In a recent tournament, Mary was serving for the match against the up and coming Claudia McCarthy. The ref called her serve an ace, but Mary, instead of congratulating Claudia on a well-played match, thought the serve might have been a bit short and replayed the point. It didn't pay to be Ms. Nice Guy. Mary lost the tiebreaker 11-10 and the first place prize — a personal home computer.

FORGET THE FLIP — It isn't everyday a club plays host to some of the top women pros, which is what occurred at the Tampa Bay Courthouse last month. The tournament went smoothly and the all-female concept went smoothly. There was only one hitch. The women pros, instead of playing for third place, opted to split the difference in money and flipped a coin. "I was a little disappointed they did that," said tournament organizer Karen Riley. "There were a lot of people still at the club who don't get to see the top pros and the third place playoff would have been entertaining." We agree with Karen. Sure it's a letdown playing for third after losing the semifinals, but pro racquetball players have to put aside their personal feelings and make the fans a priority.

POTPOURRI — The AARA's certification test for referees is no pushover. About two out of 30 pass it. Former Ektelon publicist Armen Keteyian, now a staff writer for Sports Illustrated, wrote the recent article in SI on the Lynn Adams-Heather McKay rivalry...Within the next two months we'll be doing our draw on computer, thus eliminating the possibility of players getting the wrong starting time over the phone. In Indiana, losers of all games must ref. They don't take away a shirt, but if you fail to fulfill your obligation, they attach \$5 to your next tournament entry fee. What do you think?

RAM, makers of the famous golf ball, is making a big push in the racquetball ball market. Top-ranked female Lynn Adams rarely loses when she gives clinics and plays the top males at the club in exhibitions. In Melbourne, January 18-20, she'll be the underdog, going against the likes of the state's top player Tim Hansen... And no, we can't explain how a player is ranked higher nationally than he is in the state...Lynn Adams set a bad precedent by playing in the Tampa tournament where the first place prize was only \$1,000. Sure there haven't been many pro stops, but when word gets out that she'll play for a \$1,000, why should promoter come up with \$10,000 in prize money?

Historic tournament

For women only

TAMPA — A milestone in racquetball was reached last month as the ladies moved from the backseat to the front in the U.S. National Women's Invitational Racquetball Tournament at the Tampa Bay Courthouse.

The tournament showcased female players, including professionals Lynn Adams, Caryn McKinney, Marci Drexler and Fran Davis who competed for \$2,500 in prize money. Sponsored by Myer Rum, it was the first tournament in the nation for females only.

Even though the professionals were the main attraction, the tournament drew very well for its other divisions ranging from Open to Novice. It seemed as if even the novice players played with more intensity and confidence after watching the pros battle each other. Armed with a full arsenal of new shots and strategies, I too felt inspired to play a better game. I still came up a few points short, losing in the first round to Marci Lynn, the fifth-seeded pro.

As must be the case, someone has to play the No. 1 seed in the first round and dubious honor fell upon Orange Park's 16 year old wonder girl, Claudia McCarthy. Adams, ranked second on the women's pro tour and a former national champ, handled McCarthy easily who was apparently suffering a serious case of the jitters.

Commentary

Adams, who was the heavy favorite in the tournament, having only lost two matches in the last four years to anyone other than Heather McKay, lost an 11-8 tiebreaker to McKinney.

In the women's open division, Claudia McCarthy, avenging her honor, defeated top-seeded Val Paese in the second round and advanced to the final before losing to Pensacola's Babette Bell 15-12, 15-5.

The success of this tournament demonstrates that women's racquetball is exciting to play and from the number of male and female specta-

tors it is quite obviously exciting to watch.

I don't know if separate men's and women's tournaments are to be the wave of the future, but it is possible for the women to survive alone.

MELBOURNE — More than 60 Ektelon players will converge at the Harbour Pines Racquet Club in Melbourne to attend a team meeting January 18-20. **Be aware
of
these rules**

The AARA Board of Directors has passed the following rule changes.

