# What a Ride!

A Fond Farewell from Doug Ganim

It was just over 27 years ago when I huddled in a room with Jim Hiser and Luke St. Onge to map out the vision for what we hoped would become the world's greatest racquetball tournament, the US OPEN Racquetball Championships. We went on to pull off the first event in 1996 at the beautiful Racquet Club of Memphis, Tennessee. The tournament featured a new made-for-TV portable Stadium racquetball court, live entertainment, laser light shows, booming player introductions, wildly fun evening parties, an Industry Trade Show, Players Village, hundreds of amateur players, the largest prize money purse in the sport, and all the best men and women pros in the world. The racquetball world would never be the same!




had to quit her own dynamic career because of the added travel demands for me. It was the only way we could raise our kids the way we wanted, so she made the sacrifice and never complained, supporting me in every possible way. In no uncertain terms, without her full support I would not have been able to take on this project and most likely there would never have been a US OPEN in racquetball. We all owe her a huge thank you.

Next I have to thank *all* the US OPEN Staff and Committee members who have worked for me all these years. Many of them have been involved for all or most of the US OPEN tournaments during the last 25 years. There are *way* too many to list here but I do want to mention Jim Hiser. He has been my right hand man and Assistant Director for the US OPEN since the beginning. And when I say the beginning, I mean the *very* beginning. When I first had the vision for the US OPEN Jim Hiser was the first person I called. I explained all the crazy ideas I had and we immediately set up meeting after meeting to brainstorm how he could help me pull this off. These meetings started a full two years before the first US OPEN took place in 1996. He jumped on airplanes and visited sites with me for possible host cities with facilities, encouraged me in every way, and rolled up his sleeves behind the scenes to do a lot of the detail work that was needed to make the tournament a reality. I truly don't think I would have been able to do it without him. I will never forget his unrelenting friendship and support.

As most of you know, this year marks the 25th Anniversary of the US OPEN and will be my last as the Executive Director of this incredible event. I am retiring so my wife and I can begin the next chapter of our lives together. The journey has been incredible and is filled with so many amazing memories. What a ride it has been!

I have so many people and organizations to thank that it would take a dozen pages to list them all, but I would remiss if I did not formally recognize some of the most important. First and foremost is my wife Mary Beth. When I started this project we had two young children at home. I was constantly traveling with my other jobs, and then I needed another 15 weeks a year on the road to make the US OPEN happen. She





**Familiar Faces!** Early on, top-ranked athletes took time to visit the St. Jude Children's Hospital in Memphis, bringing gifts and big smiles to help cheer up the little ones. The first big donation check presented to the hospital was \$11,560 and the cumulative total grew to top a half million dollars donated to select children's charities over the remaining years - all thanks to generous giving by US OPEN players, fans, and supporters. Well done!

I added up all the corporate and individual sponsorship support the US OPEN has enjoyed during the past 25 years and the total came to a whopping \$9.1 million. Again, *way* too many companies and people to list (over 600) but I do want to call out the Title Sponsors that led the fundraising charge ... Promus Hotel Corporation, Hilton Hotel Corporation, Choice Hotels International, and UnitedHealthcare. Just these four companies contributed over \$4 million of the total raised. I have been truly blessed to enjoy these amazing partnerships and many of the executives at these companies have become personal friends.

Lastly, I have to thank all the amateur/pro players and spectators that have attended the US OPEN over the past two and a half decades. You have come from every corner of the world to build the US OPEN into the greatest racquetball tournament in the world. Your energy - and sheer volume (!) - have never ceased to amaze me. It is really so many of *you* that have made the US OPEN what it is today, and I will forever be grateful.

After our 20th anniversary retrospective in 2015, we selected a few more of these old photos to share, including these from the very first US OPEN. I hope these images help you enjoy another quick trip down memory lane with me. In closing, it has been the honor of my life to serve as the Executive Director of the US OPEN and I am certain the folks at USA Racquetball will keep this event rolling forward for many years to come.



