The World Is One Family All Humankind Are **Brothers And Sisters**

Sport Is A Universal Language

This was the philosophy of the 1985 World Games II in London, England, July 25 through August 4. Sixteen hundred athletes from 53 countries competed in 23 sports ranging from tug-o-war to korfball to casting to sambo wrestling . . . to racquetball.

Yes, even a relatively new sport like racquetball can gain international recognition via the World Games. It was conceived as an alternative to the Olympics, based on philosphies of international comraderie rather than competition, and dedicated to developing sports which are currently excluded from the Olympics.

The World Games "is not a nationalistic event. It is not intended to be," according to Ryoichi Susakawa, Patron and Honorable Chairperson of WGII. "Competitors will march together by sport, not country. Naturally, they will care about winning, but I hope that the pleasure of participating will be just as important to them."

The racquetball competition was a prime example of Susakawa's philosophy. The action on the courts at David Lloyd's Slazenger Racquet Club was only background to the real action off the court. Due to budget restrictions of the WG Committee which provided housing at Holloway College, t-shirts, and some meals, plus promotion and advertising, the number of racquetball players was restricted to 40. Even with

coaches, referees, and officials, it was a very small, tight-knit tournament one family speaking the universal language of racquetball.

Speaking of languages, that's probably the first hint that this was no ordinary tournament. The King's English definitely had the home court advantage, but 11 of the 40 players were Spanish speakers from Latin America - 12 if you count Willie Rodriguez from Puerto Rico. Other players spoke Japanese. French, German, or Dutch, and a lucky few were multi-lingual, like Marijke Hillen (Belgium), who teaches English, German, Flemish and French, plus gets by in Spanish as well.

This was not the first multi-national racquetball tournament. Europe just held its 3rd Annual European Championship on June 28-30 in Antwerp. Belgium. Costa Rica hosted its third Torneo de la Raza for all the Americas last October. The IARF crowned Ross Harvey (Canada) and Mary Dee (USA) World Champions in Sacramento, CA, last year. But it was only as far back as July 1981 at the WG I in Santa Clara, CA, that all this international stuff began. At that time, just six countries — U.S.A., Japan Mexico, Holland, Ireland, and Germany, watched as Cindy Baxter (USA) and Ed Andrews (USA) earned the gold.

So, right from the start WG II promised to be exciting with current world champs Dee and Harvey, defending WG gold medalists Andrews and Baxter, and newly crowned European champi-



An American Master Reports On Her Experiences In Toronto

When the published material on the Master Games came in my mailbox, I held my breath. My eyes scanned down the list of the 22 sports that were to participate in the first Masters Games 0386 Toronto, Canada. Yes! Racquetball

ons Arno Mooyman (Holland) and Mirjam Wielheesen (Holland) all in the lineup for competition.

The WG publicity department did an admirable job of promoting racquetball throughout the world. According to press officer Fiona Dickson, British telly followed the action every evening, with racquetball airing twice. T.V. coverage of WG II will also air in 38 countries, including cable CBN in the U.S. So, eventhough only a handful of spectators bought tickets to watch it live in London, people all around the world will be able to get a glimpse of the action via television shortly after it happened.

Okay, what did happen? Well, the U.S.A. and Canada hoarded all the medals for themselves, as expected. while Europe, Latin America, and Japan all battled to be the best of the rest. Since Europe has the oldest courts, it should have the advantage, but Latin America insists that numero dos tries harder and Japan is making up for lost time by building courts and promoting the sport at record speeds.

In order to evaluate which developing region is developing fastest. it's helpful to separate the boys from the girls. The U.S.A. and Canada carry strong teams of either sex (the U.S.A. won 1st and 4th in the women's, and 1st and 3rd in the men's, while Canada won 2nd and 3rd in the women's and 2nd and 4th in the men's), but most of the other re-

gions have only a men's or a women's team. Latin America, with the exception of Costa Rica, is a perfect example. Their men's teams are excelante while their women's teams are practically non-existent. In WG II, the fifth through eighth places in the men's division went to Latinos, while the Latinas didn't place at all.

