WALK OFF -- His female friend applauded him midway through his match when he made an excellent get. But she was just a fair weather fan. Moments later he missed an easy setup and she admonished him. She kept riding him, hurling verbal barbs most referees never hear. Finally, the player, tired of such abuse, called a timeout and started shouting back. The end result -- he tossed his racquet in the bag and left the club.

WHO MADE THAT CALL -- Technology has hit the racquetball courts. In Memphis Tenn., they've introduced electronics to racquetball. Usually linesmen signal whether they agree with a call with a thumbs up or thumbs down. The player usually gives the linesman who disagrees with him an ugly stare. No more. Each linesman is given an electronic box and pushes a button. This signal is relayed to the ref and the player has no idea which linesman to go after.

GIVE US A BREAK -- In pro matches a common scene that occurs is the appeal procedure. After almost every point, a player appeals the call and a match often takes hours. "People think we complain a lot, but you have to remember there's money on the line. When the ref can't see anything, it's hard to accept the call matter-of-factly" one pro explained.

TIP OF THE MONTH -- Mike Yellen, the world's No. 1 player the past two years, offers this bit of advice for C players who often face the prospect of playing five or more matches if they reach the finals of a tournament. "You should prepare harder in your workout than what you'll need for the tournament. You can't work out for a C division by playing one match a day for a few days. You should play two or three consecutive matches to prepare yourself for the grueling time ahead." And on the subject of nerves, which many players say is their undoing come tournament time: "Again, it goes back to the workout. If you concentrate 100 percent during your workout, you'll be more efficient."

POTPOURRI -- Big brouhaha going on between DP and AMF Head. See page four for details on the battle between these two racquetball giants. . . Ray upsets Ruben

Morrison reaches semis

MELBOURNE -- Mark Morrison tried to put down his racquet but couldn't.

Morrison, who quit playing for four months, recently resumed playing and was the surprise of the tournament in the \$2,300 National Realty/Tom Sawyer's Auto Corner Cash Classic at the Harbour Pines Racquet Club last month.

The tournament, presented by the Florida Racquet Journal, attracted some of the top name players around the nation, but Morrison and the Florida contingent proved they can compete on that level.

Morrison reached the semi-finals before losing to eventual winner Mike Ray of Atlanta, who upset top seeded Ruben Gonzalez, the sixth-ranked player in the world.

But it was Morrison's performance that attracted the most attention.

Last May Morrison stopped playing after failing to defend his National AARA 25+ title in Houston. He lost to someone he should have defeated and graciously packed away his racquet.

"I was tired of playing and going backwards. I didn't expect to lose so I quit about four months. I began playing again at the end of September. I guess it's just part of me."

Morrison won the \$300 first place prize at the Capitol Fitness Center in Tallahassee, the week before Melbourne, but none of the top players attended.