The first US OPEN was held November 13-17, 1996 and coverage in the Jan/Feb 1997 edition of RACQUETBALL Magazine was largely black-and-white. At the time, the magazine was published bimonthly, printed on 64 pages of glossy stock (plus cover!) but ... the USRA could only afford to run color on ad placements and limited interior pages, in very specific positions.

So, the first US OPEN was reported with a full page color lead-in featuring the photo below, plus headline and this intro:

**MAKING HISTORY ... It's not often that people get to fully experience a complete thought process from "spark" to finish.**

**More often, one person has the idea, someone else has the cash, another has the creativity, and an agency on the coast has the contacts. In an interesting turn of events, promoter Doug Ganim and Promus Hotel Corporation CEO Ray Schultz, the pro tours and the USRA staff found themselves headed down a comparable path that would literally change the face of the sport. The first Promus Hotel Corporation US OPEN Racquetball Championships, presented by American Express, brought together every bit of talent, on court and off, that could conceivably pull off an event of this magnitude. And the result? It seems that racquetball has gone big time ...**







# Men's Pro Tour Preview



**Conrado Moscoso's debut US OPEN final didn't seem to rattle Waselenchuk, who seemed intent on securing his 15th title victory.**



Every year, the UnitedHealthcare US OPEN offers racquetball fans the deepest draws, the widest international fields, and all-around best opportunity to see unpredictable results. The ante has been raised even more this year since players from around the globe are now itching to return to the sport's biggest stage. Working around pandemic spikes and venue lockdowns, the IRT has hosted only three events since March of 2020 (Atlanta in January 2021, Denver in August, and Chicago in September), with athletes facing competitive challenges like never before. The quality of play has been incredible as the pros work themselves back into top form ahead of the season's biggest event, so expect some fireworks this week.

Currently #1 in the world, Kane Waselenchuk will battle for his 16th US OPEN title, but the landscape of Men's pro racquetball has changed significantly since his last win. Bolivian phenom Conrrado Moscoso, who faced Kane in that 2019 final as a lowly #15 seed, comes into this year's US OPEN with far better positioning and greater confidence about advancing deep into the bracket. Some top players from the 2019 event stepped back from touring, and their spots are now held by some of the sport's younger, budding stars.

So let's take a closer look at the top contenders for the 2021 title and lay down some odds.



# #1 KANE WASELENCHUK

Born: 11/09/81 (age: 39)  
Resides: Austin, Texas

Birthplace: Edmonton, Canada  
Height: 5' 10" Weight: 175

15x US OPEN Champion (2008-2019, 2003-2005)

Kane's talent and determination is unsurpassed. He has a career win-loss record of 608-53, good for a 92% winning percentage; however, there's another stop that will have been played (September 2021 in Chicago) that could tilt the scale a bit more in his favor before his US OPEN bid.

In addition to his 15 US OPEN Singles titles, Kane also holds 4 US OPEN Doubles titles with Ben Croft. He has 123 top tier titles, 50-plus more than the next player, cementing his legacy as the Greatest of All Time.

Kane was showing no signs of slowing down before the shutdown. When he will finally end his brilliant career is anyone's guess as he seems ready to continue adding to his impressive collection of titles.

There is a strong case to be made that Kane is one of professional sports' most accomplished athletes. His game is technically skilled and creative. The master of deception is extremely focused, hard-working, and has killer instincts. Having proven he is the best racquetball player on the planet, maybe the only question is how long he will extend his dominance. [2019 Headshot: Kevin Savory]



# #2 ALEJANDRO LANDA

Born: 3/20/88 (age: 33) Birthplace: Chihuahua, Mexico  
Resides: El Paso, Texas Height: 5'9" Weight: 163

Best US OPEN Finish: Semifinalist (2019, 2017, 2014)

Alex has developed into a consistent top performer on the tour over the last two years. Capturing four tour wins has improved his ranking from #10 in 2017 to #2 currently.

Starting part-time, he began the 2016-17 season ranked #45 and finished #10. Playing full-time 2017-18, he finished at #3 before becoming the first-ever Mexican player to overtake the #1 spot, briefly, at mid-season.

