First Tournament Abroad for U.S. Team

For the first time in racquetball history, the United States Amateur Team traveled outside the U.S. border - this time all the way to Central America with the help of sponsors D P Leach, Lite Beer from Miller, and Penn Athletic Products. The United States was only one of nine countries competing in the Costa Rican/Pan American Championships held at the Indoor Club in San Jose, Costa Rica, October 9-14. As in the past the United States dominated international competition, but not without a few upsets along the way.

"I think we more than met our goals," praised U.S. Team Coach Ed Martin of Sacramento, California. "Like I told the Team, we're not here necessarily just to impress them with our skill, but to help develop the racquetball programs in Latin America, to be good diplomats, and provide an example of good sportsmanship."

Martin and others expressed surprise at the skill level of the Latinos and the progress so far in organizing and promoting racquetball in the other countries represented: Costa Rica, Mexico, Honduras, Guatemala, Colombia, Bolivia, Dominican Republic and Panama. Gustavo Retamozo of Bolivia took "numero uno" Dan Ferris, the 1983 A.A.R.A. National Champion, to a tie-breaker the first time they played, despite his unorthodox style. Sylvia Portuquez of Costa Rica had her share of upsets, first by defeating Marcy Drexler of the U.S., then by teaming up with Patricia Leiva to take a match from the American team of Beth Latini and Tammy Hajjar. However, Hajjar and Latini redeemed themselves the next day

by winning 15-4, 15-1 and earning the first place title.

Retamozo, 20, of La Paz just started playing racquetball five months ago when the restaurant owner he works for took him to the club. One of the problems with making racquetball accessible to the general public is that most of the clubs in Latin America are private, for members only. If a club has two or three racquetball courts and not much else it is more affordable. But sometimes they can be part of a country club and may have initiation fees in the thousands of dollars. Before Retamozo discovered racquetball he played "pelota" for fifteen years, won the national title the past four years and is also the Bolivian handball champ. He was amazed that Ferris had been playing racquetball for twelve years and expects to be equal in caliber within just two years.

One of the things that the Latinos are sadly lacking is proper instruction. Possibly the majority of the nearly 100 players in this tournament had never seen an experienced player or even photos of world-ranked players. When Andres Sanchez of the Dominican Republic was asked who the best player was that he had ever seen, he answered "I'm playing him in about a half hour," - meaning Ferris.

Coach Martin is planning to carry his goal of helping out the other countries by offering clinics and exhibitions only for the cost of travel and living expenses for members of the U.S. Team. Already, he and Bill Thurman, a top-rated amateur from the San Francisco Bay area, spent a month

in Costa Rica helping them prepare for the tournament. They had 60 players turn out for their clinics, which isn't bad at all when you realize there are only four courts in the capitol city of San Jose. Three of those are at the Indoor Club and just recently had wooden floors added. The fourth court is at a private residence.

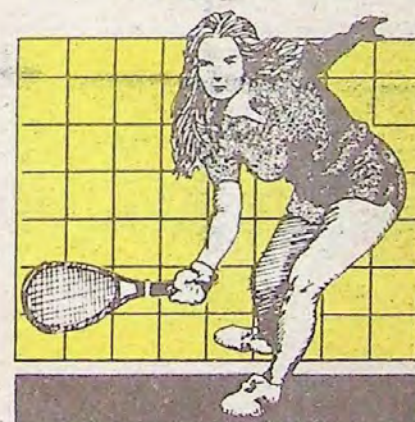
"This is the most historical event in racquetball since its inception," stated Luke St. Onge, the Executive Director of the American Amateur Racquetball Association which is centered near the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colorado. "It's just unfortunate that some of the decision-makers aren't here to see this," he continued. While manufacturers and sponsors have been taking a wait-and-see attitude toward Latin America, this tournament proved that racquetball really can be a viable force in international athletics, as well as in camaraderie. Han van der Heijden, President of the International Amateur Racquetball Federation, and his wife Marianne flew in from Holland to attend the opening ceremonies. The wife of the country's president gave a speech in behalf of her husband, Luis Alberto Monge who was awaiting a conference on Central America with Henry Kissinger. The opening ceremonies were also attended by bowling teams from all over Latin

America as part of "El Torneo de la Raza" (the tournament of the race) which is an annual event.

