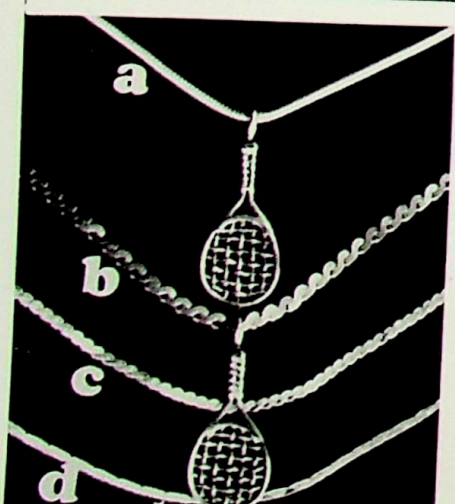

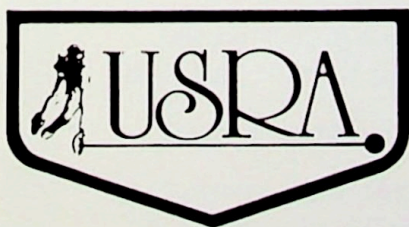

# State Tournament

Keith Dunlap topped Mike Fatolitis 13-21, 21-12, 11-7 to take first place in the men's open racquetball championship for Florida, at Jacksonville's Racquetball Club.

Dunlap, the pro at JRC but since moved on to Memphis State University, stopped Rick Stevens 21-6, 14-21, 11-8 in the semifinals. Fatolitis meanwhile was defeating Matt Mathews, 14-21, 21-18, 11-9.

Mathews took third with a 21-15, 21-13 decision over Stevens.

Mathews and Fatolitis teamed for the open doubles title. But runners-up Gary Zetrouer and Jim Adkins were forced to forfeit the championship match because of a broken foot to Zetrouer.

Zetrouer's injury occurred during a victory in the semis over Stevens and Van Dubolsky, 21-6, 21-16.

Mathews - Fatolitis advanced to the finals by trimming Kenny Hendricks - Frank Johnson 21-17, 21-5, in the other semi.

Barbara Faulkenberry took the women's open singles title, 4-21, 21-10, 11-4 over Cile Adkins. Faulkenberry beat Nancy Hornack 21-12, 21-19 and Adkins knocked off Audrey Simpton 19-21, 21-16, 11-3 in the semis.

Simpton took third, 21-6, 16-21, 11-6.

Fred Blaess took the senior singles title, 21-14, 21-5, over Bill Koenig. Larry Bauer was third and Mike Mojer fourth.

Mojer came back to capture the masters singles crown, 21-8, 21-14 over Fred Koran, Gordon Ira finished third and fourth went to John Hinkamp.

The women's B singles division was won by Virginia Morales, with Connie Prescott second.

Men's B singles went to David Mathews. Randy Watkins was second, Paul Fritsch third and Scott Nelson fourth.

Faulkenberry and Adkins teamed for the women's open doubles championship. They defeated Hornack-Nelson, 16 and 14, in the final.

Junior champ was George Deeb, 21-11, 21-6 over Sergis Gonzales. Malon Brown finished third with Rick Taylor fourth.

Deeb-Grass took the junior doubles title over Gonzales-Brovich.

Senior doubles champs were Areit-Swanson, with Koenig-Lane second. Carlton-Duda took third and Winter-Kantor took fourth.

# Florida State Racquetball League

---

1. The league's teams will be divided into 2 divisions, being North and South. At the end of the regular season, the top two teams will enter the playoffs to determine the overall league champion.
2. A league match will consist of six singles and three doubles matches (2 out of 3 games). One league point will be awarded for each team victory in singles and doubles. Ties in the standings will be broken by (1) comparing league points and, if there is still a tie, (2) the winner of head-to-head matches.
3. All teams paying the league franchise fee will be included in the league's schedule. Before the first match, each team captain will furnish the league commissioner with a roster.
4. Once a person plays in a league match for a particular team, he must remain with that team. Players cannot switch from team to team during the season unless he has relocated and established a new divisional residence. However, they are not obligated to play for the same team when the next season starts.
5. The captain of the home team is responsible for calling his opponent two weeks in advance of the match to confirm it. The captain of the winning team must send the results on the official form to the league commissioner within one week after the match.
6. Team captains are expected to manage a ladder so that their players have a ranking. Before each match, captains rank their singles players and doubles teams on the basis of their ladder because matches are organized so that the #1 player (or doubles team) plays the #1 player, the #2 player plays the #2 player, and so on. A player can play both singles and doubles. Thus, each team will field 6 players per match.
7. USRA rules apply to all league matches. Unless the captains vote otherwise, the Seamco 558 will be the official ball. Except when the racquetball court is completely enclosed, all matches will be refereed.
8. This year one player from each team will participate in the All-Star Match. Suggestions are welcome regarding the format of

the match and the selection process. Whatever system is employed will be simple and will guarantee every team at least one representative.