Landa began playing at age 12 in Chihuahua, Mexico, and represented Mexico on both the Junior and Adult national teams. He earned a silver medal in the Boys 18- at the 2006 Junior Worlds and a gold medal in doubles at the 2016 Pan American Championships. With his dual citizenship, he is currently representing the US National Team in singles.

Landa has an aggressive high-risk/high-reward game style and is at his best under pressure. He plays with an edge and a never-say-die attitude that allows him to always be in a match, regardless of the score. With another impressive season behind him, Landa remains determined to close out the year on a high note.





In the 2019 semifinals, Alex Landa (far left) struggled against Kane, and Conrrado Moscoso (below right) defeated Daniel De La Rosa in straight games. But Daniel returned the favor only recently to win Denver, so their next faceoff could go either way.



**Kane Waselenchuk: (1:5 odds)** — The chances of #16 slipping through the defending champ's fingers remain slim. Kane won the final IRT event prior to shutdown in March of 2020 but then struggled with court access near his home in Austin and missed the first two stops of 2021. A substantial lead in the rankings held him at #1 heading into Fall, allowing him to skip both Denver and Chicago and still retain his top seed here. How has the layoff affected him? As Kane nears 40, he has to be thinking about the next phase of his career, and he's launched a new clinical series with Sudsy Monchik as well as an online store featuring boutique sportswear at [krowningmoments.com](http://krowningmoments.com). But the new ventures won't distract him from his primary goal of winning the US OPEN, since he's always held a special place in his heart for this Grand Slam. It was his big "coming out" party to the racquetball world in 2000 and where he broke Cliff Swain's all-time tournament wins record in 2013. We may yet hear "big news" related to his future, but in the meantime if Kane is here and healthy, he's the man to beat.

**Conrrado Moscoso (4:1 odds)** — Many in the sport believe (especially in Bolivia, where racquetball rivals soccer as the national pastime), that Conrrado is the heir apparent to the throne. He has ascended

from South American obscurity to reaching the finals in four of his first eleven pro events and winning the 2019 Bolivian Grand Slam on home soil. He made the US OPEN finals in 2019 and the finals in the first two IRT events of 2021 (Atlanta and Denver). At both, Moscoso was favored going into the finals, only to lose each to Samuel Murray and Daniel De La Rosa, respectively. Many suspect that he had over-committed by playing the doubles finals the same day ahead of the pro singles finals. It's no surprise that his extended on-court time seems to catch up with him, both physically and mentally. Here in Minneapolis, he'll need his full focus, in every match, to top the players who have beaten him in recent months.

**Daniel De La Rosa (5:1 odds)** — Fresh off an exhilarating win in Denver, Daniel appears to be in top form. Playing through a leg injury, he held off

Daniel continues to ascend in the rankings and is fresh off a sterling performance in Denver with a win over Conrado Moscoso to claim a career fifth top-tier IRT title. With partner Alvaro Beltran, they are currently the #1 and #2 ranked doubles players in the world and are certain to make a serious bid to repeat their 2018 US Open Doubles victory this week.

He pivoted a junior career into a tour debut at 16, launching a meteoric rise up the ranks. He broke into the Top 8 at the end of the 2013-14 IRT season with a #5 finish, rose to #4 on the heels of his first Tier 1 title the next year, then finished the next season with a solid hold on the #3 spot. He then slipped to #4 after winning one T1 event and reaching the finals in another in 2017-18, before dipping to #6. He has now reclaimed #3.

Daniel is a gifted shot-maker with a powerful serve who is quick, collected, exudes confidence, and embraces high-pressure moments. His energetic and durable game style features lots of hang time as he contorts his body to retrieve balls with apparent ease. Off court, Daniel is married to LPRT pro Michelle Key De La Rosa and the couple enjoys spending time with their two children, along with golfing and excelling at pickleball.



## #4 SAMUEL MURRAY

Born: 6/04/92 (age: 28) Birthplace: Brossard, QC Canada  
Resides: Baie-Comeau, QC Height: 6'0" Weight: 215



Best US OPEN Finish: Round of 16 (2018)

Sam made a major breakthrough in capturing his first IRT title at the Atlanta Grand Slam stop in January. He barreled through four straight tiebreakers, including upsets over Daniel De La Rosa and Alex Landa, before beating Conrado Moscoso in the finals 11-9. The career best made him the first Canadian, other than Waselenchuk, to win a T1 stop.

