**THUMBS UP** — Laurels to The Racquet Ball and its staff. Virtually everyone is tournament oriented. . . Laurels to Orlando juniors Leslie Oddy and Zoe Kavanaugh. They barter their entry fee in exchange for working at the tournament. They can do it all — from cutting oranges to manning the desk and taking verbal abuse from impatient players. . . Laurels to Diversified Products and its involvement with the AARA. The firm will certainly benefit from its association with the amateur organization. . . Laurels to players who don't fly off the handle when they are given a wrong starting time and show up early. Folks, mistakes happen — especially when 70 percent of the entries are received at the last minute.

**THUMBS DOWN** — Darts to players who bad-mouth tournament directors just because they might have had one bad experience. . . Darts to club managers who take "darts" personally instead of as constructive criticism. Lord knows, we get criticized plenty. . . Darts to tournament players who have to be badgered before they'll pay their entry fee.

**PERSONAL ATTENTION** — Several of the state's top players in South Florida, including Mitch Campbell, Sergio Gonzalez, Freddie Calabrese, Oscar Gonzalez, Tim Hansen, Michael Altman and Mary Holroyd, will be receiving personal attention from Steve Strandemo, the nation's top instructor. Strandemo acknowledges the group is among the nation's top amateurs and some special attention to detail will enable them to reach the next plateau.

**THINKING AHEAD** — Omega 40 general manager Mike Phillips has everyone on his staff trained to give CPR and feels all racquetball and fitness clubs should follow his example. "Your local Red Cross can train everyone in three to four hours. All you have to purchase are the manuals. You never know when you'll have to use CPR," Phillips said.

**DON'T TURN AROUND** — Miami's Oscar Gonzalez has learned it doesn't pay to turn your back. While his opponent was serving, Oscar thought someone opened the door and turned around to fix it. His opponent served an ace and tied the game at 14. However, justice prevailed. Oscar got back the serve and won the match.

Sergio, who dominated last year, was taken to a tiebreaker in the first round by Orlando's Al Caballero and players say he doesn't have the intensity he had last year.

## Yellen, Hogan fight for top spot

# Title on line in Atlanta

**ATLANTA** — It's the epitome of sports. It's the photofinish of a Kentucky Derby. It's the 15th round of a heavyweight title fight with the two boxers tied.

The \$110,000 DP Nationals at the Atlanta Sporting Club June 11-17, will determine who will be ranked first on the men's pro tour for 1984. Mike Yellen, last year's No. 1 ranked player and racquetball legend Marty Hogan are currently tied with 87 points.

This hasn't been the best of years for either Yellen or the men's pro tour. Yellen wasn't able to cash in on his No. 1 ranking because there were only a few pro events this season. A major sponsor never surfaced and Yellen has been giving more exhibitions and clinics than in past years.

Last month at the Ektelon Championships, Yellen was upset in the first round by 17-year-old David Gross of St. Louis, Mo., thus costing him dearly in the rankings and forcing him to win the DP tournament to secure the No. 1 ranking.