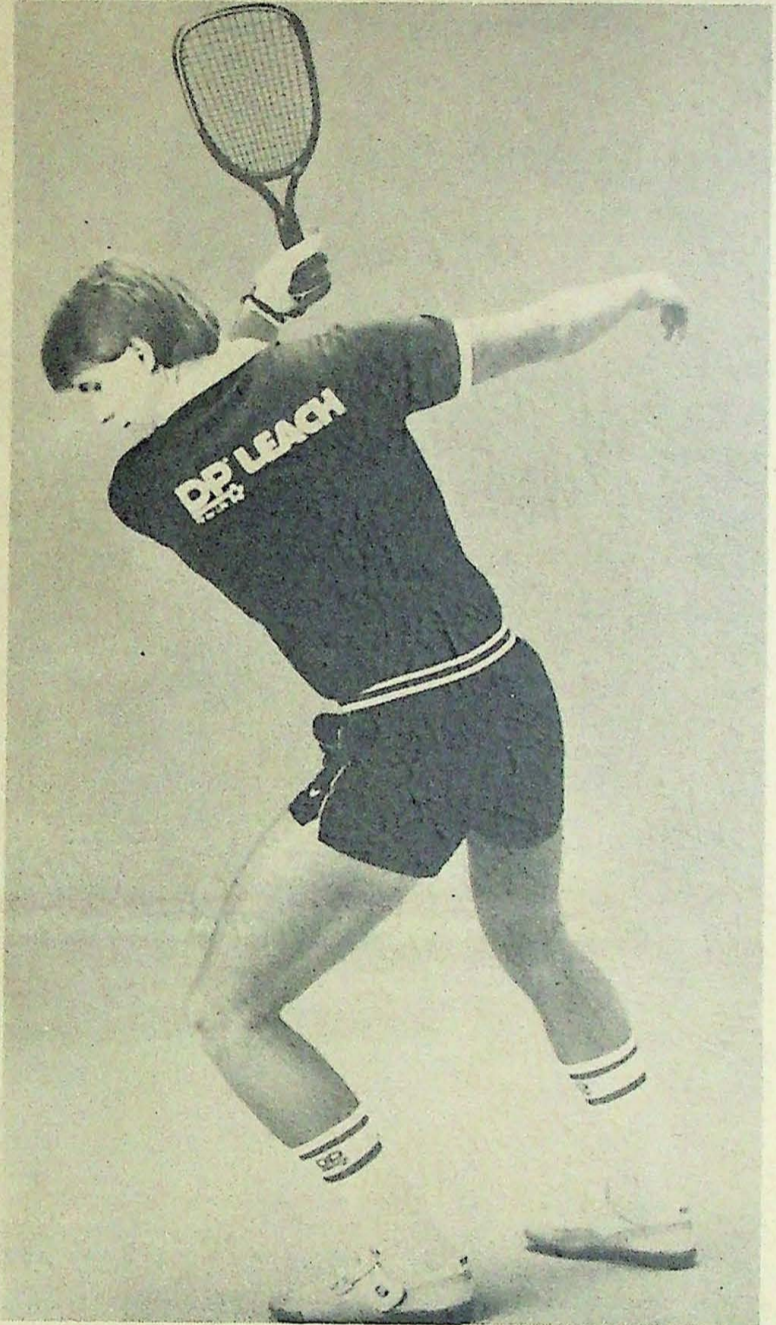
The field in Melbourne was so strong, Morrison wasn't even seeded among the top eight -- the first time that has ever happened in a Florida tournament. New York's Ruben Gonzalez was seeded first, followed by 14th-ranked Doug Cohen of St. Louis, David and Andy Gross of St. Louis, two up and coming superstars, Florida's top ranked players Tim Hansen and Sergio Gonzalez, Ray and the intercollegiate champ, Andy Roberts of Memphis.

Florida players Bubba Gautier and Mitch Campbell, who usually end up in the semis or finals of most Florida tournaments also were not seeded.

The draw was so tough, most first-round matches resembled finals of most tournaments.

Morrison drew Sergio Gonzalez in the first round and defeated him 15-11, 15-14. He then disposed of third-seeded Andy Gross 15-10, 15-12 before losing a heartbreaking 15-13, 15-10 decision to Ray.

The 25-year-old Morrison, who earned \$200 for his efforts, wasn't surprised by his showing. "I've been working out hard since I came back. Starting off

against Sergio is not the best person to start out against. I just happened to out run him at the end. People think he's lost it, but I know better. He has his mind on other things. He should be more aggressive. I hate to say that because next time he'll probably kick my ---."

Morrison's win over Gross, who gained national recognition when he defeated Mike Yellen, the world's No. 1 ranked player in the first round of the Ektelon Tournament, was relatively easy, 15-10, 15-12.

"I didn't know anything about him. I watched him five minutes. I thought he was an A player. It must have been a fluke that he beat Yellen. I didn't think he was tough at all."

In his semifinal match against Ray, Morrison held a 13-6 lead in the first game but ended up losing 15-13. "I wasn't fine tuned. Usually it doesn't upset me when I lose a big lead, but this time it did. I just wasn't playing good. Mike just played better than I did."

The 6-foot-3 Ray went on to defeat Gonzalez in two games

after the New Yorker defeated Hansen in his semifinal match. Ray earned \$1,000.

Ray almost didn't make it past the first round. He edged Campbell 14-15, 15-6, 11-9, defeated Cohen 5-15, 15-10 and 11-2 in the quarters before facing Morrison.

Gonzalez had an easier time of reaching the finals. He thumped Curtis Winter 15-6, 15-9, tossed aside Roberts 15-10, 15-7 and downed Hansen in two games before losing to Ray in the final.

"This was the first semi-pro tournament held in Florida and we thought it added a new dimension to the tournament atmosphere," said tournament promoter and Florida Racquet Journal publisher Norm Blum. "With the pro tour floundering we can attract some of the finer players around the nation. This event proved once again that racquetball is a spectator sport and eventually there will be an active pro tour. By gaining this experience, we hope to be part of that growth."

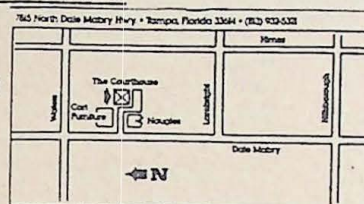

Racquet manufacturers battle

There's a confrontation in our sport of racquetball and it has nothing to do with who has the better splat shot or drive serve.

