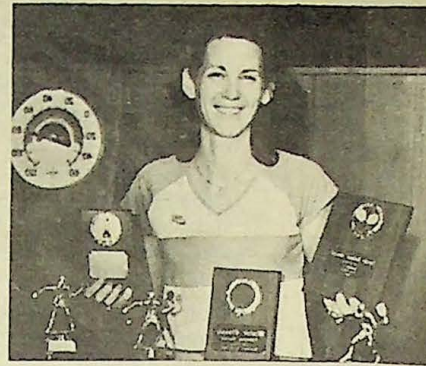

Missy Rubin

FORT LAUDERDALE — Her plaques aren't stuffed in the garage or buried in the closets. They are displayed prominently in the "Rubin" household and Missy beams with excitement when asked about them.

She was told by the doctors to forget about racquetball. It was too stressful and would raise her body temperature — two symptoms that could result in an attack for Multiple Sclerosis victims.

But Missy Rubin, 35, ignored her doctor's advice and has continued to play racquetball.

"It's absolutely the greatest therapy for me," Ruben said. "Racquetball keeps my mind going and is good for the muscles. I have a great problem with atrophy when I have my attacks and I can come back faster because of racquetball."

Missy was diagnosed with MS, a disease of the brain and spinal cord that attacks the central nervous system, in May of 1983. Her previous experience with racquetball had been anything but positive. She began playing in the summer of 1981 when her husband won a membership at the Courtrooms. She severed the cartilage in her knee in January of 1982 and after nine months and three operations, finally recovered. Missy

was then diagnosed with MS and went back to playing racquetball in October of 1983. This time she fractured her foot and again was sidelined.

Despite the bad luck, Missy continued playing, because of her strong belief in the benefits of racquetball.

"To date, I seem to average six months. When I have a MS attack I end up in the hospital because my arms, legs and vision are affected. During the last three years, I have been hospitalized nine times. Usually with the attacks I have a lot of physical therapy and work on my part to get my strength back in the muscles."

"For me, racquetball serves several purposes; the physical exercise to keep the muscles in tune and the psychological to release some of the tension or frustrations of daily life. Living with a disease which has no real treatment can be really frustrating. So far this year, I have been in the hospital three times, being discharged the last time June 21. This last attack affected my vision in both eyes, speech and arms and legs."

Missie entered her first tournament, the Florida Racquet Journal Winter Classic at her home club, Racquetball West, and finished second in the novice division. She didn't

enter another tournament until last August in the Florida Racquet Journal Summer Finale where she finished second in the C division and third in the D division.

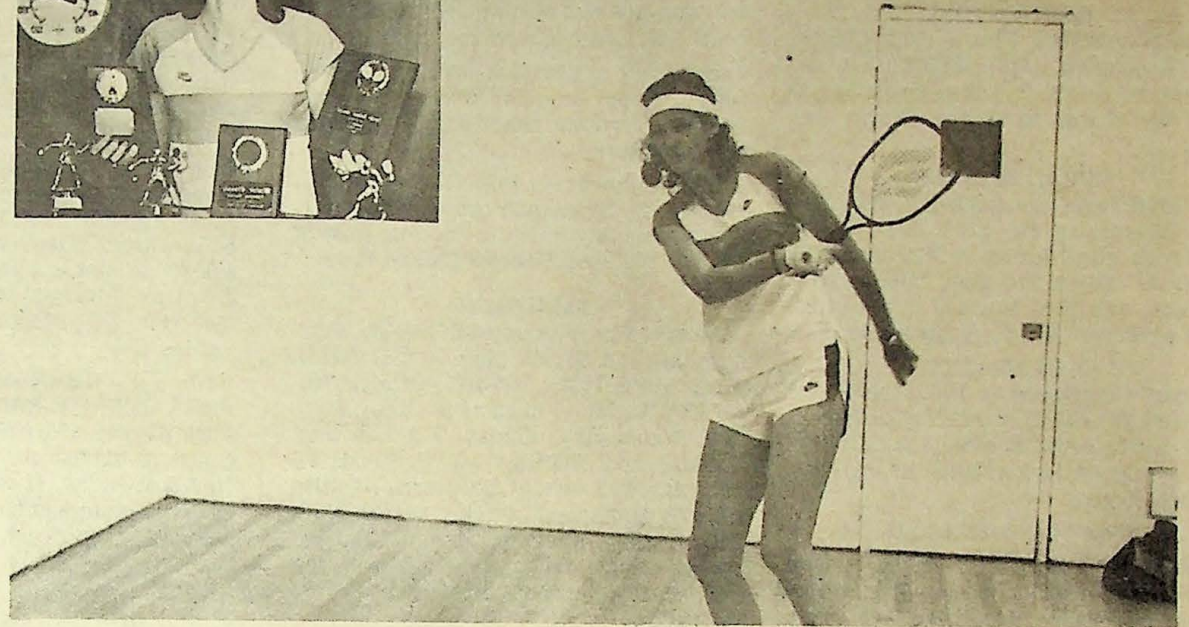
She received encouragement from her family and friends, especially Eva Russell, an avid tournament player.