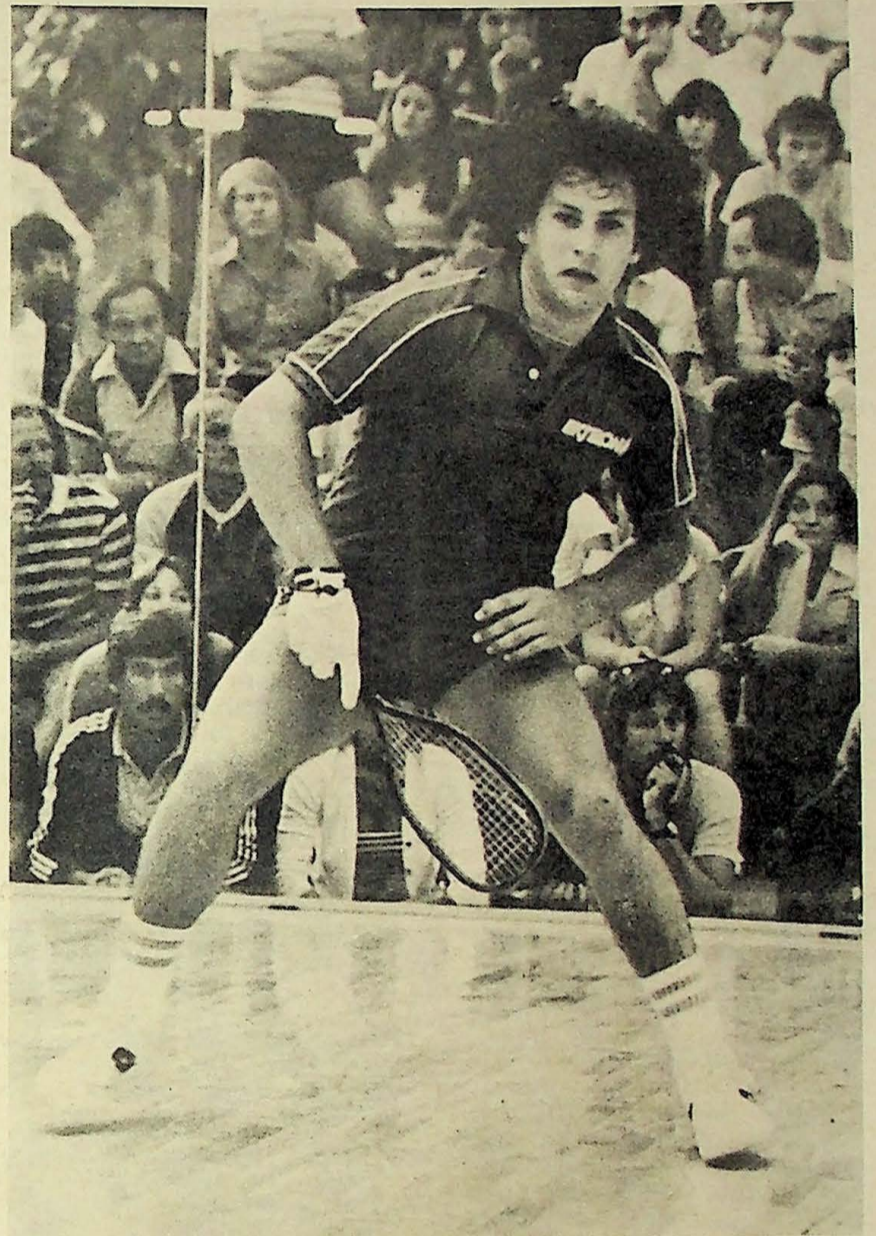
"I handled the loss real well. It was not the highlight of my career," Yellen said. "No one is going to play top level ball all the time and the situation got the best of me. It's happening to all of us now. If you look at my track record over the last eight years, I've bombed out fewer times than any other professional. You can't give up and quit."

Having played only a few tournaments, Yellen said it has been tougher keeping a stringent training schedule. "You can burn yourself out if you don't see rewards for all your work. It's just like an office job. You need something to get motivated." And the motivation for Yellen is a tournament every two to three weeks -- not two to three months.

"When I lost in the Ektelon tournament I wasn't tournament hardened, but I have two tournaments under my belt and I'm ready for the Atlanta tournament," Yellen said. "I'm in a pretty good frame of mind. I'm certainly going to put out 100 percent. My workouts have been harder lately."

Yellen has spent most of the year making promotional appearances and so has his counterpart, Hogan. Hogan has been travelling the nation promoting his new company, Hogan Racquetball, a division of Pro Kennex.

Yellen and Hogan will be challenged by one of the best fields ever put together. Third-ranked Dave Peck, who held the

## Yellen to give clinic in Melbourne

**MELBOURNE** -- Mike Yellen, the world's No. 1-ranked player, will give a clinic and play an exhibition at the National Realty/Florida Racquet Journal Summer Challenge June 30-July 1 at the Harbour Pines Racquet Club in Melbourne.

"Part of our responsibility in running racquetball tournaments is to expose racquetballers to the best in the world," said Florida Racquet Journal Publisher Norm Blum. "Yellen is not only ranked first but he's one of the more personable athletes in sports today and the racquetball community should enjoy it."

The exhibition and clinic are free to all tournament players. See page three for a tournament application.

No. 1 ranking two years ago, appears to be recovered from a series of leg operations and DP's Bret Harnett, winner of the Ektelon Championship, is beginning to realize his potential.