9. Individual plaques will be given to the players in the league championships. Special shirts will be given away at the All-Star Match. We hope to give out awards for players on the third and fourth place teams. The franchise fees, and the financial assistance provided by manufacturers will determine how much money can be spent on awards.
10. The commissioner must be notified immediately when two teams fail to play their match as scheduled.
11. Until additional league officials have been named, questions or problems concerning the league should be directed to:

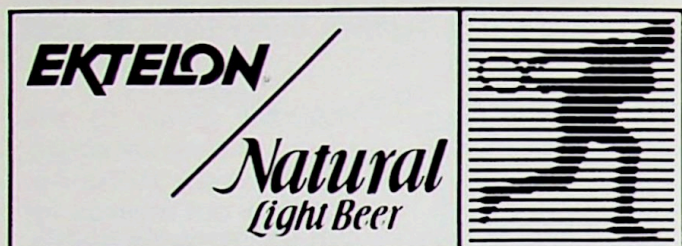

# Orlando Championships



## RACQUETBALL CHAMPIONSHIPS

In a match which previewed the Florida USRA Championship. Mike Fatolitis and Keith Dunlap squared off in the final of the Ektelon/Natural Light Beer Championship at the Racquet Ball in Orlando.

But unlike the result a week later, Fatolitis was the winner, recording a 21-15, 21-18 decision.

"Fats" had beaten Percy Philman in the quarter-finals and Bob Phillippy 21-13, 21-8 in the semis. Dunlap topped Rick Stevens in the quarters and host pro Jim Adkins 21-15, 21-8 in the semis.

Adkins rebounded to trim Phillippy 16-21, 21-14, 11-4 for third in the 42-man field,

which included the top 10 players in Florida. (193 Players comprising 282 entries competed in the Tournament.)

Phillippy upset top-seeded Kenny Hendricks in the quarters, the same point Adkins knocked No. 2 seeded Matt Mathews.

In the Women's Open, Cile Adkins did husband Jim one better by taking the title, 21-13, 21-15 over Debby Drury. Doniza Zetrouer finished third as Julie Knight forfeited due to injury.

John Stanford emerged from a crowded field of 84 to claim the Men's B title. Stanford trimmed Scott Nelson in the semis and then turned back Randy Watkins in the final.