To determine the winners of round-robin events, the following procedure will be adhered to:

- 1) each game won will count for one point.
- 2) each match won will receive a bonus point.
- 3) the winner will be the person with the most points.
- 4) in case of ties, the following tiebreaker will be used:

- 1) head-to-head competition.
- 2) points scored against.

Note: In cases where points scored against is the tiebreaker and a forfeit occurs, the points scored by the forfeiting team will be discounted from consideration of points scored against all other

teams.

This tiebreaking procedure is to be used for all sanctioned events.

BACKLINE FOOT FAULT: After the ball is served, if the server enters into the safety zone before the served ball passes the short line, it shall result in a loss of serve.

OUT OF ORDER SERVE IN DOUBLES — In doubles, when either partner serves out of order, any points which may have been scored during the out of order serve will be ruled, but an "out" (either a handout or sideout) shall be applied to the partner who should have been serving.

5-FOOT RETURN OF SERVE RULE: The rule has been changed to reflect the membership's wishes. The new rule is essentially that the receiver may not enter the 5 foot zone until the ball bounces. Violation of this rule results in a point for the server.

Your serve can be an offensive weapon

(Editor's Note: Mike Yellen has been the world's No. 1-ranked player the last two years. He is a contributing editor to the *Florida Racquet Journal* and a valued member of the Ektelon Advisory Staff.)

Before you go in and start banging the ball around from the service box, you need to be aware of the basic philosophy of the serve. Very simply, you want to hit a serve that sets up a weak return, so you can put the ball away on the next shot.

If you think about it a little deeper, it's the only time in a game situation where you are in total control. The receiver is at your mercy. So if you take that knowledge to heart, you don't ever want to walk into the service area and just put the ball in play. You decide what you're going to serve, why you want to serve that particular one, and then concentrate on executing it right.

Since you know that you're in total control, how do you work that to your optimum advantage? The best way is your service motion. The only way the receiver can tell which direction your serve is going to go is by watching your body. Almost everyone telegraphs their serves by their service motions. Cheat them of that knowledge by making every serve look similar.

Start with your beginning position. Everyone's is different, and you need to do whatever is most comfortable to you. But, whatever position you choose, always start your serves that way. Make sure you drop the ball in the place every time, and that your step into the ball is in the position every time.

Remember to concentrate on developing one consistent motion. It will help develop deceptive serves.

There are three basic types of serves

with many variations from those three: the drive, the Z and the lob. I will talk about each serve: how to hit, different variations you can use, and the most effective way to practice it. Let's start with the drive.

The drive is probably the easiest serve to attempt, yet the most difficult to execute properly. Everyone hits drive serves, but very few people hit them right consistently. So, let's get into the mechanics of a drive serve.

The objective of a drive serve is to be hit low and hard at an angle where it just passes over the short line and goes straight for the back corner. It either dies in the corner or bounces twice before it reaches the back corner. It should never come off the backwall.

The body motion used to hit a drive serve is exactly like hitting a forehand. You want to move into the ball hitting it flat and parallel with a snapping of your wrist. The best "trick" for good serves is to find your spot on the wall. Meaning, there is an area on the front wall that, if hit, will deliver an accurate serve. The only way to find your spot for drive serves is to get on a court and experiment.

It helps to have someone with you so you can see where the ball goes, and they can just watch for where the ball hit on the front wall. Go ahead and put a big "X" with tape on the wall when you've found

your spot. It will help you visually "cement" the serve in your mind and body.

Also, move around the service box and try different angles. The more variety of serves you have, the more in control you are as a server.

The next serve is the Z-serve. I will talk about the hard Z, and I'll mention the lob Z in the next segment. The object of the Z-serve is to hit it hard enough so your opponent can't cut it off before it hits the third wall. The spin created from hitting three different walls causes the ball to travel parallel with the back wall and die.