This was the second annual Costa Rican/Pan-American Championships. Just an indication of the progress that's being made in this

area of the world - last year only three countries participated in the tournament: Costa Rica, Ecuador and Colombia. There are so many new players that only one of the entrants, other than the Costa Ricans, has played both years - Bianca Novoa. She was awarded a trophy by Rodolfo Echeverria, the President of the Costa Rican Racquetball Association, for the honor.

Not only was this tournament a landmark for racquetball, but it was also a glowing example of friendships between the countries. Just as much of the action happened off the court as well as on. Since all the players stayed at the same hotel and rode the shuttle back and forth together to the club, they were able to mix and meet each other. One of the highlights of the week was a trip to the beach, which included a two-hour bus ride there and back. Amid palm trees, white

sand and crystal clear waters, the Latinos challenged the Gringos to a friendly game of soccer. St. Onge suggested that his players be allowed to *run* with the ball since that's how Americans play "futbol," but his suggestion was quickly vetoed!

The tournament came to a climax after all the finals had been played with an Awards Banquet Friday night. The evening began with food and drink and socializing. Next came dancing, Latin-style. Then the polished wood clock trophies were handed out and speeches made in Spanish and English. The program ended with each country serenading the other countries - a precedent which was started at the North American Championships held last spring in California. The Gringos sang "Yankee Doodle Dandy" in English, the Colombians sang an original song in both English and Spanish (see insert), while everyone else sang beautiful Spanish "cantas" (songs).

Maybe the competition still isn't the stiffest and the court facilities leave a lot to be desired, but this first tournament abroad will probably always be the most memorable for the U.S. Team. The Costa Ricans offered incredible hospitality, displayed impressive organization, and the natural beauty of their country will never be forgotten.

NEW DIRECTIONS

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE A.A.R.A. BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING, SEPTEMBER 17 and 18, 1983 HELD AT THE UNITED STATES OLYMPIC COMMITTEE COMPLEX, COLORADO SPRINGS, COLORADO

1. Raised all State Championships from level 2 to level 4 for State, Regional and National rankings.

2. Accepted Levi Strauss as official supplier of the U.S. Team uniforms through the World Championship Games to be held in July of 1984.

3. Participants in U.S. Open Racquetball Championships and U.S. Open Junior Championships must qualify by participating in a Regional of their choice.

Eligibility for the 1984 National Singles shall be limited to A.A.R.A. members who have participated in any of the 1984 Regional Singles Championships held throughout the country. Participation consists of paying an entry fee at the Regional tournament of the player's choice. Any Championship Division with at least six entrants must be held at the Regional and the tournament director is requested to hold any championship division with five or less entrants as a round robin event. Any player entered in a division with five or less who does not wish to participate in a round robin or in

another division will be refunded his/her entry fee. This player will still be eligible to participate in the Nationals. Exemptions will be based on the following: regional tournament directors and the A.A.R.A. Executive Director will be allowed to excuse any players who are unable to meet the participation requirements due to extenuating (EMERGENCY) circumstances. Emergencies are defined as personal family tragedies and injuries documented with a physician's note to be included with the National entry blank. An exemption will be extended to the defending current National Singles Champions in each championship division. Players may enter any divisions at the Nationals as long as they have met these participation requirements. All other eligibility rules apply.

