St. Louis High School League

When the Ladue High School boys' racquetball team won the 1986 St. Louis High School Racquetball League championship they were justly proud. After all, they had put together back-to-back championships, two undefeated seasons, and a 28-0 team record that carried the gigantic "St. Louis Cup" home to their school's display case for a year's glory.

While winners of the St. Louis League, which is sponsored by Head Racquet Sports, have made a tradition of laying claim to being the best high school team in the state, they probably didn't realize they had just as much right to claim a national championship as well. Unfortunately, that claim comes from the fact that there do not seem to be any other high school leagues in the nation — at least, none that compete interscholastically. Fortunately, that situation may change.

This year the St. Louis league has joined ranks with the AARA, a move that could prove super important in the history of racquetball as an established sport in the U.S. The concept of racquetball as a high school sport has been an ideal of racquetballers for many years.

Memphis State and others, most recently Cal State at Sacramento (See National Racquetball, March 1986) have brought team racquetball to the collegiate level, developing talent and providing the beginning of a feeder

system for professional racquetball. But junior programs (as successful as DP and Penn's Junior League, and some others have been), have never seemed to be able to get established in the high schools. This is not so in St. Louis, where high school racquetball has been reality since 1978.

The answer in St. Louis was the establishment of racquetball as a recognized extracurricular activity in the high schools. For

the past nine years, St. Louis high schools have been teaming up with local racquetball and fitness club owners to establish and coordinate play among as many as sixty teams (both girls' and boys') representing St. Louis area high schools. Public as well as private schools participate.



One of the keys to the success of the league is the cooperation between the club managers and the high school "coaches", or sponsors. Early on, the establishment of an executive committee made up of high school teachers and parents helped to shape the league. This committee directs the league activities, setting formats, making changes and rulings when necessary. Their contact with the clubs is Rick Lukasek, the manager of a local club who has served as the league director for the past two years, and the one who makes things happen. With the league's affiliating with the AARA this year, Lukasek has been named the AARA's "United States High School Commissioner".

Originally, the competition took the familiar form of corporate leagues in

which employees (students) formed teams of three to five players and competed within the corporation (school). It was basically an intramural sport.

Then the schools decided to "pool" their teams so that there was competition between the schools, though each school could enter as many three-man (or three-woman) teams as they wished. Some schools opted (and still do) to continue to limit their competition to within their own student body, as an intramural sport.

One of the earliest and most important changes made was to switch away from the "corporate" league to a format more in tune with high school sports. In 1979, the executive committee established a team format not too unlike team tennis.


Under the present arrangement, each school is allowed to enter one boys' and one girls' team at the varsity level, and any number of teams at the junior varsity level. Each team plays a ten game schedule, generally five at its

"home" club and five "away". At each meet, the best of seven sets (five in girls' & junior varsity play) determines which team can claim a victory.

The idea was to apply natural school rivalries to help promote interest. It worked.

Nancy English, a Parkway West High School teacher and her school's racquetball sponsor, finds the sport has continued to grow in popularity among the students. "It's certainly a team our high school has begun to recognize. There's lots more interest because of this league. When we have winter pep assemblies, racquetball is always recognized right along with basketball and wrestling." The Parkway West girls' team, according to English, received outstanding recognition for their championship season in 1986. "We really got some notice."

the team format is essential to success at the high school level. Ken Luecke, a member of the league's Executive Committee since its inception, likes the team format because, "It gives more kids the opportunity to represent their school, and that's really important." Luecke coordinates four teams representing DeSmet High School, a private Jesuit school in St. Louis County.

Chris Wright, a 1985 graduate of Lafayette High School, agrees. "I felt like I was doing something for the school."

The level of play is not too shabby, either. Wright, for example, is currently the No. 1 Men's Open Player in St. Louis. In December he placed fourth in the Junior World Tournament in Miami for the 18-andunder Open Class. His only loss in three years of play in the high school league was to Andy Gross, currently in the top 25 in the RMA Pro rankings, who dominated the high school league during his tenure there (see National Racquetball, June 1984).

Ken Marks, a Ladue High senior who anchors the current champions by playing their number one position, accompanied teammate Warren Bilchik and Wright to Miami for the Jr. World Tournament. Marks and his partner, Leigh Ann Coutu of Wilmington, DE won first in the 18-andunder Mixed Doubles.

"It's amazing how the caliber of play has gone up," notes Luecke, whose own teams consistently place in the "final four".

