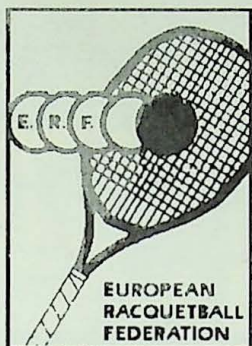

# FLORIADE

Zoetermeer, Holland  
— June 1992

THE Netherlands Racquetball Association made European history by organising the most expensive and prestigious one-time racquetball tournament ever held outside the USA.

From 10 to 14 June, 1992, 32 men and 16 women competed in the Zoetermeer Invitational Racquetball Tournament. The participants came from Belgium, Canada, France, Germany, Great Britain, Ireland, Japan, the Netherlands, the United States and Venezuela.

Three world champions, four European champions and ten national champions were among the players.

On Wednesday, June 10, 1992, the Mayor of Zoetermeer, Mr. Luigi van Leeuwen officially opened the tournament.

It took the first three days for preliminary matches, singles and doubles from 1 pm to 10.30 pm. On Saturday, the quarter and semi finals were held. With one exception, all seeded players in the mens and womens managed to reach the quarter final stage.

In the womens event, the greatest upset was achieved by Bobbie Brennan from Ireland, the reigning European champion. She surprised the number one seed from Canada, Vicki Brown.

In the semi-final, Bobbie Brennan then was confronted with Yuka Tan-no from Japan. A very talented young lady. This time the consistent play by Yuka Tan-no was too much for Bobbie Brennan and the Japanese player advanced to the final.

In the other semi final, Elkova Icenogle and Heather Dunne, both from the USA, fought a close match. Elkova won by two sets to one.

The Womens final was a one way match. Elkova Icenogle overran Yuka Tan-no in the first game 15-3. In the second game she could put up some fight, but was only able to score 10 points.

For third place, Heather Dunn needed a tiebreak against Bobbie Brennan. Bobbie won the first 15-6 but Heather fought back to take the second 15-11 and won the tiebreak 15-6.

The first four seeded players in the mens all reached the semi finals. Sudsy Monchik (USA), the number one seed met with the number four seed Fabian Balmori from Venezuela. Fabian could only stay close in the first game, 15-13. In the second game Sudsy was in command, he comfortably took the second 15-5. The second semi final match between Americans Allan Engel and team-mate James Mulcock was led by the first from the beginning to the end. James Mulcock was trailing all the time. In straight games Allan Engel won 15-9, 15-7.

For third place Fabian Balmori showed that two years of going to Memphis State University in the USA and playing racquetball is paying off. He has improved tremendously. He was at no stage of the match in any danger and he sut out James Mulcock to win 15-9, 15-10.

The mens final was between Americans Allan Engel and Sudsy Monchik. Engel played some marvellous racquetball to take the first game 15-11. In the second game Sudsy took command in the first half, but when Allan came back from behind, he became uneasy. In a very exciting second part of the game, Allan was back in the game at 10-10. The World Junior champion Sudsy was once more struggling at this stage as Allan dominated the remainder of the game to take the match 15-13.

The mens doubles was won by Johnson/Monchik (USA), in the final they beat Klinke/Balmori (GER/VEN). In the womens doubles, Dunn/Icenogle (USA) were too strong for Brown/R. Icenogle (CAN/USA).

As tournament director, I like to extend my warmest gratitude to Wim Vink, Karel Matla, Tim Radder, Jeroen Vink, Arjen Wildemans, Pascal Matla for helping me organise this memorable event.

And of course, all the sponsors and especially to the city of Zoetermeer, who made it all possible and very successful.



# EUROPEAN CONGRESS REPORT

A WELL-ATTENDED European Congress was held in Montreal. Representatives from all European Federations participating in Montreal attended. Along with Executive Director of the IRF, Luke St. Onge; IRF Secretary/Treasurer Keith Calkins and President of the IRF, Mr. Han van der Heijden.