"my moral. After I was in the hospital this past June she encouraged me to go on. There's no cure or cause for MS, but I was told to try and live a normal life. I'm learning my limitations. If I sense a rise in body temperature, I stop playing and douse myself with cold water. The body rebels against high pressure jobs. There are no warnings when you have an attack."

In the last tournament, Missy tested her body to the limit, playing three matches on Saturday and two more on Sunday. "After the tournament I was elated but exhausted. It took me a good week to rest."

While most people might take the tournament awards for granted, Missy marveled at the plaques and held onto them tightly.

"I am a fighter and I have to keep fighting. If I end up in a wheelchair, I'll be able to look back and see my trophies and say 'I did it.'"

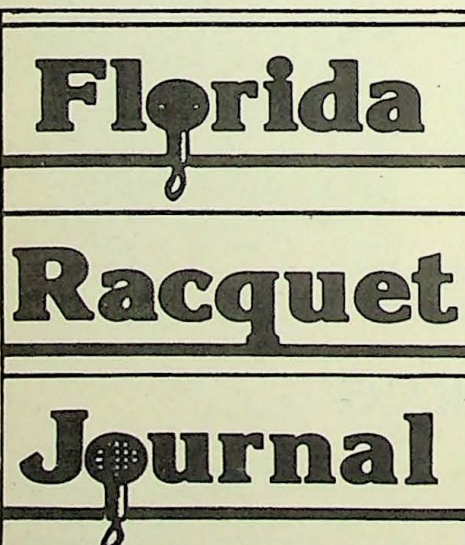

Nichols has become more consistent this year. "It's just concentration. That's all it is," Nichols said. "I think it would be hard to dominate in this state. I've beaten (Tim) Hansen the last three times and I think he realizes I belong in the circle of good players. But the circle is getting bigger. There are an awful lot of good players in this state.

"I'm going to go to as many pro stops as

I can get to to see how good I can do. I think I'll do all right. Cliff Swain (18-year-old phenom who was ranked fifth at the end of the season) proved it can be done."

In the women's open division, Orlando's Diane Bullard, who also hopes to compete on the pro tour this season, defeated Julie Pinnell in the final.

Adams takes No. 1 ranking

frustration for Adams in the event held annually in Anaheim, Calif., just minutes from her Costa Mesa home.