"An awful lot of folks have put an awful lot of time and effort into this league over these past years," adds Gary Hendren, Athletic Director at Parkway Central High School, and a coach whose varsity teams have won four championships. "There are plenty of individual tournaments the kids can enter. This gives them a chance to compete in a different kind of tournament.'

The league is not without its problems, of course, but even the best programs need debugging. Many disagreements have often brought about rulings on problems that have bugged racquetball in general, not just the high school league.

The league adopted a mandatory eyeguard rule early on, and makes players stick with it. The league also made its own ruling on what constituted "professional" status, setting a \$99.00 cash limit on lifetime winnings for students who wished to compete in the league.

Some schools have been slow to officially recognize their "teams" and offer much less support than do the more active schools. While some of the schools offer athletic letters for their racquetball athletes, for example, others strictly limit the

school's involvement. Some of the happiest headaches caused by the high school league are among fitness club managers trying to find court time for

their members in the early afternoon time slots. The 3:00-5:00 slots have become boomers in St. Louis.

The clubs offer reduced rates to students competing in the league. The situation has been profitable both for students searching for practice time and for the clubs wanting to put their courts to full use. Each school chooses a club to provide courts for its "home" matches and for practices. The club is paid from league entry fees for interschool meets, and on a pay-as-you-play basis for practice sessions.

The high school racquetball "coaches" in St. Louis are usually faculty or parent volunteers with varying levels of expertise. What all of the volunteers offer is enthusiasm for their students and for a sport that can provide a lifetime of enjoyment. Whatever some of them can't offer the players in terms of their own racquetball skills and experience, is available through the local clubs. Clinics and lessons are available through local pros and through Head, which is a new sponsor of the league this year.

The season ends with the top teams being invited to a playoff tournament weekend which draws hundreds of players, parents and friends. All-Star teams are selected by a vote of the coaches at the end of the season and recognized with certificates from the league. The league receives daily newspaper coverage in reporting "box scores" as well as weekly standings, and has in the past received some attention from local television sportscasters. Not bad in a sport where even the pros get very little major media recognition!

The implications of widespread high school programs for the sport are tremendous. Many believe that a good junior feeder program is the key to the future of the racquetball industry and to clubs that have to cut a profit to stay in business. With the league joining ranks with the AARA this year, racquetball has taken an important step (small as it may seem) forward. Similar programs established in other parts of the country would provide opportunities for interstate team competition, with the attendant publicity for the teams, the schools and the sport itself.

Marty Hogan graduated from Ladue High School before the St. Louis League was established (and was far beyond the level of play of that early league), but his alma mater is the current "national" champion. Perhaps ten or even six or five years from now, the high school team that wins the St. Louis High School League championship will have to go much farther than their hometown before they can claim a "national championship". Even they

Presidents Column by Van Dubolsky

One of the many services the AARA offers to its members is to act as a clearing house for all the sanctioned tournaments held across the United States. The results of these events (about 800 per year) are recorded by the tournament directors and sent to the national office where they are compiled and used to pro-

duce the national rankings.

Every tournament is pre-designated at a particular level ranging from closed state tournaments (Level 1) up to the National Championships (Level 6). Last May your board of directors voted to adopt a revised point value system for the rankings based upon reported tournament activity, and increased player demand for a National Invitational category (a new Level 5). The new system emphasizes the State Championships (Level 3), the Regionals (Level 4) and the National Events by awarding greater point values for these as compared to the usual Open Tournaments (Level 2). Please note the new point values for each level as they are listed at the end of this article.

As a reminder, here is a quick review of how the rankings are produced. Each tournament director is asked to fill out the appropriate forms after their event. These forms list the top eight finishers in each division. Each place, 1st - 8th, is awarded a designated point value and each player receives that number of points. The points are cumulative and are kept current by deleting any that are over one year old. For example, points earned in October of 1985 will

be deleted as of November 1, 1986. This allows us to maintain an active record of player performance.

Up until 1984 the national office attempted to handle the tournament load by itself. For the past two years the American Racquetball Handicapping System (ARHS) in Minnesota had been the official ranking organization for the AARA. ARHS served us well but very recently they closed their doors and once again the national office will be processing these results in house. By the time you read this, the transition of records (no small task) should be complete and the rankings should be up to date.

With regard to these rankings, there will always be arguments as to their validity. Some players accumulate lots of points as their states offer a greater number of sanctioned events over a year's time. This produces an obvious quantity vs. quality debate. But one thing is for certain; just about everyone checks the rankings published in Racquetball In Review and in the Tournament Programs searching for their own name.