Club owner and Mexican team coach. Enrique Villagran, has only recently become involved with the Mexican Racquetball Federation and he's very disappointed with the situation of women's racquetball. Said Villagran. "Too many of our clubs only cater to men, while my club in Tijuana is for the whole family. Women's and junior's programs are curcial to the development of the sport."

Japan's men's team has been steadily increasing in caliber since the first WG in 1981, but the real surprise is the strength of their women. When the Japanese Racquetball Federation brought a full team of five men and no women to WG I, the explanation given by team captain Ken Ishiguro was limited funds, so it was decided (presumably by the men) that the women were't good enough to warrent the expense. Also, traditional Japanese families supposedly are afraid to let their daughters travel to the U.S.A. because they might get married and never return home. Thoses same traditional families would probably also disapprove of Yasuko Ohta and Emiko Kiuchi who race around the racquetball court in athletic shorts and work up a sweat as they hari-kari the ball,

Europe also figured out that women can be a great asset to the team. Without them. the Europeans would have been shut out of the top eight positions. But thanks to the Dutch and Irish women, Europe gained three positions on the scoreboard.

The European men did have one legitimate excuse for not placing in the top eight positions, anyway, particularly the two Dutchmen, current European champ Arno Mooyman, and former two-time European champ. Tony Luykx. These two normally pose a

threat to the Latinos and Japanese, but, due to construction delays of a new four-court facility in Brussels, Belgium, the European championships were post-poned a month.

"I was sick of racquetball. I didn't even want to be here," revealed Mooy-man. "We couldn't take a break (after the European Championships). We had to start training for this right away. I wouldn't say I would have won more matches, but I could have done better."

Ed Andrews, defending WG I gold medalist, also thought he could have done better against Roger Harripersad (Canada).

At 0-0 in the first game, I was sure I had him," laughed Andrews after his semi-finals loss to Harripersad, 15-7. 15-9. "But after that, I never felt I was in the game. He just kept hitting passes that were too low to take to the ceiling and too high to shoot." At least Ed got it together later and took third place away from Ross Harvey (Canada), 15-5, 15-

Harvey, unlike 19-year-old Harripersad, wasn't exactly having the tournament of his career. He was heard to mutter "Time to retire" after his semi-final loss to Andy Roberts (U.S.A.), 15-6. 15-12. Most likely, though, Harvey will come out of retirement to defend his World Champion title next summer on his home turf, Canada.

The final between Roberts and Harripersad was a bit anticlimatic after Harripersad's brillant performance in the semis. With the T.V. cameras rolling. Roberts did and efficient job of finishing up four days of racquetball with a 15-11, 15-10 win. However, Harriper-(Continued on page 3)



sad was pleased with the outcome, especially since he'd lost 15-12, 15-4 to Roberts in the WG qualifying tournament in Ecuador last year.

Andy used the same high lob against me that he did in Ecuador, but we had a fair game," summed up Harripersad whose parents had travelled to London to cheer him on. Both Harry and Joan Harripersad have been playing racquetball for seven years, just one year more than their son who is now ranked number one on Canada's pro tour.

Dee had also spent the week before the WG with Belgian friends whom she met at the World Racquetball Championships which she had won in Sacramento in July of 1984. Coincidentally, Belgians Ivan and Bodil Devos happened to be chiropractors as well as racquetball ensiasts. (Dee has had to sit out or be taken out of most of last season's WPRA pro stops due to back injuires.) But even with help from the Devos, Dee still had to settle for fourth place at WG II.

Roberts was another American who took advantage of the opportunity to travel in Europe. His parents were vacationing in Rome at the time, so armed with a one-month Eurail pass, Roberts set out after the tournament to join his parents and tour around a bit.

For the rest of the U.S. team, obligations at home afforded them only a week or so for the World Games, most of which was spent at the club or in the

dorms or travelling in-between the two. However, they were able to steal away for one afternoon of taking in the sights like thousands of other tourists. Typical of England, it rained most of the day, but that didn't stop our hearty representatives from patiently waiting outside Buckingham Palace for two hours hoping to witness the famous "changing of the guard". Unfortunately, the guards weren't such a hearty lot as the tourists that day and they elected to stay inside.