4. Houston Downtown Y.M.C.A. has been selected as the site of the U.S. Open Racquetball Championships, May 24-28, 1984.

5. Nominating Committee Nominated: Gary Mazaroff, New Mexico; Van Dubolsky, Florida; Jon Denley, New Jersey; Garner White, South Dakota; Mike Arnold, Indiana; John Foust, Colorado. These A.A.R.A. members were nominated to serve on the A.A.R.A. Board of Directors for a three-year term. Others wishing to be nominated to the Board must submit a petition with 100

signatures of current A.A.R.A. members nominating them to the Board. The petition must be sent in to the National Headquarters by January 1, 1984. Balloting will occur in the March issue of "Racquetball in Review" and at the National Singles Championships in Houston, Texas. Four positions will become vacant.

6. Based upon U.S.O.C. approval, a National Racquetball Camp will be conducted at the Olympic Training Center during the month of August, 1984.

7. No candidates were nominated for the National Racquetball Hall of Fame.

8. Ed Martin will continue as head coach of the U.S. National Team until October 1, 1984.

9. Fugazy International was adopted as the official travel agent for the A.A.R.A.

10. The Board awarded Penn Athletic Products Company the "Official Ball" of the U.S. Open Racquetball Singles Championships and the Adult Regionals.

11. Penn Athletic Products Company was awarded the "Official Ball" of the U.S. National Racquetball Intercollegiate Championships.

12. The "Official Ball" of the U.S. National Junior Racquetball Championships was awarded to Penn Athletic Products Company.

13. All Nationals participants will be given participation certificates.

14. A Blue Ribbon Racquetball Committee for raising funds for the U.S. National Racquetball Team and funding for expenses toward having racquetball accepted as an Olympic sport was established.

15. Proposed rule changes were reviewed and these will be published in the January issue of "Racquetball In Review."

Playing with Pain

When basketball center Bill Walton retired prematurely from the Portland Trailblazers of the National Basketball Association, he tripped up one of the sport's sacred (if slightly crippled) cows. By refusing to play with a foot injury, and by publicly criticizing his team for asking him to do so, Walton was fouling the old credo that good athletes "play with pain."

Robert Shively, an orthopedic surgeon and sports medicine specialist at the Washington University School of Medicine in St. Louis and a staff member at both Barnes and Children's Hospitals, lends some medical credence to Walton's resignation with honor. Shively's experience tells him that athletes who play hurt aren't being tough; they're being dumb.

"If you're hurting," Shively says, "that's your body talking, and you should listen to it. By and large, when you have pain and play, you should be doing something else."

Shively, an ex-collegiate wrestler and football player, tends to legions of the walking, running and jumping wounded in his office

at Barnes Hospital. He doesn't place the blame on athletes for wanting to play while hurt, thus risking more severe — even permanent — injury. Shively, rather, points to the Lombardi Syndrome, named after former Green Bay Packer coach Vince Lombardi.

"Winning isn't everything; it's the only thing," Lombardi once said, thus inspiring a generation of injured athletes to perform while ignoring their pain.

Shively comments that because so much emphasis is placed on winning in our society, athletes — especially professionals — will risk life and limb for victory. This cavalier attitude about one's health trickles down to youth sports, where the kids imitate their battle-scarred heroes.

The best example of a sport in which injuries are a part of the game is football, where ligament damage, shoulder separations, neck injuries and pulled muscles go with the territory.

The treatment for such abuse to the body seems simple: Don't play.

Shively, however, realizes that to advise highly motivated athletes not to play while hurt is unrealistic.

"You simply can't treat athletes as you would regular patients," he says. "If I tell them not to play they'll either ignore me or seek out another doctor. Athletes are the complete opposite of worker's compensation patients, who usually want the doctor to recommend as long a layoff as possible. Athletes want to get right back out there."

Instead of suggesting rest and relaxation, Shively therefore steers athletes toward substitution. For example, in place of allowing a runner to run on a bad knee, Shively will advise the athlete to swim laps or ride a bicycle as a way of maintaining cardiovascular conditioning. Not until testing shows that the knee has returned to 90-percent strength will Shively allow the patient to resume running.