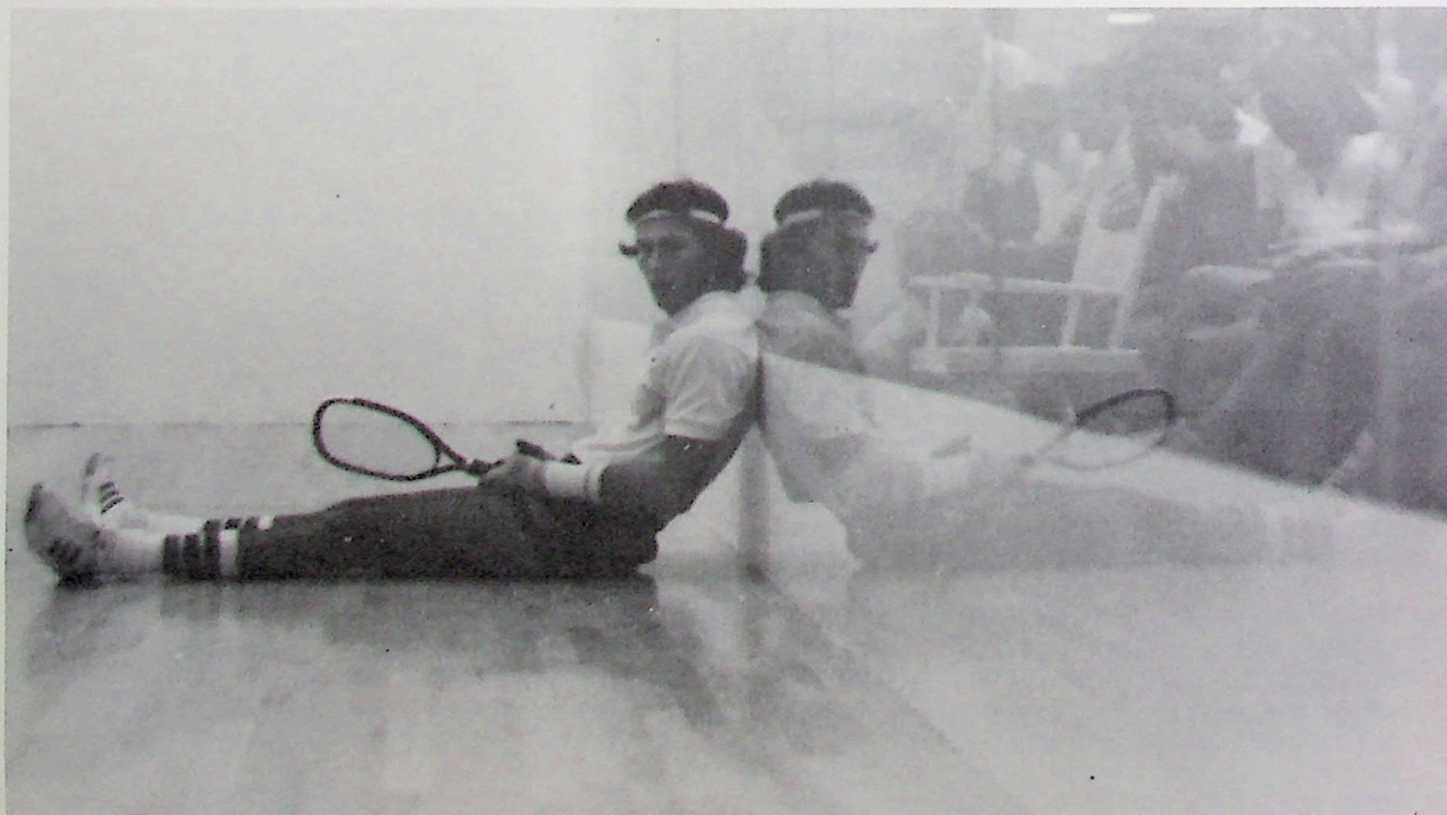
Dave Reep defeated Nelson for third.

Mike Mojer was the Seniors champ. The recently retired Air Force officer beat Larry Bauer in the final. Collie Carlton was third and Tom Krause fourth.

Masters titlist was Tom Zetrouer with John Hinkamp runner-up, Eugene Glenn third and Mike Wohl fourth.

In the Women's B final, Knight stopped Rene Fish, but hurt her arm and had to forfeit her match for third in the Women's Open. Mary Andrews was third and Barbara Lazar fourth.

Andy Warden took the Men's Novice while Jane Meilleur won the Women's Novice.

# NATIONALS

Marty Hogan was probably thinking, "Thanks, I needed that."

Hogan, the dominant force in racquetball for the last few years, had just ended the only frustration of his young career by taking his first USRA Men's National title, 21-12, 21-20 over Charlie Brumfield.

Hogan was unbeatable a year ago — until the final of the national championship. That's when Davey Bledsoe scored a stunning upset.

This year, Hogan suffered his only lapse during the Gresham stop of the Colgate Men and Women's Pro/Am Racquetball Tour when he lost in the final to Brumfield.

But this time around, Hogan stayed in command. He gained the championship without losing a game.

Hogan stopped last year's national amateur champ Jerry Zuckerman in the round of 16, 21-10, 21-15. He then disposed of Rich Wagner 21-18, 21-13 in the quarterfinals, Ben Koltun 21-19, 21-6 in the semis and then Brumfield, five times the national champ.

Brumfield, seeded second behind Hogan, had to struggle to get past Mike Yellen in the semis. The Brum won the first game 21-16, but dropped the second 21-17. In the tiebreaker, Brumfield eluded the upset 11-10.

Brumfield also was pressed hard in the 16s, as Don Thomas took him to three games, before losing in an 11-10 tiebreaker.

The two biggest upsets came in the first round. Larry Meyers shocked Bledsoe 3-21, 21-19, 11-0 and Thomas trimmed Steve Strandemo with an 11-10 tiebreaker.

Meyers was ousted in the 16s by Jay Jones, 4 and 19. Thomas also fell in the 16s after battling Brumfield for three games.

## Women's National Championships

Shannon Wright could do no wrong.

In fact, the manner in which she swept to her second straight USRA Women's National Racquetball Championship out did Marty Hogan's trek to his first title.