On tour, he's been in the top 10 in each of the last three seasons and is just the third Canadian to reach that level after Kane Waselenchuk and Mike Green. He had been touring for the past several seasons and was ranked #7 when the tour was suspended due to the pandemic.

Murray is a member of Racquetball Canada's national team and has been Canadian Champion six times: twice in singles and four times in doubles, each with different partners. Internationally, Murray has been on Team Canada 10 times and won four medals. Known as a power player and an extremely intense competitor, this latest Canadian prodigy has become a solid player on tour. He gives the top players trouble, rarely loses to lower seeds, gains confidence with each advance, and continues to chart a steep performance curve.



## PLAYERS TO WATCH

**Jake Bredenbeck:** Looking for a breakthrough year, this power player looked fit and strong in Denver despite losing a tiebreaker to Portillo in the round of 16. Jake and his brother Sam have also begun their own clothing line, Beast Made Clothing, so he's gaining style points, too.

**Javier Mar:** At his every US OPEN bid, Mar has been underseeded, upset top players and made runs into the quarters. In 2017 he beat two top-8 seeds before falling to Carson. In 2018 he scored the highest game points (12) against Kane, then ran into the GOAT again in 2019. In many ways, this controlled and tactical player is similar to fellow Mexicans Landa and De La Rosa. With excellent touch on his serves, he can control matches by putting even the most aggressive and skilled receivers on their back feet. He could reach the semis given the right draw.

**Rodrigo Montoya:** Even boasting amazing international success (the reigning World Champion, 2019 Pan American Games gold medalist, and 2021 Mexican National champion), Montoya has struggled to make his mark on the IRT or at the US OPEN and needs to focus on the task at hand. He has the ability to go deep in any pro draw, but needs to leverage a spotless career record over Moscoso and beat the players he should in order to fulfill his promise.

**Eduardo Portillo:** Lalo made it to the semis in Denver, the semis at Mexican Nationals, and the semis in Atlanta. His lanky frame disguises an agility that rivals some of the best athletes on tour, and he's made incredible strides in all aspects of his game lately. He's gone from being "that kid" who happened to work his way into a final in early 2019 to being a threat to make Saturday or Sunday at every event. His just needs to find a favorable path; in the #8/#9 slot, he'll be heading home early at the hands of Kane in the quarters.


**Carlos Keller Vargas:** This Bolivian Team member has toiled in relative obscurity for years, despite high visibility on the international circuit. He holds two major IRF singles titles (the 2018 and 2019 Pan Ams) and made a strong push to compete on the cratered pro tour last season. Hot on the heels of a great showing at Bolivian Nationals, he made a deep run into his first pro semifinal in Denver with wins over Murray and Mercado. His unique game strategy relies more on placement over power on his drive serves as a way to set up subsequent rallies.

Eduardo (Lalo) Portillo in the semis and beat Moscoso in the finals in a textbook display of rally control. De La Rosa has bounced back from a stretch of difficult play in late 2019 that even had him questioning his future on tour. Now he is in the midst of a fantastic run of form that includes multiple pro titles, the 2020 Mexican National Singles Championship and several major outdoor titles. All the while, he's been growing his presence in pickleball, where he's a teaching and touring pro-level player, plus he has transitioned to a new project management career to support his growing family. Ironically, the balance between these activities has only sharpened his resolve, and he's thriving in both sports. Daniel has reached the US OPEN finals twice before and he's hungry and motivated. Could this be his breakthrough year?