In a similar mode of treatment, Shively has specific performance criteria that he enforces before allowing injured athletes to suit up.

For instance, he will not allow a person suffering from an ankle injury to return to action until he or she can balance on the aching appendage without support and can run a tight figure eight. Likewise, an athlete with an injured shoulder is grounded until able to rotate the arm in a full circle without pain.

Shively's research specialty has been football, and his studies show, not too surprisingly, that the gridiron plays host to sport's most frequent and severe injuries. But he doesn't think coaches

deserve all the blame for such blood-and-guts results. He insists that most coaches have their players' interests at heart.

"A big part of the problem," Shively says, "is that very few teams at the high-school level and below have a trainer of any kind. The coaches themselves are the trainers."

"We have put coaches in a very difficult position. They must rely on the health of 15-to-18-year-old kids for their livelihood. Making the house payment, feeding the kids and just about everything else depend on winning. So, it's no wonder that when the big game comes along and the star halfback has a slight injury, the coach needs to get him taped up and in the game."

Shively sees more serious problems simmering in the youth-football leagues, where, as he puts it, "Coaches are trying to win the Super Bowl vicariously through a bunch of kids."

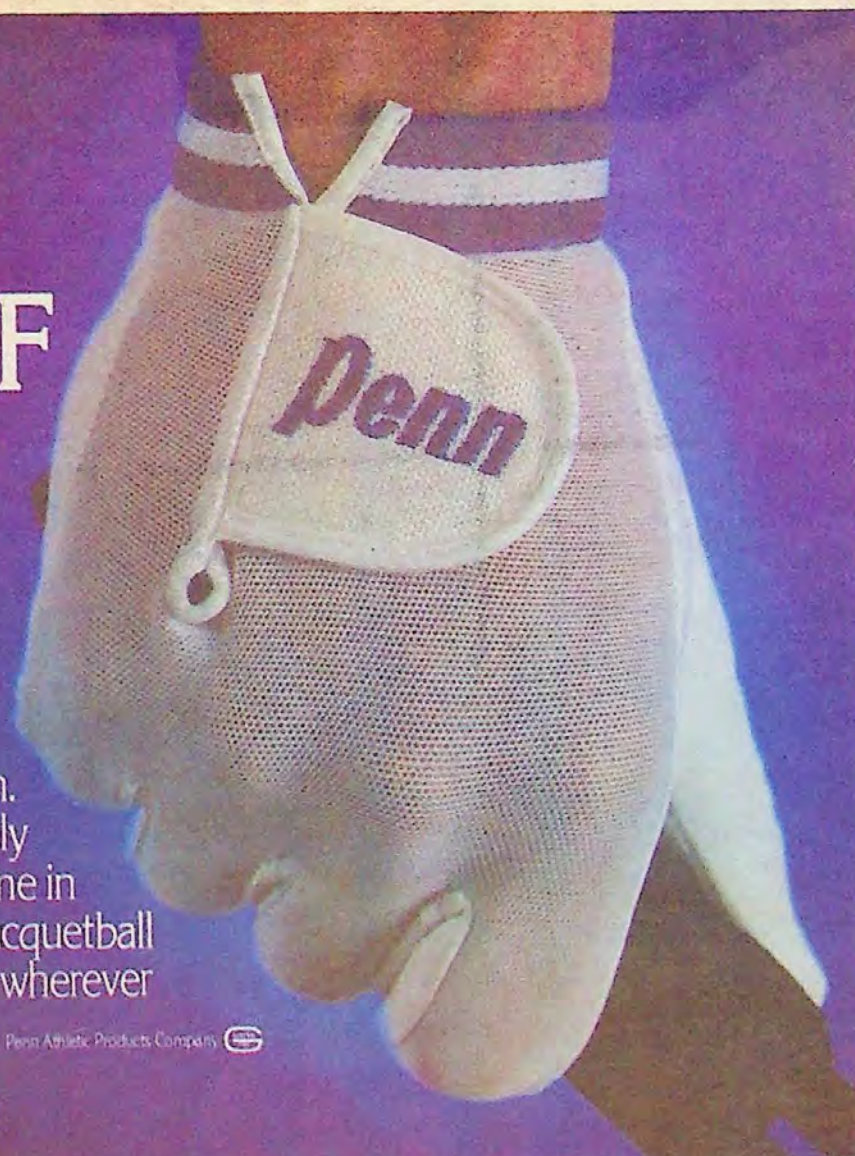
Shively thinks that on these sporting battle grounds players begin to pick up dangerous tactics, such as spearing — tackling helmet first. This kind of "hard, clean football" produces serious injuries when young players grow older and bigger.