Wright was a whirlwind, allowing only as many as 11 points once in eight games. She limited opponents to an average of just under 7.5 points per game.

The final tally showed: Susie Dugan stopped 7 and 10 in the round of 16, followed by Rita Hoff 4 and 7, Jannell Marriott 18 and 2, and Jennifer Harding 3 and 8 in the final.

Wright was quick to establish herself in the final, helped along by Harding's weak backhand returns of service.

The top upset came when Karen Walton tripped up Peggy Steding 21-8, 17-21, 11-4 in the quarterfinals. Steding was seeded second behind Wright.

Walton's championship hopes soon wilted as Harding, third-seeded, scored a 21-18, 21-18 victory in the semis.

Marriott, seeded No. 4, knocked off Laura Martino and Gainesville's Martha McDonald before being eliminated by Wright in the semis.

## National Amateur Championships

Californians Jeff Bowman and Alicia Moore captured the top prizes in the amateur half of the USRA National Racquetball Championships, but Floridians as a group left a marked impression on the tournament field.

Advancing the furthest were Cile Adkins of Orlando and Barbara Faulkenberry of Clearwater, who lost in the final of the women's open; doubles 21-10, 21-11 to Barb Tenneson and Ev Dillan, both of Minneapolis.

Faulkenberry, who has since moved to Colorado Springs, Colo., to attend the Air Force Academy, reached the women's open quarterfinals before bowing to eventual champion Moore.

In the men's open doubles, brothers Keith and John Dunlap, both now of Memphis, were stopped in the semis by Stan Wright and Steve Trent.

Competing in the men's open singles were 245 hopefuls.

Keith Dunlap and Orlando's Jim Adkins both reached the round of 32. Dunlap lost to Wright, last year's runner-up. Adkins was beaten by Don Thomas, who lost in the semis to eventual winner Bowman.

Gainesville's Matt Mathews lost to Bowman in the round of 64.

Moore topped Linda Prefontaine of Eugene, Ore., 21-18, 20-21, 11-7 for the women's open championship.

Bowman defeated Bobby Bolan of Tempe, Ariz., 21-5, 12-21, 11-0 for the men's open title.

The men's open doubles went to Houston's Mark Malowitz and Jeff Kwartler, 21-17, 21-15 over Wright and Trent.

Bill Schmidtke of Minneapolis won the men's senior singles. Charlie Garfinkel of Buffalo and Bill King of Radford, Pa., teamed to win the men's senior doubles.

Also, San Diego's Bud Muehleisen took the men's masters singles title.

# What's my Number?

---

## Florida State Ranking System (or is it?)

My name is Van Dubolsky and I've been playing racquetball or some variation thereof for over ten years. Since I moved to Florida in 1970 I have had the pleasure of meeting and playing with hundreds of different people. I have been lucky enough to play the game at all levels, from Saturday morning doubles to local, state, regional, and national tournament competition. I've had some victories I'll always remember and some losses that I'd just as soon forget, and I think I've won and lost games and matches from every possible position. (Although I'm not the kind of person who keeps accurate records . . . (Ahem) I just happen to know that over the last ten years I've won 1,876,549 games of racquetball while losing 801,249!) Anyway, I've always wondered where I stood with respect to the rest of the world's players.

Keeping track of total lifetime wins doesn't seem like a reasonable way to establish a ranking system but up until now it's all we racquetballers have really had. It seemed reasonable to me that if tennis could have a system at a local, state, and national level, why shouldn't racquetball? We know that it's fairly well established at the professional level, as any casual racquetball fan can tell you what Marty Hogan or Charlie Brumfield's numbers are; but what about the rest of us?

With these thoughts as a background I began to formulate a plan for a rating system. The first order of business was to decide at what level players should be ranked. Since it's usually easy enough to rate players ability-wise in your own family, while it's almost impossible to rank players world-wide, why not at least work towards a compromise? That's exactly what I decided to do when I made an attempt to establish a Florida State ranking procedure. The main purpose behind establishing this system would be to allow Florida based players to be assigned objectively arrived at numbers that could be used to compare them with other competitors in their respective division. Pre-established numbers would minimize seeding problems in future tournaments especially if those rankings were produced through some sort of objective system.

In creating the ranking system I used the following parameters:

I decided to use all tournament performances in Florida where invitations had been sent to clubs and organizations and individuals in most major racquetball centers in the state. I picked January 1978 as a starting point with the IRA State Championships in Ft. Lauderdale as the first recorded event.