The meeting adopted the 1991 Congress and Special Meeting Reports from Antwerp. It was agreed that Federation affiliation fees to the ERF be increased to US\$100 per year. This change comes into effect from January 1, 1993.

The European Masters event was discussed and it was agreed that a minimum of three countries must participate before a team event can be held. The deadline for entries was agreed at September 1, 1992.

It was also decided to locate the 1993 European Championships in either Milan or Hamburg. The final decision to be made at the Masters in Strasbourg on November 4.

A motion to raise the age limit to 35 for Master events from 1994 was defeated.

European representation at the World Games (1993) in the Hague was discussed. Europe will have 6 men and 6 women representatives. The best method of selection was considered and it was agreed that the final selection and country breakdown would be agreed in Strasbourg.

David Hinton (Wheelchair Racquetball) advised the Congress that a European tour would be undertaken by a number of the world's leading players during February and March of 1993. They intended visiting the European Open in Hamburg, Zoetermeer in Holland, Paris and the Tralee International in Ireland.

Luke St. Onge spoke to the meeting about European development and progress. He emphasised the importance of European Racquetball and its development to the IRF EXCO and IRF long-term objectives. He guaranteed that the IRF would assist in any way possible with European development and support the ERF fully in its attempts to expand, develop, promote and market racquetball in Europe.

After discussion it was agreed that the ERF through its General Secretary and the Racquetball Europe newsletter would ask its membership and affiliated countries to submit their views and opinions on what they — as members expect of the European Federation and what the European Federation can do to assist them in developing racquetball in their regions.

It was also hoped that European racquetballers would contribute ideas and suggestions in a free and uninhibited manner.

Congress agreed to the separation of the Secretary/Treasurer position on the EXCO to permit the EXCO to expand as agreed at the 1991 Congress in Antwerp.

# European News

## BELGIUM

MARYKE HILLEN became only the second Belgian to hold an ERF EXCO position when elected treasurer of the ERF in Montreal. Maryke has been a significant figure in both the playing and administrative side of Belgian racquetball. A member of a number of World Championship teams, she is also the first woman to hold executive position. We wish her well.

## GREAT BRITAIN

AT London's only racquetball court at Queens Park, coach and development officer Milo Hackett has been very busy during the summer, putting on programmes to attract the whole community. Working with Local Government he has put on tastier sessions for people with minor learning difficulties, physical disabilities (wheelchair users), 50+ age groups and also junior programmes. They have proved successful enough to start up clubs at Queens Park.

In 1991, racquetball received Associate Membership of the Sports Council, this year the Sports Council have fully recognised racquetball as a sport in Great Britain though the Great Britain Racquetball Federation will not get the same recognition until there are more courts in the country.

Mark Jenkinson represented Great Britain in the 1992 Paralympics as wheelchair racquetball had been given the opportunity to present itself as a demonstration sport.

## HOLLAND

AFTER eight years including five World Championships and a number of European team championship successes, Rene Hehemann has announced his resignation as national team coach. Rene's retirement will allow him spend more time with his family and focus his racquetball work on his administrative tasks as Dutch National Secretary and General Secretary of the ERF.

Holland travelled to Belgium in a pre World Championship challenge. The Dutch team won seven games and lost one.

The 1993 World Games will be held in The Hague. Having been dropped in 1989, racquetball will again be a participating sport. The centres at Zwywdrecht and De Leyens will be used. Racquetball will be participating from July 24 to 28.

## **IRELAND**

THE annual general meeting of the RAI saw a number of Council changes. Michael Murphy was elected president to replace Liam McCarney who retired from the position after five years. Liam was a major influence in Irish racquetball during his presidency and will continue to work as a member of the EXCO in his position as Ulster representative.

The rest of the officers appointed were: vice president Marie Duignan; treasurer, Maura Tormey; public relations Anthony Butler; general secretary Philip Duignan; assistant secretary Gillian Hipwell; development officer Martin McCone.

