassi, but virtually everyone should be able to tell the difference between a 16 and a 17 gauge string.

String gauge is measured in millimeters. The Tennis Industry Association has established industry guidelines for gauges and all of the racquetball manufacturers follow those standards. Ask your racquet service technician if they know the actual size of the string that they use. Of course, all reputable string manufacturers put string gauge on the package. However, I know of at least one company who advertises "racquetball" string in a 17 gauge that actually measures as a middle of the road 16. You can't always trust the packaging.

Actually, there really is no such thing as "racquetball" string per se. Certain coatings and compounds lend themselves better to racquetball than tennis and that's the reason you see string advertised that way. Factory strings that come with new racquets are, in virtually every case, 16 gauge. Factory strings usually aren't the best quality. Any racquet, even a new one, can benefit from a restring. Do it

right away? That usually isn't necessary. For most players I would suggest using the factory string for awhile to get used to the racquet before restringing.

What is the difference in string gauges? Most players use 16 gauge since it provides a reasonable compromise between playability and durability. Thinner 17 gauge string provides greater playability at the expense of durability. This is the most popular gauge among the pros because of this reason. They're going to break strings regularly anyway so they figure they want the most playability. If it comes to a choice between durability and playability, they'll choose the latter every time. Another option to consider is 18 gauge string. This gives excellent control off of the string bed, but it would only be appropriate for those who rarely, if ever, break string. Some pros use a compromise-they string 16 gauge for durability on the mains and 17 gauge for playability on the crosses. Try it out. You might like it.

One of the most common questions I get is how often you should restring a racquet. The rule of thumb is that you restring a racquet as many times in a year as you play in a week. However, it depends on your playing style as well. Some people are just tough on strings, other's may never break them. All string is dead after about 40 hours of play, sometimes less. That means you should restring at least every six months if you play twice a week. Hope to see you at an upcoming tournament. I'll be glad to talk in depth. 15th Annual Midwest Seniors/Masters
Athletic Club at Bloomingdale

Tournament Director, Rich Clay and the staff of The Athletic Club of Bloomingdale kicked off the 1999 fall season in fine fashion. The Senior/Masters round robin format gets plenty of playing time for the participants, and is an excellent way to warm up for the coming season. This tournament is also a level 5 event, giving extra points for the participants under the USRA ranking system. While most of the tournament players came from Illinois, players also came from Indiana, Wisconsin, and in the case of Men's 40+ Advanced player James Jones, as far away as California. Jones, while taking 4th in the event, was the talk of the tournament as players from all levels were amazed at his rocket serves, which when on, would seem to speed up as it hit any surface, never rising more than an inch or two above the ground. Even when the serve came off the back wall, an opponent had to move very fast to put the ball into play. Don Ott, from Indiana, was to eventually win over the fourth place Jones, fellow Indianian, Jim Scheak in third and second place Steve Sulli of Illinois, who was the only player to take a game from Ott. In the other Men's Advanced divisions, seeds mostly held to form as Dave Negrete avenged his loss stemming from last year's Men's 35+ to this year's second place finisher, Tom Utterback. In the Men's Advanced 45+, Winston Cole held sway over second seed, T.J. Ferro. However, in the Men's 50+ Horace Miller came up from second seed to best Greg Hasty from Peoria and in the Men's 55+, third seed. Ron Yonkee took out Erhard Gruenwald.

On the Women's side, Brenda White held the top spot winning the 45+ Advanced while Ellen Somberg continued her winning ways as she took the tough Women's 35+ Advanced division. For all tournament places down to fourth place see the table below.







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What's My Ranking?

In Illinois, tournament players receive rankings points in two different systems when they play in a sanctioned tournament. We thought that we would explain how the different systems work and where you can find ranking information for tournament players. No system, especially one run by volunteers is infallible, so use this information to see where you rank and to make sure no information is being left off of your tournament records. In this issue, we'll discuss the USRA ranking system. Next month the ISRA system will be covered.

One of the benefits of competing in USRA/ISRA sanctioned events is the potential for earning state and national ranking points. While winning top tournaments in Illinois is always a goal, many players participate in tournaments not necessarily with a goal to win but to improve their ranking points in the USRA ranking system. The top ten nationally ranked players in each division are published in each issue of Racquetball Magazine and the top 25 are listed on the USRA website at http://www.usra.org. These lists always include a number of Illinois players. For those of us below the top 25, it was difficult to find current ranking information. Now, with access to the Illinois racquetball website at http://www.illinoisracquetball.com, USRA ranking information can be easily obtained by all Illinois players.

The USRA System

The USRA system is a quantity as well as a quality system. It rewards, both the quantity of play and how high a player finishes in a tournament. Reaching the quarterfinal round, or higher, in a sanctioned event earns ranking points toward a season record that is maintained over a trailing twelve month period. Points accumulated for one year are automatically deleted in the thirteenth month. For example, points earned at last year's Turkey Shoot would drop off the system in January 2000.

If you complete in sanctioned events regularly, you can quickly accumulate points that will steadily move you up in the USRA rankings. On the other hand, you can complete less often but still earn big points by finishing well in higher level regional and national events. Point levels for various tournament levels are shown in the table which follows:

^{*}A closed tournament is one open to Illinois players only. For example, in Ohio, Tournament Director Doug Ganum runs a series of tournaments for the different cities around the state as a city championship series. These tournaments would be for Ohio residents only. In Illinois, tournaments are level two and above.

It is the responsibility of the tournament director to ensure that tournament records are sent to the USRA national office after each sanctioned tournament. In Illinois, the board has a Sanctioning and Eligiblity Chairperson, a position currently held by Mike Davern, to follow up with tournament directors to make sure that all tournament records are correctly reported. If you notice that a misspelling has occurred in your name on a drawsheet or tournament card, please point this out to the tournament director so that the' national office does not create a record of those results under a separate spelling of your name. If you think your tournament record is short some points, contact Mike Davern through the Illinois website to discuss your situation.

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