The actual rating system is fairly simple: Divisions are considered separately and numbers are arrived at as follows: The winner of each division gets #1 while the runner-up receives #2. If there is a play-off for third, the winner gets #3 and the loser of that match #4. The fifth spot goes to the person who lost to the eventual champion in the quarterfinals while the #6 goes to the player who lost to the runner-up. (#7 goes to the person who lost to the #3 player while the #8 goes to the #4 "loser".) The #9 spot is given to the player who was defeated by the eventual champion in the round of 16, and so on as far back as you care to go.

With this in mind I began to rank Florida's players. With only one tournament to work with it was relatively easy. With a second set of tournament results I compiled a new set of numbers and then correlated them with my first set. Since most of the participants played in both events it still seemed to work but as 1978 progressed and my list of tournaments grew, the task of producing meaningful numbers got harder. Many people have only played in a few tournaments and some excellent "known" players have no numbers at all simply because of lack of participation in 1978 events. Some highly ranked players have recently moved, and seeding still becomes a problem when known, highly ranked, out-of-state players enter Florida tournaments. Finally, as of right now, subjective decisions must be made as to what constitutes a state-level event versus just a local get-together.

Even with all the inherent problems, I've still managed to come up with numbers for just about everyone who has played in 1978 tournaments. Next month I'll publish a list of the tournaments considered in the rankings so far this year, and the names and numbers for the major divisions. (P.S. I just won my 1,876,550th game today and I'm no longer concerned with my world standing; I've got my Florida number.)

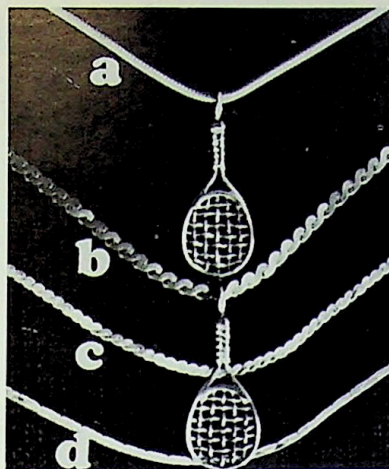
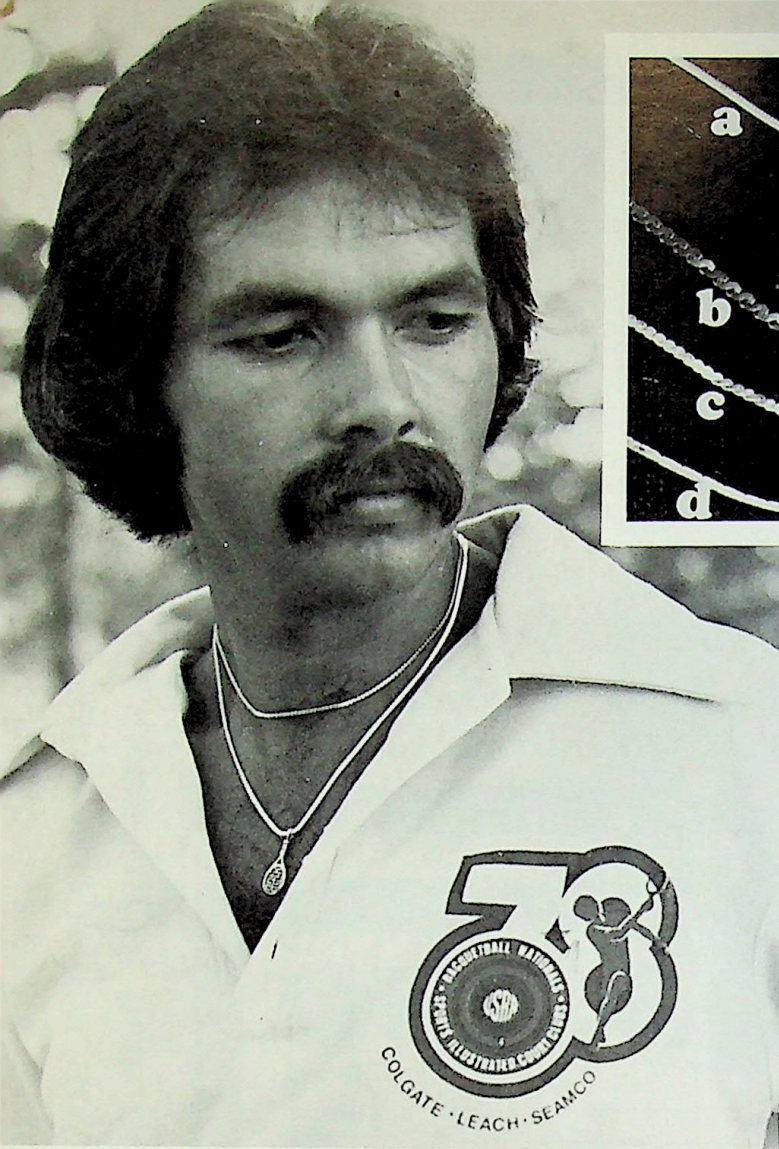