The positions of youth development officer and tournament secretary are yet to be filled. Michael Murphy will temporarily take over the position of tournament secretary until a successor is appointed.

The other three provincial representatives to the Council have yet to be announced. Nine motions out of the 17 submitted were approved by the delegates. The two most significant being the creation of a novice singles division which will also be included as a national championship event and a new promotion structure which

permits a player to win the same division three times.

Liam McCarney and Marie Duignan represented racquetball at the First National Coaching forum officially opened by the Minister for Sport at Limerick Universities National Coaching and Training Centre in September.

The event provided all sports and those involved at coaching and administrative levels the opportunity to discuss the future of coaching in Ireland and particularly the Coach Education System presently being developed by Dr. John Kirwan, director and Mr. Pat Duffy, head of coaching at the National Coaching and Training Centre.

The five aspects of the National Coaching and Training Centre are coach education, sports science, research, training environment and talent development.

# European Masters

Strasbourg, France — Nov. 3-8

ENTRIES for the forthcoming European Masters in Strasbourg, France have been received for the womens event from Ireland, Germany, Belgium with the possibility of a team from France. Individual entries will include Great Britain.

For the mens event, teams include Holland, Belgium, France, Germany, Switzerland and holders Ireland.

Hotel reservations should be made direct with Pascal Muller at Hotel Le.

Entry fee is 25 dollars per palyer to European Federation members. This covers entry and tournament T shirt only. Costs are single room 210 francs, double 130 per person. The tournament will be held from November 3 to 8. The hotel will provide lunch for 60 francs and the tournament dinner/banquet on November 7 will cost 100 francs.

NOTE: Entry fees must be paid either direct to Maryke Hillen, European treasurer or at the start of the championships.

# WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS IN MONTREAL

THE World Championships again arrived in North America, this time the venue was the Nautilus Plus Club in Ville d'Anjou, Montreal.

"The event was dominated by the USA, who brushed aside the challenge of Canada and Mexico when capturing the team events and completing a clean sweep of the singles and doubles. Canada, our hosts, took second place in team and individual events.

The facility had 20 courts including an exhibition court which was used extensively during the tournament by the TV networks who provided coverage of the feature games at the championships. Europe was represented by France, Holland, Italy, Belgium, newcomers Australia, Great Britain, Ireland and Germany.

In the Mens team event, Germany again placed No. 1 European team with a brilliant display to finish 6th and indeed with a little more luck could have been serious medal contenders. Holland improved on their previous World Championship results to move into 8th place. While Ireland, France and Great Britain all improved on their world rankings.

The Womens event ended with Ireland placing again 5th, while the teams from Great Britain, Holland, Germany and Belgium all reached top 12 placings.

In the combined event, Ireland improved to 7th place overall with Germany and Holland placing 9th and 10th respectively.

A feature of the European teams achieving such high standards and excellent results was the fact that our teams are

becoming more confident and starting to believe in themselves. They are more skilled, a lot fitter and more determined to succeed. I have little doubt that the good results will eventually turn into medal winning performances.

The introduction for the first time of the Olympic format for the singles and doubles events was an instant success. It guaranteed a minimum of three games to each player and as you can see from the results many European countries proved to be medal winners in the red, blue and white divisions. These divisions were as hotly contested as the main events and the gold silver and bronze medals equally appreciated.

In the Mens singles, won by Chris Cole of the US. Robert Pratt GB, Trevor Hayter GER and Achim Loof GER all reached the last 16.

Michelle Gould, USA, captured her first World Championship beating title holder Heather Stubb, Canada. Nadia Verilli, Italy and Marie Duignan, Ireland reached the last 16.

Germany reached the quarter final of the mens doubles before losing 2-1 to Japan, while Ireland and Great Britain reached the womens doubles quarter finals losing to Japan and USA.

The tournament was exciting and enjoyable and we would like to express our appreciation to Racquetball Canada, Luc Chauvin manager of Nautilus Plus and his staff. In particular our thanks to all the volunteers who worked at the club and those who drove the courtesy coaches. They all made our visit to Canada a most memorable one; their friendship and hospitality will always be remembered.