**Alejandro Landa:** **(6:1 odds)** — In Kane's absence, Landa has been the #1 seeded player on tour but has not been able to take advantage and add to his career title totals. He lost a close 11-10 tiebreaker to eventual champion (and long-time doubles partner) Samuel Murray in Atlanta, then suffered a back injury that caused him to lose the quarterfinal to Eduardo Portillo in Denver. Landa recently switched country allegiances from Mexico to the USA, and promptly qualified for the US National Team. Landa plays a controlled, tactical game on the court and is incredibly adept at putting away setups. He has some curious losses on his resume and can struggle with pace, a good sign for some of the tour's harder hitters who might fancy their chances at an early round upset. Landa plays with passion on the court, seeming to embrace the bad boy narrative that was on full display during a rather "spirited" match against Andres Acuña in Denver. If he's healthy, no one wants him on their side of the draw, and it'll be a huge upset if he isn't in the semis come Saturday.

## #5 ROCKY CARSON

Atop the ranks for most of his career, he fought back from injury last season to reclaim a US Team spot with USAR singles and doubles wins. But he lost a close quarterfinal to Moscoso recently (as well as an OPEN upset in 2019),

which may haunt him. He holds 27 pro titles, made the US OPEN finals 8x, and is the only player to hold #1 IRT, WOR, and IRF titles concurrently.



## #6 CONRRADO MOSCOSO

Best US OPEN Finish:  
Finalist (2019)

Junior and international success led to an IRT debut at 22 with upsets into the quarters of the 2017 US OPEN. He brings fantastic power, incredible shot-making, and great hands. This streaky player depends on a huge serve then often dares



to take (and make) low-percentage shots that demoralize opponents. The key is to limit his foot faults, take more smart shots, and stay consistent.




## #7 ANDREE PARRILLA

makes in-game adjustments easily, and his confidence is growing. Probably doesn't hurt to drill with his sister Jessica (LPRT #8) either.



## #8 ALVARO BELTRAN

**Samuel Murray (10:1)** — Murray has been one of the tour's most covid-impacted players in terms of restricted court availability in his native Canada. Against all odds (and with precious little on-court prep), he won four tiebreakers in a row in Atlanta to earn his first Grand Slam championship title in January. He wasn't able to repeat in August, and suffered a surprise loss to Carlos Keller Vargas in the 16s in Denver. But his personal best title has catapulted him to a career high ranking, which will help with early round matchups in the large US OPEN draw. With the depth of players here, he'll have to raise the level of his game to advance to the later rounds, which will demand that he find a way to train consistently with solid play and practice time before setting foot in Target Center.

**Rocky Carson: (12:1 odds)** — After a decade of reigning near the top of the IRT ranks, Carson has begun to feel the steady advance of fresh pro talent. In the 2018-19 season, Carson made the semis or better in all nine pro stops. Since then, he's made the semis of just 3 of his 10 events competed, getting knocked out seven times in the quarters or earlier. Father Time won't be ignored, and this latest run of form exactly coincides with his turning 40. That being said, he remains in the top 8 and is one of the

fittest athletes out there, of any age. And he's still a threat to make a deep run. In a close match he no doubt thinks he should have won, he nearly made the finals in Denver but couldn't hold on to a commanding lead in a tiebreaker that went to Moscoso. He continues to compete at a top level while furthering his real estate career, combining surfing into his everyday workout routine, and being a spokesperson for the budding sport of Torques.

**Andree Parrilla: (long odds!)** — Definitely on the brink of great things, it's just too strange to consider someone who finished the last two seasons ranked No.4 on tour as a dark horse. Parrilla has been operating under the radar lately, outshined by the sudden rise of Moscoso, the resurgence of the veteran De La Rosa, and the international exploits of long-time rival Rodrigo Montoya. Parrilla suffered through an awful stretch of form in early 2020, but he was able to turn things around with an excellent run to the 2021 Mexican National finals. In Denver, Andree suffered an early defeat at the hands of eventual winner De La Rosa, but he continues to deliver solid, consistent performance and will be a difficult opponent for anyone in the quarters or semis here in Minneapolis. He certainly bears watching as he continues to make his mark on tour and especially at the US OPEN.



**IRT Pro Doubles** — It's always difficult to write an accurate doubles preview since we often don't know who is playing with whom until a week or two prior to the tourney. The two top teams are likely to be Waselenchuk/Croft and Beltran/De La Rosa. However, there are as many as twelve other potential pairs capable of teaming up to capture the title. So you can expect **everyone** to be in the doubles draw, and you can bet your last dollar there **will** be upsets. Nothing in all of sports compares to watching highly-motivated pro athletes compete for cash!