Florida's top players are also capable of cracking into the elite group. Miami's Sergio Gonzalez, who has been struggling lately, has defeated sixth-ranked Ruben Gonzalez and 13th-ranked Rich Wagner with relative ease during the past year. Last year Sergio lost to Harnett in the first round.

Fort Lauderdale's Freddie Calabrese and Mitch Campbell along with Tim Hansen of West Palm Beach, are also serious threats.

The field will be battling for the largest purse of the year. The first-place winner receives \$16,600 with the runner-up receiving \$5,500.

For the first time, the women pros are also competing in the DP Nationals. Heather McKay and Lynn Adams, ranked first and second respectively, are expected to meet in the final.

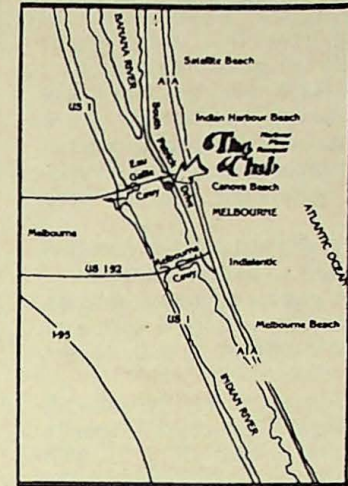

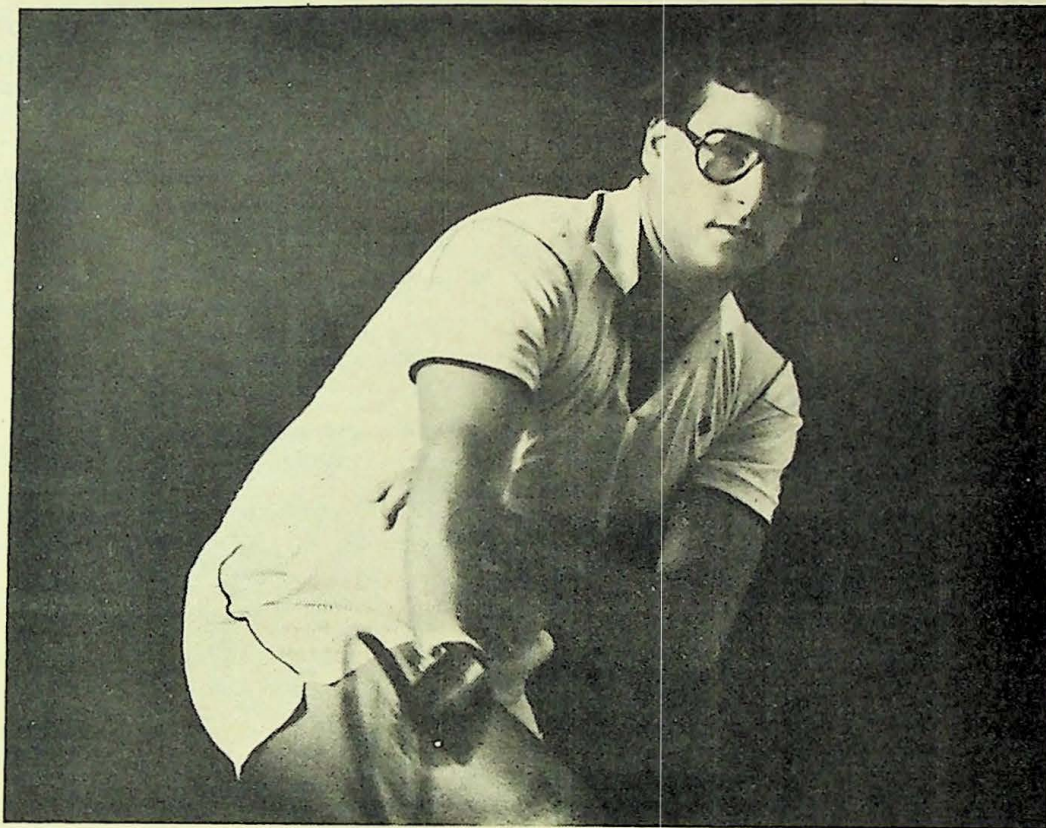

# Splat shot can help your game

A new offensive weapon is making its mark on racquetball in a big way — the SPLAT!

Actually, I'd guess that Marty Hogan has been hitting the splat, with great success, for quite some time now. But it has only been in the last two to three years that the shot has been widely embraced in the pro circles, probably because previously none of us quite knew what we were dealing with.