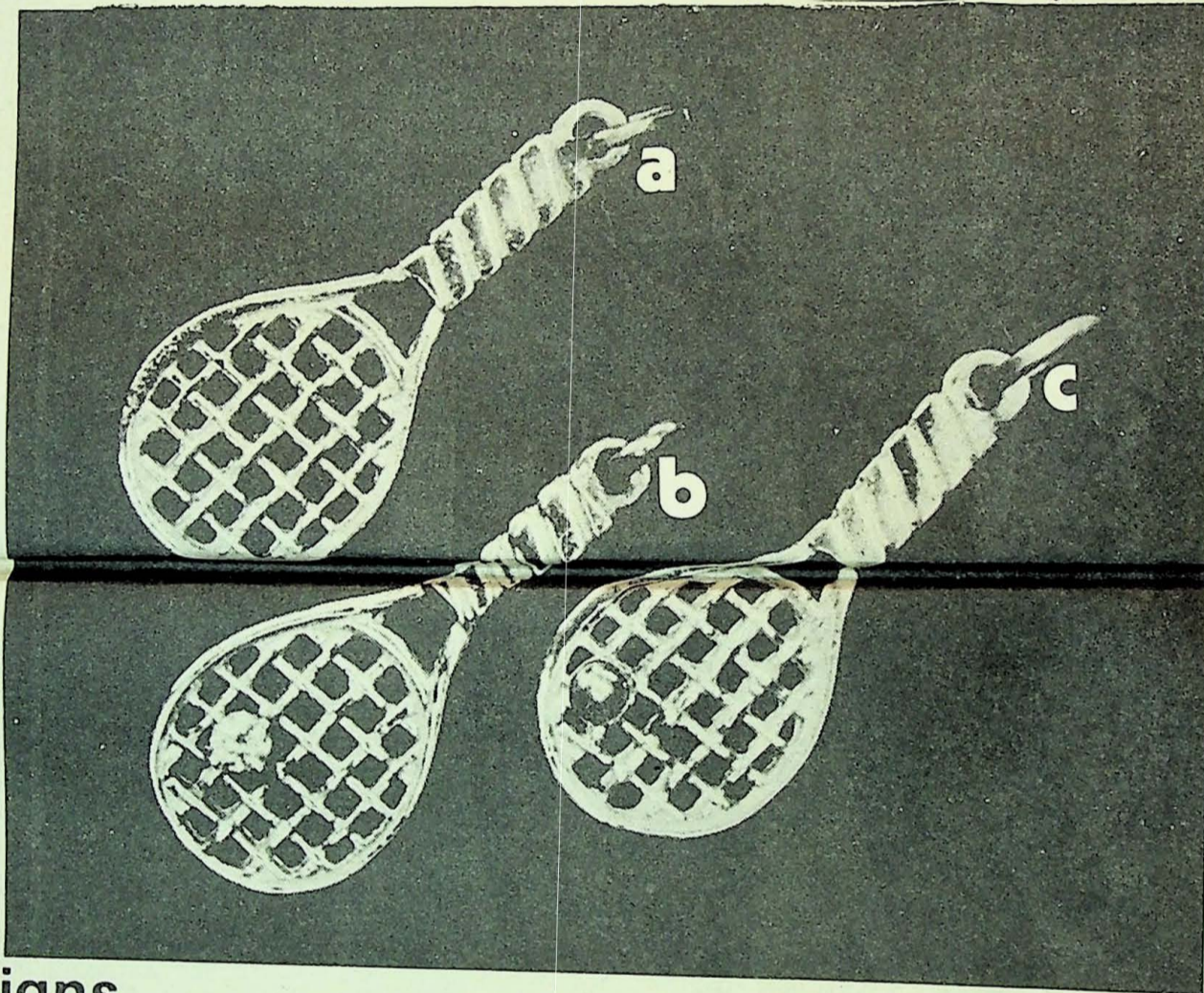

Yellen obtains No. 1 ranking

SAN DIEGO, CA. — For the third consecutive year, Ektelon's Mike Yellen of Southfield, Mich., is the 1984-85 national champion of men's professional racquetball, according to the year-end statistics released by the Racquetball Manufacturer's Association Men's Pro Racquetball Tour.

En route to his third straight No.1 ranking, Yellen reached at least the semifinal round in eight of 10 pro tournaments. He was the winner of the Bangor, Me., Veaverton, Ore., and Concord, Cal. stops on the pro racquetball circuit and was the runnerup in Tempe, Ariz., Cheyenne, Wyo., and at the DP Nationals in Boston. Most impressive in Yellen's three-year domi-

nation of the sport, is his patient, controlled style, which is a direct contrast to the power-oriented styles of most contemporary players.

Yellen, 25, averaged 85.00 points per tournament during the 1984-85 pro racquetball campaign, based on a scoring system in which a player is accorded 120 points for a tournament championship, 90 points for second place and so on down the line. Total points are then divided by the number of events in which the player participated (minimum four). Marty Hogan of San Diego, Calif. was the runnerup to Yellen, with an average of 82.22 points.