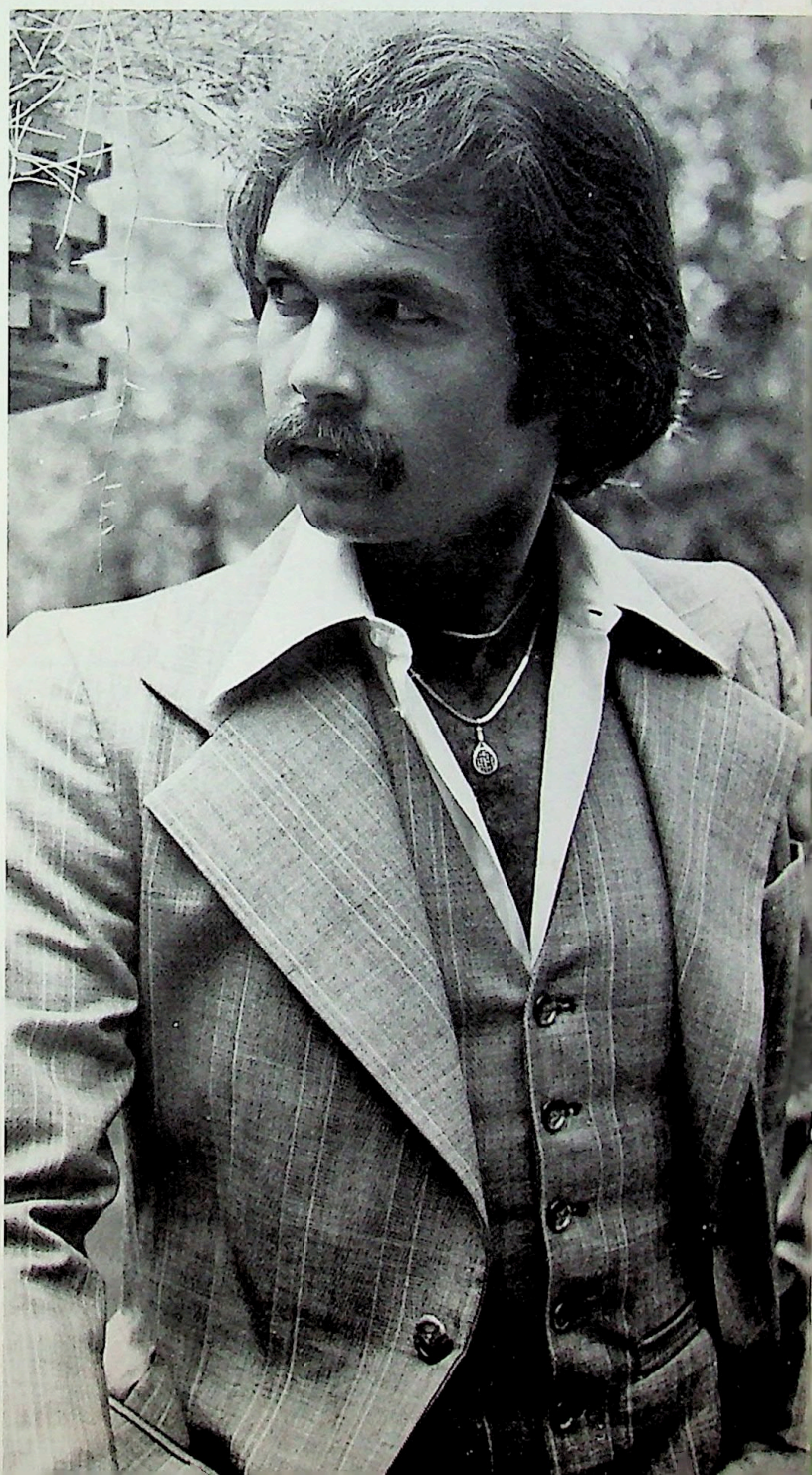