*The record held by Paola Longoria may never be broken, since she's captured this title more than any other woman in the sport's history.*

The UnitedHealthcare US OPEN finally opens the door for returning LPRT athletes, and they'll likely face the deepest draw of competitors in recent memory. Heavily favored is World #1 and defending champion Paola Longoria, who will be difficult to beat on a stage she considers her home. After a surprising upset in the 2019 doubles final, expect her to be just as intent on reclaiming that crown, too. Both singles and doubles draws are strong, and she'll be pushed hard by a young generation of rising tour stars.

**Paola Longoria: (1:2 odds)** — It's hard to truly comprehend the statistics that place Longoria as the odds-on favorite for another title. Undefeated for a decade, this ten-time winner has not lost a singles match on the big stage since 2010. It's very hard to suggest anything otherwise this year, with her 86-4 (95.5%) win ratio in tour finals since the 2010 season. She is, and may always remain, the most successful racquetball player to ever pick up a racquet, male or female. And this is the US OPEN, a place she has simply dominated. Odds aside, who would bet against her?

But while history lends credence to the expectation that Longoria will once again retain her title, recent months suggest that it may not be routine. First, Longoria lost in June to fellow Mexican Montse Mejia in the TeamRoot.com SuperMaxSlam final. She also lost in the doubles final, leaving a tour stop without a title in hand for the first time since 2013 (when the tour began fielding doubles on a regular basis). Let that sink in for a minute. Second, her drive to dominate didn't seem as sharp, which might give her opponents some hope that her aura of invincibility is fading. Third, she elected to skip the August stop altogether following a lengthy period in Tokyo providing TV coverage of the Olympics. It remains to be seen how the three-month break from competition, not to mention the recent tour losses, will affect her performance.



## #1 PAOLA LONGORIA

Longoria continues to solidify her place as one of the greatest professional racquetball players of all time. She has 11 season-ending finishes as the #1 player on the LPRT and is vying for her 11th United Healthcare US OPEN title.

Setting records unbelievable for most sports, she earned her 100th career win at the 2019 US OPEN Championships. Her victories include winning streaks of 36 consecutive tournaments and 152 consecutive matches and most recently a streak of 37 match victories for the LPRT 2018-2019 season. In addition to LPRT titles, her singles resumé includes three gold medals at the World Championships, two gold medals at the Pan Am Games and six gold medals at the Pan American Championships.

On top of all her outstanding racquetball accomplishments, she is a true sports star in Mexico. From magazine covers to TV shows, she is one of the most recognizable athletes in the country. *Forbes* magazine twice named her one of the most powerful women in Mexico. She makes regular appearances on ESPN Deportes, and this year she went to Japan with a Mexican Broadcast team to cover the Tokyo Olympics.



## #2 ALEXANDRA HERRERA



This hard-serving lefty has been quietly consistent as she has made her name known at the top of the ranks. Herrera is a steady top-3 ranked tour player and a near-guarantee for LPRT event semi-finals. She is a former IRF World Junior champion and has one of the most consistent forehands on the LPRT.

Herrera is a very tough left-side doubles player who, along with partner Montse Mejia, is the reigning US OPEN Champions. This duo also won the silver medal at the IRF World Championships in August 2018, and Mexican Nationals in 2018. They share a coming-of-age past lined with junior singles and doubles titles.


After having first stepped onto the pro tour at the US OPEN in 2012, she has made it to the semifinals 22 times and the finals 6 times. Her most recent final was at the World Singles and Doubles Open Championships in August 2021 where she fell short in the tiebreaker to Gaby Martinez. Her enthusiasm on the courts is unbounded, and this young lady is expected to keep ascending in the rankings with dedication and commitment.

With all that said, if you know Longoria, you know that she's highly motivated by losses. If you know Longoria, you know that little gives her more pleasure than beating the rising stars on tour. If you know Longoria, you don't expect her to hand over her US OPEN championship easily, or anytime soon.