The splat is really just another variation of the pinch shot — a sidewall-frontwall combination. A typical pinch will first hit the sidewall anywhere from a couple of inches from the frontwall, up to three feet back.

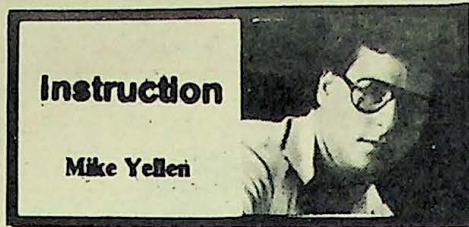
By contrast, the splat hits the sidewall from much deeper in the court — usually 20 to 38 feet back. A splat also is hit with more power and more directly into the sidewall, causing the ball to pick up a good spin. That spin helps carry the ball to the frontwall with greater velocity, and then seems to cause the ball to jump a little toward the opposite wall.

Though its name sounds like something akin to the glob from an old science fiction movie, don't let the splat deceive you. The effect is a hard-hitting, spinning ball that from the sidewall shoots low to the floor, hits the frontwall with the intensity of a kill, and then ricochets to the opposite side of the court. Usually unanswered. SPLAT!

And that's nothing to cheer about if you're on the receiving end still trying to figure out what's just happened.

I'm a firm believer in using a variety of shots — not just the one you use best or feel most comfortable with. The splat is an effective weapon that can multiply your options against any opponent.

I first started experimenting with the



shot two, maybe two-and-a-half years ago. A number of players were working the splat with great success and I really felt it was one shot I was having particular difficulties with. The added dimension that the splat gave to my opponent's offensive strategy made all the difference in many matches that I should have easily won. And eventually I had enough. It was time to try the splat.

It's difficult to give specific techniques on the splat because there are numerous subtleties to the shot that will vary according to each player's swing. But when you drill for the splat, concentrate on hitting the ball harder into the sidewall than you would for a typical pinch. From the back of the court, work at placing the ball 20 to 38 feet back on the sidewall, keeping it low and close to the floor.

To get the proper spin I found that I had to make a minor change in my swing that ultimately effected a change in my wrist snap. It also helped to open up the face of my racquet just a little and slice the ball slightly. Experiment with it. Soon you'll get a feel for the shot and will begin using the spin to suit your style.

Keep in mind also that you need to work the shot both backhand and forehand during practice sessions so that your splat doesn't become predicatable to your opponent.

The one drawback of the shot is that certain types of balls can simply deaden its effect. You want to choose a ball that will have a natural tendency to stay low to the floor — right where you want it to be. If the ball carries too high, you'll lose much of the momentum of the shot. But if the ball stays low on its flight from the sidewall to the front of the court, you'll

have a perfect low impact on the frontwall for an effective splat.

Just being aware of the splat is a tremendous advantage. If you can recognize the shot and recognize also that you're a sucker for it, eventually you'll get so fed up with losing matches that executing a perfect splat will be high on your list of priorities for the season.

B & R's juniors captured six first-place trophies, while the PRP group managed to snag a first, a second and two third places.

Luck seems to have been with Schmidt's group that weekend — even off of the courts. The group volunteered to give up their airline seats when the flight was overbooked, delaying the trip home by about three hours. Thanks to the group's good sportsmanship, Piedmont Airlines came up with ten complimentary round-trip tickets to the Junior National Championships in Davison, Mich., June 23-27.

Other Florida juniors with standout per-

formances at Wilson included Rob Kulp, Steve Hall and Nicky and John Xynidis.

The strong Southeast Florida contingent of juniors did not participate in the regionals, but will definitely be a factor in Florida's team strength at the Nationals. Such players as Mitch Campbell, James Lorello, the Afford girls, Oscar Gonzalez and Mike Altman are yet to be reckoned with.

# Schwartz takes Ektelon title

SAN DIEGO, CALIF. — Jay Schwartz' time finally came. The Pensacola stand-out, who qualified for the Ektelon Championship in four previous years, won the Ektelon amateur National Championships for the first time last month. Schwartz had competed in three finals before this year's title and had to endure three tough games with five-time national doubles champion Stan Wright. Schwartz defeated Wright by the scores of 11-15, 15-4, 15-14 to take the Men's Veteran's Championship and the \$1,000 prize.