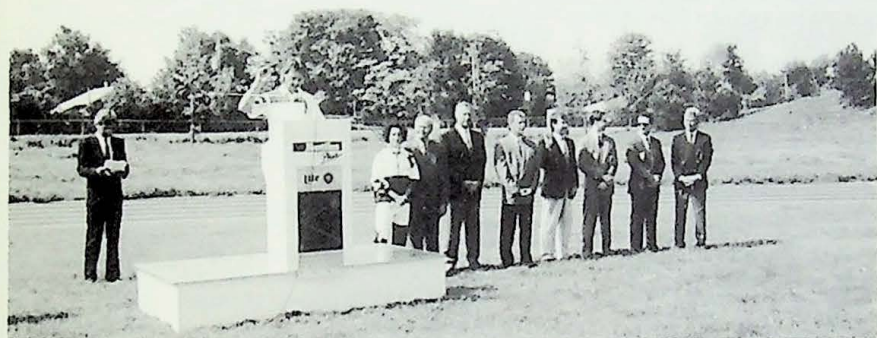


**USA — 1992 world champions.**

## WHEELCHAIR RACQUETBALL

HAVING successfully participated in Montreal, six players (2 US, 2 Canadians and 2 British) competitors moved on to the Paralympics in Barcelona where racquetball has been slotted in as a demonstration sport.

Countries selected for the upcoming European tour (February 1993) are Holland, Germany (European Open), Ireland (Tralee International) and England.

Six thousand Canadian dollars were raised towards the tour with a very successful auction in Montreal at the World Championships.

Auctioneer Tom MacWilliams of Racquetball Canada was most entertaining and extracted maximum funds from a very happy attendance.

### NEW CANADIAN WHEELCHAIR RACQUETBALL CHAMPION ENDS SEVEN YEAR JINX

JAKE SMELLIE of Winnipeg, Manitoba who, not once, not twice, but seven times finished in second place at the Canadian National Racquetball Championships has finally ascended to the winner's spot on the podium. This 30 year old Manitoba telephone dispatcher took the title with a convincing gold medal game victory in the Wheelchair "A" division over Stan Neufeld also of Winnipeg by scores of 11-4, 11-8 and 11-8.

Five time National Champion Mark Cormack of New Westminster, B.C., was satisfied with his third place finish having recently returned to competitive play after an eighteen month absence from the game for medical reasons.

# WORLD CONGRESS REPORT

THE 6th IRF World Congress was held in Montreal at the World Championships. Over 60 delegates attended along with senior executives from Leader Eyeguards and Ektelon Industries.

In his opening remarks, IRF President Han van der Heijden (Holland) outlined world progress to date, highlighted the importance of continuing to work towards Olympic recognition and emphasised the significant steps taken with regard to the expansion of racquetballs media profile.

He welcomed in particular those countries and federations such as Australia, Belize and Austria to their first world event.

The Congress then heard regional reports from Europe (Jurgen Denk), Central America and Caribbean (Enrique Villagran), South America (Jose Virreira), Asia (Japan Federation) and North America (Benoit Turcotte).

Congress at this stage considered the position of racquetball in Columbia and ratified the Racquetball Federation of Columbia (FEDE) as the governing body to replace FECOR.

Next item considered were a number of rule changes (see separate report in this issue). The sponsorship opportunities available to the IRF and its member countries were outlined by Leo Reilly, Vice-President Sales from Ektelon and Craig Schmitt, Director of Sales, Leader Sports products.

These were in turn followed by a presentation from the Mexican Federation and the City of San Luis Potosi who will be hosts to the 1994 World Championships.

Atlanta hosts for the 1996 World Championships, which will be held alongside the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta, gave an overview of their progress to date and proposals for the World Championships of 1996.