Research in the late 1970s at the University of Massachusetts at Amherst confirmed the inherent danger of kids' football. These studies showed that, from a physical point of view, a person's body doesn't fully mature until

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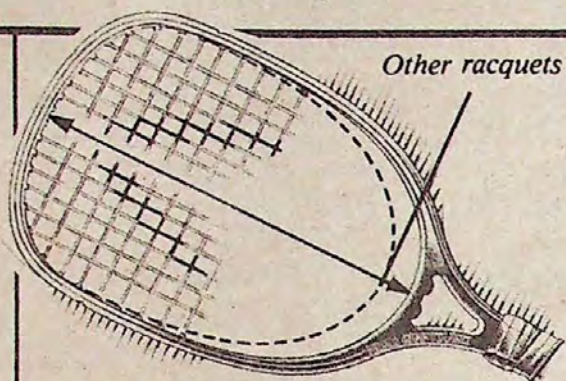
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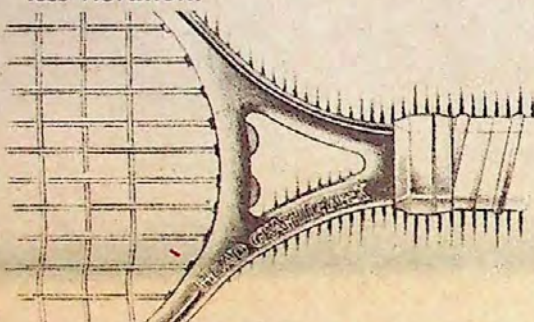
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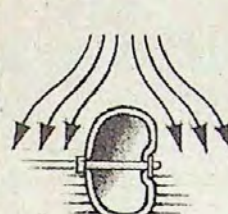

some time between the ages of 16 and 20. Before maturation, the skeleton is, in a sense, unattached and not fully formed.

Particularly vulnerable are the epiphyseal cartilages -- those soft growth centers located at the ends of the long bones of the body. In the adolescent athlete, the epiphyseal in all the joints are not fully connected, leaving knees, ankles, elbows and other joints open to permanent damage from physical impact.

Shively believes that in contact sports schools and leagues must find a way to hold competition which minimizes the risk of injury. How?

"Sports such as wrestling, where competitors are matched by weight, not age, offer a chance for

everyone to play -- and reduce the risk of debilitating injury," Shively says.

The New York State public school system, for one, has experimented with such a program which categorizes student athletes according to maturity and stretches across all sports. Called the Selection Classification Age Maturity Program, its success has been remarkable. The injuries for all sports dropped the first year from 32 per 100 to 3 per 100. For football, injuries dropped off to an eye-catching 6 per 100.

Until all sports at all ages become more controlled by programs that lessen the risk of injury, Shively believes that athletes might do well to examine their own principles. Are they being strapped with a crippling way of life when Sunday-afternoon sports casters continue to imbue the public with the idea of playing hurt is one of sport's most admirable and heroic traits? Ask Bill Walton.