Miami's Bubba Gautier lost to finalist Cliff Swain in the open division and Fort Lauderdale's Tom Rothstein lost in the 30+ division.

As has been the case in previous Ektelon Championships, upsets played a major role in determining this sport's national champions.

This year certainly followed the same pattern of problems for some of the top seeded entrants. Bad luck touched three of the tournament's top competitors as early as the first round of play.

Bret Harnett, 19, claimed his first Ektelon Championship by defeating the senior member of the men's circuit, Jerry Hilecher, 30.

In the women's division, Heather McKay defeated defending national champion Lynn Adams to gain her third straight Ektelon Championships title.

Mike Yellen, defending national champion and defending Ektelon Championships winner, was eliminated in the round of 32. Yellen's surprising loss was to up-and-coming David Gross.

Gross, 17, from St. Louis, Missouri, an unseeded right-hander, defeated the champion by the scores of 11-8, 5-11, 11-5, 11-6, to move into the round of 16. Gross was eliminated in the next round by Brian Hawkes of Fountain Valley, Calif., in three straight games.

Also in the first round in 1984, second-place finisher in the 1983 Ektelon Championships, Rich Wagner, eliminated himself with an injury forfeit. So after round one, the battle was on to see who would be the new set of finalists for 1984.

First-round action for the women also didn't end as planned. Fifth-seeded Laura Martino, from El Paso, Tex., and a finalist last year, was defeated by Jennifer Harding. Harding, from Milwaukie, Ore., fought with Martino for five exciting games. Harding eventually was victorious, winning in the tiebreaker game by the score of 15-13.

Though upsets throughout the tournament marred play for some of the seeded players, this wasn't the case for top-ranked McKay and fourth-seeded Harnett.

Harnett, of Las Vegas, Nev., claimed the Ektelon Championship by defeating Hilecher.

Hilecher, of St. Louis, Mo., took the youngster to five games in the final match. In the fifth and deciding game, Hilecher took an early 3-1 advantage. Harnett rallied for four straight points to lead 5-3. After Hilecher responded by taking the lead 8-6, Harnett came back to score the game's remaining five points to defeat Hilecher 11-8 in the fifth game.

"It's such a great feeling to win my first Ektelon Championship. It seems like I always have poor performances here," said Harnett, who defeated Hilecher by the scores of 11-4, 10-11, 11-6, 3-11, 11-8. Harnett's victory was worth \$10,000, while Hilecher picked up \$3,100 for second-place money.

This was the first major circuit victory for Harnett since 1982 when he claimed the Hawaii title. To get to the finals, Harnett defeated Peter Britos 6-11, 11-1, 11-4, 6-11, 11-5; Andy Gross 11-9, 9-11, 11-4, 11-4; and Gregg Peck 11-9, 11-4, 11-10. Harnett defeated top-seeded Marty Hogan in the semifinals by the scores of 7-11, 11-4, 8-11, 11-6, 11-5. In the deciding fifth game, Harnett scored six unanswered points to take a 10-4 lead. The key in his defeat of the 1981 Ektelon Championship winner was his wicked first serves.

Seventh-seeded Hilecher also scored an upset to reach this year's final. In the semifinals, he defeated third-seeded Dave

Peck, a two-time winner of this tournament in 1980 and 1982. Hilecher and Peck also went to the five-game limit in a highly emotional match. In the deciding fifth game, Hilecher was never out of the lead, scoring an easy 11-3 win and earning his third trip to the finals.

No stranger to the word finals is the 42-year-old McKay, from Toronto, Canada. She defeated defending national champion Lynn Adams in the finals by the scores of 19-21, 22-20, 21-13, 21-16.

In the past 23 tournaments McKay has entered, she has been in the finals an amazing 21 times. The other two performances she was defeated in the semifinals. Both McKay and Adams are quite familiar with each other on the court. Since 1982 they have met a total of 19 times, each time it has been in the finals of a tournament. Adams, however, continues to hold the advantage over McKay with 11 tournament wins.

"My game always seems to be in great shape when I play in the Ektelon Championships," explained McKay, who earned \$7,000 for her victory. Adams, who was in

her second final in the last three years, took home second-place money worth \$3,000.