It's a battle between two racquet manufacturers -- AMF Head, based in Princeton, N.J. and Diversified Products -- located in Opelika, Ala. The two resemble a pair of heavy-weight fighters. Currently they're testing one another in the early rounds, but this bout promises to turn into an all-out brawl. Throw out the ref, toss out the rule book. This feature event will be a doozy. They'll sell ringside tickets and scalpers will be present when this corporate battle explodes.

Competing businesses are rarely great buddies and this situation is hardly any different.

A look at the background explains how this battle started. A couple of years ago the AARA approached the various racquet manufacturers, asking for sponsorship. They were turned down cold by everyone except Diversified Products, then called DP Leach. DP had just experienced a change in management and gladly signed a five-year contract with the AARA which made them the major sponsor of national and regional events.

DP had a lock on the major events and were pleased with the arrangement, figuring it would enable them to be a front runner in racquetball.

Aside from DP, Ektelon, although it wasn't associated with the AARA, was the only aggressive racquet

manufacturer. Head basically stayed on the sidelines and made little noise. That attitude changed last year when Mark Wentura, an aggressive and young executive, moved his way up the corporate ladder and was put in charge of racquetball.

Wentura was ready to make HEAD a leader in the industry and the energetic executive began making decisions. One of the first things he did was implement the Head Racquet Sports Tech and Training Van. The van was equipped with a video tape system, tape library, racquets, shirts and the driver could string racquets at the site.

Its purpose was to be a support vehicle for Head sponsored players and the van was assigned to the major racquetball events. The idea has been done in other sports.

At skiing events, whether it is sponsored by Rossignol or anyone else, companies have their vans on site to help out their skiers. The same holds true for racing. The van has a dual purpose. Not only is it a support vehicle, but it also attracts attention.

The Head Racquet Sports van was first introduced earlier this year at the AARA Junior Nationals in Davidson, MI. and then travelled to the AARA National Singles Championship in Houston, TX.

Diversified Products was incensed and the war between the two companies began.

"We showed our support for the AARA by spending a lot of money," said Reid Roney, DP's racquetball promotion manager. "It's very unethical for a competitor without spending a penny to even be there. They were giving away visors and t-shirts. They say they are supporting their players. That's a bunch of hogwash. People know what is going on. They aren't stupid. It's a cheap punch at the sponsors."

DP has made their position clear and informed the AARA that they don't want the van at events they sponsor. They don't care how it is done, but they want the van removed from the premises of the club. "A club owner or director has full control of that tournament," Roney said.

"Our AARA contract says there should be no competitors on the tournament site."

The confrontation almost came to a head at the AARA Southeastern Regional Doubles Championship at the end of September in Jacksonville. The HEAD van arrived in Jacksonville and promptly took the best parking spot in front of the club.

When DP representatives saw the van, they called the home office and were instructed to pull out the products and go home if the van wasn't moved.

Wentura, who has contacted the corporate lawyers over the issue, agreed to move the van across the

street. He could have opted to push the matter but felt the club manager was put in the middle and didn't want a confrontation at that point.

But the confrontation could come shortly.

"It's a shame DP is reacting the way they are," Wentura said. "Look at the Indy 500. Everyone has a tech van. It's part of the excitement of the sport. They are being negative because they don't have one."

Wentura never imagined DP's reaction would be so severe. "I'm surprised they are making a big fuss over the van. They are making more noise by complaining about it. It isn't in their best interest."

"We certainly won't be intimidated. The whole van concept is a takeoff on tennis. Head has done it for tennis the last two to three years. It's a service to our sponsored players and it enables them to relate to a manufacturer. We plan on taping matches and have one of our pros, like Steve Strandemo, Rich Wagner or Fran Davis in the van and reviewing the tapes."

The off the court fighting will intensify during the next several months. The more adamant DP gets about Head infringing on their sponsorship, the more often Head will arrive on the scene.

It's a classic fight between two giants of the industry.

And isn't it nice to know that such a keen interest is being taken in the sport of racquetball?