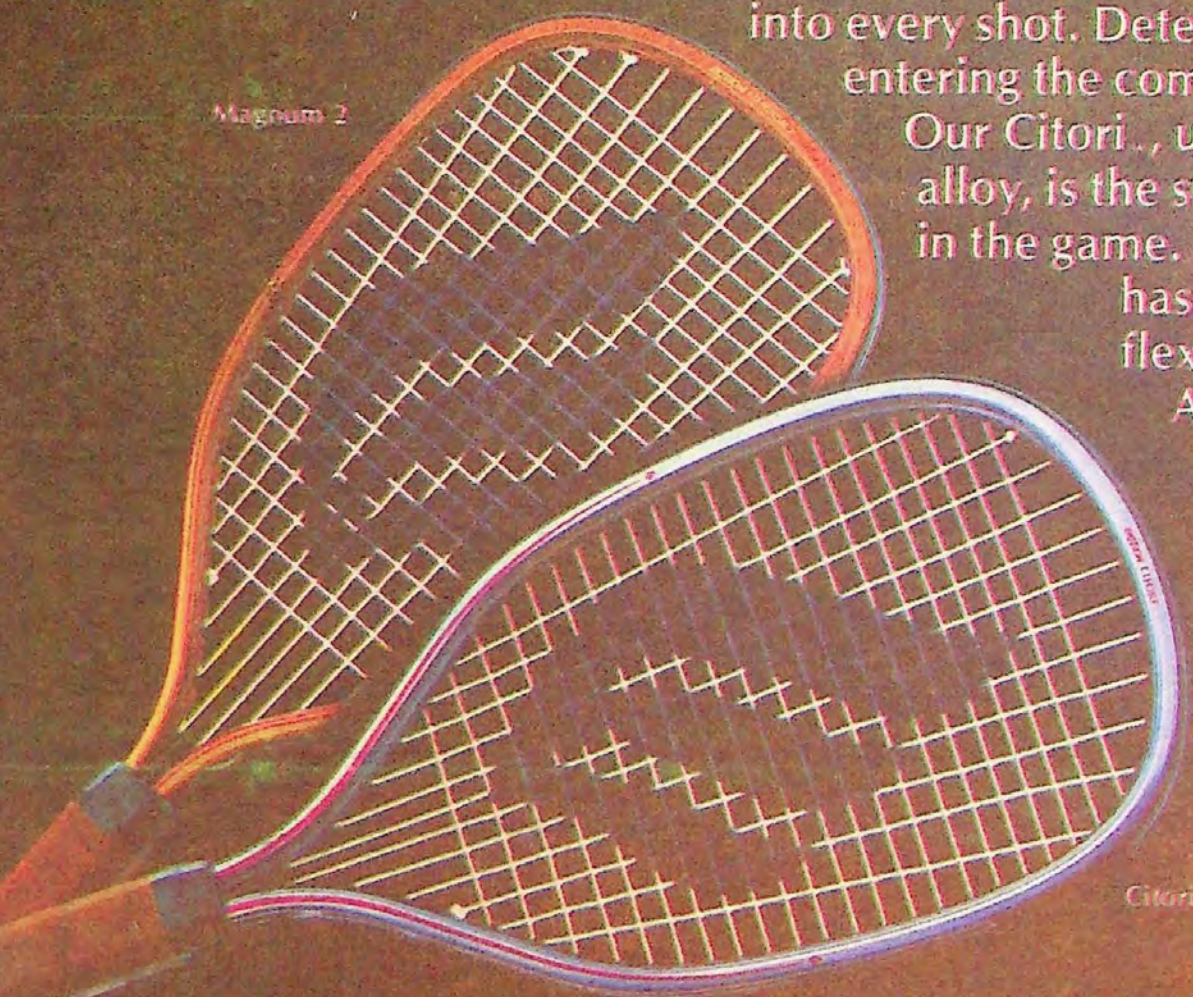