McKay reached the finals by defeating Val Pease 21-5, 21-5, 21-5, Liz Alvarado 21-12, 21-12, 21-10, Caryn McKinney 21-7, 21-17, 21-15, and third-seeded Shannon Wright Hamilton in the semifinals by the scores of 16-21, 21-16, 21-17, 21-17.

In the five tournaments Heather has entered so far this season, she has claimed three titles at Auburn, Bangor and the Ektelon Championships.

Adams, who has won 15 tournaments over the last three years, also has three wins to her credit during the 1983-84 tour with victories at Atlanta, Plymouth and Seattle professional stops.

In a prelude to the men's and women's professional finals, the three amateur national championships were decided on the center courts at the Sports Gallery in Anaheim, Calif.

In the Men's Open Division, Jim Cascio, from Lancaster, Pa., was victorious over Cliff Swain, of Braintree, Mass. Cascio, 20, who claimed his first title in 1984, has com-

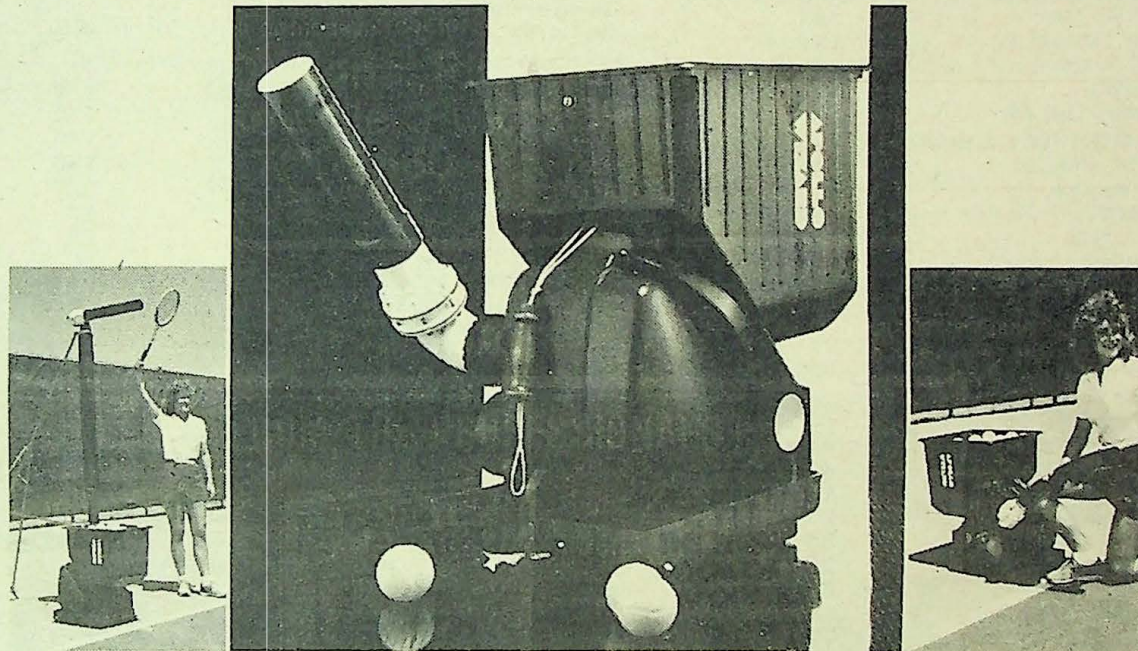
peted in the Ektelon Championships the past four years. His play was flawless, going through the entire tournament without losing one game. In the finals, he defeated Swain by the scores of 15-7, 15-7 to take the Men's Open Championships and receive the \$1,000 check.

Marci Drexler, 18, from North Hollywood, Calif., also won her first Ektelon Championships title this year. After three attempts at the crown in previous years, she took home the winner's trophy by defeating Cindy Baxter, 29, from Lewiston, Pa. The scores in this exciting three-game final were 14-15, 15-7, 15-11. Drexler took home the \$1,000 cash award for claiming the Women's Open Division.

As has been the case in previous Ektelon Championships, the upsets were as frequent as the competition was exciting. With the losses of Yellen, Peck and Hogan earlier than planned, it made this year's event an unpredictable finish.

A first-hand look at the women's and men's Ektelon Championships finals will once again be televised by ESPN. The event will be telecast on Sunday, June 24, beginning at 1:00 p.m.