**Maria Jose Vargas (4:1 odds)** — After taking time off in 2020-21 for the birth of her son, Maria Jose Vargas has been working her way back into top form. A finalist in 2019 and 2014 at the US OPEN, Vargas has demonstrated the ability to showcase her skills on the big stage. Now as #3 on tour, even after a significant absence, she will be a favorite to challenge the champ. Admittedly, she looked a bit shaky at the TeamRoot.com SuperMaxSlam back in June; however, the rust appeared to be gone by August when she lost a tough semifinal to Gabriela Martinez in Denver.

Vargas has one more important element working for her — she is one of the few players to have ever won a match against Longoria. In the fall of 2019, Vargas defeated Longoria in a tight tiebreaker at the By the Beach final. She had another chance at the Christmas Classic, leading 6-0 in the tiebreaker, but Longoria rallied to close it out for the title. So, while Vargas






## #3 MARIA JOSE VARGAS

Vargas is one of the most aggressive shot takers on the LPRT and one of an elite group who has won against Longoria. Her highest pro rank was #2, right before taking time off to start a family. Vargas has 4 LPRT Tier 1 titles and added her first Grand Slam victory to her resumé by winning the first-ever LPRT event in Bolivia in 2018.

Vargas, who is coached by Carlos Cuadri, is a fun player to watch. She is a formidable opponent for any player on tour and has one of the most challenging drive serves in women's professional racquetball history. Her willingness to dive for every ball creates exciting, long rallies. Since Vargas came onto the LPRT at the US OPEN in 2012, she has made 24 trips to pro finals, winning the title a total of five times.

Since Vargas made her LPRT debut at the US OPEN in 2012, she has made frequent trips to pro finals and taken games off of Longoria but has yet to beat her, making her a strong contender for an upset. Be sure to follow this mom's bid for a groundbreaking title win this week, cheered on by her husband, young daughter, and (hopefully napping!) infant son who was just born in April 2021.



## #4 GABY MARTINEZ

Martinez is the most recent LPRT event winner and a rising star with plenty of international experience. This talented, explosive player is known for her incredible court coverage and a fearless, aggressive game style. And she is all of 5 feet tall.

Martinez' tour debut was at the age of 15, at the 2014 Great Balls of Fire Pro-Am in Miami, Florida. She won her first pro event at the World Singles and Doubles Open Championships in August 2021. Her brief resumé also includes 6 pro semifinals and 8 quarterfinal appearances.

A veteran member of the Guatemalan National Team, she had been expected to win Girls 18&U at the IRF World Junior Championships in her last year of junior eligibility but lost to Mexico's Montse Mejia. That same

year she had been fresh off a rare win over Longoria at the 2018 IRF World Championships when she reached a US OPEN high point with a semifinal berth. Although she took a brief step away from the sport a few years ago, in what was thought to be a very early retirement, she is back and better than ever.



## PLAYERS TO WATCH

**Rhonda Rajsich** is a crowd favorite who always seems to be enjoying her time on tour. She turned back the clock at the US National Championships, claiming both the singles and doubles titles in July. A knee injury in 2019-20 seemed to hamper the veteran, but she remains fit, fast, and will use her vast guile and experience to challenge anyone. Expect the four-time champion to give her all.

**Natalia Mendez** quickly established herself as a top-eight player on tour yet has not had that breakout tournament. Full of energy and an unorthodox game, she can surprise with her athleticism and power. Her recent semifinal berth will give her plenty of confidence. So, could this be her moment?

**Valeria Centellas** exploded onto the scene with a 2018 IRF World Championship title in doubles at age 16! And, she has not disappointed since. Making waves in any draw, Centellas has soared up the rankings and now sits at #9. Her aggressive style and explosive play can beat anyone.

**Angelica Barrios** has a unique style that combines a little power with incredible touch. Rarely unsettled, she uses her opponent's pace against them and wins through control and percentage play. Do not be deceived by the almost casual looking shots and attitude; the Bolivian #1 knows exactly what she is doing.