We are always looking for a better, but still cost effective and prac-tical, way to rank our players nation-ally and we are open to your suggestions. In the meantime, if you feel your points are not correct there are probably reasonable answers as to why: misspelled names, misplaced results, unreported tournaments, etc., do produce inaccuracies. Give us a call at (303) 635-5396 and we will do the best we can to straighten it out so that your ranking is a correct one.



1987 New England Regionals

The New England Regional Championships have been scheduled for April 10-12, 1987 at the Cambridge Racquetball Club. This year sponsors are Penn Athletic Products and Michelob Light. Winners of championship divisions will receive free entry into the AARA National Championships held Memorial Day weekend in Houston, TX.

Last year's Regional Championships had over 500 entries and many players had to be turned away due to large entries. Players are strongly urged to mail their application prior to entry deadline. If the draw exceeds 400 players, play may begin as early as 2:00 pm on Friday.

We are pleased this year to have for the first time, Michelob Light as co-sponsor. Unfortunately, because of Massachusett's laws regulating the sale of alcohol, we cannot give away free beer as we had in past years.

The Cambridge Racquetball Club, host of this year's event, is an established tournament facility having hosted both state and regional tournaments in the past.

Florida Intercollegiates by Lori Basch

Gators! Noles! Knights! Hurricanes! It's time once again for the Florida State Intercollegiate Racquetball Championships. The event will be held at the Orlando Tennis & Racquet Club on March

While this tournament thus far has been a small one, it has always been exciting for all the players. Why? First of all, it seems to regularly draw a lot of excellent college-aged players who are both state and nationally ranked. Secondly (and most importantly), this event involves the only team format for intercollegiate competition in racquetball on both the state and national levels! The excitement and school spirit always run high!

What is the format of intercollegiate team racquetball? A team is comprised of numbered 1-4 men's and women's singles players, and number 1-2 men's and women's doubles teams. A team can have more than four singles players or two doubles teams, but the additional players must be spread across the divisions begin-

ning with number 1.

Team points are accumulated by the players as follows: the winner of a division receives 10 points; runner-up, 7 points; third place, 4 points, and fourth place, 2 points. In addition, a player receives two points per match won except for the finals and third place matches. There is team competition within each men's and women's team, then each school's total combined score (men and women) is tallied for an overall win.

Last year Florida State University won the tournament by eight points over the University of Florida, with St. Leo College near Tampa placing third. Your Overall Goal: Power With Control

by Steve Strandemo

Your ability to hit with power is crucial in today's game — and can help move you many pegs up the ladder — but aimless, uncontrolled power will get you in as much trouble as the good that it brings and will sabotage your efforts to develop a sound game. Conversely, you can't expect to win big matches with a totally defensive game, where you simply keep the ball in play by hitting ceiling balls, passing shots, and tob serves while waiting for your opponent to make all the errors.

Ideally, the goal to strive for is what we might call "controlled maximum velocity", where you blend power and control in your strokes, your shot selection, and your overall approach to the game. The realists in good racquetball are learning that to become complete players who can adjust to every type of opponent, they must develop confidence in their ability to play with both power and control.

The great virtue of controllable power is that it enables you to play tough against any type of player. When you can pound the ball accurately, low enough to keep it from coming off the back wall as a setup, you generate more mistakes by your opponent (such as left-up shots and balls that carom unintended off a side wall) because you cut down on his reaction time and put him on the defensive - either jamming him or forcing him to move quickly and to hit while on the move or stretched out. This lowers his scoring efficiency while increasing your offensive opportunities.


For example, power with control will nearly always beat the adept control player because you can hit at a speed that minimizes his chances to set up comfortably and hit accurately and thus keep the game controlled to his liking. This same power in your game will help keep the blaster at bay by keeping him under constant pres-



sure. As one of the original control-era pros, I've had to change my swings on the forehand and backhand to gain more power. Now I can hit the ball hard enough to stay in the rally against the "shooters" and create my own offensive opportunities. Power itself is not the crucial factor when killing the ball straight-in or as a pinch—accuracy is what counts—but it does help give you more chances for the knockout punch by putting your opponent on the defensive and forcing weak returns.

Therefore, have an appreciation for power, but remember that your ability to sting the ball unbelievably hard is not enough to keep you advancing if you can't keep the ball low with a minimum of skips. If you are a dedicated shooter and you're on your game and getting setups from your opponent, you'll bury him. But when you're out of the groove and wild, your opponent doesn't have to be awed or intimidated by your power - he must simply hang in there until you skip the ball or wait for his chance to rekill your shots in center-court, off a side wall, or off the back wall.
