There were so many great matches at State, unfortunately, I didn't get to watch too many, but I did get to see some. After only two years playing in 'B' Division, it was a pleasure to watch Elliott Mistich win the championship, and then to go on and win his first 'A' tournament. It stinks that he beat me in the finals to win, but I was still happy for him. He works very hard at his game, and will definitely be a threat in 'A' during the 1999-2000 season. Speaking of 'A' players, well thank goodness he is not an 'A' player any more, but did you notice Barney Revuelta? Because if you blinked, you definitely missed him. He was like a hurricane blowing into Louisiana in June and moving on to Texas in April, but not before leaving a path of destruction through the 'A' Division. Not to worry, I'm sure he'll be back trying to rain on some of our Open players' parade.

One person I neglected to recognize at State was John Davis. John stepped into the history books when he became the only LRA member to capture five State Singles Championships in the Open Division. By beating David Rahn last year, John became one of only three people (David Rahn and Mike Almerico) to win four Championships. John can add this to his resume of accomplishments, along with State Doubles Championships, Sportsperson of the Year, and many Top Ten national rankings. John gets better every time he steps

on the court; you can bet his best years are still ahead of him. I am proud to have him as a representative for the LRA, he is a player to admire as well as fear if you have to play him.

State Singles may have ended the racquetball season in Louisiana, but thirty LRA members had some more business to take care of. Two states that hosted Regionals had to deal with the wrath of the LRA. Louisiana was well represented at the Texas Regionals and handled the tough competition like true sports, but it was Birmingham Regionals that showed the rest of the country that Louisiana was ready for Nationals. Thirty-nine LRA members descended on the Downtown YMCA to take nine divisions including the Men's Open as well as most of the junior divisions.

Silly me, I was worried about Regionals being so far away it would affect the amount of LRA members going to Nationals. What was I worried about? I am also proud to say that we were ranked fourth (behind Texas, California, and Florida, the three biggest states for racquetball) in the amount of players that attended the tournament. Can it get better? Sure. How about five finalists and one National Champion. I could write about Nationals forever, but read Anthony Zeringue's article on Nationals later in the newsletter.

The 1999-2000 season has begun, and as I said earlier, we are going to do it again. We are going to have a better year than last year; it has already started. We just had the Louisiana Games at Elmwood and with the help of the Greater New Orleans Sports Foundation, we are getting some great media exposure. Don't forget the pros are coming back in August, the juniors are coming back in September, and who knows who else is coming back whenever. Stay tuned.....

HOW DO YOU RATE?

Racquetball Skill Rating

D-PLAYERS:

Beginners. Can find the racquetball courts if there are proper signs. Sometimes wear swim fins on the court. Never brings a can of balls with them. Often leave blood on the court.

C-PLAYERS:

Intermediate. Own their own racquets. Never bring a new can of balls with them. Been using the same ball since 1995. A squash ball bounces higher than this ball does. Knows many of the rules. Follows some of them. Plays in running shoes. Still waiting to break a sweat.

B-PLAYERS:

Advanced Intermediate. Owns two racquets. One Oversized, and one Ektelon CBK last restrung in 1987. Brings both to the courts. Has a copy of the 1994 USRA rule book in the bag. Uses it. Think they're A-players. Always has a fresh ball.

A-PLAYERS:

Twenty-three gloves hanging from bag. Changes gloves between shots. "If I hit you it's an avoidable. If you hit me it's not. Simple. Read the rule book." Never brings new balls. Expects the B-players to provide them.

OPEN PLAYERS:

Screams at referee. Screams at opponent. Screams at linesman. Screams at self. Screams at tournament director. Screams at kids. Screams at spectators. Screams at Mother Theresa.

"THE FINALS" 32ND EKTELON U. S. NATIONAL SINGLES CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Louisiana Racquetball Association was well represented having thirty entries at "The Finals" National Singles Championships held at the Downtown Houston YMCA. Among them eight members took home nine medals.