**Veronica Sotomayor-Monchik** has not played on tour since the 2016-17 season, so how she will do in her first event in over four years remains to be seen. However, with a final and four semifinals to her credit, two of which were at the US OPEN, she is more than capable of making some noise.

certainly has the skills it takes to win, can she actually do it on the big stage? If so, her serve will simply have to dominate. Always entertaining, winning or losing, she'll be sure to pull out all the stops.

**Gabriela Martinez (6:1 odds)** — The defending 2018 world champion has had mixed results and roller coaster finishes on tour. A big-name win has often been followed by a poor showing, and a shocking "retirement" from the sport a few years ago made many question the long-term motivation of such a talented athlete. However, no one could ever question the effort exhibited by Martinez on court. At times, tactics and mental slips have cost her in big moments. That appears to have changed this year, and a different Martinez has emerged. Supported by Guatemalan coach Aaron Palomino, Martinez has developed an ability to adapt and focus on a strategic game plan. The result was a semifinal appearance in June, followed by her first pro title in August.

A pocket-sized spitfire, expect Martinez to shine on the big stage. Intimidated by no one, she'll scratch and claw her way to a victory if she must. What makes Martinez worth the odds given her? She has beaten Longoria, and in doing so won a world title. Can she do it again? Yes. Will she? Watch and find out.

**Montse Mejia (7:1 odds)** — Like Martinez, Montse Mejia is another prodigy that had not been living up to her potential. However, from almost nowhere, she roared through a huge draw at the TeamRoot.com SuperMaxSlam in June to defeat Longoria in two epic games and claim her maiden title. Fitter and faster than she's ever been, Mejia showed dogged determination to beat the best and do so in the big moment.

In the last three US OPENs, Mejia's hopes were dashed by Longoria. But her recent singles win, not to mention being the defending US OPEN doubles champion, will give her added confidence. A word of caution, however. Success is often followed by catastrophic failure, and Mejia, who was picked by many to win in Denver, fell early in the round of 16. Which Mejia shows up in Minneapolis remains to be seen, but she has the tools and experience to go all the way.

**Alexandra Herrera (10:1 odds)** — Ranked #2 on tour might suggest Herrera should have better odds, but her results at the US OPEN are not her best. Having never advanced beyond the quarterfinals, she has lost to Mejia, Martinez, and Rajsich the past three US OPENs, so history is not on her side. Plus,




she is 0-15 against Longoria, and if you want to win in Minneapolis, Longoria is the player you must beat.

That said, Herrera is stronger than at any point in her career. Pushing Martinez all the way in Denver's final, she fell just a few short points away from her maiden pro title in what turned out to be a classic battle. She is #2 for a reason, and her consistent serving and shooting cause havoc for most players. To win, she will have to execute to perfection.

**Samantha Salas (15:1 odds)** — Salas has been competing at the US OPEN since 2003, and while she has made it to two finals and four semis over the years, Vargas, Rajsich, and Longoria have each denied her bid for a win. Intense and hard-hitting may describe her play, and there is absolutely no question she will have done everything possible to be her best when the lights come on. Known for a dominating forehand, Salas has worked on a less effective backhand over the past two seasons, but it remains unclear whether its improvement will carry her past long-time nemeses. With 9 finals in 10 tournaments in the 2018-19 season, Salas was the clear #2 on tour. But, with only 1 final berth in the last 12 tournaments, Salas will have to revive her old form to shock the world.

**LPRT Pro Doubles** — This preview is always difficult since it's nearly impossible to predict who will partner with whom; however, it's fair to assume that defending champs Herrera and Mejia will stay together to defend and take on the odds-on favorites of Longoria and Salas. That still leaves many potential pairings, which can create an incredible depth of field. However, as most folks know, doubles is wildly unpredictable and upsets are the norm. Look for plenty of fireworks in every round of the LPRT doubles.

*The US OPEN is where magic happens, and with a tour deeper and more competitive than any time in recent memory, do not wait to the latter rounds for the upsets. With significant swings in rankings over the past 12 months, the seedings are unlikely to reflect current player form. So, strap yourselves in for a pulsating draw full of drama and action!*