Dave Hinton, chairperson of the Committee for athletes with disabilities covered the progress of Wheelchair Racquetball and advised the Congress that Wheelchair Racquetball had been accepted as an "unofficial" demonstration event at the 1992 Paralympics in Barcelona from September 2 to 9.

In conclusion the following were re-elected to the executive of the IRF:

- President: Han van der Heijden (Holland).
- Executive Vice-President: Rudolfo Echeverria (Costa Rica).
- General Secretary/Treasurer: Keith Calkins (USA).
- Commissioner Asia: Michikane Ishiguro (Japan).
- Commissioner Europe: Jurgen Denk (Germany).
- Commissioner North America: Benoit Turcotte (Canada).
- Commissioner Central & Caribbean: Enrique Villagran (Mexico).
- Commissioner South America: Jose Virreira (Bolivia).

# New Rules agreed at World Congress

AS previously mentioned in our Congress report a number of new rules were presented to the Congress for consideration and approval.

Jim Hiser, chairperson of the IRF Rules Committee gave early warning of the changes and copied all Federations well in advance of the Congress.

A total of 10 rule changes were presented to the delegates along with explanatory notes giving the various reasons behind the changes.

In addition a number of points clarifying existing rules were highlighted. Seven of the 10 rule changes were passed and the clarification points were accepted also.

We have listed these below and it is important to note that these became effective from September 1, 1992:

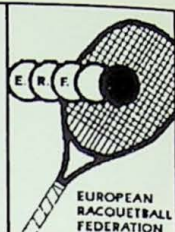
## 1992 IRF RULE CHANGES

1. Tie break games are reduced to 11 points.
2. In Doubles, if the serve strikes the servers partner, it is considered a fault, ie 2nd serve or side out.
3. A referee or lines judge may only be removed at the discretion of the referee in chief or his delegate. The referee in chief or his delegate may observe a match in progress to determine what, if any, action is to be taken.
4. Out of Court line: The upper edge of the out of court line is on the back wall parallel with and located 12 ft above the floor.  
After return: Any ball returned to the front wall while on the rebound or on the first bounce goes above the 12 ft line through any opening in a side wall, shall be declared dead and the rally replayed.
5. In any match using linespeople, all calls are now appealable except technicals.  
This includes avoidables NOTE limit of 5 appeals per game still apply.
6. In Open divisions, players will be permitted only ONE serve. Screen serves are faults, NOTE this does not apply to Underage, Overage, B, C, D and Novice events.
7. TEAM COMPETITION
  - (a) Where team competition is involved, coaches or representatives of such teams are bound by the same rules as players as far as technicals are concerned and the infractions are charged against the player.
  - (b) No Coaches or representatives are allowed in the courts at any time during a match. Failure to observe this is a technical foul and shall be charged against their player.

### CLARIFICATION OF RULES

- A. APPEALS: An appeal by a player must be made directly to the referee immediately after the rally had ended and before the player leaves the court. Any appeal directed to any other person will not be recognised and the appeal forfeited.
- B. INJURY TIME OUTS: No time out shall be charged to a player who is injured during play. Injury must be as a result of contact, such as with the ball, racquet, wall or floor. Muscle cramps and pulls, fatigue and other ailments that are not caused by direct contact will not be considered an injury.
- C. EYEWEAR: Failure to wear eyewear protection designed for racquet sport is an automatic technical.
- D. The match officially begins when the referee calls the score for the first rally.
- E. Wet gloves are NOT considered equipment for timeouts, ie on a request to change glove, a player must take a time out.
- F. Three technicals against a player means that he/she forfeits the match.

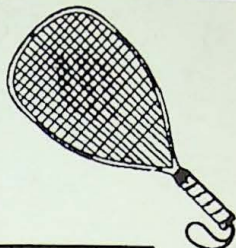
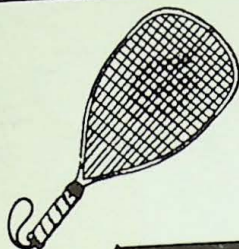