Yellen's first national championship in

1983 saw him become the first player in men's pro racquetball history to win the sport's prestigious "Grand Slam" (the Ektelon National Finals, the Catalina National Championship and the DP/Leach Nationals) in a calendar year.

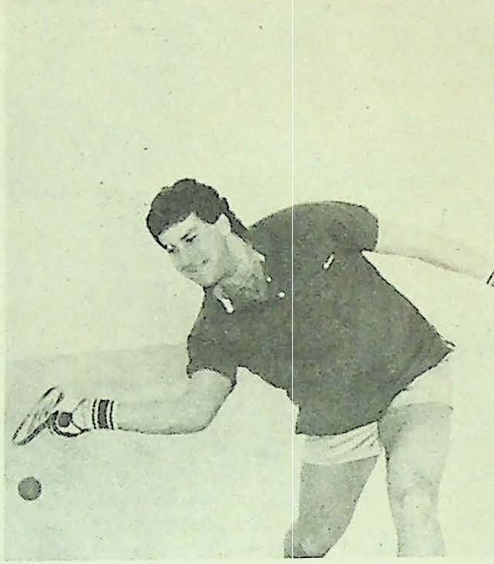
His second national championship led to a contract extension worth one-million dollars with Ektelon, the world's leading manufacturer of racquetball equipment. Yellen's record-setting contract with the San Diego-based firm is the largest in racquetball history and spans the remainder of his professional career.

Though his third consecutive national title has additionally enhanced the value of

his nine-year relationship with Ektelon, Yellen has transcended basic product endorsement to become one of the sport's most articulate and respected spokesman, as well as an ambassador for racquetball throughout the world.

Yellen, who has more requests for clinics and exhibitions than he can handle, has worked closely with the *Florida Racquet Journal*.

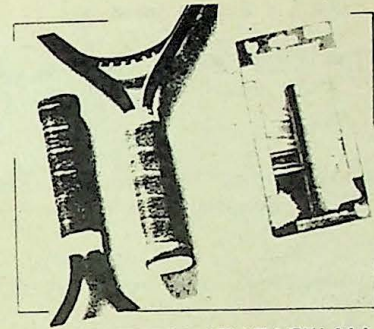

AARA Notes

The following rule changes were approved by the AARA Board of Directors and will go into effect September 1.

Rule 2. A. Order — The player or team winning the coin toss has the option to serve or receive for the start of the first game. The second game will begin in reverse order of the first game. The player or team scoring the highest total of points in Games 1 and 2 will have the option to serve or receive for the start of the tiebreaker. In the event that both players or teams score an equal number of points in the first two games, another coin toss will take place and the winner of the toss will have the option to serve or receive.

Rule 13. D Between Games — The rest period between the first two games of a match is two minutes. If a tiebreaker is necessary, the rest period between the second and third game is five minutes.

Rule 7. H. Out-of-order serve — In doubles, when either partner serves out-of-order the points scored by that serve will be subtracted and an out serve will be called: if the second server serves out-of-order the out serve will be applied to the first server and the second server will resume serving. If the player designated as the first server serves out-of-order, a sideout will be called. In a match with line judges, the referee may enlist their aid to recall the number of points scored out-of-order.

A. Courts E— Receiving Line — A broken line parallel with and five feet to the rear of the short line. The receiving line will be with a line 21 inches long that extends from each side wall: the two lines will be connected by an alternate series of six-inch spaces and six-inch lines (17 six-inch spaces and 16 six-inch lines). The back edge of the receiving line will be five-

feet from the back edge of the short line. **IMPORTANT NOTE:** Sites of all state, regional and national championships taking place after September 1, 1985 must have the receiving line painted on the floor. Until Sept. 1, 1986, all other sanctioned tournaments may use tape to designate the receiving line. Official court specifications must be complied with by Sept. 1, 1986.

RACQUET SPECIFICATIONS Dimensions. (Current language). **IMPORTANT NOTE:** For a one-year period beginning September 1, 1985, the above racquet dimensions have been waived for experimental purposes. For that period, the lone specification is that the racquet, including bumper guard and all solid parts, may not exceed 21 inches in length.
