

I found Tom Rall's article, "Racquetball in America" particularly interesting. He talks about how we should all quit complaining, be part of the solution rather than the problem, work with our state organizations, etc., etc. He


mentions those who say "You know I don't see any new young people playing", rather than working to get young people playing. These are all good ideas and I agree with them. But, Tom, you still won't see much about young people playing in Racquetball Magazine.



Ektelon USRA 35th National Doubles

Northwest Athletic Club, Brooklyn Center, MN October 2-6, 2002

Converging upon the beautiful Northwest Athletic Club facility in suburban Minneapolis, 566 players competed in the Ektelon 35th National Doubles. The club's 12 courts saw a lot of impressive doubles action from Wednesday morning through late Sunday afternoon.

When not refereeing (non-winners must referee or forfeit further competition), the indoor pool, cardio and weight rooms, and a great pro shop were available for the use of all participants. The club boasts tennis as well, but funny thing, I didn't see a single racquetball player taking advantage of that particular amenity.

The upside of this year's competition (although we did yearn a bit for Vegas) was that the entire tournament was played in one facility; hotels were 5-10 minutes' drive from the club; and it's only 7 hours' or so drive time from the Chicago area (I heard Bob Croft made it in under 6). You definitely do need transportation since there was no shuttle service provided. I guess that's a way to get to know more people as you're begging rides back and

forth. Next year National Doubles will again be held in Minneapolis. Perhaps the USRA will consider providing shuttles and enhancing their hospitality...

This constructive input notwithstanding, it was a fun and well-run tournament, with plenty of opportunity to watch killer racquetball, renew acquaintances and meet lots of great people.

Illinois players (7 women and 7 men) paired up both with fellow Illinoisans and out-of-state players to form 20 teams in 17 divisions. Each player was allowed to enter up to three divisions (with at least one of the divisions Mixed). Although four fewer Illinois players participated this year than last, Team Illinois brought home 11

medals compared with 7 in 2001!

The Avoidable Hinder

What exactly is an avoidable hinder? Many players don't have an understanding of the avoidable hinder rule. Other players feel that since most of these things are not intentional, they will just play the rally over. Most of the time, at the club on a Saturday morning, the call will be a "hinder and let's play it over"; there's usually mutual agreement between individuals on how the game will be played during pickup games. But tournament play is a different story. The avoidable hinder call should be enforced and the ref has the ultimate decision on the call. There are 9 possible avoidable hinder calls that are listed in the Racquetball Rulebook:

Failure to Move - A player cannot take away the offensive player's shot straight to the front wall (1) or a cross court shot (2) that would end up in the far back corner, farthest away from the player hitting the ball.

(1) An example of taking away a straight on shot to the wall is when a player dives and hits the ball back at himself. The opponent is standing waiting for the shot, but holds up due to the fact that contacting the ball will inevitably hit the player lying on the ground. In doubles, when the server hits the serve to the side wall his partner is standing against, an avoidable hinder can be called if the partner does not move off the wall. This must be an offensive shot that is being taken away. When the returnee has to go to the ceiling instead of driving the ball and hitting his opponent, an avoidable hinder can be called.

(2) An example of taking away the crosscourt pass is when a server puts the ball into a corner and backs up into that particular line. If in judgment, the ref believes the ball would have been a good pass if not hitting the server, an avoidable hinder can be called. Another failure to move avoidable hinder is when the ball is rebounding off the back wall. The offensive player runs into the opponent who has taken up center court. An offensive shot has been taken away from that player. This constitutes an avoidable hinder.

Stroke interference - This occurs when a player moves or fails to move, so his opponent does not have a free swing at the ball. Taking away a player's offensive shot or getting hit on the backswing (or swing before contact), either intentionally or unintentionally, are two examples of stroke interference.

Blocking - Players are not allowed to block other players from getting to or returning balls. In doubles, a player may not move himself in front of an opponent while his partner is taking his shot. This takes away that player's chance to return a ball.

Moving Into The Ball - A player is not allowed to move himself into the flight of the ball and be hit by that ball. First of all, it takes away from the possibility of the opponent scoring on a good shot. Second, it hurts...these are two good reasons why you should not move into the flight of the ball.

Pushing - It is against the rules to deliberately push or shove your opponent during a rally. This usually occurs during a doubles match where two individuals are trying to keep center court position. Remember that planting yourself in center court can be dangerous. In doubles, it is very important to keep your body moving, so you can get the best possible positioning without getting in the way of others. This should not be a sumo match.

Intentional distractions - You may not deliberately shout, stamp your feet, wave your racquet, or in any other manner disrupt your opponent while it is her turn to hit the ball. You may talk to your partner in doubles when it is your turn to take the shot.

View obstruction - When your opponent is about ready to take the shot, you may not run in their line of vision. This is deemed a

distraction and can be called an avoidable hinder.

Wetting the Ball - It is the job of the server to insure that the ball is not wet when serving the ball. If they serve the ball when the ball is wet, and it is to the server's advantage (sliding drive serve), an avoidable hinder may be called.

Apparel or Equipment Loss - How many times do you see a player lose his glasses, a shock absorber, or a hat during play? Once a player loses apparel or equipment, play should be stopped and an avoidable hinder should be called. There is an exception to this rule: if the player hits an unretreivable shot, and he then

loses something, the shot will be considered good. If the loss of equipment is caused by an opponent, a dead ball hinder may be called unless the act is considered avoidable.

Many matches are fast paced, and in most instances, the avoidable hinder call is the toughest call to make. It's in your best interest as a player and a ref to have an understanding of what can be called an avoidable hinder. Remember, it doesn't have to be intentional to be called.

The National Rules Committee defines its interpretation as follows: "If the shot that was taken away most likely would have ended the rally, then an avoidable hinder should be called." Consider all the elements of the situation (e.g., skill level, players' abilities, singles, doubles, etc.) when deciding if a shot "most likely" would have ended the rally.

A couple of final thoughts:

Having good court sense (where to be on the court) will help everybody in the long run.

And don't whine if you don't get the avoidable call you wanted...make your, case quickly and politely, then get back to the game!

It's All in Your Be A

Here's a challenge to all ISRA Members:

- Sponsor ONE NEW player to the sport of racquetball this year. Any age.
- Take him/her to your court... and teach the game. Stay with them until they can join a league on their own.
- Just think how good you'll feel when each of us sponsors the players of tomorrow!