Donnie Crowe from Fort Polk, LA was the lone member that took home the GOLD by defeating David Carter of Hurst, TX 15-12, 10-15, 11-1 in Men's 45+ C/D. Donnie gets the Sportsmanship Award for this tournament--while playing in his semi-final match his opponent constantly heckled and mocked not only Donnie but the "LRA Gang" that was cheering on Donnie. Donnie kept his cool and let his racquet do the talking by coming from behind in game one and when he was up 2-1 in the second game, his opponent faked an elbow injury and forfeited the match.

Beth Rist from Lake Charles, LA placed second in two divisions. Women's C and Women's 35+ C/D. This was Beth's first national tournament and not only did she play well, but she also showed great sportsmanship throughout her matches and never left the court without a smile. Beth not only gets the Rookie of the Year award, but also MVP overall for the tournament.

The Come Back Kid award goes to Wayne Skinner from Harvey, LA. Wayne placed second in Men's 35+ C/D. Wayne was actually defeated in the first round Thursday, but after Friday night he was reentered in the bracket because the opponent that defeated him in the first round was an illegal entry in the bracket (a Texas Sandbagger, imagine that!). Wayne was awarded the match and went on to win the next two matches to get to the finals.

Via Waco, TX/Lake Charles, LA, the Southpaw Cuban, Barney Revuelta, placed second in Men's A. Barney played hard and well throughout the racquetball year, never losing a single "A" match, until his final "A" match at Nationals. Barney was defeated in a tie breaker. Also from Lake Charles, Wes McDonald placed second in Men's 25+ C/D and John Davis took third place in Men's 30+. Jerry Buchanan from Fort Polk, LA won third place in Men's C and Captain Steve Conn from River Ridge, LA took third in Men's 45+ A/B.

On a special note, the Accommodation Award goes to Clarence "the machine" Simmons. Big "C" in his round of 16 and his quarterfinal match showed just how much he loves to play racquetball. In his round of 16 match and being one game up, he began cramping in the second game and lost that game. But after quick treatment and some gut sucking he went on to win in the tie breaker. If that wasn't enough, in his quarterfinal match while in front of the "LRA Cheering Squad" and his daughter, Clarence went for every ball even if it meant diving for it. With "ooh's" and "ah's" we all could not believe what was happening in front of us, but each and everyone of us who watched Clarence cheered him on and roared when he made those points. Unfortunately, Clarence fell short and lost his quarterfinals match.

Next year the LRA wants to bring even more members to "The Finals", so begin preparing TODAY!

TOURNAMENT SCHEDULE

As you can see the calendar of upcoming tournaments and events is quickly becoming crowded. We have a couple of new clubs in Louisiana that have expressed interest in hosting LRA/USRA sanctioned tournaments and have scheduled their tournaments.

If your club is interested in hosting a tournament in 2000, it is necessary that they contact us as soon as possible in order to secure the date preferred for their tournament.

Talk to your club pro/owner and urge them to plan out 2000 now, so your club can secure a date for your tournament next year.

RACQUETBALL TIPS

FOREHAND CEILING BALL

(Contact Points & Follow Through)

There are two different contact points that generate two different defensive shots. The way you change your contact point is by changing your wrist location at impact during a swing. The two different contact points are still based on you contacting the ball on the inside of your front foot. By changing only your wrist location at

impact, you are disguising your shots from your opponent and giving yourself a better chance in a rally.

For each shot listed below, think of the court as a pool table and you are trying to angle the ball off your racquet into a pocket on that pool table.

1. If you want to hit a down the line ceiling ball shot, then your racquet face should be parallel with the front wall at impact.
2. If you want to hit a cross court ceiling ball, your wrist position at contact is slightly turned towards the side wall (close your wrist enough so that you are able to contact the ball and angle it into front wall enough so that it goes to the opposite corner).

In order to follow through correctly, there are a few simple guidelines listed below that will be helpful for you to follow:

1. After making contact with the ball, follow the ball with your eyes to the ceiling. This helps get your momentum going towards the front wall for a more consistent shot, and helps you get moving again for the next shot.
2. After contact, your racquet face will start to angle downward toward your knees and your shoulders should be facing the front wall. This is accomplished by using shoulder and hip rotation throughout the stroke.
3. Your wrist will snap through at impact to generate extra power and control in your stroke.