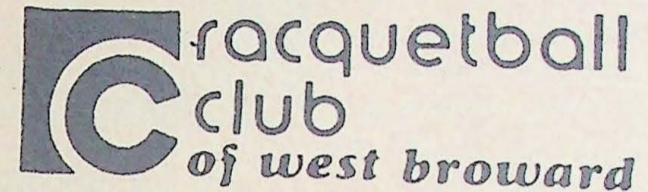

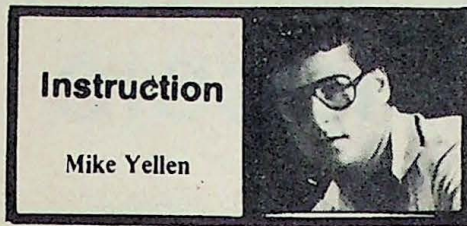
Yellen offers more tips

(Mike Yellen is the top-ranked men's professional racquetball player in the world. He has held this title for the past two years. He is a frequent contributor to the Florida Racquet Journal. He will be giving a clinic and exhibition December 14-16 in conjunction with a Florida Racquet Journal tournament at the Fort Walton Beach Athletic Club.

I love the drive shot. I love even more the look on my opponents face after I have executed a perfect drive shot; the jaw usually drops and a look of respect comes over their face. It's not like it happens all the time, but when it does, it's great.

There are two very successful types of drives and one less effective drive that you should know. The most consistently effective drive shot is the "hummer" which moves directly parallel to the side wall. The other effective drive is the cross court drive which hits the side wall three quarters of the way back and either bounces twice before hitting the back wall or else dies at the wall. Least effective, but occasionally



successful, is the screamer which comes directly back at your opponent so fast that he or she elicit nothing but a weak return.

There are many advantages to drive shots for players at all levels. Dictating aggressive racquetball, the drive will put your opponent off balance and will make difficult for him or her to build any kind of rhythm during the match.

To be specific, the good drive down-the-line or cross-court will make it impossible for your opponent to get a racquet on the ball, while a drive right at the other player standing close to the service line or mid-court will, hopefully, leave him startled and unable to recover in time for a return.

Concerning the down-the-wall and cross-court drives, these shots don't necessarily have to be play stoppers to be successful. An

alternative objective is to move your opponent out of position, thereby forcing a weak return to which you can choose another shot to kill or drive, pinch or roll out.

Now let's have a look at the mechanics of the drive. The most important element of good cross-court drive is the angle. It must be wide enough to prevent your opponent -- who should be near mid-court -- from cutting the shot off and blasting it back at you.

If the angle is even a bit too wide, the ball will rebound off the side wall too soon and hang far enough in the center of the court for access by your opponent. This will also be the case when the ball is hit too hard and too high, affording the other player a shot from the back wall.

Barring these mistakes, your drive should force your opponent out of center court enabling you to take this coveted position, and put him in the back court trying to hit a ball while he is moving away from the front wall.

A drive which reaches the back wall can also be effective by making your opponent run to back court only to find the ball dead and unplayable.

This is only true if the ball is not hit too high.

The same is true of a down-the-wall drive which is a little more difficult to execute because the wall tends to inhibit your stroke.

But then, your opponent will have the same problem with the ball on its rebound, perhaps worse if the ball is hit correctly. Then it's known as wallpaper.

However, if the ball bites at the side wall on a down-the-line shot, it may result in a plum for your opponent, for the ball will slow down and change direction and head for middle court. It is worthwhile here to stress again the importance of hitting the ball low. A high ball will certainly reach the back wall, giving your opponent the opportunity of making you the defender.

Of the two most effective drive shots, i.e., down-the-line and cross-court, the former is more difficult to execute precisely. This is because the side wall cannot be used to slow the ball down in its journey to back court. Therefore it is easier to miscalculate and find the ball coming back from the backwall.

The AARA has taken a step to eliminate all the controversy that goes with refereeing.

We're proud to announce a National Referee Certification Program. Please read the *Florida Racquet Journal* each month to keep up with the developments of this format.

This month we'll examine the objectives of the program.

The goals are as follows:

1) Standardize interpretation and enforcement of the Official Rules of

Racquetball.

Provide a formal program through which all racquetball enthusiasts have an opportunity to become competent referees and line judges, eliminating the shortage of competent officials at all tournaments.

Provide a system whereby racquetball officials may upgrade themselves.

Assure that all competitive matches are judged and played fairly.

A certification system has been

established to rectify the problems that exist in racquetball today.

Certification System

Individuals will be designated as Level I, Level II or Level III referees. Certification is good for four years.

Level I requires:

Membership in the AARA and or AARA-affiliated State Associations.

Experience:

A) Must have refereed 10 matches at an AARA sanctioned tournament. (Date and tournament must be attested to by tournament director.)

Written Examination: Receive 80 on referee test.

Match assessment: Receive 55 from two Level I referees, or one

Level III official (or any referee assigned by the state referee director) on a match assessment during a semifinal or finals match.

Wallet-size attest cards will be available at each clinic and tournament site. Completed cards must be sent to the state referee director. This information will be provided at the tournament site.