It takes more strength and wrist snap to hit an accurate Z-serve off the same motion as a drive serve. But that's one of the differences between a good racquetball player and an excellent player.

The way you adjust your serve is by using the corner as a gauge. The closer you hit the ball to the corner, the tighter the serve will be. When it hits the third wall it will really catch the wall hard and shoot out parallel to the backwall. The farther away from the corner you hit the wall, the less spin you get when the ball hits the third wall. Instead of coming out parallel, it will angle back towards the backwall.

So far, from one position, you should be able to hit three different serves off the same motion. Four from the middle.

This is an excellent starting group of serves. You have now 10 different serves from two basic serves. But let me stress again, to gain optimum advantage and deception, they must all be hit off the same service motion.

The last basic serve is the lob. It can be hit from anywhere on the court, creating different angles. The lob is more of a push stroke than a normal racquetball stroke. You don't snap your wrist and your arm

motion is fairly straight. You want to feel as if you're cradling the ball on your strings for as long as possible. It's a very soft motion.

For a high lob serve, you want to get the ball as high on the frontwall as possible. The objective is to have it bounce inside the five-foot mark and then die in the back corner. The reason these serves are so effective is because for one, the hardest ball to do anything with is the one coming straight down. Second, if you get the serve into the back corner, not only is the receiver hitting a ball coming straight down, but they're also fighting the walls.

These serves are very effective against someone with weak ceiling balls, or against a player who wants to shoot everything. They either get frustrated because they have to play a ceiling game, or they try to shooting impossible shots.

The next lob is the high Z. It follows the same theory as the hard Z except it's hit very high on the wall with the soft lob touch. But spin is still created by hitting three different walls, and after it hits the third wall, it drops very fast, thus making it difficult to dig out of the back corner area.

There are also the half lob. The object of these serves is to hit them a touch harder and lower on the wall so they hit the receiver around their chest. Don't hit it so hard that it comes off the back wall. This is a relatively simple serve, and insures the server that the return shot will not be low and hard. It's extremely difficult to go anywhere except the ceiling off this serve.

You should work and concentrate just as much on lob and second serves as any other serve. A properly executed lob serve will get you a weak return just as quickly as a drive will.

REYE SYNDROME

Reye syndrome is a rare but **dangerous** condition that can develop from **flu or chicken pox**. It occurs mainly in **children under 16**, usually when they **appear to be recovering**. Watch for these signs:

- **Persistent vomiting**
- **Fatigue**
- **Confusion and belligerence.**

If your child displays any of these symptoms, **consult a doctor immediately.**

Some studies indicate that there may be an association between the use of **aspirin** for flu and chicken pox and the development of Reye syndrome. Further studies are being conducted on this possibility. In the meantime, the **U.S.**

Surgeon General suggests that you check with your doctor before using aspirin or any medication when your child has flu or chicken pox.

Sir:
I saw an article the other day from a magazine that was pinned to our racquetball bulletin board. It was by one of the three top pro players. It told how to perform a "legal hinder."

The writer obviously didn't know that to begin with a "legal hinder" was a contradiction in terms. He also had little or no integrity or respect for the rules.

Unlike golf, where the pros appear to have a lot of integrity and have been known to call penalties on themselves, the pros of racquetball teach how to break the rules.

At least nine out of 10 of our racquetball players at our facility readily admit that they have never read the rules of racquetball. I suspect that the 10 percent who claim to have read the rules — including our pro — haven't read them either.

Our pro is proud of the fact that he knows 51 ways to cheat and not get caught. In a tournament at our facility recently,

I saw both players in a match serve obvious screen serves — none were called.

One of the problems of course is the absence of professional or knowledgeable referees.

I would like to suggest that you include an article in each issue concerning a particular rule. Please include the clear intent of the rule makers. Please don't be wishy-washy. Over a period of time, your readers might know the rules.

If you spend some words on integrity, respect for the rules and respect for the opponent, it might also help.

P.S. Please also print the rules when there is a change. I can't ever find a dated copy of the rules.