- maybe. Gigi, at age 16, who would be missing home, boys, rock concerts. boys, sweet 16 and boys, was hard to persuade to make the trip in my dandy Dodge Colt, but she relented.

Toronto, that beautiful city situated on Lake Ontario, staged three major celebrations in conjunction with the Games. On August 7th, the Opening Celebration was held and a "March of Athletes". The Mid-Games Jubilee was August 16th. The Closing Festival ended the event on August 25th. The racquetball tourney was held August 13-18, allowing us to attend the Mid-Games Jubilee along the beautiful lakefront recreational area. The Tournaments

Of course, the competition in the Masters required that you play against some of the best vetern players in the world. The racquetball player that commanded most of the media attention was Canada's own Heather McKay, naturally.

Heather won the final of the Women's 40+ racquetball competition in the manner in which she has been winning in racquetball and squash all her life brilliantly.

Playing effortlessly, she disposed of Nancy Katz from Pennsylvania in straight games, 15-3, 15-1.

'It was a fun match — a nice way to finish the Masters," said McKay whose brow wasn't even damp after the match. Her opponent, Katz, wasn't quite so relaxed and stressed that she is the U.S. "Amateur" over 40's champion and no match for a professional.

'Playing Heather is awesome," she said. "She's got every shot in the book. I didn't know where to cover. I just don't play at that level back home.

This was Heather's last match before she returns to her native Australia to help coach the next breed of down-under squash players, although she has already committed herself to the next Masters Games in Denmark in 1989.

In the men's 35+ final, Chuck Ealey, former football great from Canada, defeated Gul Khan from Colorado, 15-11, 14-15, 15-5.

In my event, I defeated Kathy Mueller from Minnisota, in two games, 15-6. 15-2. Kathy had won the 45+ title division at the AARA Nationals in Houston.

There were many recognizable competitors from the States that took their division titles. Ed Remen from Virginia took the Men's 40+ title by defeating Red Retter from New Jersey, 15-2, 15-6. and two other perennial champions took home medals from the Masters -Pat Colombo (NY) won the 50+ title and Earl Acuff (VA) won the 65+ title.

The Games were organized by sport, not by nation and I think that is the way international competition should be organized. I look forward to 1989 when the Masters rolls around again.







AARA CODE OF ETHICS

In keeping with the Constitution of the American Amateur Racquetball Association, the following Code of Ethics is hereby accepted as guide to stimulate the interest of people in healthy sport participation through racquetball.

The spirit of this Code of Ethics is to summarize principles of behavior all should be willing to impose upon themselves. As players we need to bring credit to the sport of racquetball in the eyes of spectators, media, sponsors, and other players.

Tennets of the Code of Ethics

1. Safety first.

Whenever possible, hold up your shot or movement rather than risk injury to your opponent.

2. Give your opponent the benefit of the doubt.

Play the rally over if you disagree. If in doubt of your shot, call it down or play it over. In tournaments, accept the decision of the referees and linejudges. Don't argue or en-

3. Offer a hinder whenever you obstruct your opponent's shot. Always attempt to clear your opponent's hitting lane.

4. Always call the score and serve before you begin to put the ball into play.

5. Know the official playing rules and abide by them always.

6. Play your best always and maintain countinuity of play.

Do not stall, sulk, complain, ridicule your opponent, yourself or the officials in the tournaments. Never make a mockery of your match whether winning or losing. Do not use any profanity or any loud or abusive language during the match.

7. Show up early for your match with proper attire and equipment. If time permits, allow your opponent to use the court alone for warming up upon request. Do not withdraw from a match or tournament except for illness, injury, or personal emergency. Try to play opponents of equal or higher caliber whenever possible. Sandbagging is not within the spirit of competi-

8. Be prepared and willing to referee or be a linejudge.

Learn to referee as quickly as possible and attend certification clinics whenever you can. Alway be willing to accept the responsibility of being a referee or linejudge when asked at a tournament.

9. Coaching should not take place except during outs or breaks. Do not interfere with or participate

in on-court matters as a spectator. 10. Win or lose in the spirit of good sportsmanship.
